1500 Spl Invitees To Attend Security Conclave In Jammu

Jammu: Around 1,500 special invitees, including defence experts and retired army officers, are attending a security conclave which will be addressed by Defence Minister Rajnath Singh here on Monday, Jammu and Kashmir BJP chief Ravinder Raina said.

Besides addressing the conclave at Gen Zorawar Singh auditorium on the campus of University of Jammu, Singh will also visit the BJP headquarters at Trikuta Nagar to chair a meeting of senior party leaders to review the prevailing political situation, Raina said.

Pak Deploying Chinese Supplied Cannon On LoC

hina has been helping the Pakistan Army build its defence -infrastructure, besides providing Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, setting up communication towers and laying underground cables along the Line of Control, officials said.

This, according to officials, is part of efforts to further shore up China's position as an all-weather friend of Pakistan while ensuring the safety of growing Chinese enclaves in Pakistan-controlled Kashmir (PcK) set up on the pretext of securing the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) road and hydel projects built in the "occupied territory".

The officials said that the recently developed SH-15, a 155 mm truckmounted howitzer gun, has also been spotted at some places along the Line of Control (LoC) after it was displayed on Pakistan Day last year.

Known as a 'shoot and scoot' artillery weapon, Pakistan had signed a contract with Chinese firm North Industries Group Corporation Limited (Norinco) for the supply of 236 SH-15s and, according to London-based Janes Defence magazine, the first batch was delivered in January 2022.

Though no senior PLA officials were observed at forward posts, unlike earlier in 2014, some intercepts suggested that Chinese troops and engineers were setting up infrastructure along the LoC, including underground bunkers, the officials said.

The Army has officially maintained silence on the issue but has been constantly updating the intelligence agencies, sources said.

The Chinese military's presence, according to experts, is due to Beijing's 46-billion-dollar CPEC under which Gwadar Port in Karachi will be linked to China's Xinjiang province by the Karakoram highway, an area under the illegal occupation of China. More on P6



AI Could Democratise Nutritional Advice, But Safety And Accuracy Must Come First

how people are using artificial intelligence (AI) tools such as ChatGPT, you will quickly find that food requests are popular. More specifically, users are seeking help with menu planning to meet their personal dietary goals.

But how effective is this technology in providing dietary advice? In a consumer poll, over three out of five consumers agreed they would like to eat a healthier diet. Some 73% felt it was important to buy food that has a low environmental impact.

A substandard diet is a leading cause of chronic disease and death around the world. Additionally, a third of all humancaused greenhouse gas emissions are linked to food. Against this background, it's clear that help is required to achieve the transformational shift from goals to behaviour.

However, for the 19.9% of Europeans who live with a self-reported food allergy, every eating decision has to align with protecting themselves from an adverse reaction. This comes at a cost: the average spend on weekly food purchases for those with food hyper-sensitivities is 12-27% higher than for those with no allergies. An extra 40.37 days is required for those with allergies to research and plan their diet.

So, while AI could help many households have healthier diets, the consequences of an error for those with food allergies can be life threatening. With concern also raised for consuming purported healthy ingredients such as coconut oil, it is extremely important that nutrition experts help inform these technological solutions.

How can AI help?

Academics in Canada used specific types of AI, known as natural language processing (NLP) and machine learning, to process text on food labels. This is done to accurately categorise food products by their specific nutritional criteria. Such criteria include the Table of



Reference Amounts for food categorisation used by Health Canada – the country's government department for health policy – along with the nutrient profiling system of Food Standards Australia New Zealand, the authority that develops food standards for both Oceanian countries. This work showed that technology could be used to reduce the time needed to manually categorise large numbers of food products.

Commercial offerings using technology in this way already exist. One example is the company Food Maestro. The company I am involved with, Spoon Guru, has been working with global retailers for eight years, helping them facilitate the food search and find features within online grocery shopping platforms using AI systems that are codeveloped with registered nutritionists.

The field of generative AI uses large language models (LLM) and machine learning to not only identify words within text but also to understand their order and context to produce human-like responses to text-based prompts.

Al chatbots such as Chat GPT use this technology to synthesise information, summarise text and answer questions. It can be used to provide tailored menu plans, generate recipe ideas and compile shopping lists.

Chatbot test

Early expert reviews using Chat GPT for menu planning and dietary advice have produced mixed results. A study to assess the chatbot's ability to produce dietary plans for those with allergies found that out of 56 diets, it generated an unsafe plan on one occasion, including almond milk within a nut-free dietary plan.

There were other errors too. For example, there were mistakes in the way food quantities and energy values were described and there was repetition of the same foods within menu plans.

In a review of ChatGPT's potential for personalised obesity treatment, the authors raised concerns about patient privacy and security. They also noted a lack of accountability should harmful advice be provided. These models currently do not have to abide by professional standards or codes of ethics.

Dietitians tested ChatGPT's ability to define an ideal diet for those with type 2 diabetes or those undergoing haemodialysis – a treatment for kidney failure. They too found errors. The chatbot responded with foods that would not be optimal for these conditions, without any warnings. Menu plans were again repetitive and the authors raised concerns that such solutions could encourage users not to consult qualified health professionals.

The lack of references to the sources of information used to generate the answers meant they couldn't check if they were of high scientific quality. A cardiologist tested the advice that ChatGPT generated in relation to his specialist area, which was the link between dietary fat and cardiovascular disease. He felt the answers misinterpreted the research studies, repeatedly producing errors and inconsistencies in a tone described as sensible, confident and convincing.

Ethical implications

Despite clear signs that caution is warranted, some early reviews also noted that AI had strengths and the potential for providing personalised nutrition advice. ChatGPT's responses often aligned with published food-based dietary guidelines. For example, the chatbot included fruit and vegetables in every meal, and incorporated advisory statements, such as "it is important to read labels carefully" and "consult a health professional".

The ethical implications, safety and quality of the technology will need to be more fully understood before it is likely to be used within these professions. However, customers and patients may choose to make regular use of it regardless.

Technology like ChatGPT could be seen as a useful tool for dietitians and registered nutritionists to quickly find information about foods, helping inform their work.

Academics investigating the relationship between food and health could also use AI to save time or develop innovative approaches to their research. This could help increase the impact of their research, increasing its accessibility in a way that benefits society.

Policy makers, regulators and those working in the food industry are very interested in the health and sustainability of food. They are also interested in how advice in this area is communicated to the public.



"One of the challenges of joining a virtual meeting from a conference room, is that the people in the room are identified by the name of the conference room rather than as individuals," the tech giant said in a Workspace Updates blogpost on Thursday.

However, with the new feature, if someone joins a meeting from a conference room, they can use companion mode on their personal device to check in to that specific room.

Rather than being represented in a meeting just by the conference room users are in, room check-in helps to make sure that everyone in the meeting can see their name and be aware of their



presence.

Room check-in will be available by default, but admins can turn this feature off for specific Meet hardware devices or specific users.

Meanwhile, earlier this month, the tech giant was rolling out a new viewer mode in the video communication service, which allows users to select "Everyone is a viewer" when creating their Calendar invite.

When using Google Meet for large meetings, designating attendees as "viewers" helps reduce potential meeting distractions, like audio disruptions.





A Sea Of Difference

Media coverage of Titanic-touring sub and migrant boat tragedy reveals deep bias

" There is a potential tragedy unfolding with a submarine that is getting minute-tominute coverage all around the world, and it is understandable because, obviously, we all want and pray that those folks are rescued

ONDON: For much of the past week, international news media audiences had to put up with round-the-clock coverage of an incident whose place in the annals of history is far from assured. For as long as the fate of five people inside Titan, a submersible that was headed to the site of the Titanic shipwreck, remained unknown, major media outlets spared no bulletin slot or expense in getting talking heads to hold forth on the topic.

It did not need an elder statesman of America to point out the scandalous contrast between the intense media coverage of the Titan's doomed journey and the almost cursory attention paid to the deaths of possibly hundreds of people off the coast of Greece just days earlier. Still, when Barack Obama did just that at a public forum in Athens on Thursday, his comments not only struck a responsive chord with the audience but also gave voice to the pent-up frustrations of news consumers worldwide.

"There is a potential tragedy unfolding with a submarine that is getting minute-to-minute coverage all around the world, and it is understandable because, obviously, we all want and pray that those folks are rescued," the former US president said in the Greek capital, where he was attending a conference on child and adolescent mental health initiatives.

"But the fact that that has gotten so much more attention than 700 people who sank — that is an untenable situation."

The disaster he was referring to - described as "one of the worst in recent memory" — unfolded far away from the media's gaze in the Central Mediterranean on Tuesday. A fishing vessel carrying an estimated 750 people from Palestine, Syria, Egypt and Pakistan capsized in international



waters off Pylos in southern Greece. According to the UN Human Rights Office, 78 people are confirmed dead while at least 500 more are missing.

The media conversation concerning the tragedy, however, was quickly drowned out by the noise of technical experts and ocean explorers dissecting live on air the search-and-rescue efforts of multiple Western countries to locate the Titan, which was carrying wealthy marine enthusiasts on a tour of the Titanic wreckage off the coast of Newfoundland in Canada before it vanished on Sunday.

"Sadly, the only reason people are talking about the relative lack of attention to the staggering number of migrants and refugees who die all the time on dangerous journeys

is that timing," Judith Sunderland, associate Europe and Central Asia director at Human Rights Watch, told Arab News. "It happened right after the horrifying shipwreck off the coast of Greece, one of the worst in recent memory.'

Her viewpoint is seconded by Nour Halabi, a University of Aberdeen fellow, who believes that had the Titan not gone missing during the same week that tragedy struck the migrant vessel, Western media outlets' "blasé" attitude might not have been so glaringly evident and 'we would not have been having this discussion.'

The "juxtaposition of the two events" has brought to the public's attention "this contrast of 'worthy

and 'unworthy' victims," Halabi, the author of "Radical Hospitality," which examines media coverage of immigration, told Arab News

While international media outlets went big on close-ups, names and life stories of the five "explorers," as described by the submersible's operator OceanGate, the world got to see at best blurry images of a mass of migrants in distress as their ship capsized, the latest in a long line of tragedies that have turned the Mediterranean Sea into a veritable graveyard of people fleeing poverty and violence in their home countries

two-meter by two-meter slab of pearly white stucco stands alone near the center of a vacant, trash-strewn lot behind a red brick wall across Maulana Azad Road from Regal Chowk. The faux Spanish tile roofing is cracked and falling off, and on one side a golden inscription in black marble reads: "Sri Pratap Singh Library, Foundation Stone, Laid February 27, 2004."

Zahida Bano, Chief Librarian of the current SPS Library, explained what happened.

"Nothing," she deadpanned, chatting outside her office last week. "There was some controversy between the builders and the government, apparently costs were higher than they expected, and construction stopped before it started."

Nearly three years later the stout monument looms over the vast emptiness like an anti-scarecrow, fending off progress and fostering a return to nature. Instead of thrumming with the quest for knowledge the spot festers, silent testament, if any more were needed, to the Valley's intellectual calcification.

"I've been championing, fighting, writing letters and pleading with all and sundry, but nothing is getting done over there," said Agha Ashraf Ali, former J&K Director of Education and Principal of the College of Education. He had prodded local bureaucrats, politicians, and businessmen not only to restart work on the modern SPS venue but also to add an extension to the children's

> library in the name of his son, the poet Agha Shahid Ali, all to no avail. "Full of large promises and small excuses, they are not interested in books at all," he said.

> In the age of bottomless broadband Internet and 2000-channel satellite television, reading may be on the wane across the globe. But in Kashmir the problem is especially acute, and the stakes particularly high. From Mughals to Dogras to Indians, Kashmiris have for centuries been under one or another oppressive voke; an unwillingness to read could fate them to remain there.


"Without a library there's no university, there's no thought, there's no progress," Agha added. "Libraries and-universities, these things are on the frontier of thought, where you can move forward and ask inconvenient questions; this is an absolutely dead society, afraid of asking questions." Indeed, the saddest truth may not be that the

library has not yet been built, but that locals don't seem to care. The Deputy Director of Libraries admitted the situation had grown dire.

"Many people are less interested in reading," acknowledged Kuldeep Singh, who was transferred into his new post from the Social Welfare Department last month. He cited electronic media and an increasing lack of time, particularly among wealthier, more sophisticated Kashmiris. "The educated people are reading less, not more, even though it should be the other way around."

Comparing the latest borrowing estimates with historical data revealed a steep decline. The Directorate of Libraries said SPS Library has averaged 1000 visitors and 350-400 borrowers per month this year. Bano, who works at the site every day, estimated that members borrowed around 70-80 books monthly, or one-fifth the directorate's estimate.

According to Dr. Sangita Gupta and Dr. Gurdev Singh, professors of library science at the University of Jammu and authors of the new report "Public Library System in J&K State", SPS Library loaned out 10,185 books from April



1945 to April 1946. Stretched over a year, the directorate's 2006 estimate would come to much less than half that and Bano's on-site numbers would be just under one-tenth. Yet the population of Srinagar has doubled in the last 60 years, which means book borrowing has dropped as much as 95 percent in that span.

Prodded by such data, Kashmir Observer undertook an informal survey of passersby on Residency Road and found that about one out of every ten local adults had read an entire book in the last six months. Unemployed engineering graduate Javed Dhar, 27, was representative of those polled.

"I'm online all the time and just not very interested in reading," he said, stopping on the way to meet a friend for lunch. "I'm really busy, too

The collection developed in the public li braries so far is... not relevant to the tastes of the public." they wrote. "[Book] selection is done at a higher level, and the requirement of users of the particular library is not taken into consideration. The librarian is not consulted...this leads to less use of library reading material.

"The condition of these libraries is unsatisfactory and very poor," the authors continued, explaining that professional service is absent, the infrastructure nominal, the locations odd and unpopular, and that all the libraries "are lacking the requisite reading facilities; the reading space is insufficient and the requisite furniture is inadequate."

Finally, Gupta and Singh pointed out that, like current Deputy Director Singh, most library officials are appointed from within the state administrative cadre. "In the history of public libraries, no subject expert has been appointed as Director of the Public Libraries and Research in the state,' said their report.

These findings are borne out at SPS Library, which lies tucked away behind the State Museum across from the Jhelum. Although the front reading room is bright, airy, and attractive, in two back rooms thousands of volumes fester in dusty cases surrounded by neglected, brilliantly colored papier-mache walls.

Chief Librarian Bano acknowledged the 1896 building was in need of cleaning and repair, but more than the structure has suffered. A few of the glass-fronted bookcases had been left unlocked, and a recent visitor found that many of the texts inside were fragile and of little use. Upon opening, several pages fell out of a faded, red-bound 1927 hardcover of Dostoyevsky's Poor Folk. A bright green 1950's Penguin Edition of Dickens' Our Mutual Friend was sticky and unwilling.

"I used to check out Carlisle, Rousseau, the lives of Napoleon and all that from SPS, books for my father," Agha recalled. "Now fifty, sixty years after independence, when money has been coming into Kashmir in cataracts, the library has gone to the dogs. You can't find any books at all, anything that has been released in the last few years is not available here.

Moscow: The Wagner paramilitary group halted its march on Moscow on Saturday, after Belarus President Alexander Lukashenko brokered a deal between Russian President Vladimir Putin and the rebels, averting an armed confrontation that threatened to plunge the country into civil war.

Yevgeny Prigozhin, the leader of Russian mercenary group Wagner, told his forces to immediately halt their advance on Moscow and return to their camps as fears of a possible violent power struggle gripped the country.

We are turning our columns around and going back to the field camps according to our plan," Prigozhin said in a short, fiery audio message posted to Telegram on June 24.

In his statement, Prigozhin boasted that his troops – which he claimed numbered 25,000 – had come within 200 kilometers of Moscow without spilling any blood, a possible hint to the Kremlin of his support within elements of the nation's security structures. Earlier, Moscow deployed soldiers in preparation for their arrival and told residents to avoid going out.

The Kremlin later confirmed that it had struck a deal with Prigozhin to end the insurrection, saying the mercenary leader will move to Belarus and have all charges dropped against him while his Wagner group will now come under the direct control of

the Russian military. Belarusian strongman Alyak-

sandr Lukashenka helped mediate the deal, the Kremlin said. The insurrection heralded the

most serious challenge to President Vladimir Putin's more than two-decade hold on power, and though it appears to be over for now, it has left the authoritarian Russian leader weakened and vulnerable, experts say.

In a sign of the gravity of the situation earlier in the day, Putin addressed the nation, saying in televised remarks that he would do "everything to protect the country. He also called the leaders of Belarus, Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, and Turkey to inform them of the situation.

Israeli settlers' rampage against Palestinian villages continues for fifth day

sraeli settler gangs on Sunday morning burned crops in the Palestinian town of Turmusaya, north of Ramallah, only days after the village was subjected to a rampage that left at least 30 houses and 70 vehicles on fire.

More than 400 settlers stormed the village on Wednesday under the protection of the Israeli army, killing one Palestinian, Omar Jabara Abu Al-Qattin, 25.

Israeli settler attacks on Palestinian villages are increasingly a regular occurrence for West Bank residents. On Saturday, dozens of settlers swept through several West Bank villages attacking Palestinian homes in scenes that have been described as an organised "pogrom".

Several dozen settlers rampaged through the village of Umm Safa, in the occupied West Bank, terrorising Palestinian residents. Video footage of the attack has surfaced online showing roving gangs of settlers firing bullets towards Palestinian houses.

The latest attack marks the fifth consecutive day of vigilante attacks against Palestinian villages in the West Bank. Palestinian media outlet

Arab48 said that at least 10 houses were destroyed in Umm Safa and seven vehicles.

The settlers carried out the attacks with the protection of the Israeli army, according to Palestine TV journalist Mohammed Radhi. Ån off-duty Israeli soldier was one of four suspects detained fol-

lowing the attack on Umm Safa. Following the latest attack, the Israeli military chief Herzi Halevi, the head of the Israeli intelligence at Shin Bet, Ronen Bar, and Israeli Police Commissioner Kobi Shabtai issued a joint statement strongly condemning the recent string of settler attacks on Palestinians in the West Bank, brand-

ing them as "nationalist terrorism in the full sense of the term".

The Israeli military has admitted to having "failed" to stop other settler riots in recent days.

Israeli settlers also attacked the electricity grid, causing a blackout in several Palestinian villages including Umm Safa, Deir Sudan, Ajjoul and Attarah.

Spiralling violence Separately on Saturday, a Palestinian teenager was left bleeding to death after being shot by Israeli forces at a military checkpoint at Qalandia, a village be-

tween Jerusalem and Ramallah. Ishaq Hamdi Ajlouni, 17, was shot and killed by Israeli forces after he opened fire, lightly wounding a security guard.

Violence has engulfed the West Bank this past week following Israel's raids on the Jenin refugee camp on Monday that left seven Palestinians dead.

The raids were followed by an attack on Tuesday by two Palestinian gunmen that left four Israeli settlers dead. Israel continued to ratchet up tensions when on Wednesday it carried out its first drone strike in the West Bank in almost 20 years, leaving three Palestinians dead.

Last year, faced with an increase of armed resistance in the West Bank, Israel publicly initiated the Break the Wave campaign, enabling near-daily military raids across the West Bank and an escalation in Israel's shoot-to-kill policy, resulting in mass arrests and the deadliest year for Palestinians in the occupied territories since the Second Întifada two decades ago.

Since the start of this year, Israeli forces and settlers have killed at least 171 Palestinians, including 26 children. A total of 135 fatalities have been recorded in the West Bank and East Jerusalem and a further 36 in the Gaza Strip. In the same period, Palestinians have killed at least 24 Israelis.

Imphal: The Manipur government on Sunday extended the ban on internet services in the state for five more days to prevent any disturbances of peace and public order.

According to an official release, the ban on internet services in the Northeast state, which has been racked by ethnic clashes and violence, has been extended till 3 pm on June 30 to "prevent any disturbances of peace and public order in the jurisdiction of the State of Manipur".

The government release informed further that the ban on mobile internet services in the state was extended due to the "persisting unrest".

Director General of Po-Manipur vide letter lice. No.IC/11(163)/2008-PHQ(Pt) dated 24-06-2023 reported that there are still reports of incidents of violence, attacks and arson of houses and premises including exchange of firing," the release stated.

"There is apprehension that some anti-social elements might use social media extensively for the transmission of images, hate speech and hate video messages inciting the passions of the pub-

lic which might have serious repercussions for the law and offer situation in the State of Manipur," it added. This is the third straight ex-

tension of the ban on internet services in the state. Earlier, on May 3, the Manipur

government suspended mobile internet services in the state, amid the spiralling ethnic violence, and the ban has remained in force ever since.

The government extended the ban on June 11, till June 15, and then again, for five more days, from June 20 to June 25.

Manipur has been in the throes of ethnic violence for a month, in the wake of a directive of the high court asking the state government to consider including the Meitei community in the list of Scheduled Tribes (STs).

Violence gripped Manipur on May 3 after clashes erupted during a rally organised by the All Tribals Students Union (ATSU) to protest against the demand for the inclusion of Meiteis in the list of Scheduled Tribes (STs).

the criminal justice system. Among the many stories he narrates is one of mafia lord Romesh Sharma, who terrorised his targets to extort properties worth hundreds of crores and thwarted investigations using his access to powerful people in the political and corporate world.

He also recounts how 'Bikini Killer' Charles Sobhraj managed a sensational escape from the highsecurity Tihar Jail in Delhi, the



complex story behind the fight for justice in the BMW hit-and-run case that left several people dead, and the Jessica Lal murder case.

Mr Kanth says whatever be the compulsions of maintaining security, law and order, or crime control, the police and justice machinery cannot be permitted to give go-by to the laid down legal processes.

"Killing someone, even the hardened and much wanted criminal, while the said person happens to be either in the police or judicial custody or within reasonable control, shall amount to a murder or a culpable homicide not amounting to murder," he says.

"Through my extremely hazardous journey negotiating the path of criminal justice system in the majority of the cases I investigated, I found that the most serious and heinous crimes. even those concerning the terrorists, mafia, and drugs or being supported by the rich and powerful, could be brought to logical conclusions within the framework of law," he told PTI.

He says his book is mostly about cases and situations in which the "truth which is supposed to be the guiding star in the hazardous journey of India's criminal justice system becomes the first casualty".

PM Modi Visits Egypt's Historic 11th-Century Al-Hakim Mosque In Cairo

Cairo: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday visited Egypt's historic 11th-century Al-Hakim Mosque in Cairo, restored with the help of India's Dawoodi Bohra community. On the second day of his state visit to Egypt, Prime Minister Modi was shown around the mosque whose latest restoration was completed about three months ago.

The mosque mainly performs Friday prayers and all five obligatory prayers. The Prime Minister

was seen appreciating the intricately carved inscriptions on the walls and doorways of the mosque which was built in 1012.

Over a thousand years old, al-Hakim is the fourth oldest mosque in Cairo and the second Fatimid mosque to be built in the city. The mosque covers an area of 13,560 square metres, with the iconic central courtyard occupying 5,000 square metres. The Bohra community, which is settled in India, originated from the Fatimids. They renovated the mosque from 1970 onwards and have been maintaining it since then, he told PTI.

The Prime Minister has a very close attachment to the Bohra community who have also been in Gujarat for many years and it will be an occasion for him to again visit a very important religious site for the Bohra community," India's Ambassador to Egypt Ajit Gupte earlier said.

Protesting Wrestlers Rule Out Hitting Roads Again, Say Fight Against Wfi Chief Will Be Just A Legal Battle Now

New Delhi: A day after asserting that they could hit the streets again to resume their agitation against WFI chief. the protesting wrestlers on Sunday said the fight against Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh will be fought in the court and not on roads.

Vinesh Phogat, Sakshi Malik and Bajrang Punia posted identical tweet where they said the government has fulfilled its promise of filing a chargesheet against Singh.

"In this case, the wresters' will

continue till we get justice but it (fight) will be in court and not on road," the statement on twitter read.

"Regarding the reform in WFI, the election process, as promised, has begun. We will wait for fulfilment of promises made by the government regarding the July 11 elections."

A few minutes after posting the statement, Vinesh and Sakshi tweeted that they are taking a break from social media for a few days.

On Saturday, in a live address on social media, the trio of Vinesh, Sakshi and Bajrang had attacked former wrestler and now BJP leader Yogeshwar Dutt for questioning the IOA ad-hoc panel's decision to grant them exemption from Asian Games trials

In that near 40-minute address, the wrestlers had asserted that their fight against Singh will continue and they will deliberate how to continue this fight after evaluating the chargesheet filed against Singh.

"People are asking us why are we silent . The time (to suspend protest) was till June 15. This fight will continue, whether it is on the mat or off

the mat, but the fight for justice will continue," Vinesh had said,

"Till Brij Bhushan is not put behind bars, he doesn't pay for his sins, it will continue. We are waiting for a copy of chargesheet. We will evaluate if it is strong enough for justice. Whether we will sit on road or put our lives at stake, we will decide. That's why we are silent. Our fight has not ended," she had said.

Vinesh also alleged that Dutt was targeting them because of his self

interest.

"You (Dutt) had scared wrestlers

that's why they did not come in the second protest (from April 23). You put pressure on them that they will lose their jobs. People told us that they were with us but they have compulsions that they can't come," Vinesh.

"I will tell you why you are doing this. Brij Bhushan might have offered you the post of WFI President and that's why you have sided with him." After being removed from Jantar

Mantar on May 28, the wrestlers had suspended their protest till June 15 after getting assurance from Sports Minister

Anurag Thakur that a chargesheet will

be filed against Singh by then and none of his family members will be allowed to contest WFI elections.

The wrestlers, who got massive support from farmer leaders, khap panchayats and several other organisation, sat on Jantar Mantar for 38 days before Delhi Police detained them for violating law and order on May 28.

They first came to Jantar Mantar on January 18 and suspended their threeday sit-in after Thakur promised to probe their allegations of sexual harassment and intimidation against 66-yearold Singh, who is a six-time BJP MP.

Monsoon Arrives In Delhi

2 Days Early, Brings Mercury Down To 29 Degrees Celsius

NGT-Appointed Committee On Yamuna Identifies New Thrust Areas For Rejuvenating River

New Delhi: The NGT-appointed committee on Yamuna has identified new thrust areas, including prevention of dumping of waste from bridges across the river, for the rejuvenation of the water body, Raj Niwas officials said on Sunday.

These have been identified apart from the existing eight action points.

The latest action points evolved on the basis of the experiences till then and were presented to the fourth meeting of the high level committee (HLC) held in April this year for review.

Delinking of sewerage lines and storm water drains developed due to faulty inter-connections, prevention of dumping of waste from bridges across the Yamuna and de-silting of sewer lines below 1,000 mm diameter which run up to approximately 442.63 kilometres in the city, in addition to the 200 km of trunkperipheral sewer lines which are above 1m diameter, are some of the New Action Plans envisaged.

These will go along with the eight previously identified tasks that the HLC has been monitoring and implementing.



The New Action Plans were explained during the fifth HLC meeting which took place recently. Under the delinking of sewerage system and storm water drainage, there will be full capacity utilisation of storm water drainage.

During the fifth meeting, the HLC was informed that the total number of natural storm water drains stands at 210 in Delhi, and the Irrigation and Flood Control Department (I&FCD) was asked to submit an agencywise list of storm water drains which have got connected to

The HLC was also informed that the Delhi Jal Board (DJB) has prepared a list of 539 points of faulty inter-connections from storm water drains in the first phase. Out of these, 309 storm water drains are still connected

to DJB's sewerage system. Out of these 309 drains, the Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) accounts for 286 drains, Works Department Public (PWD) 19, and the Delhi State Industrial and Infrastructure Development Corporation Ltd (DSIIDC) accounts for three drains

instructed that drain owning agencies (DOAs) will submit timelines for disconnection of faulty inter-connections during the next meeting of the HLC.

As part of prevention of dumping of waste from bridges across the Yamuna, 10 bridges will be covered. These bridges are maintained by various agencies looking after the supply of wire mesh/net and adhering to timeline repair of broken wire mesh/net.

These include Wazirabad Barrage Road Bridge, Inter-State Bus Terminus (ISBT) near Kashmere Gate, Old Iron

Railway Bridge, Geeta Colony Road Bridge, Signature Road Bridge, ITO Road Bridge, Railway Bridge Downstream of ITO, Nizamuddin Road Bridge, DND Flyway Road Bridge and Okhla Barrage Road Bridge.

As part of de-silting of sewer lines below 1,000 mm diameter, in addition to 200 kms of trunkperipheral sewer lines, 442.63 kilometres of de-silting of sewer lines below one mm diameter will take place by December. Till May 2023, about 26.08 kilometres of cumulative length of de-silting of drains has already taken place.

The HLC has been reviewing the progress of work and the Action Taken Report (ATR) with regards to directions issued under eight specific heads aimed at specific targets.

These include 100 per cent treatment of sewage, trapping of all drains, construction of sewerage networks in unauthorised colonies and JJ clusters, industrial effluent management through CETPs, septage management, restoration and rejuvenation of Yamuna floodplains, utilization of treated waste water, and environmental management plan of Najafgarh Jheel, officials added.

Press Trust of India New Delhi: The monsoon arrived in the national capital on Sunday, two days before its scheduled onset, bringing respite to Delhiites from scorching heat, even as a woman died due

to electrocution amid rainfall. The rains which started early morning brought the maximum temperature down to 29 degrees Celsius, eight notches below normal. the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said. The Safdarjung Observatory, Delhi's primary weather station, logged 48.3 mm rainfall in the 24 hours ending at 8.30 am on Sunday, it said. The rainfall also led to wa-

terlogging and traffic congestion in some parts of the city. On Sunday, the southwest monsoon covered both Delhi and Mumbai together for the first time since June 21, 1961, the IMD said. While it hit the national capital two days before schedule, its entry into the financial capital is two weeks late, the Met office said.

'It is the first time since June 21, 1961, that the monsoon arrived in Delhi and Mumbai at the same time," said DS Pai, a senior scientist at the IMD.

Meanwhile, the Safdarjung Observatory recorded 2.4 mm rainfall, Palam 7.1 mm, Lodhi Road 1.7 mm, Ridge 7.4 mm and Ayanagar recorded 4 mm rainfall between 8.30 am and 5.30 pm on Sunday. The Met office termed the monsoon activity over Haryana, Chandigarh and Delhi as "vigorous".

According to the IMD, monsoon activity is considered "vigorous" if the recorded rainfall is more than four times the normal or it is fairly widespread. In a related incident, a 34-year-old woman died of electrocution after accidentally coming in contact with a live wire at the New Delhi railway station complex on Sunday morning amid rainfall which also led to waterlogging there.

According to traffic police, due to rain, a branch of a tree fell on the road in Plaza Market, Vasundhra Enclave leading to obstruction in traffic movement for a brief period.

According to data shared by the central control room of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, due to the monsoon, several trees were uprooted in Janakpuri, Swaroop Nagar and Trilokpuri, while waterlogging was reported from Timarpur in Civil Lines, Janakpuri, Firni Road, Friends Colony, and Railway Colony.

Srikanth Kondapalli, professor of Chinese studies at Jawaharlal Nehru University who is part of a think-tank on Indian policy towards China, feels that arms transfers to Pakistan are part of a design to secure China's interests in the region.

He said that arms transfers are in line with China's stated stand of being Pakistan's "all-weather" friend and to check India by pursuing an overall regional dominance policy.

"China initiated the Economic Corridor (CPEC) in 2014 in violation of India's sovereignty concerns in Pakistan-controlled Kashmir.

"In addition to expansion of the Karakoram Highway, China has sent an estimated 36,000 'security guards' into PcK to protect its hydro-electricity projects and other infrastructure projects from terror attacks," he said.

Kondapali said that China had also been constructing "well-off society" villages in PoK.

"Modern warfare also requires 24/7 surveillance and China has supplied 10 CH-4A drones, specifically designed for high-altitude missions over land and sea that can fire from 5.000 metres away. These are in addition to 48 Wing Loong-II drones, used as a surveillance and aerial reconnaissance and precision strike platform, to Pakistan since 2018," he said.

Army Accused Of Forcing Worshippers To Raise Slogans In Pulwama

Srinagar: Several Jammu and Kashmir political leaders, including three former chief ministers, have demanded a probe into reports alleging that some army personnel forced a group of worshippers inside a mosque to raise religious slogans in Pulwama district.

Both the army and the police are tight-lipped on the matter but sources in both the establishments said an internal investigation is on to ascertain the facts about the alleged incident during pre-dawn prayers at Zadoora village in the south Kashmir district on Saturday.

National Conference vice president and former chief minister Omar Abdullah tweeted that "reports of security force personnel entering a mosque in Zadoora in Pulwama are deeply distressing. It's bad enough they entered but then forcing people to chant" religious slogans as reported by the locals there is unacceptable.

"I hope @rajnathsingh ji (defence minister) will issue instructions for these reports to be investigated in a timely & transparent manner," he said.

PDP president and former chief minister Mehbooba Mufti, in her reaction to the incident through a tweet, said, "Shocked to hear about army troops from 50 RR storming into a mosque at Pulwama & forcing Muslims inside to chant"

"Such a move when @ AmitShah (Home Minister) is here & that too ahead of (Amarnath) yatra is simply an act of provocation," she said and demanded an immediate probe into the incident.

New Delhi: A woman from Guinea-Bissau has been arrested for smuggling in cocaine worth Rs 11 crore at the international airport here, a statement issued on Sunday by the customs said.

The passenger was intercepted after her arrival from Ethiopia's Addis Ababa on June

18, it said.

During investigation, it was found that she had swallowed 59 capsules containing the narcotic. The passenger was taken to a local hospital where she was made to regurgitate the capsules, leading to recovery of 724 grams of cocaine. The woman has been arrest-

ed and cocaine has been seized, the agency said.

56-Year-Old Millionaire Fails China's Toughest Exam For 27th Time

China: After failing to achieve a high enough score on China's dreaded college entry exam for the 27th time, 56-year-old Liang Shi is beginning to wonder if he will ever make it to his dream university.

Mr Shi, a self-made million-aire, has taken the gruelling "gaokao" exam dozens of times over the past four decades, hoping to earn a place at top-tier Sichuan University and fulfil his ambition of becoming "an intellectual". By most measures, Liang has had a successful life -- he worked

his way up from a menial job on a factory floor to establishing his own construction materials business, making millions of yuan in the process, but his university dreams have so far eluded him.

In his quest for a prestigious higher education, he has put in 12-hour study days, abstained from drinking and playing mahjong, and endured the media mocking him as the "gaokao holdout", as well as online suspicion that it is all a publicity stunt.

But despite months of living like "an ascetic monk", this year Liang was 34 points short of the provincial baseline for getting into any university. "Before I got the result, I had a



feeling that I wouldn't be able to get a high enough score to enter an elite university," he told AFP. "But I didn't expect to not

make it into the ordinary ones." Shortly before 10 pm Friday

-- along with hundreds of thousands of high-school students across southwestern Sichuan province -- the grey-haired businessman carefully typed in his exam identification information and nervously waited to find out how he'd done.

Several local media reporters live streaming the scene were also avidly checking for updates -- and from their disappointed expressions, Liang knew before he even saw the screen himself that the result was not ideal.



"It's all done for again this year," he said to himself. "It's very regrettable.'

In the past, Liang's repeated misses failed to deter him.

Every time he fell short, he vowed to try again the next year. Now, for the first time in decades, he is wondering if his hard

hope for improvement, there is no point doing it again. I really did work very hard every day," he said tiredly.

"It's hard to say whether I will keep on preparing for the gao-kao next year," he admitted.

"Proper training and enforcement of safety procedures could have prevented this tragedy," an OSHA official said.

Piedmont is a subsidiary of carrier American Airlines.
