Is Online Market Robing Kashmiri Handicraft Dealers Of Livelihood

Mumbai: The bustling streets of Mumbai have long been a hub of trade for exquisite craftsmanship. Kashmiri Thousands of Kashmiri traders would flock to Mumbai annually to showcase their intricate designs and impeccable craftsmanship. However, the once highly sought after rich heritage of Kashmiri artistry is facing a challenging time in this bustling metropolis.

The declining demand is not only robbing the livelihood of thousands of traders and craftsmen back home but poses a threat to the preservation of Kashmir's rich cultural heritage. Paras Khan from Ali Kadal

in downtown Srinagar, who owns a shop at Colaba called 'Kashmir Novelties', says compared to other places like Delhi, Agra and Jaipur, there are fewer tourists here, but Mumbai with its own charm and class has always been a paradise for high end shoppers. Traditionally Kashmiri crafts have had a niche clientele. Mumbai's elite class, corporate sector and tourists were main buyers. Shawls



were more like an investment here. There used to be

wealthy Indians, who would buy shawls and present them as dowry. The finest of shawls - the Pashmina was widely available here. The luxury market was dominated by the handloom industry and this was long before. There was demand, but there wasn't enough supply because there weren't as many resources as there are now," Khan said.

Yasir Shah, another trader from the valley, has been in Mumbai for over 20 years.

"I started this business in 2002. I came to Mumbai from Srinagar in search of work. I had just finished my diploma. When I first arrived here, I

attended a few exhibitions that piqued my interest. So I started the shawl business. It was going well until Covid struck.

We had to start our business online during Covid. So we started with Amazon, Flipkart, and Snapdeal; there weren't many buyers there, but we somehow survived."

The phenomenal rise of online trade in the post Covid era has had both positive and negative impacts on the sale of Kashmiri handicrafts. While online platforms provide wider reach and More on P10

World Used Art- 370 To Keep **India Off Balance: EAM**

New Delhi: Defending the abrogation of Article 370, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Thursday said that India was being kept off balance internationally for a long time through the provision, which prompted the action and now, the world un-derstands the logic behind it.

"The whole world used Article 370 against India to keep us off balance, so we remedied it at home. We spent a lot of time to make the world understand why we did it (abrogation of Article 370).

Now, people say it is not a

live issue anymore," he said in a press conference, while responding to a question on how the government handled the issue on the diplomatic front.

He further added that while doing so, the government also fought lots of false narratives which emanated from within the country.

Soon after coming to power in 2019 for the second time, the NDA government abrogated Article 370 on August 5 that year and turned Jammu and Kashmir into a union territory.

Besides, Ladakh was also turned into a separate union territory. (IANS)

DoB Recorded In Service Records Can't Be Altered: HC

Says Once Same Is Accepted By Employer, It Can't Be Altered Without Hearing Him, Or Holding Enquiry

Srinagar: Observing that great sanctity is attached to the entry of date of birth recorded in the service records of a government servant, the High Court of J&K and Ladakh has said that the same cannot be altered by the employer without giving such employee an opportunity of hearing or else hold an enquiry in the matter. A bench of Justice Javed Iqbal Wani made the observa-

tions while allowing a petition filed in 2017 by one Prithpal Singh but died on 26 February 2021 and later his legal heirs were brought on record. In his plea, late Singh had

challenged order by virtue of which the State retired him from the State Road Transport Corporation where he worked as driver on 31 August 2003. According to the petition, Singh came to be engaged as a driver on 19 February 1986 and upon his appointment, his age came



to be recorded in the service book as of 28 years on 10 July 1985 on the basis of age certificate issued by Chief Medical Officer, Baramulla as he was not possessed of any academic qualification.

It was contended that on the basis of the date of birth recorded in the service book by the corporation, Singh had to retire in 2017 upon attaining the age of 60 years and that the authorities issued the order suggesting the year of retirement of Singh as 2003.

"Under service jurisprudence, every newly appointed person to a service or post under the Government at the time of appointment has to declare his/her date of birth by Christian Era with conformity documentary evidence," the court said. The date of birth recorded in the service records consequently becomes the basis for superannuation and the date of birth so declared by such person at the time of appointment has to be accepted by the appointing authority on production of conformity documentary evidence, the court said.

"Thus, once a date of birth of a government servant is recorded in his service records having been declared by such government servant and accepted by the appropriate authority, same cannot be altered by the concerned authority except in the case of a clerical error and though, an appropriate authority reserves the right More on P10

- 3. The other book accepted for the candidate is published by Weser Publications Germany and the book I had submitted is also from Weser Books Germany. So on what ground my book has not been considered which is from the same publisher with ISBN No.

Whereas, the assessment of books, publications and research papers etc. is the domain of the experts, therefore, the matter was taken up with the two experts who were on the Board of Interview, for their comments; and,

Whereas, the two experts vide email dated 10.05.2023 have clarified that the selected candidate has written a book on LASERS in Periodontics, and the author (Dr. Muzafar Ahmad Bhatt-BDS, MDS Periodontia) has written the book by himself only and was awarded the point, whereas the book by Dr. Fayiza Yagoob Khan (MDS Periodontics) was written in association with Dr. Mubashir Mushtag (MDS Conservative Dentistry and Endodontics) on topic "Advanced Diagnostic Aids in Periodontics". So marks can not be given for this. Dr. Fayiza was not the only author in this book. The topic of "advanced Diagnostic Aids in Periodontics" was common and it is available in every book in periodontics whereas "LASERS in Periodontics" availability is limited In Advanced Diagnostic Aids in Periodontics book many of paragraph is taken from a textbook by Glickman's/Carranza's. If any paragraph is taken from any textbook/journal, the reference from where it is taken should be guoted. The two experts have further conveyed that they had a communication with Mr. Akhil Gupta Publisher, Akinik publication house, who stated that all these are false allegations; and, Whereas, co-authership (1st & 2nd) is permissible, however, on other ground given by the Experts, the book by Dr. Faiza Yaqoob Khan can not be considered and that of Dr. Muzaffar Ahmad Bhat can not be rejected.

Srinagar: Democratic Progressive Azad Party (DPAP) on Thursday held a peaceful protest in Srinagar and marched towards the Divisional Commissioner office against the government's decision to stop subsidized ration to Above Poverty line category.

The party termed the decision anti people, saying such decisions would not be acceptable. "Those who have decided to not supply ration to APL category should learn from the history how the scheme was launched from the time of Maharaja's rule. They can't undo anything they want without bearing in mind its repercussions on ground," said Taj Mohiuddin, treasurer of DPAP.

He said during the rule of Maharaja, shali stores were set up everywhere in Jammu and Kashmir to ensure food security to all. He said the population of the UT has grown manifold since then and the food production on the other side has drastically come down.

circum-"Under such stances, the government can't deprive people of food and it is the responsibility of every welfare state to ensure no one sleeps hungry," he said.

Taj said the present regime is contradicting its own claims, on one hand it glorifies the era of Maharaja while on the other, every welfare scheme of those times is scrapped or modified to trouble common people. At the time of popular government, the BPL families used to get 7kgs per head to the limit of 35 kgs and the APL families were getting 13kgs per head at landed cost.

The protesters later marched towards the office of Divisional Commissioner and the Provincial President Kashmir Mohammad Amin Bhatt submitted a memorandum of certain demands in

Colorful Abayas Or School Uniform? **Students Protest Abaya 'Ban' In City Schools, Principal Refutes Allegations**

No Formal Order Banning Hijab Issued By Govt: CEO Srinagar

Srinagar: Several female students of Vishwa Bharti Higher Secondary School here staged a protest against its administration on Thursday, alleging that they were denied entry to the institute for wearing Abaya.

The protesting students alleged that the VB college administration categorically asked them to avoid wearing Hijab inside the college premises and adhere to the proper dress code if they want to continue their studies.

The students however refused to follow the directives, saying Hijab is their religious emblem and that doing so would violate fundamental tenets of Islam. They asked the college manage

ment to refrain from intervening in religious affairs and reverse the arbitrary instruction immediately. which they said offended their religious sensibilities. 'We were denied entry to the

college in Hijab as the college admin-

mtzko

istration is forcing us to follow the western culture. We would prefer to die than to compromise with our religion," a protesting student said.

She said the college administration cannot compel students to avoid wearing Hijab as doing so is strictly prohibited in Islam.

"We were asked to avoid wearing Hijab inside college premises or else our admission will be cancelled forthwith. How fair is it to force students to follow what they outrightly oppose. We can't accept this diktat," she added.

Another student said the college administration cannot judge students with their clothes, while male students smoke openly in the college without any respect for teachers.

A loose-fitting, full-length robe, Abaya is worn by Muslim women. "We are told we should go to

Madrassa if we want to wear an Abaya. We were not allowed inside the school," said one of the protesting students.

School principal Memroz Shafi

said the students have been told that they can wear abaya from home to school, but they should take it off inside the school premises.

"We told them to wear a long white-colored Hijab or a large dupatta as that is part of the school uniform. They come wearing colorful Abayas, with different designs which are not part of the uniform,' he said.

The principal said the stu-dents should follow a proper dress code in order to maintain decorum in the school.

When contacted Chief Education Officer (CEO) Srinagar Mohammad Shabir Khatana told Kashmir Observer that private schools or colleges do not come under the purview of School Education Department and that he cannot comment on the matter.

He was however quick to add that no formal orders have been issued by the administration, directing students not to wear Hijab inside college premises.

Bandipur Boy Dies In Kabul Fighting US Troops

Trinagar- An 18-year-old militant from Bandipur, who had gone across the LoC at the age of 11 has died in Afghani-stan during a bloody battle with American troops. He is the first Kashmiri youth to die fighting US soldiers in Afghanistan. Earlier, several Kashmiri youth had lost their lives during the Afghan jehad against the Soviet occupation

When the 15 RR learnt of the boy's death in Afghanistan, it raided his home, dug up the grounds and tore up walls and ceil-ings, but were able to find nothing.

The Bandipur boy from the Pattu Shahi village, Ayaz Ahmad Malla, had given up his carpet-weaving vocation at the age of 11, joined militant ranks in 2000, and crossed the LoC for arms training.

His father, Ghulam Muhammad, said that he had talked to his son on phone many times during the past seven years, and had always pleaded with him to come back and live a normal life. "The phone was our only contact. He would ring up and talk

to his mother," he said.

"One day he told me that he was going to Afghanistan, and asked me to pray for him. Ayaz's father said, adding that he had crossed over to Afghanistan three times during the past seven years, and each time he would take leave of his family on phone.

"Two months ago he called for the last time and said that he was going to Afghanistan. He asked me to tell his mother that they would meet again if he returned alive, or else they would

meet on Judgment Day," he said. "He did not contact us while in Afghanistan. But we did not worry, because we had got used to it. But on June 1, we were informed that Ayaz Ahmad, alias Arif, had been killed on May 29 during an operation by the US-led allied forces on the outskirts of Kabul," he said.

The family could not immediately ascertain where their son had been buried, but they surmise that locals must have interred him somewhere in Kabul

Ghulam Muhammad said that his son had been affiliated to the Harkat-ul-Mujahideen, but he had been with some other ant group when he first left home to cross the LoC.

"I still remember when I used to ask Ayaz to return and he d tell me to pray for him," he said. People are flocking to home to pay condolence to Ghulam Muhammad who lats that he now won't even be able to see his son's grave.

Odisha Train Accident: 19 Bihar Passengers Missing, 50 Dead, Say Officials

PATNA: At least 19 people from Bihar, who were on board the Coromandel Express, are still missing after the train accident in Odisha's Balasore district on June 2 in which 288 people were killed, said the state Disaster Management Department (DMD).

The missing 19 Bihar passengers on board the Coromandel Express include four from Madhubani district, Darbhanga (2), Muzaffarpur (2), East Cham-paran (2), Samastipur (2), Si-tamarhi (1), Patna (1), Gaya (1), Purnea (1), Sheikhpura (1), Siwan (1) and Begusarai (1), said a statement issued by the Disaster Management department.

"At least 50 people from different Bihar districts have reportedly died and 43 sustained injuries in the Odisha train accident," the statement issued on Wednesday night said.

Of the 50 people from Bihar who died in the train accident, nine are from Muzaffarpur district, Madhubani (6), Bhagalpur (7), East Champaran (5), Purnea (2), West Champaran (3), Nawada (2), Darbhanga (2), Jamui (2), Samastipur (3), Banka (1), Bewguisarai (1), Gaya (1), Khagaria (3), Sharsha (1), Sitamarhi (1) and Munger (1), it said.

A team of DMD officials is providing all assistance to the officials concerned of the Odisha government in ascertaining the identity of the bodies of the unidentified passengers who

PARIS: A man armed with a knife attacked a group of preschool children playing by a lake in the French Alps on Thursday, injuring four along with an adult, and sending shockwaves through the coun-

46 Hours And Counting: Girl Stuck In Borewell, Robotic Experts Called In

SEHORE: Rescue agencies were still making hectic efforts for the third day to save a two-and-a-half year-old girl who fell into a borewell in Madhya Pradesh's Sehore district, an official said on Thursday.

A team of robotic experts also joined the operation on Thursday morning to rescue the girl, who fell into the 300-feet deep borewell in a field at Mungavali village on Tuesday afternoon, he said.

Oxygen was being supplied to the girl in the borewell through a pipe, district administration officials said.

With more than 46 hours passing away since the incident, the task to pull the girl out of the borewell has become more difficult as she has slipped further down and got stuck at a depth of nearly 100 feet, as per officials.

A three-member robotic rescue team from Gujarat reached the site on Thursday morning to join the operation, the official said

"We have lowered a robot into the borewell to collect information and we are processing the data by scanning it to know the child's condition. After processing the data, we will decide the next course of action on how to rescue the girl from the borewell," the robotic team in-charge Mahesh Arya told reporters at the site.

The girl, named Srishti, fell into the borewell at around 1 pm on Tuesday and since then efforts have been on to rescue her.

She was initially stuck at the depth of about 40 feet in the borewell, but



due to vibrations caused by machines engaged in the rescue operation, she has slipped further down to about 100 feet, making the task more difficult, Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan said on Wednesday.

An Army team also joined the rescue operation, while teams of the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and the State Disaster Emergency Response Force (SDERF) have already been working to rescue the girl, officials said.

As many as 12 earth-moving and poclain machines are also currently engaged in the rescue operation, they said

Chief Minister Chouhan and a team of officials are in touch with the district authorities to supervise the rescue operation, they said.

With the latest incident, the dangers posed by open and abandoned borewells have come to the fore again.

On Saturday, a two-year-old girl slipped into a narrow borewell in Gujarat's Jamnagar district and got stuck at a depth of 20-feet. She died despite hectic rescue efforts by multiple agencies for 19 hours, an official earlier said.

In 2009, the Supreme Court issued guidelines for preventing fatal accidents of children falling into abandoned borewells.

The revised guidelines issued by the court in 2010 included setting up barbed wire fencing around the well during construction, using steel plate covers fixed with bolts over the well assembly and filling up of borewells from the bottom to the ground level.



Keeping powder dry

he June meeting of the monetary policy committee was held against the backdrop of an improving macroeconomic environment — inflation has fallen below expectations, and growth has fared better than most optimistic projections. In this environment, as was expected, the MPC has voted unanimously to keep interest rates unchanged as it assesses the impact of past monetary policy action. The benchmark repo rate stands at 6.5 per cent. The tone of the policy was balanced. The committee emphasised the need to remain "vigilant" on the growth-inflation outlook considering the uncertainty stemming from the deceleration in global economic activity, tight financial conditions, elevated inflation, and continuing geopolitical tensions.

In recent months, inflation has surprised on the downside. Retail inflation, as measured by the consumer price index, fell to 4.7 per cent in April, down from 5.66 per cent March, in part, due to the base effect. Core inflation, which has tended to be sticky, has also softened. Factoring in these readings, the RBI has now lowered its inflation projections for the first quarter to 4.6 per cent, down from 5.1 per cent earlier. However, inflation is expected to edge upwards thereafter to 5.2 per cent in the second quarter, 5.4 per cent in the third quarter, and 5.2 per cent in the fourth quarter, as the base effect fades. For the full year, the central bank now expects inflation at 5.1 per cent, only marginally lower than its earlier forecast of 5.2 per cent. While these projections point towards a real interest rate of 1.3 per cent, they also imply that inflation is likely to remain above the 4 per cent target for the foreseeable future. There remains considerable uncertainty over how the monsoon will play out - its temporal and spatial distribution could have a bearing on output and prices. In the run-up to this meeting, there was some expectation of the MPC changing its stance. However, the committee has voted (5-1) to keep its stance unchanged, remaining focused on the "withdrawal of accommodation". It is possible that once there is greater clarity on the trajectory of inflation in the coming months and over the impact of El Niño, the policy stance will be suitably altered.

On growth, too, there is reason for optimism. In the last quarter (January-March) of 2022-23, the Indian economy grew at 6.1 per cent, surpassing most expectations. This has prompted many analysts to raise their forecasts for growth in 2023-24. However, despite that, most of these estimates remain below the central bank's assessment, which still pegs growth at 6.5 per cent. In fact, the RBI now expects the economy to grow at 7.25 per cent in the first half of the year, slowing down thereafter to 5.85 per cent over the second half. How this growth-inflation dynamic evolves with respect to the central bank's expectation will determine the course of monetary policy.

FRENCH LESSONS

Pension has always been a touchy issue, especially so when the authorities have tried to weaponise the idea of social security. France, thus, is in the news, thanks to the government's reformist pension policy and the massive opposition that its stance has spawned. At the core of the matter is the French government's proposal to raise the retirement age to 64 years from the current 62. Emmanuel Macron's proposal has a pragmatic underpinning: demographic changes have rendered the extant pension laws inefficient.

France's experience has a lesson for pension administrators in India. To appreciate the issue in the local context, one needs to understand two significant aspects — life expectancy and retirement preparedness. A third aspect, the controversy surrounding the new pension system, must also be explored.

Indians are living longer. This translates to what is called 'longevity risk'. Ordinary citizens tend to outlive their resources. This adds to their retirement under-preparedness. Added to all this is the somewhat regressive move to adopt the old pension system. A number of states have already announced their intention to do so, regardless of the burden this will add to their coffers. Gone are the days when employees worked till at least 60. People who are barely in their 50s are being let go, a fall-out of corporate cleansing. The problem seems to have compounded after Covid-19. Worse, it is



a consequence of mergers and acquisitions, closure of verticals, or restructurings. The advent of AI and machine learning might just worsen it.

A huge number of Indians depend overwhelmingly on government welfare schemes. The enormous social security bills notwithstanding, they serve the unorganised sector well. We are referring to the small shop employees, informal labour, low-skilled people engaged in trades, transportation workers and the like. Most of them, unfortunately, have little recourse to formal pensions. According to an estimate by the World Bank in 2016, the global population segment aged 65 and older will double to 20% by 2050. Nearly 1.3 billion people, roughly 80% of the elderly, will reside in low-income countries. Only a third of the population in these nations have any sort of organised retirement infrastructure.

Policy makers in India have clear tasks ahead of them. One, increase retirement

age to, say, 65 years and help it remain stable. Two, make retirement savings compulsory with the help of the New Pension System in the organised sector. Three, pension savings must be mandatorily invested as actively as possible in the equity and debt markets so that efficient returns are generated for the long term.

The last bit has already ignited a mild controversy because of elements opposing the idea of risky equity investments. Debt or fixed-income, they argue, is a far better route for deployment of retirement money. The proponents of the conservative idea seem to have forgotten the limited scope for debt investments. It is difficult for the average debt instrument to meaningfully outdo inflation. Equity, on the other hand, is perfectly capable of delivering superlative performance. But equity is quirky; there can never be any guarantee of performance. The trick is to communicate the relevant points to the common Indian saver.

The bulk of the global pensions' burden is on governments and private corporations. This is true for India as well. A higher retirement age will help our nation just as it will help France. Contributory pension must continue till the death of an individual. So when life expectancy increases, the total amount of pay-outs goes up. Additional working years will help augment contributions and bring down the overall pension spend.

India is set to become an ageing nation. A large section will have no pension cover. This will add to our dependency ratio — the metric that helps us determine how retired folks depend financially on family.

As demonstrations intensify in France, as proponents of the old system in India prime their arsenal, as administered-rate retirement benefits clamour for attention, pension reforms will steal the limelight for years to come.

WhatsApp Introduces New Feature **'Channels', Know Everything About It**

hatsApp keeps its users engaged with new features and updates for the platform. Now it has introduced a new feature called 'WhatsApp Channels'. As per The Verge, an American technology news website, the latest WhatsApp feature introduces a new type of communication to the world's most popular chat app.

It's known as Channels, and it's intended for one-to-many broadcasting rather than discussion.

The Meta-owned firm described it as "a private way to follow what matters," and mentions local and sports updates as examples of how you may use it.

Channels in a new tab called Updates - where you'll find Status and channels you choose to follow - separate from your chats with family, friends, and communities. Channels are a one-way

broadcast tool for admins to send text, photos, videos, stickers, and polls. To help select channels to follow, the company is building a searchable directory where you can find your hobbies, sports teams, updates from local officials, and more.

This feature comes with most private broadcast service available. This starts by protecting the personal information of both admins and followers. As a channel admin, your phone number and

profile photo won't be shown to followers. Likewise, following a channel won't reveal your phone number to the admin or other followers. Who you decide to follow is your choice and it's private.

According to WhatsApp statement quoted by The Verge repory, privacy is an important component of the experience, which is why channel admins' information isn't shared and the app only saves 30 days of a channel's history.

Artificial intelligence (AI) algorithms outperformed the standard clinical risk model for predicting the five-year risk for breast cancer, according to a large study of thousands of mammograms.

A woman's risk of breast cancer is typically calculated using clinical models such as the Breast Cancer Surveillance Consortium (BCSC) risk model. This model uses self-reported and other information on the patient, including age, family history of the disease, and whether she has given birth, to calculate a risk score.



"Clinical risk models tive performance over pend on gathering information from different sources, which isn't always available or collected," said lead researcher Vignesh A. Arasu, from Kaiser Permanente Northern California, US. "Recent advances in AI deep learning provide us with the ability to extract hundreds to thousands of additional mammographic features," Arasu said in a statement. The study, published in the journal Radiology, used data associated with negative -- showing no visible evidence of cancer -- screening 2D mammogrames performed at Kaiser Permanente Northern California in 2016. Of the 324,009 women screened in 2016 who met eligibility criteria, a random group of 13,628 women was selected for analysis. Additionally. all 4,584 patients from the eligibility pool who were diagnosed with cancer within five years of the original 2016 mammogram were also studied. All the women were followed until 2021. "We selected from the entire year of screening mammograms performed in 2016, so our study population is representative of communities in Northern California," Arasu said. The researchers divided the five-year study period into three time periods: interval cancer risk, or incident cancers diagnosed between 0 and 1 years, future cancer risk, or incident cancers

Some of the AI algorithms excelled at predicting patients at high risk of interval cancer, which is often aggressive and may require a second reading of mammograms, supplementary screening or short-inter-


val follow-up imaging. When evaluating women with the highest 10 per cent risk as an example, AI predicted up to 28 per cent of cancers compared to 21 per cent predicted by BCSC.

Even AI algorithms trained for short time horizons -- as low as 3 months -- were able to predict the future risk of cancer up to five years when no cancer was clinically detected by screening mammography.

When used in combination, the AI and BCSC risk models further improved cancer prediction.

"We're looking for an accurate, efficient and scalable means of understanding a women's breast cancer risk," Arasu said.

"Mammographybased AI risk models provide practical advantages over traditional clinical risk models because they use a single data source: the mammogram itself," he added.



RBI Keeps Interest Rate Unchanged For Second Time In A Row

MUMBAI- The Reserve Bank of India on Thursday left its key interest rate unchanged for a second straight policy meeting but signalled that it wants to see inflation moderate more while keeping an eye on the monsoon.

The monetary policy com-mittee (MPC), which has three members from the RBI and an equal number of external experts, voted unanimously to keep the benchmark repurchase or repo rate unchanged at 6.50 per cent. It decided 5:1 to retain the policy stance focused on "withdrawal of accommodation", which was introduced in April last year.

While consumer price inflation eased during March-April 2023 and moved into the tolerance band, headline inflation is still above the target of 4 per cent and is expected to remain so during the rest of the current fiscal, RBI Governor Shaktikanta Das said announcing the monetary policy decision.

Markets Snap 4-Day Rally **Amid Profit-Taking**

MUMBAI: Equity benchmarks Sensex and Nifty surrendered early gains to close with losses on Thursday, snapping their four-day winning streak as investors pared exposure to auto, bank and IT stocks after the RBI left its key interest rate unchanged.

After remaining in the positive territory for most of the session, the 30-share BSE Sensex fell 294.32 points or 0.47 per cent to settle at 62,848.64. During the day, it tumbled 353.23 points or 0.55 per cent to 62.789.73. The NSE Nifty declined 91.85 points or 0.49 per cent to end at 18,634.55.

"Investor sentiment took a downturn following the in-line monetary policy announcement by the RBI, as the market had higher expectations for a more optimistic revision in the inflation outlook, taking into account the recent easing of inflation data.

'The RBI's decision to lower the inflation rate by only 10 bps suggests a cautious stance due to geopolitical uncertainties, the potential impact of El Nino and the increase in Minimum Support Price, Vinod Nair, Head of Research at Geojit Financial Services, said.

Kotak Mahindra Bank was the biggest loser in the Sensex pack, sliding 2.68 per cent, followed by Tech Mahindra, Mahindra & Mahindra, Axis Bank, Hindustan Unilever, Tata Motors, Tata Consultancy Services, Bajaj Finserv, Bajaj Finance, Nestle and Titan.

In contrast, NTPC, Power Grid, Larsen & Toubro, HDFC, Reliance and HDFC Bank were the gainers.

In the broader market, the BSE midcap gauge fell by 0.87 per cent and smallcap index declined by 0.47 per cent.

Expedite Research On Medicinal Usage Of Cannabis: Jitendra Singh

New Delhi: Science and Technology Minister Jitendra Singh on Thursday urged scientists to expedite research on cannabis and explore its medicinal capabilities in curing neuropathies, cancer and epilepsy.

Singh was chairing a meet-ing to review the 'Cannabis Research Project' undertaken by the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research-Indian Institute of Integrative Medicine (CSIR-IIIM) in Jammu.

The minister said the project is "first of its kind in India' and has the potential to "produce export quality medicine for neuropathies, cancer and epilepsy".

This project will give an impetus for huge investment

opportunities in Jammu and Kashmir, he added. Singh stressed that a synergy between the country's

premier institutions such as CSIR-IIIM, the Indian Institutes of Management (IIM), Indian Institutes of Technology (IIT) and All India Institutes of

Medical Sciences was important to realise the full potential of the cannabis research work. The proximity of these institutions in Jammu could be used to establish a collaboration that would help in developing marketing strategies, clinical trials and technical support for

In 2019, the Union Finance Ministry had sanctioned a research and development project on compounds such as cannabidiol (CBD) and tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) found in cannabis, commonly known as

The nod for the research came after the World Health Organisation proposed re-categorising cannabis in international law due to growing evidence supporting its medical use.

accessibility to customers, they have also presented many challenges for the traditional handicraft industry.

Many individual artisans and smallscale producers lack the necessary infrastructure, resources and digital skills to effectively engage in online sales. Many struggle to navigate ecommerce platforms, handle logistics, or market their products online, putting them at a disadvantage in the digital marketplace.

Endorsing this notion, Shah says changing buying preferences of consumers following Covid-19 is adversely affecting trade of Kashmiri businessmen based in Mumbai.

"This increased competition can make it harder for Kashmiri handicrafts to stand out, as buyers now have a plethora of options to choose from", says S A Rizvi, who till recently headed Kashmir Govt Arts Emporium at Fort

needs.

"Everything is now easily accessible, but people must understand the essence of handloom, what handloom means, and that handloom takes time. So, if the market has been declining for 10-15 years, the main reason is machine-made products. There is also stiff competition from places like Jaipur, Agra, or Bhadohi in terms of carpets, and Punjab in terms of shawls and stoles," added Shah.

Paras Khan says he is not too optimistic either.

"I don't see much room for improvement because this was a family-run business passed down from generation to generation. As a thirdgeneration owner of my small busi-ness, I'm not sure if my children will carry on the family tradition. I believe they might not. Because the younger generation isn't interested. They prefer working in the private sector. I'm not certain about the government's claims because bureaucrats don't have that mindset. They say "Make in India," "Skill India," but the talk is different and the work is different. If the government truly wants to improve this. it must collaborate with promising entrepreneurs who want to see change in this sector. Many enterprising young people are attempting to revive this fading art. The government must encourage the younger generation to get involved and show them that this is not a hopeless cause", Khan said. Despite sounding pessimistic Khan has some praise for the government initiatives taken in recent past. "One positive step taken by the government is that there was a lot of deception by traders who were simply selling machine-made, phoney products in the name of Kashmir. It was seriously affecting the business. So the government is doing a good job of putting a stop to this and seizing such places where such malpractices occur. QR code based labels are now being placed on authentic crafts like Pashmina shawls and hand knotted carpets so that customers can learn where the product was made and who the weaver is. Such actions are admirable and greatly appreciated. Because we need to establish a baseline for this industry. When such fundamental standards are met, small-scale traders are encouraged to do more work. Entrepreneurship and governance should go hand in hand to improve this.' The Government of Jammu and Kashmir, through its Handicraft and Handloom Department, has off late initiated the process of bringing various crafts under the Geographical Indications Act. This is being done to prevent low-quality and machinemade products from damaging the genuine Kashmir handicraft brand. The Act has already been granted for authentic Kashmiri crafts like Pashmina, Kani and Sozni shawls, hand-knotted Carpets, papier-mâché and woodwork like Khatamband, Walnut Wood Carving. Seven more crafts have been enlisted for the registration, as per reports. And at the same time, says Yasir, "Government needs to do more. This

trade is dwindling by the day. Not only that, but all of the art in the country is on decline. GST is another factor. When GST was introduced, how were people who did not even have an Aadhar card supposed to complete these formalities? And without GST, this work is rendered ineffective. As a result, people are in pain. Initially, there were no taxes on art and craft products. There was no tax on handmade items. Everything is taxed now. The government should waive off taxes for people working in the arts and crafts and traders who are below the poverty line."

Hussain suggests that "if the government is serious enough to run its showrooms, the biggest bottleneck that we face today is a lack of staff, and efforts should be made to employ more people." That can solve 70% of our problems.

"Online shoppers often look for competitive pricing and discounts. Individual Kashmiri artisans and sellers can not afford to lower their prices which will impact their profitability. Even if they do it this will be at the cost of the uniqueness and craftsmanship of handicrafts", Rizvi elaborated.

When asked why he discounts the value of online trade of Kashmiri handicrafts, Rizvi says Kashmiri handicrafts which are known for their intricate designs and traditional techniques, and cultural significance need an elaborate explanation in front of a buyer which according to him online platforms may not always effectively convey. "The tactile and visual experience of seeing and feeling the craftsmanship may be lost in online transactions, making it harder to communicate the true value of these crafts."

Moreover the online marketplace. he says, is not immune to the sale of counterfeit or mass-produced imitations of Kashmiri handicrafts. This, according to Rizvi, not only undermines the market for authentic products but can also deceive buyers who may unknowingly purchase inferior-quality items at a cheaper price.

The fast pace of life and changing preferences and evolving tastes of consumers remains a serious challenge to the handicraft industry, Kashmiri traders here believe.

Furthermore, the increased availability of mass-produced and cheaper alternatives has also impacted the demand for Kashmiri handicrafts. Machine-made replicas flood the market, often resembling the intricate designs of authentic Kashmiri products.

"Only a few would feel the lack of essence and soul that handmade crafts possess", says Rizvi.

These replicas are often more affordable, making them an attractive choice for budget-conscious buyers.

Economic factors have also played a role in the declining demand. The fluctuating economy, rising inflation, and changing consumer spending patterns have resulted in reduced purchasing power among Mumbai's population. Handicrafts, often considered luxury items, have taken a backseat as consumers prioritize more essential

Emporium however sounds upbeat. 'Market for our products is bouncing back. We are performing well except for off season times when footfall dwindles. Our sales performance during the previous fiscal year was outstanding. All our crafts are in demand except for crewel and Numdas which are getting fewer customers. There is an excellent future for our products provided we bring in innovation and keep the designs in tune with the market requirements," he told Kashmir Observer.

Wrestlers Want To Take Part In Asian Games Trials, Say Need A Month And Half To Prepare

NEW DELHI: Aday after calling off their protest against outgoing WFI chief Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh having received assurance from the government, the wrestlers on Thursday expressed intent to take part in the Asian Games selection trials scheduled to be held later this month.

Sports Minister Anurag Thakur on Thursday said that all national federations are aiming to finalise the squads for the Asian Games, well before the July 15 deadline set by the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA).

The Games are set to take place in Hangzhou, China from September 23 to October 8. The Indian Olympic Association (IOA) had on April 27 announced that a threemember ad-hoc committee A two-member ad hoc committee of Bhupender Singh Bajwa and Suma Shirur, which is running the day-to-day affairs of the Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) since May 4 will be conducting the selection trials most likely in

the last week of June.

However, the wrestlers want some more time to get ready for the trials.

'We want to take part in the selection trial but to prepare for it, we need at least a month and a half of training," international wrestler Satyawart Kadian, who is also Sakshi Malik's husband, told PTI on Thursday.

Getting back into competition mode will be a tough task for the wrestlers as some haven't competed since the World Championships in September last year while some of others last hit the mat even earlier, during the Commonwealth Games in August, 2022.

The grapplers had pulled out of a slew of international events recently while Vinesh Phogat and Bajrang Punia also opted out of their international training camps in April due to the protest. While the two central figure of the protest -- Tokyo Olympics bronze medallist Bajrang and world championship medallist Vinesh -- figure in the long list, the same cannot be said about Rio Olympics bronze medallist Malik.

The wrestlers have been demanding the arrest of outgoing WFI chief Singh, who they have accused of sexually exploiting women wrestlers, including a minor.

However after a marathon meeting with Thakur on Wednesday where they were assured that a chargesheet will be filed by against Singh, the wrestlers suspended the protest till June 15 as a resolution seems to be round the corner.

On Thursday, Thakur reiterated that the wrestlers' demands, including the formation of a WFI Internal Complaints Committee headed by a female, will be met.

"I said yesterday as well, we had a very positive meeting with the protesting wrestlers. All the issues that they raise we discussed and we have said that the chargesheet will be filed till June 15 and the WFI elections will take place by June 30. "We want the wrestlers to return to the mat and take part in competitions,' Thakur said.

Father Of Minor Wrestler Admits Filing False Allegations Against WFI Chief

NEW DELHI: The father of the minor wrestler told PTI on Thursday that they deliberately filed a false police complaint of sexual harassment against WFI chief because they wanted to get back at him for the perceived injustice against the girl.

The startling admission by the father substantially weakens the case against Brij Bhusha Sharan Singh who has relentlessly faced protest for the past six months by wrestlers, who have accused him of sexual harassment. The complaint by the minor wrester has also led to investigation under POCSO Act.

"It's better that truth comes out now instead of court," he told PTI when asked why he is changing his story now. "Now that interactions have started, the government has promised



fair enquiry into my daughter's defeat (in Asian U17 championship trials) last year, so it is also my duty that I rectify my mistake," he said

He also provided elaborated explanation for the origin of his and his daughter's animosity against Singh, who has vehemently denied the sexual harassment allegations, including against the minor.

The origin of the animosity goes

back to the 2022 Under 17 Asian Championship trials in Lucknow when the minor lost the final and missed out on selection to the Indian team.

They blamed Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh for the referee's decision.

Leave Bats Alone In Their Habitats For A Pandemic-Free Future, Says Study

Scientists make the case that pandemic prevention requires a global taboo or ban whereby mankind agreed to leave bats alone, to let them have the habitats they need, undisturbed, in a study published in the journal The Lancet Planetary Health. The researchers from Cornell

University, US, along with those from Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS), US, say that while we may never know the exact means by which a bat virus, to which the COVID-19 pandemic and SARS coronavirus outbreak of 2003 can be traced, we do not need to know all of the details in order to act. Bats are known to be a source

of rabies, Marburg filoviruses, Hendra and Nipah paramyxoviruses, coronaviruses such as Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS) Coronavirus, and fruit bats are strongly believed to be a source of Ebolaviruses.

This analysis, the researchers said, points to the value of humanity globally not fearing them or trying to chase them or culling them, all of them being activities only serving to disperse them and increase the odds of a zoonotic spillover. They emphasised that hu-

manity simply must take the most basic, common-sense upstream steps to lower our risk of incurring another pandemic - at



the interface where dangerous viruses can actually move from animals into people.

"In a globalised world with 8 billion people, we can no longer ignore our interconnectedness with the wildlife and ecosystems around us. We must change humanity's relationship with nature if we want to prevent the next pandemic of zoonotic origin and that can start with bats," said Susan Lieberman, WCS's Vice President for International Policy. Calling for humanity to change

its broken relationship with nature, specifically wildlife and bats in particular, the study said that the costs of implementing human behavioural changes were insignificant compared to those of another global pandemic.

"If we can actually stop hunting, eating, and trading bats, stay out of their caves, keep livestock away from areas where bats are concentrated, and if we can stop deforesting, degrading, or even start restoring, their natural habitats, we can indisputably lower the chances of another pandemic," said Steven A. Osofsky, professor at Cornell and lead author of the study.

Allowing bats to survive and thrive will also pay billions of dollars in dividends in the form of the ecosystem services that bats provide, such as control of mosquitoes and other harmful insects, as well as pollination of a wide array of important crops, the authors said in their paper.

They further said that while humanity's relationships with other kinds of animals merited close scrutiny, respecting bats and the habitats they needed was truly the lowest hanging fruit of genuine upstream pandemic prevention - an important better-latethan-never message now that we've passed the third anniversary of the COVID-19 pandemic.

KASHMIR OBSERVER WhatsApp Launches **New Feature 'Channels' For Broadcast Messages**

Meta-owned WhatsApp on Thursday launched a new feature called - "Channels" within the app for broadcast messaging, i.e., a simple, reliable and private way to receive important updates from people and organisations.

The company said that it is building Channels in a new tab called Updates, where users will find Status and channels they choose to follow - separate from their chats with family, friends and communities.

"Channels are a one-way broadcast tool for admins to send text, photos, videos, stickers, and polls. To help you select channels to follow, we're building a searchable directory where you can find your hobbies, sports teams, updates from local officials. and more," WhatsApp said in a blogpost.

Users can also get to a channel from invite links sent in chats, emails or posted online.

To protect the personal information of both admins and followers, the company said that as a channel admin, their phone number and profile photo won't be shown to followers, likewise, following a channel won't reveal their phone number to the admin or other followers. Moreover, WhatsApp men-

tioned that the company will store channel history on their servers for up to 30 days and will add ways to make updates disappear even faster from followers' devices. Admins will



also have the option to block screenshots and forwards from their channels.

Channels will not be end-toend encrypted by default as the aim of Channels is to reach a wide audience. "We do think there are some cases where end-to-end encrypted channels to a limited audience might make sense, such as a non-profit or health organisation, and we are exploring this as a future option as well," WhatsApp said.

With this feature, the company believes there is an opportunity to support admins with a way for them to build a business around their channel using their expanding payment services as well as the ability to promote certain channels in the directory to help increase awareness.

The company is launching Channels in select markets Colombia and Singapore and said it will bring Channels to more countries and the ability for anyone to create a channel over the coming months.
