CAG Picks Holes In 5 Dev Projects In J&K Under PMDP

SRINAGAR: The Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India, in its latest audit report, has picked up some serious gaps and loopholes in five Development projects for the erstwhile state of J&K, that may have thwarted the infrastructural development of J&K.

In its report on implementation of the Prime Minister's Development Package (PMDP), the CAG has said that the Development projects include sectors relating to Tourism, Agriculture, Horticulture, Urban Development along with the funding for Externally Aided Projects.

Notably, there are 13 projects for J&K with a total project outlay of 5,521 crore in this sector and out of these



13 projects, five projects that have an outlay of 2,285 crore were selected by CAG for test check in Audit report.

As per CAG, against the total project cost of 2,285 crore for the five selected projects, an amount of 1,470.06 crore was released and an expenditure of 1,309.51 crore had been incurred with an unutilised

balance of 160.55 crore (11 per cent) as of 31 March 2019. "During the period from

2015-2016 to 2018-2019, funds ranging between 13.76 crore and 194.63 crore had remained unutilised with the Mission Director of Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation(AMRUT)." The

CAG report reads. "Further, project funds ranging between 25.48 crore to 54.73 crore were lying unutilised with six designated offices of Mission cities/ implementing agencies at the close of each year during the period from 2015-2016 to 2018-2019 resulting in blockage of funds. Against the availability of 181.86 crore during the year 2019-20, an amount of

2019-20, an amount of 141.73 crore was released by the Mission Director, leaving a balance of 40.13 crore unutilized as of 31 March 2020."

Rapid Testing In Kids To Catching Covid Via Breastmilk: What Studies Say

The following is a summary of some recent studies on COVID-19. They include research that warrants further study to corroborate the findings and that has yet to be certified by peer review.

Rapid antigen tests may be unreliable in children

When used in children, rapid antigen tests for detecting the coronavirus do not meet accuracy criteria set by the World Health Organization and U.S. and UK device regulators, according to researchers who reviewed 17 studies of the tests.

The trials evaluated six brands of tests in more than 6,300 children and teenagers through May 2021. In all but one study, the tests were administered by trained workers. Overall, compared to PCR tests, the antigen tests failed to detect the virus in 36% of infected children, the researchers reported on Tuesday in BMJ Evidence-Based Medicine. Among children with symptoms, it missed 28% of infections. Among infected kids without symptoms, the tests missed the virus in 44%. Only about 1% of the time did the tests mistakenly diagnose the vi-



rus in a child who was not actually infected.

Given that more than 500 antigen tests are available in Europe alone. the authors said, "the performance of most antigen tests under reallife conditions remains unknown." But the new findings "cast doubt on the effectiveness" of rapid antigen tests for widespread testing in schools, they concluded. Breastmilk transmission of CO-

VID-19 unlikely A new study appears to confirm smaller, earlier studies that suggested nursing mothers are un-

likely to transmit the coronavirus

in breastmilk.

Between March and September 2020, researchers obtained multiple breastmilk samples from 110 lactating women, including 65 with positive COVID-19 tests, 36 with symptoms who had not been tested, and a control group of 9 women with negative COVID-19 tests. Seven women (6%) - six with positive tests and one who had not been tested - had non-infectious genetic material (RNA) from the virus in their breastmilk, but none of the samples had any evidence of active virus, according to a report published on Wednesday in Pe-

diatric Research. Why breastmilk would contain coronavirus RNA but not infectious virus is unclear, said study leader Dr. Paul Krogstad of the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA, "Breastmilk is known to contain protective factors against infection, including antibodies that reflect both the mother's exposure to viruses and other infectious agents and to vaccines she has received," he noted. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advises that before breastfeeding, bottlefeeding, or expressing milk, women with COVID-19 should wash their hands or use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. The CDC also recommends that they wear a mask when within 6 feet (1.8 meters) of the baby.

New technique may speed vaccine, antibody drug development

Researchers are working on a way to speed development of vaccines and monoclonal antibody drugs for COVID-19 and other illnesses, shortening the time from collection of volunteers' blood samples to identification of potentially useful antibodies from months to

As described in Science Advances on Wednesday, the new technique employs cryo-electron microscopy, or cryoEM, which involves freezing the biological sample to view it with the least possible distortion. Currently, "generation of monoclonal antibodies involves several steps, is expensive, and typically takes somewhere on the order of two to three months, and at the end of that process you still need to perform structural analysis of the antibodies" to figure out where they attach themselves to their target, and how they actually work, explained Andrew Ward of Scripps Research Institute in La Jolla, California.

In experiments using the new approach to look for antibodies to HIV, "we flipped the process on its head... by starting with structure,' Ward said. Because cryoEM affords such high resolution, instead of having to laboriously sort through antibody-producing immune cells one by one to identify promising antibodies, the process of identifying antibodies, mapping their structure and seeing how they are likely to attack viruses and other targets goes much faster, he added The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the need for such robust and rapid technologies," his team concluded.

Kids Whose Grandparents Are Overweight Are Almost Twice As Likely To Struggle With Obesity

School holidays can be a special time for extended families to gather. Children may see their grandparents at seasonal gatherings or as part of childcare arrangements to help working parents. New research suggests the biology, environment and the food they share contributes to children's future health.

According to the World Health Organisation, 39 million children under five years are overweight. Some 25% of Australian children and adolescents are overweight or obese.

How parents contribute to their offspring's obesity risk is well established but the link between grandparents and grandchildren has been less clear. Our systematic review of studies involving more than 200,000 people around the world confirms obesity is transmitted across multiple generations of families. We still need to figure out why and how to break this

Setting up for a lifetime of health issues

Obesity among children and adolescents is associated with developing health problems. These include high blood pressure, cholesterol imbalance, insulin resistance, diabetes mellitus, accelerated growth and maturity, orthopaedic difficulties, psychosocial problems, increased risk of heart disease and premature mortality. We examined the current glob-

al evidence on the association between grandparents who are overweight or obese and the healthy weight status of their grandchildren. We looked at 25 studies that involved 238,771 people from 17 countries. The combined data confirms obesity is transmitted multigenerationally - not just from parent to child but also from grandparent to grandchild.

We found children whose grandparents are obese or overweight are almost twice as likely to be obese or overweight compared to those whose grandparents are "normal" weight.

Nature and nurture?

Further research is needed into how children's obesity status is influenced by their grandparents but there are likely two pathways at work. The influence could be indirect via parents' genes or occur directly through the roles played by grandparents in children's upbringing. Let's start with biological fac-

tors. Both egg and sperm cells contain molecules that respond to the nutritional intake of parents. This means traits that are susceptible to high weight gain can be passed on from grandparents to parents and then to their grandchildren. And evidence shows genetics, environmental factors, lifestyle and eating habits all play key roles in predisposing individuals to

What we eat and feed our family members can lead to the expression of certain genetic traits (a term referred to as epigenetics) which can then be transferred to successive generations. Due to shared familial, genetic, and environmental factors, obesity tends to aggregate within immediate families and studies have consistently reported an intergenerational transmission of obesity from parents to children.

Food intake can also influence health and biology across multiple generations. In Sweden, a study reported adequate food for paternal grandparents at ten years of age reduced heart disease and diabetes and increased longevity among their grandchildren.

Food and family

So, grandparents' weight status and choices about what and how much is eaten in their home could influence their grandchildren's weight directly or via the children's parents. These influences may be greater or less significant depending on the role grandparents play as primary care givers or in shared living arrangements. According to the recent Australia's Seniors' survey, one in every four Australian grandparents provides primary care to their grandchil-

Grandparents' role as caregivers significantly affects children's healthy eating knowledge, attitude, and behaviours. This might be seen in the meals shared, recipes passed down or special treats for loved ones. Such habits can add to childhood obesity risks, above and beyond genetic factors.

Working on prevention

Our research shows the importance of including grandparents in obesity prevention strategies. In addition to parents, grandparents could be oriented to provide guidance on responsible feeding, recognising hunger and fullness, setting limits, offering healthy foods and using repeated exposure to promote acceptance. They can help encourage regular exercise and discourage coercive feeding practices on their grandchildren.

While our study shows a mul-

tigenerational link in the transmission of obesity, most of the available evidence comes from high-income countries - predominantly America and European countries. More studies. especially from low-income countries, would be helpful. Further investigation into the effect of grandparents on grandchildren's obesity across different races and ethnicities is also needed. Grandparents have varied social and cultural roles in the upbringing of their grandchildren around the world. More data could help design effective obesity prevention programs that recognise the vital importance of grandparents.

AAC Pays Tributes To Gaw Kadal Victims

Srinagar: Jammu and Kashmir Awami Action Committee (AAC) Friday paid tributes to the victims of Gawkadal on their 32nd anniversary and said that despite the passage of more than three decades, the families of the martyrs are still awaiting justice.

Expressing sympathy and solidarity with the victims, the AAC, especially its incarcerated Chairman Mirwaiz Umar Farooq, has urged the workers of Darul Khair Mirwaiz Manzil to immediately visit the area and ensure all possible assistance to the families affected by the fire.



Deals On Wheels

o the unsophisticated, it does not make sense to have society running on the wheels of debt, and yet that is precisely what is happening in Kashmir despite the general age-old disquiet about deliberately running up sizeable monetary liabilities. Like fish to water, Kashmiris have taken to the easy car loan financing offers with a gusto matching their enthusiasm for transitory fads in the past, like buying three-wheelers or opening public call offices, to name just two. But the present case is a more lasting phenomenon as it panders to the primal urge in almost every human-being to go automotive. As simple, timid minds grapple with the mystery of lending agencies hoping to sustain themselves even after making massive long-term advances with minimum returns, bolder elements have pounced on the chance of acquiring wheels in record numbers. No one grudges people their partiality to four-wheeled locomotion, but a few questions are inevitable.

It is not clear why lending agencies were suddenly made to open the flood-gates in Kashmir for an explosion of debt-financed motoring when other critically urgent issues like power were hanging fire. Successive governments at the state and the center have studiously failed to address the wholly iniquitous arrangement on exploiting the state's hydel resources that has piled up a mountain of debt on Jammu and Kashmir besides keeping it in chronic shortage of power, and yet Kashmiris are being encouraged to sink deeper into liabilities at the individual level for the dubious satisfaction of driving a car.

Here is a society unable to meet its own wage bill, but would nevertheless be seen zooming about in trendy automobiles in a false reflection of its economic reality. Who would believe that Kashmir, whose streets today are choc-a-block with all manner of vehicles, is unable to finance adequately manned municipalities for the basic task of keeping cities and towns clean? The shoddy and poverty-ridden state of civic bodies – and other government departments – is at sharp variance with the meretricious affluence projected by the presence of a vehicle at virtually every doorstep.

This is not to oppose or deride the public will to own cars, but to point out that the practice should be in line with the real economic status of individuals and the society. Opinions may vary about whether it is prudent to go into debt to fund fantasies –life, after all, is given us once to enjoy – but should the economic independence of a debtless state be compromised so rashly by hedonistic self-indulgence?

Apart from the more esoteric aspects of the issue, there are prosaic, mundane concerns that appear to have been given a total go-by by policy-makers in introducing such lax and freewheeling access to car finance. Though one is tempted to attribute ulterior motives to making Kashmir a car-happy paradise, it would be more proper to point

out just two issues that have been overlooked in this entire enterprise. Cities worth the name plan decades in advance for factors like growing population and growing traffic volume. But Srinagar and the major towns in the valley are still stuck in the early seventies with respect to their capacity to handle burgeoning demand for land, housing, and of course, roads. Though the early years of militancy had choked the inflow of new vehicles, the past decade has seen a phenomenal rise in this respect, with the recent financial assistance opening the floodgates. This phenomenon has totally over overwhelmed the system and the existing infrastructure, and sent authorities into a desperate tizzy in planning expressways and flyovers that may take years more to materialize. The toll that will be exacted in the meantime is incalculable, and Kashmiris, particularly in Srinagar and major towns, can be assured of a protracted ordeal on the roads, having pitifully little room to take their cherished vehicles through. No one in the exalted policy-making circles appears to have applied his or her mind to the highly limited capacity of Srinagar and the towns to handle growing volumes of traffic before allowing such liberal funding of automobiles. The results are there for all to see, and one does not require a crystal-ball to know what the coming years will bring.

Administrations in more advanced cities, for example Singapore, have put a ceiling on vehicle ownerships by imposing heavy taxes on private cars in a rewarding step to protect the environment and ensure smooth civic functioning. Highly efficient public transport systems have been put in place to facilitate swift, affordable transit of huge masses of passengers. But, in contrast, what is seen in Kashmir is a mongrelized policy that has difficulty in deciding whether it is oriented towards a public system or a totally private mode. The thoughtless manner in which heavy procuring of commercial passenger vehicles is being allowed side by side with private cars is an ample indication of the total absence of direction in the government.

It seems Kashmiri weddings have made the Green Bottle Del Monte and Badami Drink

their official event partners. Even this was palatable had we not just gone rogue with having fancy boxes, fancy trays, fancy napkins and a whole lot of things just to reassure

"too religious".

the ladkay walay/souin that they are being respected. I wish our society could think of a way to show respect in a way that didn't entail them to add one item to the menu for the Baraatis.

Not to forget the schizophrenia that

is omnipresent. If you throw an extravagant party — you are deemed deserving of the wrath of Allah. And God forbid, if you have a simple wedding with a few guests — you are declared a miser. Infact, all previous dawats are considered debts to you. Incase, a groom comes with a huge courtage of guests, it is said that they are giving Izah/ hard time to the bride's family. On the other end, if a groom decides to drop by with two or three people, he is deemed

a prude. Everyone laments the fact

that the bride has bagged someone

dress these baskets well or else you will invite the scorn of society. Nothing as dull as a Majma/basket which hasn't been decorated in an elaborate manner. But worry no more, we have various ventures that get the work done for you. The trend is showing no signs of stopping. Perhaps, when we run out of all kinds of flowers, money and decorations to dress the majmas— we shall also attach a picture of the bride and groom — smiling uncomfortably, placed awkwardly, cello taped onto a basket of almonds.

Perhaps, even worse than extravagance, is how alien some trends are to Kashmiri culture. The clothes, their silhouettes, the decorations, the food, the treats, the goodies and even the ceremonies have become oddly unfamiliar. Instagram feeds are filled with pictures from what is called a, "haldi ceremony". The closest a Kashmiri muslim would have come to this ceremony before would have been in daily soaps and bollywood movies. It was all fun and good, till we actually went on and started incorporating it in our culture.

Do not even get me started on the Maharaja style sofas on the "stage" set for the bride. These sofas are golden and gaudy. Any walnut made sofa or settee would cry tears of lament over being considered lesser than these run of the mill furniture pieces.

We also have photo booths at weddings now. Some seem alright. They have a pretty assembly of flowers. However, some just make a rather loud attempt to stand out. In one of the weddings that I attended recently, there was an "Indian Village" setup with the charkha and that quintessential village wheel. There was no sign of anything remotely Kashmiri.

I don't think any of these observations are new for any common Kashmiri. We know that ironically, Kashmir, which should be preserving its culture, is often too ashamed to take pride in it. Anything from Kashmir, doesn't make the cut.

It doesn't suit the elites of Kashmir to send sweets as gifts from a local bakery — not even from a popular one. It has to come from "dilli". Only then your offerings will be deemed unmatched.

All these events, customs and trends would have been harmfless, had they not have had the capacity to create desire and standards in our society. With social media, everything is advertised. It has to be. You do not even realise that by allowing your service providers to share their services online through your wedding photos — you are actually allowing them to make you an advertisement — a commodity.

There's grace in being mindful of the many challenges we are facing these days. Instead of making marriages inaccessible, one must strive to come up with ways to discourage such trends. Only then will our society, let people from all economic backgrounds, have easy access to blessings like marriages. No woman should have to worry about being able to afford marriage.

It is a telling comment on our society, since this is precisely the case.

The Pandemic Is Birthing Billionaires And Killing The Poor

s we enter year three of this cruel pandemic, amid its turmoil, we are still tempted to reimagine our world.

When the pandemic first struck, with and poor united in fear Mighty politically.

rich and poor united in fear. Mighty politicians decried nationalistic selfishness, chided "greedy as hell" corporate conduct, and promised a vaccine would be a public good.

It felt like there was solidarity. But only at first.

As we grieve all those killed by virus – over 5.5 million deaths have been officially reported, but the pandemic's true death toll is estimated at over 19 million lives lost – we see that greed has been busy at work.

We enter 2022 witnessing the biggest increase in billionaire wealth since records began. A billionaire was created every 26 hours during this pandemic. The wealth of the world's 10 richest men alone has doubled, rising at a rate of \$15,000 per second. But COVID-19 has left 99 percent of humanity worse off.

Our malaise is inequality. Inequality of income is now a stronger indicator of whether you will die from COVID-19 than age. In 2021, millions of people died in poorer countries with scant access to vaccines as pharmaceutical monopolies, protected by rich countries, throttled their supply. We minted new vaccine billionaires on the backs of denying billions of people access to vaccines.

Because inequality harms us all, we are all put at risk from the variants that inevitably emerge from man-made vaccine

apartheid. In the same way, we all lose in our democracy from elite power and from a climate crisis driven by the overconsumption of the top 1 percent, who are responsible for double the emissions of the bottom 50 percent.

This is not rich versus poor anymore: It is

the super-rich versus us all.

New Oxfam estimates show that inequality contributes to the death of at least one person every four seconds. And that is a conservative figure. This economic violence exists not in spite of extreme

wealth, but because of it.

It would be tempting to

It would be tempting to view this all as simply business-as-usual rich-doing-well once again. But these data, compiled and calculated in Oxfam's new paper "Inequality Kills", are off the charts. Billionaire wealth, for example, has risen more since the pandemic began than in the previous 14 years combined. The IMF, World Bank, Crédit Suisse, and World Economic Forum (WEF) all project a spike in inequality within countries.

The super-rich are having a great pandemic. So much of the trillions of dollars, pumped by central banks into financial markets to save economies, have ended up in the pockets of billionaires riding a stock market boom, while the surge in monopoly power, growing privatisation, the erosion of workers' rights and wealth and corporate tax rate and labour market liberalisation have continued in full speed.

In parallel, billions of people face the impact of deepening inequality. In some countries, the poorest people have been nearly four times more likely to die from COVID-19 than the richest. Some 3.4 million Black Americans would be alive today if their life expectancy was the same as white Americans', which is up from an already shocking 2.1 million pre-pandemic. Gender parity is set back by a generation, while women in many countries face a second pandemic of increased gender-based violence.

Vaccine apartheid fuels every inequality. And now the prospect of IMF-backed austerity in more than 80 countries threatens to make matters much worse.

We are making history for all the wrong reasons. Inequality is now as great as it was at the pinnacle of Western imperialism in the early 20th century. The Gilded Age of the late 19th century has been surpassed.

Hoping that change can come from the failed, narrow straitjacket of neoliberalism is the definition of insanity. The unprecedented nature of today's crisis demands extraordinary, systemic action – and a shift in imagination of the politics of the possible.

Legendary artist Pandit Birju Maharaj passed away on Sunday night after suffering a heart attack. NHA Denies Any Covid-19 Related Data Leak

NEW DELHI: The National Health Authority (NHA) has denied any Covidrelated data leak from Co-WIN portal on the prima facie basis, saying the platform neither collects the address of people nor RT-PCR test results for vaccination, a top official said on Friday.

Cyber criminals on the dark web had posted personal data of thousands of people, claiming they were from India.

"While we will enquire into the substance of the news, prima facie the assertion is not correct. The reason is that Co-WIN collects neither the address of the person nor the RT-PCR test results for vaccination. Further, we would like to assert that no data has leaked from Co-WIN portal and the entire data of residents is safe and secure on our platform," National Health Authority CEO R S Sharma said in a statement.

The alleged leaked data has been put on sale on Raid Forums website where a cyber criminal claims to have personal data of over 20,000 people.

Cyber Security researcher Rajshekhar Rajaharia also tweeted that personally identifiable information (PII) including name and Covid-19 results are made public through a content delivery net-

He said that Google has indexed lakhs of data from the affected system.

"PII including Name, MOB, PAN, Address etc of #Covid19 #RTPCR results & #Cowin data getting public through a Govt CDN. #Google indexed almost 9 Lac public/private #GovtDocuments in search engines. Patient's data is now listed on #DarkWeb. Need fast deindex," Rajaharia said in his tweet.

The government has heavily relied on digital technologies in terms of controlling and creating awareness about the Covid-19 pandemic as also its vaccination programme. Several government departments mandate people to use the Aarogya Setu app for Covid-19 related services and information.

Rajaharia in a follow-up tweet on January 20 said that he is not reporting any vulnerability in this incident but cautioning people to remain alert from fraud calls, offers related to Covid-19, etc that they may get as their data is being sold in the dark web.

Data sold in the dark web is often exploited by cyber criminals and fraudsters for various kind of frauds.

Ex-IPS officer A A Khan, who founded Mumbai ATS, dead

MUMBAI: Retired IPS officer Aftab Ahmed Khan, credited with establishing the Anti-Terrorism Squad (ATS) in the Mumbai police three decades ago the first such elite force in the country died here on Friday, a police official said.

The celebrated police officer was also involved in numerous operations against gangsters in Mumbai and terrorists during his decades-long career. He was 81 and is survived with wife, two sons and a daughter.

Khan was infected with COVID-19 a few days ago and admitted to a private hospital in suburban Andheri from where he was later discharged, the official said. However, this afternoon, he was again

rushed to the hospital, where he was declared dead before admission, he said. Khan, a 1963-batch IPS officer, had resigned from the Maharashtra police in 1995 when he was serving as an Inspector General of Police, he said.

The veteran officer was known as the founder of the ATS, which was the first such counter-terrorism organization in the country at that time, the official said.

The anti-terror agency was set up in the Mumbai police in 1990 on inspiration of the Special Weapons & Tactics (SWAT) of the Los Angeles Police Department. "Khan saab was a dashing officer who always led from the front, Iqbal Shaikh, a retired ACP who worked with him in various operations, told PTI.

During his decorated career, he never came under any kind of pressure and was always straight forward in his conduct, Shaikh said. A team led by Khan went to Baroda (now Vadodara) in Gujarat on January 24,1991, where 'Operation Baroda' took place for two days and the chief of Khalistan Commando Force, Baldeo Singh Saini, and four other terrorists were killed, he said. "In 1992, five terrorists were killed by our team at Khindipada in suburban Mulund," recalled the retired ACP.

Dreaded terrorist Manjitsingh alias Lalsingh was arrested in 1992 by Khan's team at Dadar Railway Station in Central Mumbai, when he arrived by a train from Amritsar, Shaikh said.

Lalsingh was allegedly involved in the 1985 Air India Kanishka flight bombing, he said. Lalsingh was also involved in firing on then-Haryana Chief Minister Bhajan Lal during his visit to Canada, the former ACP said. Khan headed the Mumbai police team, which killed dreaded criminals Maya Dolas and Dilip Buwa during a shootout at Swati Building in Lokhandwala Complex, Shaikh said.

Netaji's grand statue to be installed at India **Gate: PM Modi**

NEW DELHI: Ahead of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose's 125th birth anniversary, Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced on Friday that a grand statue of the iconic freedom fighter will be installed at India Gate as a symbol of India's "indebtedness" to him.

Till the statue, made of granite, is completed, a hologram statue of his would be present at the same place, he said, adding that he will unveil the hologram statue on January 23, the birth anniversary of the Azad Hind Fauj founder.

"At a time when the entire nation is marking the 125th birth anniversary of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, I am glad to share that his grand statue, made of granite, will be installed at India Gate. This would be a symbol of India's indebtedness to him," Modi tweeted.

Most of the opposition parties, including the TMC, welcomed the decision, but the Mamata Baneriee-headed party also alleged that the

announcement was aimed at countering criticism after the rejection of West Bengal's tableau themed on the nationalist leader for the Republic Day parade snowballed into a major row.

In a statement later, the PMO said the installation of Bose's statue will be part of the year-long celebrations to mark his 125th birth anniversary.

Asserting that the installation of the statue will be a case of India "reclaiming" its history, official sources said the dimension of the hologram statue will be 28 feet long and six feet wide.

The granite statue will be installed under a canopy, which used to have a statue of King George V that was removed in 1968, they added.

The announcement came on a day the opposition parties criticised the government for the decision to put out the flame at Amar Jawan Jyoti at India Gate here and merge it with the immortal flame at the National War Memorial.

Core Group

General Police, Dilbag Singh, co-chaired a meeting of the Core Group at Badami Bagh Cantonment here on Friday to review the security situation in Kashmir.

Reviewing the intelligence inputs and security parameters of 2021, the Core Group, he said, asserted that reduction in infiltration, reduced militant incidents and recruitment, increased operations based on HUMINT, reduced collateral damage, no civil casualties in law and order situation, reduced SF casualties, increased arrest of militants and booking of OGWs last year point to effective conduct of joint operations and activities by intelligence and security agencies.

"There has been increased neutralization of Pakistani terrorists in last few weeks. The effort of the frontline soldiers and operatives of all agencies were acknowledged by all present," he

The Core Group, the defence spokesperson said, discussed fresh strategies of the militant organizations and their handlers including use of Hybrid militant and targeting of soft targets.

"15 terrorists killed in 2021 were fresh names not on the security forces radar. The setting up of SIA and the increased booking by NIA is showing impact of focused intelligence and investigation efforts," he said.

He further added that these efforts have been effective in targeting drug, hawala and the OGWs networks.

The defence spokesperson also that legal action on those willfully harbouring militant is being increased as the harbourers have direct involvement in militant activities.

According to the defence spokesperson, the officials in the meeting stated that the ceasefire has improved the security situation along the border, however, intelligence inputs of "terrorist launch pads and terrorist training activities" in Pakistan indicate the need to be alert along the Line of Control.

"On the Line of Control, late snow has kept the infiltration routes open for longer time, however effective domination has ensured decrease in overall infiltration including those from South of Pir Panjal. The vigil on the Line of Control against infiltration of men, drugs and weapons is continuing," he said.

Sharing the challenge of propaganda of the nexus through internet and social media, the officials, as per the defence spokesperson said that sadly these efforts include propaganda to legitimize killing of Kashmiri civilians by the militants.

"The use of social media to spread disinformation is widespread and needs to be countered proactively by a joint effort. Efforts at synergy in exposing fake news, booking of radicals trying to foment unrest and proactive sharing of information by state agencies are being upgraded," he said.

According to the defence spokesperson, the DGP and the Corps Commander commended the officials present on improved security indicators and appreciated that post the abrogation of Article 370, certain bench marks were set which have been achieved successfully for the restoration of peace and prosperity in the region.

The DGP, he said, stated that reduction in local militant recruitment is one parameter that all must approach with continued focus. In the meeting, he said, a special mention was made on the measures taken to minimize the collateral damage in operations despite risk to own soldiers.

Singh, as per the defence spokesperson, recommended continued efforts to give chance of surrenders to local militants to give them a second chance at living a fruitful life.

'The Corps Commander called upon all to treat 2022 as a transformative year where common man used to zero civilian casualties in 2021 should see 2022 as the year when things turned for good for the long term. He cautioned the trend of the terrorists to use urban areas with thick built up area for operations as they provide more avenues to hide or escape and puts higher onus in security forces to exercise restraint to avoid collateral damage," he added.

According to the defence spokesperson, the Corps Commander expressed satisfaction at low casualties among the forces in 2021 by better intelligence-based operations and improved tactical drills.

"He called for continued efforts along with the civil society to counter the separatist propaganda and break the cycle of violence for long term peace in Kashmir," he added.

Govt Blocks 35 Pak

Apurva Chandra told a press conference on Friday. Indian intelligence agencies were closely monitoring these social media accounts and websites and flagged them to the ministry for immediate action, he added.

"Vide five separate orders issued under rule 16 of the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021, the Ministry has ordered to block these Pakistan-based social media accounts and websites," the ministry said in a statement later

Shops and other business establishments in the city and elsewhere in the valley which had opened this morning were forced by police to shut in view of the restrictions, they said.

The police closed the markets and asked people to return to their homes.

After the movement of people early in the morning, the police erected barricades at several places in the city here and other areas of the valley and the movement of public was restricted, the officials said.

They said only employees and emergency cases were allowed to move and all other non-essential movement was restricted.

The district authorities appealed to the people to cooperate with the administration and curtail their movement in view of the rising cases.

In the Valley, the officials said, Srinagar detected highest 1341 new cases of Coronavirus, Baramulla 688, Budgam 550, Ganderbal 246, Bandipora 241,Anantnag 237, Kupwara 208, Pulwama 170, Kulgam 106, Shopian 43,

In the winter capital, the officials said, Jammu reported a maximum of 1306 fresh cases of virus, Doda 103, Udhampur 100, Samba 99, Reasi 71, Rajouri 62, Kathua 61, Poonch 48, Ramban 22 and Kishtwar 18.

"Moreover, 1877 more COVID-19 patients have recovered and been discharged from various hospitals including 819 from Jammu Division and 1058 from Kashmir Division," the

officials said. Also, they said that five more people— four from Jammu and one from Kashmir died of Coronavirus related complications on Friday taking the death toll in the pandemic to 4591 in J&K -2241 in Jammu division and 2350 in Kashmir Valley.

The officials also said that no new confirmed cases of mucormycosis (black fungus) were reported on Friday, thus the total number of confirmed casesremains51 across J&K.

LG Directs Officials

At the outset, he said, the Deputy Commissioners briefed the LG about the Covid situation, status of vaccination, implementation of Covid Appropriate Behavior (CAB), and other related measures in their respective districts.

Notably, the petitioner had filed a writ alleging that Mudasir had died due to medical negligence and inadequacy of medical support at Sub District Hospital Charar-e-Sharief.

This had also resulted in the constitution of two separate three member enquiry committees by Director Health Services, Kashmir who had directed the committee to investigate the allegations of medical negligence and submit a detailed report. Both the committees hadn't held anyone responsible for the young Journalist's death.

It was further alleged in the petition that despite the committee having recommended attachment of the delinquent doctor and the other staff to the Directorate of Health Services, it had remained silent on the charge of medical negligence.

The petitioner had also alleged that the enquiry committee has derelicted in its duty of enquiry, as it on one hand has directed attachment of the delinguents while on the other hand has deliberately omitted the concluding findings on medical negligence.

Talking to Kashmir Observer, Advocate Salih Pirzada, who is representing the petitioner, said that the issued notices are a step closer to getting justice for Mudasir Ali. "There was clearly negligence from the on duty doctors and staff while treating Mudasir and as per Supreme Court guidelines, they must be attached for their recklessness and negligence."

He further said, "Even though the enquiry committee had said that the delinquents must be punished but still hasn't termed Mudasir's death as due to negligence. But, now that these fresh notices have been served, it feels as if we are a step closer towards justice. We're sure that those who were behind Mudasir's death will be held responsible and subsequently attached."

CAG Picks Holes

(CEO), Leh hasn't maintained separate accounts of scheme funds, as per the scheme guidelines.

"As a result, the expenditure incurred by the designated officers of Mission cities and implementing agencies under the scheme during the period 2015 to 2019 was not available either with the Mission Director or at Administrative Department level." The report reads. "The fact remains that work on the project was still incomplete, as of November 2020."

As per CAG, the works under the Jawaharlal Nehru National Urban Renewal Mission projects for Jammu and Kashmir selected for test check with an estimated cost 221.65 crore of the Mission executed by the State/ UT Government were not complete.

"As of March 2020 due to non-acquisition of land, non-finalisation of contracts, delayed process in settlement of issues and incorporation of additional components of works of these projects, has led to non-completion of the project."

Pertinently, the CAG has also held J&K Government responsible for failing to constitute a Local Level Steering Committee (LLSC) that could have to facilitate interaction between JKERA and participating agencies for selection of sub-projects and review their scope for projects under the Jammu and Kashmir Urban Sector Development Investment Programme (JKUSDIP).

"Neither were these committees formed nor was a shelf of projects framed in coordination with the line Departments for placing it before the LLSC. As a result, sub-projects were randomly taken up for execution, without prioritizing these as per specific needs of the state." The CAG report reads.

The report has also revealed that there was a delay in sanction of funds, the utilization certificates for the remaining amount had not been submitted by JKERA, diversion of funds, faulty estimates and unadjusted advances had hampered the implementation of the programme.

As per CAG, for the construction of Government Tourist assets in lieu of damaged/ destroyed assets, the J&K Tourism Department did not formulate a plan for operation and maintenance of its tourist assets. "As of September 2020, out of 23 subprojects, 15 sub-projects had been completed and one sub-project was dropped while seven sub-projects were under Execution." The report reads.

It is pertinent to mention here that a comprehensive reconstruction plan for the erstwhile State of Jammu & Kashmir, was announced by the Prime Minister of India on 07 November 2015. The Prime Minister's Development Package (PMDP), included 63 projects with a total outlay of 80,068 crore under the following five sectors including Humanitarian Relief, Crisis Management, Social Infrastructure, Development Projects and Economic Infrastructure.

Not Surprised At Kohli's Decision To Quit Captaincy: Pietersen

MUSCAT: Former England skipper Kevin Pietersen on Thursday suggested that "harsh" bio-bubble life could be one of the reasons for Virat Kohli quitting Test cap-taincy as he backed Rohit Sharma to lead India in all formats.

Kohli stunned the cricketing world by stepping down from the Test captaincy following India's had earlier relinquished T20 captaincy after the World Cup last year, something that led to a war of words with BCCI, leading to his removal from ODI leadership.

"People who are critical of the modern day sportsmen I think are foolish because these biobubbles are very hard to play in," the former England star batsman told PTI in a group interaction on the sidelines of Legends League Cricket.

"It will be very unfair to be too harsh, to be critical. Because you have not looked at Virat Kohli. Kohli needs crowds, he gets go-

The 33-year-old Kohli held the record for most Test wins by an Indian captain (40) with only Graeme Smith, Ricky Ponting, and Steve Waugh having won more matches than him.

Pietersen said he was not surprised when Kohli quit captaincy from all formats.

"A lot of players have suffered. It is the greatest job in the world. 1-2 series loss to South Africa. He But when you put them in a bubble, it's certainly not the greatest job because there is no fun," the 41-year-old said.

"I'm actually not surprised that Virat wants just a little bit of a break from that extra pressure because it's damn difficult playing in these bubbles," he said.

'It's very difficult to judge all International sportsmen, be premier league footballers or any sportsman around the world, playing in a pandemic."
