Pattan Man Tests Covid-19 Positive 5 Days After Death

SRINAGAR- Five days after his death and subsequent burial, swab samples of an 86-year-old man from Pattan area of north Kashmir's Baramulla district returned positive for the pathogen on Wednesday, taking the death toll due to the virus in Jammu and Kashmir to 34.

Official sources said that the octogenarian, a resident of Hamray Pattan Baramulla, died on May 29 and his sample was taken at the local Community Health Centre. The authorities had allowed the burial of the elderly as per covid-19 protocol after his family agreed to it. His sample report returned positive at CD hospital diagnostic laboratory today, re-
