MeT Predicts Heavy Snowfall In Upper Reaches

Srinagar: Snowfall in the higher reaches and light drizzle in the plains extended the respite from cold wave conditions in Kashmir, even as the weather department on Monday predicted heavy snowfall in the upper reaches for two days from Thursday.

There was light to moderate snowfall in hilly areas like Gulmarg, Sonamarg-Zojila axis and Machhil in Kupwara, the officials said. They said a light drizzle took place over night in many plain areas of the valley.

The meteorological department had forecast moderate snowfall at many places in the higher reaches and light snowfall in the plains from Sunday evening.

Srinagar recorded a low of 0.9 degrees Celsius Sunday night --up from minus 0.1 degrees the night before, they said.

Qazigund, the gateway to the Valley, registered a minimum of 0.2 degrees Celsius, while Kokernag in south Kashmir re-corded a low of minus 0.5 de-grees, the officials said.

The mercury in Kupwara, a frontier district, settled above the freezing point at a low of 0.7 degrees. The tourist resort town of Pahalgam in Anantnag district, which also serves as a base camp for the annual Amarnath Yatra, registered a low of minus 0.7 degrees Celsius -- up from minus 1.4 degrees.

The minimum temperature in Gulmarg, the famous ski resort town in north Kashmir's Baramulla district, was at minus 2.5 degrees Celsius, the officials said.

The day temperature, how-ever, has fallen across the valley with Pahalgam recording a high of 3.8 degrees Celsius on Sunday while nearby Qazigund recording 7.6 degrees Celsius.

Bharat Jodo Yatra To Raise J&K Statehood Demand: Cong

Jammu: The Rahul Gandhi-led Bharat Jodo Yatra will enter Jammu and Kashmir on January 20, Congress leader Vikar Rasool Wani said on Monday and added the party will raise various issues including the demand for the restoration of its statehood prior to the assembly polls.

A large number of Congress workers will walk alongside Gandhi from Lakhanpur to Srinagar, Wani, the Jammu and Kashmir Pradesh Congress Committee (JKPCC) president, said. He also thanked Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha for granting permission for the yatra and issuing necessary directions to the officers concerned for its smooth conduct.

"After spending 10 days in neighbouring Punjab, the Bharat Jodo Yatra is crossing into Lakhanpur (Jammu and Kashmir) on January 20. A big event is planned by J&K Congress for the flag receiving ceremony at Lakhanpur," Wani told reporters at the party headquarters here on the sidelines of a function to welcome new entrants, mostly youth activists, into the party fold.

FIRE FURY IN KASHMIR 112 Charred To Death In **4786 Incidents In Two Years**

Srinagar: The fire incidents across ten districts of Kashmir have claimed the lives of 112 persons while 35 others have received injuries in the last two years-2021 and 2022, an official data revealed. The data said that a total of 4786 fire incidents have been

reported during 2021 and 2022 including 2242 in 2021 and 2544 in 2022, which indicates the rise of 302 blaze incidents in Kashmir. "A total of 1711 structures got damaged in 2021 while 1699 structures suffered damage in 2022." the data reveals. In 2021, 75 persons lost their lives in which Pulwama recorded highest casualties at 24 followed by Shopian 22 and Kulgam 12. Five people were also charred to death in Srinagar. The data said that Srinagar and Kupwara have recorded 5 deaths each in the fire incidents. It said that the highest fire incidents have been reported from Srinagar where 448 fire calls have been received by Fire and Emergency Services while Baramulla has recorded 324 fire incidents in the year 2021.

'Diet Change Combined With Drugs May Cut Seizures By Half'

Ollowing a modified Atkins diet high in fat and low in carbohydrates and taking medication may reduce seizures by over half in people with tough-to-treat epilepsy, according to a study by researchers at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences.

The modified Atkins diet is a combination of the Atkins diet and a ketogenic diet that includes food items such as soy products, heavy cream, butter and oils, leafy green vegetables, and animal protein including eggs, chicken, fish, and bacon.

While the ketogenic diet has been shown to be effective in reducing seizures, its stringent requirements and restrictions can make it difficult to follow, the researchers said.

"For people with drug-resistant epilepsy, or those who have been unable to find effective treatment to reduce seizures, it's encouraging to see that there are lifestyle changes that can be combined with standard drug therapy to reduce the number of seizures," said Manjari Tripathi, from AIIMS New Delhi.

"Our study found that this combination may reduce the chance of seizures by more than half," said Tripathi, author of the study published in the journal Neurology.

The study involved 160 adults and adolescents who had epilepsy for more than 10 years on average and had at least 27 seizures per month despite trying an average of four antiseizure medications at the maximum tol-



erated dose.

They were randomly assigned to receive either standard drug therapy alone or drugs plus the modified Atkins diet over six months. Par-

ticipants logged their seizures and meals They were given food lists, sample menus and recipes. Carbohydrate intake was restricted to 20 grams per day. US Federal dietary guide-

lines recommend between 225 and 325 grams of carbs per day.

After six months, researchers found that 26 per cent of people who had both drug therapy and followed the modified Atkins diet had more than a 50 per cent reduction in seizures compared to only three per cent of the people who had drug therapy alone.

Four people in the diet group were free of seizures by the end of the study, while no one in the medication-only group was seizure-free, the researchers found.

The study also looked at quality of life, behaviour and side effects at six months.

The group that had drug therapy and followed the modified Atkins diet showed an improvement in all areas compared to the group that had drug therapy alone, the researchers said.

They noted that 33 per cent of the participants did not complete the study due to poor tolerance of the diet, lack of benefit or the inability to follow-up in part due to COVID-19.

However, the researchers said tolerance of the modified Atkins diet was better than what is seen with the ketogenic diet.

"While the modified Atkins diet may be an effective treatment in controlling seizures, further research is needed to identify genetic biomarkers and other factors associated with the response to this diet," Tripathi added.

'This may improve patient care by encouraging targeted precision based earlier use of this diet," she added.

The researchers acknowledged a limitation in the study that seizures were self-reported or reported by caregivers, so some of them may not have been reported at all.

'Eating Almonds Daily Boosts Recovery Molecule By 69%, Helping In Recovery After Heavy Exercise'

ating almonds daily has been found to support metabolic recovery followling strenuous exercise by increasing beneficial fat by 69 per cent, according to a new study. The researchers concluded

that daily consumption of almonds leads to a change in metabolism, downregulating inflammation and oxidative stress from exercise and enabling the body to recover faster.

'We conclude that almonds provide a unique and complex nutrient and polyphenol mixture that may support metabolic recovery from stressful levels of exercise,' corresponding author Dr David C Nieman, a professor at the North Carolina Research Campus, said. The findings have been published in Frontiers in Nutrition.

'Almonds have high amounts of protein, healthy types of fats, vitamin E, minerals, and fibre. And the brown skin of almonds contains polyphenols that end up in the large intestine and help control inflammation and oxidative stress " said Nieman

12,13-DiHOME, Unlike 9.10-diHOME has been shown have negative effects on overall health and the body's recovery to exercise. According to the research, the clinical trial involved 38 men

and 26 women between the ages of 30 and 65, who didn't engage in regular weight training. Approximately half were randomized to the almond diet group, and the other half to the control group, who daily ate a caloriematched cereal bar.

The researchers took blood and urine samples before and after the four-week period of dietary supplementation. Performance measures included a 30 second Wingate anaerobic test, a 50 metre shuttle run test, and vertical jump, bench press, and leg-back strength exercises, the study said.

Additional blood and urine samples were taken immediately after this 90 minute session of "eccentric exercise" and daily for four days afterwards, the study said.

After each blood draw, the participants filled out the 'Profile of Mood States' (POMS) questionnaire to quantify their mental state, and rated their delayed onset muscle soreness that is, pain and stiffness felt after unaccustomed or strenuous exercise - on a 10-interval scale, the study said.

What Happens To Your Body On **A Long-Haul Flight**

If crowded airports are a sign, Australians are keen to get back into the skies. And if you're flying long haul, in a few years you could have an even longer option.

Qantas has announced from late 2025, it will fly passengers on non-stop flights from Australia's east coast to London that would see you in the air for more than 19 hours in one stretch. That's compared with current flights that take the best part of 24 hours but are broken up into shorter legs.

So what will happen to your body during one of these longer flights? Is it any different to what happens when you fly long-haul now?

1. You can become dehydrated

Dehydration is common on long-haul flights. It can explain why your throat, nose and skin can feel dry on an aeroplane. The longer the flight, the greater the risk of dehydration.

That's because of low levels of humidity in the cabin compared with what you'd expect on the ground. This is mostly because a lot of the air circulating through the cabin is drawn from the outside, and there's not a lot of moisture in the air at high altitudes.

You also risk dehydration by not drinking enough water, or drinking too much alcohol (alcohol is a diuretic, resulting in an increase in

sinuses, gut and sleep As the cabin pressure changes, the gas in our bodies reacts accordingly. It expands as the aircraft climbs and pressure decreases, and the opposite occurs as we descend. This can lead to common problems such as:

earaches when the air pressure either side of your eardrum is different, placing pressure on the eardrum

headaches can be caused by expanding air trapped in your sinuses

gut problems just accept that you're going to fart more.

You can also feel more sleepy than usual. That's due to the body not being able to absorb as much oxygen from the cabin air at altitude than it would on the ground. Slowing down is the body's way of protecting itself, and this can make you feel sleepy.

The good news is that most of these problems won't necessarily be more pronounced on longer flights. They're mainly an issue as the plane climbs and descends.

3. You could develop blood clots Blood clots, associated with being immobile for long periods, are usually a big concern for passengers. These include clots that form in the leg (deep vein thrombosis or DVT) that can travel to the lung (where it's known as a pulmonary embolism

In Six Years, SKIMS Registers 27,727 Cancer Patients

The institute records 1833 deaths due to different types of cancer

Srinagar: In six year, Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences (SKIMS) Soura have registered over 27,000 patients ailing with cancer disease. Besides, the institute has

witnessed 1833 deaths due to different types of cancer.

During this period, the institute has also issued 64,504 Out Patient Department (OPD) cards issued by the department of Nephrology.

The official figures of SKIMS accessed reveal that from October-2016 to October-2022, the institute has registered 27,727.

The Public Information Officer (PIO) SKIMS in a reply to Right to Information (RTI) said, "Total number of OPD cards issued under the Nephrology Department from October-2016 to October-2022 are 64504 and cancer patients registered are 27727.'

October-2022, a total number of 17,579 deaths have been registered," PIO said.

It also said that under medical Oncology, radiotherapy, Clinical Hematology and Surgical Oncology during these six years are 1833 while under the Nephrology department at least 1145 deaths were recorded.

The PIO also said that 1745 accidental deaths were also recorded by the institute during this period.

About the total number of patients admitted and treated in State Cancer Institute since its establishment from December-05-2020 to October-2022 includes, the officer said that at least 2473 patients were admitted and treated while 659 deaths were also recorded.

On asking about the proposal submitted to the government for a separate kidney hospital, the PIO said, "Any kind of proposal for a separate kidney hospital will be dealt with by the adminis-tration." (KNO)



Changing Lifestyle Putting Kangri At Backburner In Srinagar

Srinagar: Some decades back. for most Kashmiris Kangri was the only portable way for people to warm themselves. However, with the advent in technology and change in lifestyle, some city residents say they have given up the use of 'Kangri' and they no longer use the tradi-

tional Kashmiri firepot in their households Badr-u-Nissa Bhat, a resident of Srinagar's old city area said that they have given up the

use of Kangri many years back. 'My family gave up the use of Kangri when I was very young. They had apprehensions

about my safety and the things around. I am not used to it" said Badr-u-Nissa, a Ph.D. scholar at Kashmir University. However, she says it is impossible to stay warm without

resorting to other advanced mechanisms to keep yourself warm in Kashmir. "Two of our rooms have a

Hamam facility and in other rooms we use radiators. I think these are efficient ways to heat up a room. But I am still fanaticized by Kangris." She said. "Whenever I go to a relative's place, I don't miss a chance to get a 'Kangri Josh'.' Shadab Abbas, is another

Old city resident who says they don't use the traditional firepot to warm themselves.

"Kangri comes with a lot of risk and there are better ways to warm ourselves. We use a gas heater to warm up our rooms"

Although some city residents may have given up the use of traditional firepot for warming themselves, most people say it is part of Kashmiri culture and legacy.

Aamina Zainab, a homemaker said she is physically and mentally attached to 'Kangri' and does not see it fading away.

"Without Kangri, winter is incomplete in Kashmir, no matter how times change, Kangri will be part of Kashmir for all times to come.³

During winters, the sales of heating equipment increases significantly. However, those in the business say they had been registering good sales in the pre-pandemic times but the coronavirus pandemic has hit them hard.

Speaking on anonymity, a prominent stockist of gas heaters at Lal Chowk said their sales have dropped since the pandemic otherwise they had top notch business.

"Today's sales are nothing compared to what we had before the pandemic" he said.

However, not everyone is unhappy with how things are going in the market.

Mikaeel Ahmad, has been dealing with 'underfloor heating' or 'electric Hamam' since last many years.

Mikaeel says at first people were reluctant and were very apprehensive about it but with time and with word of mouth their sales have increased.

'The electric Hamam runs on electricity, however, even when the electricity is switched off, it remains warm for some hours" he said.

Mikaeel says they have installed around 12,000 electric Hamam's in the last few years in the city.

"In households where electric Hamam's are installed, they no longer use a Kangri"

After installing underground electric heating systems across the length and breadth of the city, Mikaeel says "Kangri is part of our cultural heritage and it is not going to fade away anytime soon."

Nazla bar uzw-e-za'eef Drastic 11-Hr Power Cut In Valley Ordered

RINAGAR - The power development department (PDD) today revised its curtail¬ment schedule to deliver yet another rude shock to the val¬ley consumers by reduc ing availability of the direly essen¬tial commodity to a little over 12 hours per twenty-four hours. Depending upon the whims and caprices of its underlings to en¬force irritating unscheduled cuts, power supply would now be something like the prover-bial 'once in a blue moon'

According to the revised schedule effective from today, load shedding will be enforced during mornings, evenings, day and night. During a week, there will be three evening cuts of 4.5 hours each from 5.30 to 10; four night cuts of 6.5 hours each from 11 p.m. to 5.30 a.m. and two morning cuts of two hours each from 5.30 to 7.30. A day cut of five hours will be enforced in two groups all of seven days. The total duration of the 'night-mare' aggregates to 78 and a half hours, or 11 hours and 13 minutes a day

Power supply to essential services like hospitals, water supply, telecommunications, besides the security force camps and VIP installations, as usual, will be unaffected. According to the chief enigneer, maintenance and rural electrification, Qazi Muhammad Syed, supply to the organised industrial units at Khonmoh, Rangreth, Zainakot, Bagh-e-Ali Mardan Khan and other places would be main-tained.

Sources told Kashmir Ob¬server the recent northern grid failure which had plunged sev-eral northern states into dark¬ness, disrupted essential sup¬plies and services and, on top of it all, embarrassed the centre, served as an immediate provocation for the drastic measure. The northern grid authorities attributed the fail¬ure to over-drawal of engery by all the states in the northern region. Obviously, as the Persian saying, Nazla bar uzw-e-za'eef (wrath on the weak), goes, the axe fell on Jammu and Kash¬mir On Thursday evening, the northern grid authorities di¬rected the deputy general man¬ager of the Power Grid Corporation of India based at Wagoora grid station to switch off the 220-KV Wagoora, Zainakot transmission line to stop valley's power imports to the extent of 240 megawatts. Similar steps are understood to have been taken in Jammu re-gion.

Following the massive brakes from northern grid, sources said, the valley's im-ports have been more than halved, from 400 mw to a mere 160 mw. With the generation of around 40 mw from local power stations - Uri, lower Jhelum, Upper Sindh, phase I and II, and Ganderbal - the total avail-ability adds up to 200 mw against the peak requirement of 700 to750 mw.

Caught in a desperate situ ation, the PDD authorities are going to come down heavily against defaulters. The chief engineer asked the consumers to clear their arrears to avoid disconnection. Power supply to Zainakot-based central public peptor Hindustan Machine Tools was cut off today. Supply to various flour mills and units owing more than Rs one lakh in tarriff is being snapped early. Qazi said power supply to various central and state gov-ernment departments in the red would also be stopped im-mediately. (KASHMIR OBSERVER, 10 January, 2001)

Waiting For Polls

ith Assembly elections in Himachal Pradesh and Gujarat over, there was hope that the centre might call Assem-bly polls in Jammu and Kashmir. But even as we are in 2023, there is no sign that J&K is any closer to holding election. It is still not known whether polls will be held in the upcoming few months or not.

J&K has not had an elected government since June 2018 when Governor's rule was imposed after the PDP-led coalition government lost its majority following the withdrawal of support by the BJP. The last four years have witnessed a drastic political makeover of the state-turned-union territory, so much so that in many aspects, the current J&K bears little resemblance to what it was pre-August 2019.

Many observers in Kashmir are hoping that elections may be held by April-May. Things on this score, however, are likely to get clearer in the weeks to come. 2023 will be the last year when the polls could be hoped to be held in the union territory as in 2024, the country is due to hold general elections.

Meanwhile, people in Kashmir are eagerly waiting for the elections, as the exercise is expected to lead to restoration of statehood. No less than union home minister Amit Shah has made it clear that the statehood of J&K would be restored only after elections are held and a representative government is formed.

As things stand, the situation appears conducive for Assembly elections. Kashmir is calmest compared to the situation in past thirty years. Also, the BJP's landslide win in Gujarat has effectively put the saffron party on the road to a third successive triumph in 2024 parliament election. This apprently gives the party confidence that it could continue to control and direct the course of events in J&K.

So, J&K could expect the announcement of Assembly elections in the near future, now that the exercise of drawing up fresh electoral rolls has been completed. With national elections set to be held in May next year, there are sixteen months within which the exercise could be held. But with every passing month, if the polls are not called, people would start losing hope about the exercise being held during the BJP's second term as the national ruling party.

This will be especially disappointing to people considering that across the country around ten Assembly elections are scheduled to be held before the national elections. In a sense, there is still hope that the polls would be held in the near future. But for now, all we can do is keep our fingers crossed.

Controversial Postal Department Exams in J&K

Lok Sabha MP shoots letter to Union Communication Minister for an in depth probe

ecently, several national and local newspapers and news websites carried a detailed report about Lok Sabha MP Mohammad Akbar Lone shooting a letter to Union Communication Minister asking him to handover the case of alleged examination malpractice in the limited departmental examination of Department of Posts to Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI).

In his letter, Union Minister Communication Ashwini Vaishnaw who also holds the portfolio of Railway Ministry Lok Sabha MP from Baramulla Mohammad Akbar Lone said that results of the Limited Departmental Examination conducted in June last year in Jammu be declared null and void as many candidates were allowed to adopt unfair means by the officials of the Postal Department J&K. The Lok Sabha MP demanded that a CBI probe be held in this matter.

Background

In May 2022, the Department of Posts which functions under the Ministry of Communication issued a notification to hold a limited departmental exam enabling Postal Assistants to be promoted as Inspector of Posts. Through an official communication issued by Director (DE) Ranjeet Kumar Sinha through Postal Directorate's letter dated 09-05-2022, nine posts for Jammu & Kashmir Postal circle were advertised along with vacancies for other postal circles of the country.

Technically, the Departmental Examination should have been conducted in Srinagar as Postal Circle headquarters is in Srinagar. The same was conducted on June 25 and 26th 2022 in Jammu. Govt Higher Secondary School Gandhinagar Jammu was chosen as the exam centre. Instead of holding the exam in a single hall the candidates (Postal Assistants) were seated in several small rooms. This was a deliberate attempt of the postal department officials to allege an aggrieved candidate Irfan Rashid Khan who has now turned into a whistle-blower. The letter hammad Akbar Lone to the Ur mentions this in detail.

Post Master General and other top brass of his department, nobody bothered to act over the complaint. Irfan was thus forced to seek judicial intervention by way of filing a petition before a local court in Srinagar. The court directed the Crime Branch to investigate into the entire case last year in August.

Crime Branch's Interim reports

On August 27th 2022, the Srinagar Court directed the J&K Crime Branch to investigate the matter. The Economic Offences Wing of Crime Branch took up the investigation and came up with three interim reports. The latest report was issued on 23rd November 2022. MP Lok Sabha Mohammad Akbar Lone has mentioned about these interim reports as well. The author has also gone through these reports and the Nov 23rd 2022 report says that two candidates, namely Sandeep and Naresh, were talking to each other in the examination room, which should not have been allowed. The report also says that Anchal Singh Chamyal, Assistant Director Postal Department Jammu has been shown as an authorised person to

nav says that recently a delegation of some employees from Postal Circle J&K met him and narrated a story which is of a very serious nature. The letter reads:

"I could not have taken the matter seriously as I get to hear lots of such complaints, but when I went through the J&K Crime Branch's three interim reports, I thought I must bring the matter into your notice with a copy to the Hon'ble Prime Minister as well. The said reports are attached with this communication"

The MP, while expressing his dismay over the entire exam process in his letter, told the Union Minister that it was quite evident that the Postal Department had not at all conducted a fair investigation. The MP requested the Minister to constitute a special team to Investigate this issue afresh. The letter further reads:

"I would appreciate it if the investigation is handed over to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI)& the result be declared null and void and fresh exams be conducted in a time bound manner. I would suggest that Departmental Exams in the Postal Department be conducted by an independent agency in future so as to ensure more transparency & accountability"

Need for Aviation Industry to Sober Up

ir India's privatisation was meant to turn around the fortunes of the country's longtime national carrier. Instead, two recent instances show just how far the airline and the aviation sector more broadly need to travel to sober up to the reality that more than their finances they need to address their attitude toeman O les and basic human decency. In No-🛸 d man urinated on an elderly female co-passenger on the carrier's longhaul New York-New Delhi flight. Yet, he was allowed to leave the plane and the airport without consequence. Only after the woman escalated her concerns to the top brass of the Tata Group, which now owns Air India, did the airline take any action, and that too with only a 30-day fly ban for the man. A second case has since come to light, of another drunk male passenger urinating on a female co-passenger's blanket during a Paris-New Delhi Air India flight in December. On this occasion too, the guilty party was allowed to leave the airport after, reportedly, submitting a written apology to the lady.

India's aviation regulator has now threatened action against Air India and its staff for failing to comply with rules for unruly passengers which include a minimum threemonth fly ban. But the damage has been done — to the victims, to the credibility of Indian aviation, and to the brand of Air India. The private employer of the male passenger involved in the November incident has reportedly fired him and he has been arrested. That Air India did not take similarlv decisive action immediately reflects an institutional failure on the airline's part that will no doubt hurt its standing with other passengers. But the incidents also reveal a deeper Indian malaise. Far too often, when people - especially men - engage in unacceptable behaviour in public, victims are encouraged to quietly seek a 'compromise' instead of seeking justice. In a country where few trust the rule of law, victims who are weaker often feel that an apology is the best they can expect. That strengthens a culture of impunity for the powerful and wealthy who know that they can get away with almost anything. This must change. No civilised society, leave alone a proud democracy, can simply hold its nose, accept such transgressions, and move on. The odour has now reached the skies. There must be consequences

Times When Baramulla Opened The Gates To Kashmir

Before opening the partition floodgates in the valley, Baramulla—as nonagenarian Aziz Mir remembers in his old town home was a thriving town on the banks of Jhelum. As the entry point of pre-47 Kashmir, the place was dotted with inns, intrigues and inquisitiveness.

Some eight eventful decades later, the town has entered into the local lexicon as some northern town whose thoroughfare merely runs up to the line of control.

"Before the arrival of uprooted people and armed tribals, and before the son of the soil would derail the invading march, Baramulla was a cauldron of cultural exchange," says Mir, who retired as a government teacher three decades ago. "The town was second to none due to its distinction of being the gateway of Kashmir. But in that bloodcurdling fall, the status changed and it became a garrison town because of its proximity with the new frontier."

proximity with the new frontier." Today, as Baramulla has been lulled by the reiterations of its past glory, many term this verbal glorification a reason behind its stagnation.

"Baramulla town was the noted prime town of Jammu and Kashmir in old days," Khaliq Parvez, a celebrated chronicler and former trade leader, prudently reminisces about his hometown.

"Since Baramulla leveraged trade to far-off places like Peshawar, Punjab, Karachi, Lahore and even Central Asia, it alone was a good enough reason for many dignitaries and staunch traders to settle down here."

In his feted treatise, Jila Watan, Khaliq Parvez mentions that back in time, Baramulla has been the host for one of the biggest mushaira of South Asia solicited by veteran poets.

Behind its prominent past and popularity, many reckon, was the multicultural image of Baramulla. Knowing its viability and sustainable potential, people of all faiths populated the place. As a mini-reshver (valley of saints) in the macromystic abode, Baramulla has hosted people like Syed Janbaz Wali and

Guru Har Gobind Singh.

Syed Janbaz Wali was the third Sufi saint from Iran to visit Kashmir in sequence after Shah Hamdan and is said to be the descendant of the Prophet's lineage. Franciscan missionaries of Mary are also said to have visited Baramulla—housing among other things a temple dedicated to Shiva.

Apart from showing syncretic shades, Baramulla was the first town to advance on modern lines. During Maharaja Pratap Singh's time, a hydel power plant was set up in Boniyar, Baramulla. It was the second advanced hydel power plant in South Asia.

To bring back its glory, some frail attempts were made in recent times. Muzzafar Hussain Baig, former deputy chief minister, came up with a forum like 'Greater Baramulla' to push the place on the maps of development. However, before any outcome, political changes spiralled, and Kashmir plunged into the dragged-discord. In the shade of strife, not many attempts could take off to rebrand Baramulla for its unique legacy and cultural connection.

But as long as the Jhelum valley cart route—connecting the valley with the rest of the world—was thriving, Baramulla was the stopover and assembly point for traders and travellers. The place opened the doors to the resourceful sites of Kashmir. Apart from trading, some of the footfall was also driven by its strategic importance.

In his research paper—Kashmir

and Swat during Neolithic times published by Ancient Asia journal, Mumtaz Yatoo produces substantive facts for Baramulla to be a place of strategic importance and integration and interaction.

"The geographical position of Baramulla at the crossroads of communication is important," notes Yatoo in the concluding remarks, "allowing it to act as a hub between the northern regions of Pakistan and Central Asia on the North Western side, and the rest of Kashmir on South Eastern side."

Notably, this significance stems from the history itself. As the inhabitation took off in the valley, Baramulla became its natural entry point. Raja Bhimsina (2306 B.C.) was the one to set up the township. After it was well established for living, it became a popular halt station for travellers from Central Asia, China, and some parts of Europe. While these travellers would spend some of their leisure time in town, it spurred trading along with cultural and religious exchange.

This exchange has been of such great significance that vestiges of several Buddhist monasteries have been excavated, of late. These excavations suggest that the primitive civilisations of Kashmir largely inhabited Kanispura, making Baramulla the centre of trade since those times, with Harappan society and others.

Later, Baramulla was at the crossroads of the fabled Silk Route. Traders from Iran, Afghanistan, China, Russia and some parts of Europe enhanced their trade to farther areas after exploring the place. The tools, pottery artefacts, schist disks, ceramics and other primitive objects discovered at archaeological sites in Baramulla closely resemble the ones found in Swat Valley – Pakistan, and regions of China and South Asia.

In fact, as the halt station of various Mughal rulers, Baramulla brimmed with art and culture, for all these rulers would spend their vacations with artistic indulgences.

Such revelations suggest the intensity of cultural exchange and trade propelled by Baramulla and enabled the development of other districts and subdistricts while being a conduit of connection.

But the town lost its cultural lineage and limelight in the fall of 1947. "Many fled the town to save their lives," Aziz Mir, the living witness, recalls. "After Partition, Baramulla was never the same again. The place lost its image in the strategic restructuring of the valley."

Unlocking CREATIVITY

o you think that creativity is an innate gift? Think again. Many people believe that creative thinking is difficult – that the ability to come up with ideas in novel and interesting ways graces only some talented individuals and not most others.

The media often portrays creatives as those with quirky personalities and unique talent. Researchers have also identified numerous personality traits that are associated with creativity, such as openness to new experiences, ideas and perspectives.

Together, they seem to paint a dire picture for those who consider themselves conventional thinkers, as well as those who do not work in creative occupations – including roles that are often considered traditional and noncreative, such as accountants and data analysts.

These beliefs miss a key part of how creativity actually works in your brain: Creative thinking is actually something you engage in every day, whether you realize it or not.

Moreover, creativity is a skill that can be strengthened. This matters even for people who don't consider themselves creative or who aren't in creative fields.

In research that I recently published with organization and management scholars Chris Bauman and Maia Young, we found that simply reinterpreting a frustrating situation can enhance the creativity of conventional thinkers.

USING CREATIVE THINKING TO COPE WITH EMOTIONS

Creativity is often defined as the generation of ideas or insights that are novel and useful. That is, creative thoughts are original and unexpected, but also feasible and useful.



Everyday examples of creativity are plentiful: combining leftover food to make a tasty new dish, coming up with a new way to accomplish chores, mixing old outfits change your feelings. There is actually an element of creativity to this: You're breaking away from your existing perspectives and assumptions and coming up with a new way of thinking.

Say you're frustrated about a parking ticket. To alleviate the bad feelings, you can think of the fine as a learning moment.

If you're anxious about a presentation for work, you can cope with the anxiety by framing it as an opportunity to share ideas, rather than as a high-stakes performance that could result in demotion if handled poorly.

And if you're angry that someone seemed unnecessarily combative in a conversation, you might reevaluate the situation, coming to view the behavior as unintentional rather than malicious.

TRAINING YOUR CREATIVE MUSCLES

To test the link between creative thinking and emotional reappraisal, we surveyed 279 people. Those who ranked higher on creativity tended to reappraise emotional events more often in their daily life. Inspired by the link between emotional reappraisal and creative thinking, we wanted to see whether we could use this insight to develop ways to help people be more creative. In other words, could emotional reappraisal be practiced by people in order to train their creative muscles?

We ran two experiments in which two new samples of participants – 512 in total – encountered scenarios designed to provoke an emotional response. We tasked them with using one of three approaches to manage their emotions. We told some participants to suppress their emotional response, others to think about something else to distract themselves and the last group to reappraise the situation by looking at it through a different lens. Some participants were also given no instructions on how to manage their feelings.

In a seemingly unrelated task

that followed, we asked the participants to come up with creative ideas to solve a problem at work.

In the experiments, conventional thinkers who tried reappraisal came up with ideas that were more creative than other conventional thinkers who used suppression, distraction or received no instructions at all.

CULTIVATING FLEXIBLE THINKING

Negative emotions are inevitable in work and life. Yet people often hide their negative feelings from others, or use distraction to avoid thinking about their frustrations.

Our findings have implications for how managers can think about how to best leverage the skills of their workers. Managers commonly slot job candidates into creative and noncreative jobs based on cues that signal creative potential. Not only are these cues shaky predictors of performance, but this hiring practice may also limit managers' access to employees whose knowledge and experience can play major roles in generating creative outcomes.

The result is that the creative potential of a significant part of the workforce may be underutilized. Our findings suggest that supervisors can develop training and interventions to cultivate creativity in their employees – even for those who might not seem predisposed to creativity.

Our research also indicates that people can practice flexible thinking every day when they experience negative emotions. Although people may not always have control over the external circumstances, they do have the liberty to choose how to cope with emotional situations – and they can do so in ways that facilitate their productivity and well-being.

New Delhi: A new light and sound show fusing art and cutting-edge technology that will tell the story of India through the ages will be inaugurated at the historic Red Fort on Tuesday, officials said.

Union Home Minister Amit Shah is slated to be the chief guest at the event, which will also be attended by Union Culture and Tourism Minister G Kishan Reddy, they said.

"The show will be of another class and will fuse cutting-edge technology with art and live performances giving the audience a spectacular experience. It will tell the story of India and its wealth of cultural heritage through the ages," an official source said.

The venue of the show will be a

site near the 'Naubat Khana' of the 17th century monument, he said. Red Fort, built by Emperor Shah Jahan, is a UNESCO World

Heritage Site. Dalmia Bharat Limited, a cement manufacturing company, was selected as a 'Monument Mitra' to adopt and develop tourist amenities of the Red Fort in 2018. 'Monument Mitras' (friends of heritage sites) have been appointed for heritage sites, under the central government's ambitious 'Adopt a Heritage' scheme,

for preservation and maintenance of India's cultural sites. According to an invitation shared by Dalmia Bharat Limited, the show is called 'Jai Hind', and it will be like a "time travel through the ages with an immersive experience created from a fusion of art and technology". The Ministry of Culture, in a

statement, said the show will be a "dramatic presentation of the bravery and the history of India from the 17th century to the

present day". The one-hour long show is divided into three parts that will bring to life key episodes from India's history, including the rise of the Marathas, the 1857 war of Independence, the rise of the Indian National Army and the INA trials, the fight for Independence and India's continuing progress over the past 75 years by several forms of performance art - projection mapping, live action films, light and immersive sound, actors, dancers and puppets, it said.

The show will be showcased at different monuments inside Red Fort starting with Naubat Khana, moving to Deewan-e-Aam and then to Deewan-e-Khas, it said.

AI PARIS-NEW DELHI FLIGHT INCIDENTS **DGCA Issues Show Cause Notice; Says** Airline's Response 'Lackadaisical'

Mumbai: Aviation regulator DGCA has issued a show cause notice to Air India after finding the airline's response as "lackadaisical and delayed" regarding two of passenger misbehaviour incidents onboard a flight from Paris to New Delhi last month.

This is the second time in less than a week that the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) has issued a show cause notice to the Tata group-owned Air India.

On Monday, Air India Managing Director and CEO Campbell Wilson met DGCA chief Arun Kumar, according to a source. Details about the meeting could not be immediately ascertained.

The latest show cause notice

to which the airline has to respond in two weeks is in relation to two incidents onboard the Paris-New Delhi flight on December 6, 2022 that were not reported to the regulator.

In one incident, a drunk passenger was caught smoking in the lavatory and was not listening to the crew. In the second incident, another passenger allegedly relieved himself on a vacant seat and blanket of a fellow female passenger when she went to lavatory, DGCA said in a statement on Monday.

"Air India didn't report the incident until DGCA sought the incident report from them on 05.01.2023. After perusal of the reply submitted by Air India through email dated 06.01.2023, prima facie it emerges that provisions related why action should not be taken against them for "dereliction"

to handling of an unruly passenger... have not been complied with. It has been noted that the response of the airline has been lackadaisical and delayed," it said.

The watchdog has issued the show cause notice to the accountable manager of Air India as to why enforcement action should not be taken against them for dereliction of their regulatory obligations.

"However, to follow the principles of natural justice, they have been given two weeks time to submit their reply to DGCA and based on that further action will be taken," the statement said. On January 5, DGCA issued notices to the officials and crew of the New York-Delhi flight, asking

the Sharia (Islamic law), Geo TV reported. The fatwa issued by the clerics from the

militancy-hit province declares that only the head of the Islamic state has the prerogative to declare "jihad" (holy war).

"Not everyone has the right to declare jihad," the fatwa said.

It further said that taking up arms against the police and military personnel is against both the Sharia and the state, and anyone who rebels against the constitution and laws of Pakistan will be punishable by law.

The 14-page fatwa has been signed by religious scholars from difference schools of thought, including Maulana Qari Ehsanul Haq, Mufti Subhanallah Jan, Dr Maulana Attaur Rehman, Maulana Hussain Ahmed, Mufti Mukhtarullah Haqqani, Allama Abid Hussain Shakri and Maulana Abdul Kareem, Dawn reported.

The development comes as the banned Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) intensified its attacks on security forces, especially in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Balochistan provinces.

The fatwa came two days after the TTP chief Mufti Noor Wali Mehsud said in a video message that his group is "open to guidance" from Pakistan's religious scholars if they believe "the

direction of our jihad" is wrong. The TTP, which has ideological linkages with the Afghan Taliban, executed around more than 100 attacks last year, most of which happened after August when the group's peace talks with the Pakistan government began to falter.

In November last year, the TTP called off an indefinite ceasefire agreed with the government in June 2022 and ordered its militants to carry out attacks on the security forces.

The TTP, also known as the Pakistan Taliban, was set up as an umbrella group of several militant outfits in 2007. Its main aim is to impose its strict brand of Islam across Pakistan.

The TTP, which is believed to have close links to al-Qaeda, last week threatened to target ton leaders of Prime Minister Shehhaz Sharif's PML-N and Foreign Minister Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari's PPP if the ruling coalition continued to implement strict measures against the militants.

Rahi wrote several collections of poems and translated the works of some of the celebrated poets in other languages into Kashmiri.

Prof. Nazir Azad, another poet and critic, told Kashmir Observer that Prof. Rashi would patiently hear the poetry in different Mushairas and would encourage the poets. He said he would also do criticism in a subtle way.

"Tames asse Kasher zabane henz dag, ti tem khatre oas su mehanat ti mashaqat karran (he was worried about the Kashmiri language and for it's upliftment, he would do a lot to activities)" Prof. Azad said.

Prof. Rahi was not only a great poet, recalls Prof. Mushtaq Ahmad Zargar, but also a brilliant teacher.

"His lectures in the class would be so crystal clear that his students would never forget," said Prof. Zargar who is currently in-Charge Kashmiri Section, Department of Modern Indian Languages, Aligarh Muslim University. He said after Lal Ded, Prof. Rahi is seen as the

best poet in the literary world. "But his way of criticism was different. We

will always cherish these moments," he added. Prof. Shafi Shauq said that Prof. Rahi was the

only well read Kashmiri poet who consciously tried to imbibe all those healthy features of Western literature in Kashmir and gave them local colour and hibitation.

"His major contribution to Kashmiri literature was that he reformed the department of Kashmiri at University of Kashmir and I have had the honor to work under him from the inception of the department in 1976," said Prof Shafi Shauq who retired as Head of the Department, Kashmiri department, KU in 2010.

Rahi's demise was also condoled by Lieutenant Governor Manoi Sinha, who termed his death as "end of an era".

"Deeply saddened to learn of the passing away of Jnanpith awardee Prof Rehman Rahi, one of the most influential poets in Kashmiri in recent times. His passing marks the end of an era. My sincere condolences to his family, friends and well-wishers," Sinha said in a tweet.

Former chief minister and PDP president Mehbooba Mufti also condoled Rahi's death.

He said all the VDGs, especially the ex-servicemen, are ready to work in coordination with the security forces to counter terrorists.

Sarpanch of Dhangri Dheeraj Sharma thanked Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha's administration for fulfilling their demand.

He said during his visit to the village after the terror attack, Sinha had promised to provide new weapons.

JAMMU: Four years after she lost her husband to illness came a blow so devastating she might never recover. Saroj Bala's two sons were among the seven people killed when militants struck their village in Jammu and Kashmir's Rajouri district, shattering every dream, smashing all hope.

On Sunday, her 21-year-old son Prince Sharma lost his battle for life and died at Jammu's Government Medical College hospital where he had been admitted with bullet injuries after the January 1 attack in Dhangri village. New Year's Day was also when his brother, 27-year-old Deepak, was killed when militants opened fire at their home.

The grief of losing her second son even as she was mourning the first has left her heartbroken.

'I have been left alone. Who

will talk to me now? My world has ended. I have lost every-thing in life," the inconsolable Bala said as the mortal remains of her younger son were consigned to flames at the Dhangri cremation ground on Sunday.

Thousands of people joined her in mourning the death of the young man.

Militants had struck Dhangri late in the evening on January 1, targeting three homes before fleeing the scene. They left behind an improvised explosive device (IED) that went off the next morning outside the Sharma house.

While Deepak and three others died the first day, two children, Vihaan Kumar Sharma (four) and Samiksha Sharma (16), from the same family were killed in the IED explosion on day two. Fifteen people were injured, including Prince.

Bala, who was just coming



to terms with the death of her husband, said there is nothing to look forward too. Her dreams of seeing her sons getting married and settling down

in their jobs have crashed. In a cruel twist of fate, Deepak, who had been selected for a job in the Indian Army's ordnance department, was cremated last week Tuesday, the very day he was set to join his work in Leh.

Prince was serving in the Jal Shakti department, a job

he landed following the death of his father Rajinder Kumar Sharma, an employee of the department who died four years ago.

"Both my sons would sit with me every day. We would have long discussions on family issues. My life has no value now. Everything has gone with the death of my children," the despairing mother said.

Battling the grief of losing both her sons, the 58-year-old recalled the hardships faced by the family, especially during the treatment of her husband. His disease had put a lot of pressure on her sons who made every effort to save him, she said. "We were expecting good

days ahead but the terrorists snatched all our happiness." The grieving woman remembered how she cooked for her sons, how she made their beds and the many hours they spent planning a better future for the family. Sushil Kumar, her nephew, said the extended family kept the news of Prince's death

from her as long as they could. She had been waiting for Deepak's ashes to take them to Haridwar and came to know that Prince had died too only when his body reached the village Sunday afternoon.

"Even we cannot share her pain... the terrorists did not think once before targeting innocent civilians and devastating many families," Kumar said. Dheeraj Sharma, sarpanch of the village, said that there can be no bigger tragedy for any family.

"This entire family is devastated now. Only the mother is left and she has lost both her unmarried young sons in the attack. She is all alone now,' he said.

The family will now immerse the ashes of both brothers next week

1685 Drug Peddlers Arrested, 1021 NDPS Cases **Registered Last Year: Police**

SRINAGAR: Police on Monday said 1021 NDPS cases were registered, 1685 drug peddlers including 138 of them notorious were arrested last year. Besides, huge quantity of different types of contraband and psychotropic substances were recovered, police said in a statement.

Furthermore, it said, many narco-militant modules were busted and 35 accused persons were arrested during 21-22. "Apart from this, huge contraband banned substances, cash, arms & ammunition and other incriminating materials were recovered."

Giving break up, the police said while 1685 persons were arrested in 1021 NDPS related cases and out of them, 138 notorious drug peddlers were booked under PIT NDPS Act.

"Pertinently, while giving top priority to the investigation of NDPS cases, out of 1021 registered cases, 917 cases were speedily challaned before different courts of law against the involved accused during the previous year."

Secretary in APD, Director Agriculture Jammu/Kashmir, Director Horticulture Jammu/ Kashmir, Director Research Sher-e-Kashmir University of Agricultural Sciences and Technology-Kashmir(SKUAST-K), Managing Director JKHPMC, Director Law Enforcement, representatives of concerned oil companies, and other concerned attended the meeting in person and through virtual mode

While reviewing supply and availability of pesticides and insecticides for the upcoming Horticulture and Agriculture season in the UT, the ACS asked all the stakeholders to follow all the prescribed guidelines of Central Insecticide Act. Reviewing registration of tree spray oil/ horticulture mineral oil or TSO/HMO companies with Central Insecticide Board (CIB), Dulloo said that all the suppliers, registered with the Board, have to comply with all quality parameters before supplying the pesticide or insecticide to J&K.

He also instructed the Director Research SKUAST-Kashmir to issue notification with regard to the utility of TSO/HMO while taking up random sampling of supplied insecticides and pesticides from the market to check their quality.

He also asked the concerned to finalize the rate structure of CIB approved products with neighbouring States of India so that farmers of the UT are not overcharged while buying these petroleum derived spray oils.

The ACS also asked the representatives of various companies to register themselves with the CIB for the supply of their product in J&K and also directed the Director Law Enforcement for ensuring supply of only standard insecticides

and pesticides in J&K.
