## Admin Orders Cancellation Of Land Mutations

**JAMMU: The divisional administration in this winter capital on Thursday directed all the Deputy Commissioners to cancel all the mutations of the state land transferred under Roshni Act in the districts.**

## Class 12 Board Exams Begin In Kashmir

**SRINAGAR:** The annual board examinations for Class 12 in Kashmir valley commenced on Thursday amidst COVID-19-related preventive measures put in place by the authorities to check the spread of the infection among the students, officials said.

They said the examination commenced across the valley as well as in the winter zone areas of Jammu division.

The examination was conducted smoothly with almost full attendance in adherence to COVID-19 SOPs, the officials said. The candidates were briefed

about the concessions granted in the examination that they had to attempt only 60 marks out of 100 marks, they said.

This year, one supervisor for 20 students were appointed instead of 30 students, so as to follow the social distancing norms, they added.

As many as 58,514 candidates are appearing in the examination for which 626 centres have been established whereas from winter zone areas of Jammu division 15,055 candidates are appearing in 188 centres, the officials said.

## MMU Forms 'J&K Halal Certification Board'

**SRINAGAR:** Jammu and Kashmir Mutahida Majiles-e-Ulema (MMU), an amalgam of various religious organisations on Thursday announced formation of first ever 'Halal' food certification board to ensure halal, hygienic and pure food is served to the people.

The decision to form "J&K Halal certification Board" was taken during a one-day session held recently at Mirwaiz Manzil Rajouri Kadal here, an MMU spokesperson said Thursday. He said the participants unanimously emphasised the need for such certification to ensure that halal practices relating to slaughtering and food manufacture are followed and people are provided

with halal, hygienic and pure food.

"There was a consensus among all members that as mechanical slaughter house cutting and packing plants and food processing and manufacturing units are coming up across J&K, a halal certification board comprising of Islamic scholars needs to be formed," the MMU spokesperson said.

"Besides, this will greatly help the local manufacturers in export of these items to the people in other Muslim countries," he added.

He said that clerics unanimously agreed and subsequently constituted "The Jammu & Kashmir Halal certification Board" under the patronage of MMU head and Mirwaiz e Kashmir Moulvi Muhammad Umar Farooq,

### Govt Cites Poll Threat To Extend 4G Ban

**SRINAGAR:** Barring districts Ganderbal and Udhampur, the authorities on Thursday extended high speed 3G and 4G internet ban across Jammu and Kashmir for another fortnight.

While high speed internet remains banned in the J&K from August 5 last year, the government has cited attempts to disrupt upcoming polls for which it said that the subversive elements 'heavily rely' upon it.

The government said the recently announced elections to 280 District Development Council Constituencies and bye-elections in PRIs/ULB, spread across J&K are witnessing "high level of interest" amongst the people.

"It is apprehended that the (militants) and separatist elements shall make every possible attempt to disrupt the democratic process. During the last fortnight, there have also been targeted killing of the civilians, political activists, that manifest the nefarious designs of the (militants) to dissuade general public from participating in the election process," reads an order issued by the Principal Secretary Home Shaleen Kabra.

## 27 PAGD Candidates File Nomination Papers For District Polls

**SRINAGAR:** The People's Alliance for Gupkar Declaration (PAGD), an amalgam of seven political parties in Jammu and Kashmir seeking restoration of the erstwhile state's special status, on Thursday fielded 27 candidates from three parties including National Conference (NC), Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) and Peoples Conference (PC) for the forthcoming District Development Council (DDC) polls

The NC is contesting 21 of the 27 seats in the Kashmir valley, the PDP, led by Mehbooba Mufti, is contesting four, while the Sajad Lone-led People's Conference (PC) will field candidates in two

## In FOCUS Inside Dal Dwellers' Decaying Lives At Rakh-E-Arth

Life for an erstwhile tourist guide Nazir Shangloo in the wilderness of flood basin turned human settlement has been a lingering nightmare.

Born and brought up as an "amphibian" in the heart of the Srinagar city's famed Dal Lake—where the Imperial Englishmen's departure from the 1947 would open the recreational spaces for the westerners and influence the Dal dwellers' life-style—Nazir knew a different life.

He was a Hanji for the larger Srinagar inhabitants, but always

an adventurous soul who peaked heights with his high-end tourists during his heydays.

But all this came to a grinding halt after his water-borne tribe was uprooted from the Dal Lake and left to fend for themselves at the forgotten corner of the city where flood waters quite often inundate lives.

Today, Nazir is a pale-shadow of his past. His handsome looks have now paved way to a frown face and a receding hairline.

"They threw us from our birthplace by terming us polluters," Nazir shares his tribe's torment.

"But now, they've proved friends



to none — neither to us whom they dumped into this flood-basin, nor

to Dal Lake which is putrefying right under their noses despite in-

vesting crores of rupees on it."

Nazir's new home is situated on the outskirts of Srinagar, which is known for acting as a flood sponge for keeping the heritage city of Srinagar safe from brimming Jhelum.

This forgotten territory was to be the new home for Dal dwellers, a community of people who were ex-tricated from mesmerizing Dal Lake and resettled in Rakh-e-Arth.

The much-touted modern colony was supposed to have schools, hospitals, recreational facilities, playgrounds, and every means of development that justified relocation.

The reality, however, was a far cry.

Only a handful of people were aware of Rakh-e-Arth's existence and even fewer knew its address. Arriving here was an all-new challenge.

Shrouded in dust and mystery, Rakh-e-Arth was nothing that the documents claimed. Potholed roads, lopsided structures, and abandoned playgrounds are some of the sights that greet its visitors.

The resettlement colony was to be the government's answer to encroachment problem and an effort to preserve Srinagar's prized possession — the Dal Lake.

The erstwhile residents were promised a package of land, monetary

compensation, and liveable environs in exchange for giving up their lives and sources of income at the lake.

But what Lake and Waterways Development Authority (LAWDA) gave them instead was a poorly-planned and unliveable expanse of marshy flood land.

From being situated in a flood channel to reeling from negligence, Rakh-e-Arth soon became its residents' worst nightmare.

The floods of September 2014 was a sordid reminder of how their fates have been sealed in what could be a lifetime of struggle just to survive.

The residents claim that their houses were damaged beyond redemption with very little help from the government to rehabilitate them. They continue
