India Speeds Up Work On Strategic Road Near China Border

Rushes Additional Troops To Forward Positions Along LAC: Report

PITHORAGARH: Helicopters have landed heavy road-building machinery in the tough Himalayan terrain of Uttarakhand's Johar Valley to help speed up construction of the strategic Munsiyari-Bugdiyar-Milam road near the India-China border, an official said.

After several failed attempts in 2019, the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) recently succeeded in carrying heavy road building equipment by helicopters to Laspa, raising hopes of the road's faster completion, BRO Chief Engineer Bimal Goswami said.

CHANDIGARH: The Punjab Police on General of Police Dinkar Gupta said Thursday claimed to have foiled a major attempt to smuggle arms and ammunition into Kashmir to carry out militant attacks there with the arrest of two alleged Lashkar-e-Toiba (LeT) operatives.

Cutting of hard rocks, which are standing straight on a 22-km portion of the road, will now become easy as heavy machines can be transported by helicopters to the spot.

"Construction of the road was started in 2010 with an amount of Rs 325 crore sanctioned for the project, the BRO chief engineer said.

He said the road is being constructed from both ends and except the 22-km hard portion, cutting work has been completed on 40 km of the road.

Meanwhile, India has rushed additional troops to the forward positions in Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Sikkim and Arunachal Pradesh fearing any 'misadventure' by China, ANI reported Thursday.

Quoting government sources, the report says that the Chinese army has deployed its troops all along the over 4,000 kilometre-long Line of Actual Control after which India has also rushed its fighting formations to forward locations in Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Sikkim and Arunachal Pradesh.

"The Chinese military has done military build-up not just in Ladakh but also in other sectors including Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Sikkim and Arunachal Pradesh wherever it shares borders with us. The build-up includes troops and heavy weaponry which are deployed in rear positions," sources said.

"To avoid any possibility of any misadventure by the Chinese, we have rushed in our fighting formations to forward locations in all these sectors," they added.

According to the report, the Indian side has also rushed in its new ultra-light howitzers and other heavy weaponry to the forward locations for countering this build up on the other side by China.

The report says that the reserve brigades of a Corps with an area of responsibility including Himachal Pradesh have gone up to the Ladakh sector to provide backup and cushion to the 3 Infantry Division based in Karu there.

It adds that additional fighting formations have also been moved forward to the border locations in Himachal Pradesh where Chinese choppers had shown up in April.

The report further adds that additional troops have been deployed in the Harsil-Barahoti-Nelang Valley and other sectors in Uttarakhand, where Chinese soldiers were seen carrying out foot patrols and chopper activity was observed before the buildup started.

Similarly, in the Eastern sector starting from the Chicken's neck corridor, the training brigades of the Corps formations including the Sukna-based 33 Corps and Tezpur-based 4 Corps have been deployed on the front locations and a Brigade of the 17 Mountain Strike Corps is also ready for deployment, the sources said.

The report says that along the LAC in Ladakh sector only, 10,000 PLA soldiers and heavy weaponry including tanks and long-range artillery guns have been deployed by China.

India, China Engaged To ...

This meeting was in continuation of our diplomatic and military engagement which both sides maintained in order to address the situation in areas along the India-China border," the MEA spokesperson said.

"It was agreed in the meeting that an early resolution of the situation would be in keeping with guidance of our leaders. The two sides are, therefore, maintaining military and diplomatic engagements to peacefully resolve the situation at the earliest and also to ensure peace and tranquillity in the border areas," he said.

"Sixty-seven new positive cases of coronavirus were detected in the union territory on Thursday," an official said.

According to officials, 24 of the fresh cases were from Jammu and 43 from the Kashmir region. The union territory has registered 52

deaths due to COVID-19 so far. The officials said Thursday's cases included 26 people who had

returned to the union territory recently. "A senior surgeon at SKIMS Hospital at Soura and two Jammu and Kashmir Police personnel are among those infected," the official

said Contacts of the doctor, including his colleagues, have been identi-

fied and put under isolation, the official added. Anantnag district in south Kashmir recorded the highest number

of cases at 13, followed by Jammu 11, the officials said. They said there were no fresh cases in six districts -- Shopian,

Ramban, Kathua, Samba, Reasi and Kishtwar. With Thursday's fresh cases, the total number of infected persons in Jammu and Kashmir stood at 4,574.

Of these, 3565 are in Kashmir, while 1,009 are in the Jammu region, an official said.

There are 2,702 active cases in the union territory -- 1,996 in Kashmir and 706 in Jammu -- while 1,820 patients have recovered, they said.

India Denies Visas To US...

Indian Foreign Minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar said the government firmly repudiated the surveys of the commission, which had little knowledge of the rights of Indian citizens, describing it as biased and prejudiced.

"We have also denied visas to USCIRF teams that have sought to visit India in connection with issues related to religious freedom," he told a lawmaker from Modi's ruling group in a June 1 letter.

The step was taken because the government saw no grounds for a foreign entity such as the USCIRF to pronounce on the state of Indian citizens' constitutionally protected rights, he added.

Reuters has reviewed a copy of the letter to Nishikant Dubey, an MP who had raised the issue of the panel's report in parliament. The US embassy in New Delhi referred all queries to the commission based in Washington, DC, which was not immediately available to respond.

The commission is a bipartisan US government advisory body that monitors religious freedom abroad and makes policy recommendations to the president, the secretary of state, and Congress. However, these are not binding.

India would not accept any foreign interference or judgement on matters related to its sovereignty, Jaishankar added.

US Envoy Says 'Very ... Large for International Religious Freedom, came hours after the

release of the '2019 International Religious Freedom Report' on Wednesday.

Mandated by the US Congress, the report documenting major instances of the violation of religious freedom across the world was released by Secretary of State Mike Pompeo at the State Department.

India has previously rejected the US religious freedom report, saying it sees no locus standi for a foreign government to pronounce on the state of its citizens' constitutionally protected rights.

Brownback, during a phone call with foreign journalists on Wednesday, said India has been a country area that spawned four major religions itself.

CIC Rejects RTI On Centre... that had occurred between 2001 and 2016. This is an essential

requirement under the Armed Forces (Jammu and Kashmir) Special Powers Act 1990, under which the armed forces of the Union operate in J&K.

In January 2018, the Union government had informed the Rajya Sabha that request from the government of Jammu and Kashmir for sanctioning the prosecutions was refused in 47 cases due to lack of sufficient evidence, prima facie.

A month later in February, Nayak had submitted an application to the Ministry of Defence under the RTI Act seeking copies of the Standard Operating Procedures, criteria and standards of measuring evidence used, designation of the final decision-making authority and inspection of the 47 case files. MoD transferred the RTI application to the Indian Army. Both public authorities denied they held in their custody any of the information described in the RTI application.

The matter escalated to the Central Information Commission in August 2018. The CIC conducted a hearing in February 2020, issued an interim order and reserved the final order to allow for additional submissions to be made after the hearing. On June 5, the CIC issued its final order permitting access to a copy of the orders issued by MoD refusing sanction to prosecute in each of the 47 cases. The CIC, however, rejected access to the concerned case files in the larger public interest. "Commission has considered the detailed arguments of the Appellant and the stance of Respondent No. 3 (the CPIO and the Army) as regards the denial of information on Para 5... under Section 8(1)(a) of RTI Act. While admittedly, Appellant has raised quite valid objections expounding larger public interest citing the Hon'ble Supreme Court judgement in the matter of Extrajudicial Victim Families Association Manipur (EEVFAM) & Anr Vs. Union of India & Anr.,," the CIC said in its order

"however we ought to appreciate the fact that the instant case hinges on an extremely sensitive aspect of the Kashmir conundrum. Given the limited jurisdiction of the Commission under RTI Act, the bench is neither adjudging the merits of the violation of human rights argument of the Appellant in relation to the alleged victims or their families nor the conjecture and surmises associated with the denial of prosecution sanction in the 47 cases referred to hereunder. Rather, the facts of the instant case require a dynamic attribution to the meaning of larger public interest within the framework of RTI Act by associating non-disclosure with larger public interest," the order adds.

The appellate body further said that the Commission is in complete agreement with Respondent No. 3((the CPIO and the Army) that disclosure of the elaborate aspects of the Army Operations will impact future operations.

"The disclosure of operational details will gravely impact the security and strategic preparedness of the Armed Forces, which by common knowledge is vital to the State's diaspora," the order reads. It adds that the other aspect of sensitivity lies in the inevitable vulnerability of this subject matter to speculations cutting across national and international borders; perhaps even trial by media that will emanate from such disclosure.

"As a cumulative effect, these eventualities may further compound the situation of unrest and instigate festering emotions in the State in addition to the international ramifications.... Indisputably, the larger public interest of the State (vis-a-vis its susceptibility to unrest) prevails over that of the alleged victims," the order by CIC reads.

"As regards, the contention of the Appellant that Section 10 of RTI Act can be invoked to severe [sic] the operational details, Commission finds the argument far fetched given the nature and form of information sought. Identifying and severing such intricate details from the papers, correspondence, file notings, emails etc desired in the RTI Application will invariably cause disproportionate diversion of the resources of the public authority as per Section 7(9) of RTI Act," it adds.

the street simmer, and went on to consume over 100 lives in Kashmir.

But before rage would engulf the valley, it was a local shopkeeper who, as a courier of the fatal news, had rushed towards the address of the Mattoos of Saida Kadal.

Like any other day, Ashraf was waiting for his son's return from tuition. As part of family fun routine, he would hide behind the door, and surprise his son with his sudden shouting appearance.

A hearty laugh would uplift the mood of the family-now grappling with a disturbing silence.

But that day, when his son's fate was sealed, the father-who was still wearing young looks on his yet to be furrowed facewas running like a crazy person on Srinagar streets-uttering his beloved's name: 'Tufail Souba'-before spotting him dead to his heartbreak.

They had retrieved a five-rupee coin from his son's clasped fist. "What unsettles me now, is the fact my son is buried at two places," the father lamented. "His brain lies buried at some distant corner of Gani Memorial Stadium where he was shot dead, while his rest of the body is sharing the sacred space with martyrs of Kashmir at Eidgah, Srinagar."

That year, amid street slaughter, Omar Abdullah as the controversial chief minister of the erstwhile state of Jammu and Kashmir broadcasted a sentimental message-"my chips are down". It hardly deterred the father from being the lifelong justice campaigner for his son.

What sets Mattoo and his tribe apart is their commitment for justice despite being denied the same so far. "Tomorrow," the father once said, "I would at least face my son, and tell him: 'Son, I did my best!' '

But to thwart his campaign, his son's killers were time and again declared "untraceable and untraced". He was offered blood money and told to move on. The father, however, continues to hold his fort.

And that's exactly why on that summer day, those three boys in his neighbourhood were speaking high of the man who has already walked miles to seek justice for his dreamer son, now forever silenced.

Zahra was recently charged under Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA) for her social media posts by the police in Kashmir. Under this stringent law, a person could be jailed for up to seven years. Her work focuses on people who have been going through immense sneering because of the conflict in Kashmir. An IWMF jury member while commenting on Zahra's work said that the story behind her work lends a closeness to her subjects, which requires a huge level of courage.

IWMF said in a statement, "We are deeply honoured to recognise the work of Masrat and others. Our winner and honourees this ear exhibited stunning emotion, dynamic composition and most significantly, put themselves in direct contact with those experiencing immediate suffering, at immense personal risk. Taking to micro blogging website Twitter, Zahra wrote that she was happy that her work has finally been recognized.

"After thanking Almighty, I would like to say a big thank to my mentor, Showkat Nanda, for his guidance, love and care. When I applied for the award earlier this year, he was there at every single step - from helping me prepare my application to editing and sequencing my work. Zahra also expressed her gratitude to her family, friends, colleagues and everyone who supported her when she was going through difficult times.

"I dedicate this award to the unshakable courage of my fellow journalists of Kashmir, especially women reporters and photographers," she said.

The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways through National Highways and Infrastructure Development Corporation Ltd (NHIDCL) invited bid ... for "construction of 14.15 km long tunnel across Zojila Pass on Sonmarg-Kargil section of NH-1 between union territories of J&K and Ladakh along with approaches" through an engineering, procurement and construction (EPC) contract.

The Zojila tunnel project and a road both will be built under EPC mode at an estimated cost of Rs 4,430 crore, as per officials.

Earlier Road Transprot and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari had said that the tunnel for all-year connectivity between Leh and Srinagar may undergo some design changes to prevent cost escalation as the government plans to complete the project at the earlier estimated cost of about Rs 6,800 crore.

"We are planning to make some design changes that may include doing away with escape tunnel and instead (have) alternative tunnels to cross from one side to the other as it will be my endeavour to prevent cost escalation and build it at the previous estimated cost of Rs 6,800 crore," he had told PTI. Though the revised project cost estimate of a little over Rs 8,000 crore has been sent to the Cabinet, "we are deliberating on minor design changes to prevent cost escalation," the minister had said.

"Besides the escape tunnel, we can do away with vertical shafts not compromising with safety," he had said, adding that rebidding for the project was expected in a month or two. Prime Minister Narendra Modi had in May 2018 laid the foundation stone for the Rs 6,800 crore project, billed as the Asia"s longest bi-directional tunnel, in Jammu and Kashmir. However, barely months after the foundation, the NHIDCL on January 15, 2019 terminated the contract awarded to troubled IL&FS group company IL&FS Transportation after it abandoned the project citing financial problems.

The project which was earlier constructed on hybrid annuity mode will now be converted into EPC mode, according to Gadkari.

The cancellation of the award in January last year was the second time NHIDCL had scrapped the contract for the 14.15-km tunnel project which would cut down the 3.5-hour long drive through the mountainous Zojila Pass to just 15 minutes. The corporation had earlier cancelled the bid of IRB Infrastructure. IL&FS Transportation in 2017 emerged as the lowest bidder in the rebidding process.

Unveiling a plaque for commencement of work for the tunnel, Modi had said, "Zojila tunnel is not a mere tunnel but a modern day marvel."

"We do remain very concerned about what's taking place in India. It's historically just been a very tolerant, respectful country of religions, of all religions," he said.

"COVID-19 does not see race, religion, colour, caste, creed, language or border before striking. Our response and conduct thereafter should attach primacy to unity and brotherhood," Modi said in a post on LinkedIn in February.

The Indian government, while previously rejecting the US religious freedom report, had said: India is proud of its secular credentials, its status as the largest democracy and a pluralistic society with a longstanding commitment to tolerance and inclusion.

The Indian Constitution guarantees fundamental rights to all its citizens, including its minority communities. It is widely acknowledged that India is a vibrant democracy where the Constitution provides protection of religious freedom, and where democratic governance and rule of law further promote and protect the fundamental rights.

We see no locus standi for a foreign entity/government to pronounce on the state of our citizens' constitutionally protected rights, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said in June last vear.

Earlier in the day, the US State Department in its India chapter of the report said that there were reports of religiously motivated killings, assaults, riots, discrimination, vandalism and actions restricting the right of individuals to practice and speak about their religious beliefs.

According to the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) data, 7,484 incidents of communal violence took place between 2008 and 2017 in which more than 1,100 people were killed, it said.

The Federation of Indian American Christian Organizations (FIACONA) in a statement welcomed the US annual religious freedom report.

FIACONA President Koshy George said that his organisation finds the list of incidents affecting the rights of the people to believe and practice their faiths as reported to be accurate though there are a few more thousand such incidents that have taken place in India during the reporting period.

work has been started on this project sofar.

The JKAP leader said that almost all roads connecting different areas in Srinagar particularly in Batmaloo constituency are in dilapidated condition and the commuters are immensely suffering on this account.

"Roads in Qamarwari, Mujgund, Lawaypora, Barthana, Parimpora, Boatman Colony, Takenwari and Bemina including Firdous Abad, NundReshi Colony, Toto Ground, Sir Sayed Abad, Bhakshi Abad, Iqbal Colony and Tengpora are fully damaged and potholes and ditches giving a tough time to the commuters," Sheikh observed. He said that Batmaloo constituency is hugely populated and the people of this area have been neglected by the government. 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Pregnancy And Pandemic

In recent days, there have been fears of a deeper community transmission in Kashmir. One indicator for this is the sharp spike in number of Covid-19 positive pregnant women. On June 8 Kashmir reported 620 new coronavirus cases, highest since the lockdown began on March 25. Among the cases were 51 pregnant women. This has taken their total number to 240. Such sharp spike in the number of Covid-19 positive pregnant women has taken the health authorities by surprise. They see it as one of the clearest indicators of the community transmission of the Coronavirus in Kashmir Valley. It is true the government has been specifically testing pregnant women, so more of their cases are coming to light.

In early May, Jammu and Kashmir Government had made COVID-19 testing of all pregnant women mandatory, after a local court took suo motu cognisance of the deaths of two pregnant women in south Kashmir's Anantnag district. Following the court's intervention, Divisional Commissioner, Kashmir, Pandurang K Pole, had directed the Health authorities "to devise a birth plan for the pregnant women so that they could be screened for COVID-19 well in time". Thereafter it was made mandatory for the pregnant women to be tested at least a week ahead of their delivery. But the authorities were surprised when not only the pregnant women turned out Covid-19 positive but their numbers kept steadily rising. In recent days things have become much worse. In the first four days of June, 70 pregnant women were diagnosed as Covid-19 positive. Most of the positive cases of pregnant women- around 79 - are from South Kashmir's Anantnag district which also tops the list of the cases in the union territory with around 400 cases. Kulgam, another South Kashmir district follows with around 50 positive cases of pregnant women.

The pregnant women are not picked up for testing as part of the regular testing regime that involves contact tracing of the Covid-19 positive patients. They come from general masses and their examination therefore falls into the category of random testing of the healthy population. Most of these pregnant women have no travel or contact history. Doctors are now advising pregnant women to avoid unnecessary visits to hospitals, clinics and diagnostic centers. They also stress the need for a dedicated help lines for pregnant women in each district where doctors are available on call to address the health-related queries of these women. A doctor on call will obviate the need for these women to visit health facilities which can be a source of infection.

Meanwhile, fresh coronavirus cases are growing exponentially in Kashmir Valley with the daily caseload now growing around 100 - 200 daily. Total number of deaths from the coronavirus contagion is now over 40. This has forced the administration to declare all districts in Kashmir Valley except Ganderbal and Bandipora as red zones ahead of issuance of new guidelines for easing out the corona lockdown. But to fight the community transmission the government needs to undertake some creative measures rather than go for another lockdown. It has to taken steps to strictly enforce social distancing while people go ahead with their daily lives. Government has done so with Covid-19

"It does not think," he went on, "it does not feel, and it lies totally outside the elaborate social nuances humans have carved out through patterns of communication, representation and discourse. And this, above all else, makes it a lethal adversary for the West. It has exposed how much of

Western society is permeated with influential people who have deluded themselves into thinking that their ability to manipulate words, images and sounds gives them the ability to control reality itself."

That the rules are now dissolving amid ideological double talk from health authorities says something important about the American capacity for political delusion In each stage of the response

to the coronavirus, this delusion has been at work. In the first stage it was liberals and portions of the public health establishment (including, fatefully, key decisionmakers) who treated the virus as something to be spun or narrativized away.

By the time this effort at reality-denial collapsed, the baton of narrative delusion had been passed to Donald Trump, who spent crucial weeks behaving as though the power of positive thinking could suffice to keep his glorious economy afloat.

Magic words of reopening

Eventually the plunging stock market and the rising infection rate forced even Trump to adapt somewhat to reality. But the next delusion belonged to some of his conservative supporters, who embraced the idea that the economic carnage was just the result of government policy — even though many stay-at-home orders only happened after steep drops in din-

ing and shopping and travel, not before — and that if the government simply spoke the right magic words of reopening, something close to normal life would immediately resume.

Now finally, amid the wave of protests against police brutality, the baton of words-against-reality has been passed back to the public health establishment, many of whose leaders are tying themselves in ideological knots arguing that it is not only acceptable but essential, after months circumscribing every sort of basic liberty, to encourage mass gatherings to support one particular just cause.

With this last turn, we've reached the end of the progression, because it means the original theory behind a stern public health response — that the danger to life and health justified suspending even the most righteous pursuits, including not just normal economic life but the practices and institutions that protect children, comfort the dying, serve the poor — has been abandoned or subverted by every faction in our national debate.

Yes, there are ongoing liberal attempts to prop up a distinction between mass protests and other forms of non-distanced human life.

But these attempts will fall apart: There is no First Amendment warrant to break up funerals while blessing Black Lives Matters protests, and there is no moral warrant to claim that only antiracism, however pressing its goals, deserves a sweeping exception from rules that have forbidden so many morally important activities for the past few months.

Pent-up energies

For the record, I still believe those rules were mostly right. The lockdowns lasted too long and imposed too much in certain places, and the George Floyd protests reflect pent-up energies that had to be released. But the rules bought time for warmer weather and social adaptations and hopefully a slower spread, they bought time for hospitals and masks and medical equipment, they brought us at least some distance closer to a vaccine — and on the evidence of the stock market and the jobs numbers, they did so without creating the total economic calamity that many on the right were prophesying.

That the rules are now dissolving amid ideological double talk from health authorities says something important about the American capacity for political delusion.

But it doesn't prove that we were wrong to implement them — not when there are thousands of people who are still alive, and whose lives emphatically matter, because we sustained restrictions for a time.

The progression I've described, though, in which all sides have embraced delusions or found something to value more than public health, does signal that there will be no further comprehensive attempt to fight the virus.

Trump and conservatism won't support it, the public health bureaucracy won't be able to defend it, and we didn't use the time the lockdowns bought to build the infrastructure to sustain a campaign of actual suppression.

So in this sense we are back with Elkus' original point. All the virus wants is targets, and if it doesn't ultimately find another hundred thousand victims, or more than that in some autumn second wave, it will not be political decisions or public health exhortations that save us.

On the left and right we've exhausted those possibilities, and like the earthlings unexpectedly preserved from alien domination at the end of "The War of the Worlds," now only some inherent weakness in our enemy can save us from many, many deaths to come.

A slow turn

oing by leading indicators, economic activity in India appears to have picked up, although marginally, as the restrictions stemming from the lockdown have been eased gradually across the country. While activity remains well below levels observed in the pre-COVID period, the pace of contraction in some of the economic indicators has moderated from the lows observed in April when the impact of the lockdown would have been more pronounced.

On the consumption side, data from GSTN shows that while e-way bills (both intra-state and inter-state) generated continue to contract, the pace of contraction has eased - from declining by a staggering 84 per cent in April to 54 per cent in May. The disaggregated data indicates a greater pickup in intra-state e-way bills as compared to inter-state bills, suggesting that perhaps inter-state restrictions continue to hurt the flow of goods. Over the course of the coming weeks, as restrictions are eased further, household consumption will rise as pent-up demand is satiated, though how and when this demand ebbs is debatable. On the production side, labour market data also suggests a gradual resumption of economic activity. As per CMIE data, the unemployment rate eased to 17.5 per cent during the week ended June 7, down from the peak of 27.1 per cent observed almost a month ago. As restrictions are eased further, and economic activity picks up, the labour market should slowly improve, although even a sustained pick-up may not translate to a recovery of all the jobs lost over the past few months as firms will focus on lowering their costs in light of continuing economic uncertainty. A similar trend is observed in electricity generation, and railway revenue (freight traffic) - while both continue to contract, the pace of contraction has eased, indicative of a resumption in some industrial and commercial activities. The RBI data also shows a spurt in transactions - the average value of IMPS transactions rose by 28 per cent in June, after contracting in May and April, while UPI growth is back to pre-COVID levels.

How economic activity shapes up over the course of the coming weeks and months will depend in large part on the spread of the virus and efforts to control its spread. Data volatility is likely to increase as the effects of the lockdown, and the response of households and firms to the health and economic uncertainty, play out over the coming weeks and months. However, it is possible that as in previous episodes such as demonetisation and GST, the formal sector gains at the expense of the informal sector. In that case, going forward, the official GDP estimates, which tend to capture the formal sector more accurately, may end up masking the pain in large parts of the informal economy. *The Indian Express*

he United Nations defines child labor as work that deprives children of their childhood, dignity, and potential, which is detrimental to their physical and mental health. Interferes with children's school life. Child labor exists as a threat to the world today. Today's children are the future of tomorrow. The progress and development of the country depend on them. But child labor hurts their physical and mental health. Problems such as working conditions, and abuse, premature aging, malnutrition, depression, drug dependence, physical and sexual violence, etc. detach these children from the mainstream of society. It is a violation of their rights. It deprives them of their rightful opportunity which can trigger other social problems.

World Child Labor Day

Child labor is a global challenge. Different countries have taken many steps regarding child labor. "World Child Labor Prohibition Day" is celebrated on June 12 every year to combat child labor. World Child Labor Day was started by the International Labor Organization in the year 2002. The purpose of this day is to highlight the need to protect the rights of children and to eliminate child labor violations in various forms of child labor. Another major problem responsible for child labor is trafficking. An estimated 1.2 million children are sexually abused and trafficked annually for child labor. India has a high rate of child trafficking. According to the National Crime Records Bureau, one child goes missing every eight minutes. These children are mainly victims of begging

Child Labor and Law

In accordance with the constitutional order, the Constitution of India states through various sections of fundamental rights and state policy-directing principles that no child under the age of 14 shall be employed to work in any factory or mine or engage in any other hazardous employment. The Child Labor (Prohibition and Regulation) Act 1986 prohibits the employment of children under the age of 14 in any illegal profession and in 57 procedures which are considered to be detrimental to the life and health of the child. These professions and processes are mentioned in the schedule of law. The Factory Act 1948 prohibits the employment of children under 14 years of age. Adolescents between the ages of 15 and 18 can be employed in a factory only if they have a fitness certificate from an authorized doctor. The law stipulates four-anda-half hours per day for children between the ages of 14 and 18 and prohibits them from working at night. Significant judicial intervention in action against child labor in India came from a 1996 Supreme Court decision directing the federal and state governments to identify, employ, and provide quality education to children working in hazardous processes and occupations.

How the future will survive child labor

literate parents about the shortcomings of child labor can help fight this crisis. Motivating parents to send their children to school can bring the dangers of child labor under control. Social workers, media persons, citizens Societies, NGOs, in fact, people from all walks of life need to unite against this issue so that our children can have a prosperous life. Covid-19 lockdowns may be gradually easing, but anxiety about the world's social and economic prospects is only intensifying. There is good reason to worry: a sharp economic downturn has already begun, and we could be facing the worst depression since the 1930s. But, while this outcome is likely, it is not unavoidable.

To achieve a better outcome, the world must act jointly and swiftly to revamp all aspects of our societies and economies, from education to social contracts and working conditions. Every country, from the United States to China, must participate, and every industry, from oil and gas to tech, must be transformed. In short, we need a "Great Reset" of capitalism.

There are many reasons to pursue a Great Reset, but the most urgent is Covid-19. Having already led to hundreds of thousands of deaths, the pandemic represents one of the worst public-health crises in recent history. And, with casualties still mounting in many parts of the world, it is far from over.

This will have serious long-term consequences for economic growth, public debt, employment, and human wellbeing. According to the Financial Times, global government debt has already reached its highest level in peacetime. Moreover, unemployment is skyrocketing in many countries: in the US, for example, one in four workers have filed for unemployment since mid-March, with new weekly claims far above historic highs. The International Monetary Fund expects the world economy to shrink by 3 per cent this year - a downgrade of 6.3 percentage points in just four months.

All of this will exacerbate the climate and social crises that were already underway. Some countries have already used the Covid-19 crisis as an excuse to weaken environmental protections and enforcement. And frustrations over social ills like rising inequality - US billionaires' combined wealth has increased during the crisis - are intensifying.

Left unaddressed, these crises, together with Covid-19, will deepen and leave the world even less sus-

tainable, less equal, and more fragile. Incremental measures and ad hoc fixes will not suffice to prevent this scenario. We must build entirely new foundations for our economic and social systems.

The level of cooperation and ambition this implies is unprecedented. But it is not some impossible dream. In fact, one silver lining of the pandemic is that it has shown how quickly we can make radical changes to our lifestyles. Almost instantly, the crisis forced businesses and individuals to abandon practices long claimed to be essential, from frequent air travel to working in an office.

Likewise, populations have overwhelmingly shown a willingness to make sacrifices for the sake of health-care and other essential workers and vulnerable populations, such as the elderly. And many companies have stepped up to support their workers, customers, and local communities, in a shift toward the kind of stakeholder capitalism to which they had previously paid lip service.

Clearly, the will to build a better society does exist. We must use it to secure the Great Reset that we so badly need. That will require stronger and more effective governments, though this does not imply an ideological push for bigger ones. And it will demand private-sector engagement every step of the way.

The Great Reset agenda would have three main components. The first would steer the market toward fairer outcomes. To this end, governments should improve coordination (for example, in tax, regulatory, and fiscal policy), upgrade trade arrangements, and create the conditions for a "stakeholder economy." At a time of diminishing tax bases and soaring public debt, governments have a powerful incentive to pursue such action.

Moreover, governments should implement longoverdue reforms that promote more equitable outcomes. Depending on the country, these may include changes to wealth taxes, the withdrawal of fossilfuel subsidies, and new rules governing intellectual property, trade, and competition.

The second component of a Great Reset agenda would ensure that investments advance shared goals, such as equality and sustainability. Here, the large-scale spending programmes that many governments are implementing represent a major opportunity for progress. The European Commission, for one, has unveiled plans for a \$838 billion recovery fund. The US, China, and Japan also have ambitious economic-stimulus plans.

Rather than using these funds, as well as investments from private entities and pension funds, to fill cracks in the old system, we should use them to create a new one that is more resilient, equitable, and sustainable in the long run. This means, for example, building "green" urban infrastructure and creating incentives for industries to improve their track record on environmental, social, and governance metrics.

The third and final priority of a Great Reset agenda is to harness the innovations of the Fourth Industrial Revolution to support the public good, especially by addressing health and social challenges. During the Covid-19 crisis, companies, universities, and others have joined forces to develop diagnostics, therapeutics, and possible vaccines; establish testing centres; create mechanisms for tracing infections; and deliver telemedicine. Imagine what could be possible if similar concerted efforts were made in every sector.

The Covid-19 crisis is affecting every facet of people's lives in every corner of the world. But tragedy need not be its only legacy. On the contrary, the pandemic represents a rare but narrow window of opportunity to reflect, reimagine, and reset our world to create a healthier, more equitable, and more prosperous future.

Don't bother yourself, we won't submit to sanctions: Iran to US

Tehran: Foreign Ministry Spokesman Abbas Mousavi has condemned US sanctions against Iranian shipping companies and tankers, saying Iran will not give in to such pressure.

"We advise the American officials to stop the imposition of unilateral sanctions, as their illegal and unilateral sanctions are more against their allies and global trade than Iran," Mousavi said on Wednesday

He said that the fresh US sanctions are not different from those already in place against the Islamic Republic, as Washington once put sanctions on the entire Iranian nation and now is sanctioning Iranian citizens or officials individually.

"American officials are categorizing the sanctions in detail, but they are only bothering themselves as the Islamic Republic of Iran will not submit to such sanctions and pressure," Mousavi said.

He said the illegal and unilateral US measures and its playing with international rules and regulations would be of no avail as "their sanctions are ineffective, have domestic consumption and do not enjoy international backing."

The Iranian official called on the international community to stand up to the US actions, which he said would af-

fect other countries as well. The remarks came two days after the US enforced the sanctions imposed on Iran's shipping network took, months after the State Department announced them in December.

The US blacklisted the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Lines (IRISL) and its Shanghai-based subsidiary, E-Sail Shipping Company Ltd, along with more than 100 ships and tankers over accusations of transporting items related to Iran's ballistic missile and military programs, as well as what it claimed were other "proliferation-sensitive items.

"These designations serve as a clear warning that anyone doing business with or otherwise supporting IRISL or E-Sail are exposed to potential sanctions and risk contributing to Iran's proliferationsensitive programs, including its nuclear and missile programs," US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said in a statement on Monday.

The new US sanctions are believed to further hamper imports of food and medical supplies into Iran at a time when the country is fighting to contain a deadly coronavirus outbreak

The sanctions also come in blatant defiance of growing international calls for Washington to ease its Iran sanctions, which have severely prevented the country's access to lifesaving medical items.



Covid may push 49 million into extreme poverty this year: UN chief

United Nations: Nearly 49 million more people are likely to fall into extreme poverty this year due to the Covid-19 crisis and every percentage point drop in the global GDP would mean hundreds of thousands of additional children will have stunted growth, UN chief Antonio Guterres has warned, calling on countries to act immediately to ensure global food security.

Secretary-General Guterres warned that unless immediate action is taken, it is increasingly clear that there is an impending global food emergency that could have long-term impact on hundreds of millions of children and adults.

There is more than enough food in the world to feed our population of 7.8 billion people. But, today, more than 820 million people are hungry. And some 144 million children under the age of 5 are stunted — more than 1 in 5



The number of people who are acutely food or nutrition insecure will rapidly expand. Every percentage point drop in global gross domestic product (GDP) means an additional 0.7 million stunted children.

children worldwide. Our food systems are failing, and the Covid-19 pandemic is making things worse," Guterres said at the launch of the policy brief on food security on Tuesday.

Nations must mobilise to save lives and livelihoods, focus-

ing attention where the risk is most acute. "Countries need to scale up support for food processing, transport and local food markets, and they must keep trade corridors open," he said. – PTI

Norway Mosque Attacker Gets 21-Year Sentence

OSLO : A 22-year-old Norwegian man who said he was inspired by far-right attacks was sentenced on Thursday to 21 years in prison after being convicted of killing his stepsister and opening fire in a mosque near Oslo last August.

The lawyer for the gunman, Philip Manshaus, had sought to use an insanity defense to argue that her client was not criminally liable, but the court made clear on Thursday that it considered him sane in handing down the sentence, which can be extended if he were to be considered a con tinued threat to society.

Speaking during the trial, Mr. Manshaus said his only regret was that he failed to cause more harm. He pleaded not guilty to murder and terrorism charges, claiming his acts



were in "self-defense" on behalf of "the European people."

He must serve at least 14 years, but the sentence could be extended indefinitely under conditions known as special detention.

UK PM offers new 'support bubbles' out of **COVID-19 lockdown**

At least four lawmakers, including a provincial minister, have died due to coronavirus in Pakistan.

Twitter Tests Feature That Stops Sharing Links If You Haven't Read Them

ashington, United States: Twitter said Wednesday it was testing a new feature that seeks to limit the sharing of articles by users who haven't read them.

The feature -- which asks users whether they have read an article before they retweet it -- appears to be aimed at slowing the spread of unverified information.

"Sharing an article can spark conversation, so you may want to read it before you tweet it," Twitter's support team said.

Twitter said it would be testing the feature on its Android application "to help promote informed discussion." "When you retweet an article that you haven't opened on Twitter, we may ask if you'd like to open it first," the company said.

In a reply to one user, Twitter noted, "We wanted to test a way to



improve the health of a conversation as it gets started." But it said users will "always have the option" to go ahead with the retweet.

Twitter and other platforms are struggling to contain misinformation, which often is passed along by users who fail to review details of the comments they are sharing.

Last month, Twitter decided to limit the reach of some comments by President Donald Trump, in one case because they were misleading and in another case because of a violation of platform rules promoting violence.

Christopher Columbus statue beheaded in Boston

statue of Christopher Columbus in Boston has been beheaded, police said Wednesday, as calls to remove sculptures commemorating colonisers and slavers sweep America on the back of anti-racism protests.

A Columbus statue was also vandalised in downtown Miami, and another was dragged into a lake earlier in the week in Richmond, Virginia, according to local reports.

The incidents come as pressure builds in the United States to rid the country of monuments associated with racism following massive demonstrations over the killing of George Floyd by a white police officer in Minneapolis last month.

Italian explorer Columbus, long hailed by school textbooks as the so-called discoverer of "The New World," is considered by many to have spurred years of genocide against indigenous groups in the Americas.

He is regularly denounced in a similar way to Civil War generals of the pro-slavery South.

From this data, the researchers estimated that those tested with SARS-CoV-2 in the four days after infection were 67 per cent more likely to test negative, even if they had the virus. When the average patient began displaying symptoms of the virus, the false-negative rate was 38 per cent, the study noted.

According to the researchers, the test performed best eight days after infection, which on average is three days after symptom onset.

But even then, they said the test had a false negative rate of 20 per cent, meaning one in five people who had the virus had a negative test result.

'We are using these tests to rule out COVID-19, and basing decisions about what steps we take to prevent onward transmission, such as selection of personal protective equipment for health care workers," says Kucirka.

"As we develop strategies to reopen services, businesses and other venues that rely on testing and contact tracing, it is important to understand the limitations of these tests," she added.

The sooner people can be accurately tested and isolated from others, the better we can control the spread of the virus, the scientists said.

Nepal Will Get Back Land **From India Through Dialogue: PM Oli**

KATHMANDU: Nepal's through Nepalese territory. Prime Minister K P Sharma India rejected the claim as-Oli has said that his government will seek a solution to the Kalapani issue through diplomatic efforts and dialogue on the basis of historical facts and documents.

"We will get back the land occupied by India through holding a dialogue," Oli said while responding to questions in Parliament on Wednesday.

He claimed that India built a Kali temple, created "an artificial Kali river" and "encroached the Nepalese territory through deploying the Army" at Kalapani. The river defines the border between the two countries

India rejected the claim asserting that the road lies completely within its territory.

Nepalese officials say that Nepal had control over the area before 1962 when the India-China war took place. At that time India stationed its army seeking permission from then Nepalese rulers for a temporary purpose, but it never removed its forces, they claim.

Although there are border issues in other areas such as Susta but the government has given priority to Lipulekh, Kalapani and Limpiyadhura as Nepali territories have not been captured by deploying army in other



Oli's claim comes in midst of a raging boundary row between the two countries with India sternly asking Nepal not to resort to any "artificial enlargement" of territorial claims after Kathmandu released a new political map laying claim over Lipulekh, Kalapani and

Limpiyadhura. The ties between India and Nepal came under strain after Defence Minister Rajnath Singh inaugurated an , 80-km-long strategically crucial road connecting the Lipulekh pass with Dharchula in Uttarakhand on May 8. Nepal reacted sharply to the inauguration of the road claiming that it passed

parts of its international border, Oli said in response to a question in Parliament. Earlier this week, the Nepalese Parliament unanimously endorsed a proposal to consider a constitution amendment bill to pave way for putting the new political map that includes Kalapani, Lipulekh and Limpiyadhura in Nepal's national emblem.

A discussion on the issue started in the Parliament since Minister for Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Shivamaya Tumbahanfe tabled a bill for the second amendment to the Nepalese Constitution to incorporate the new political map of Nepal on May 31.
