Muharram Observed With Reverence Across India

New Delhi: Muslims took out "tazia" processions, flagellated themselves and offered special prayers as they observed Muharram - the martyrdom of Imam Hussain - on Saturday. At least eight people were killed due to electrocution and more than 80 injured in Jharkhand, Gujarat and Uttar Pradesh as "tazias" came in contact with high-tension wires.

There were also a few incidents of violence during Muharram processions in places such as Delhi and Varanasi in Uttar Pradesh.

On Ashura, the 10th day of Muharram, Muslims commemorate the martyrdom of Imam Hussain Ali, a grandson of the Prophet Muhammad, in the battle of Karbala in 680 AD with mourning rituals.

Dressed in black and chanting in unison, Shias parade through streets beating their chests and chanting, while some emulate the suffering of Hussain by flagellating themselves with chains, ropes, etc. Sunni observe fast and offer prayers. "Tazia" is a miniature replica of the tomb of Imam Hussain.

Elaborate security arrangements were made in states for peaceful processions.

In Delhi, a section of people taking out Muharram processions clashed with police and pelted stones at them, injuring around 10 cops and damaging several vehicles, after they were stopped from changing the More on P6

On August 5, 2019, the Centre stripped the erstwhile state of Jammu and Kashmir of its special status under Article 370 of the Constitution and divided it into two union territories.

Melting Ladakh Glacier Could Form 3 Glacial Lakes: Study

New Delhi: Accelerated melting of the Himalayan Parkachik Glacier in Ladakh could give rise to three glacial lakes with an average depth ranging between 34 and 84 metres, scientists have found.

These lakes could be a potential source of glacial lake outburst floods in the Himalayas, the scientists from the Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology, Dehradun, said.

Parkachik Glacier is one of the largest glacier in the Suru River valley, which is a part of the Southern Zanskar Ranges, western Himalaya. The Zanskar Range, part of the Himalayas, lies

in the union territory of Ladakh. The glacier's yearly melting rate was 6 times faster between 1999 and 2021 (22 years) than that calculated from 1971 to 1999 (28 years), the scientists found using satellite data to determine its glacial retreat from 1971-2021. How Burgers And Chips For Lunch Can Worsen Your Asthma That Afternoon

ertain foods or dietary patterns are linked with better control of your asthma. Others may make it worse. Depending on what you've eaten, you can see the effects in hours.

Food can affect how well your lungs function, how often you have asthma attacks and how well your puffer works.

Here's what we know about which foods to eat more of, and which are best to eat in smaller amounts, if you have

Asthma and inflammation

About one in ten Australians (2.7 million people) have asthma. This makes it the fourth most common chronic (persisting) disease in Australia.

Asthma is an inflammatory disease. When someone is exposed to certain triggers (such as respiratory viruses, dust or exercise), the airways leading to the lungs become inflamed and narrow. This makes it difficult for them to breathe during what's commonly known as an asthma attack (or exacerbation).

Researchers are becoming increasingly aware of how someone's diet can affect their asthma symptoms, including how often they have one of these attacks.

Thumbs up for fruit and veg

The Mediterranean diet – a diet high in fruit, vegetables and oily fish – is linked with less wheezing in children, whether or not they have been diagnosed with asthma. Some, but not all, of the studies found this was regardless of the children's bodymass index (BMI) or socioeconomic status.

Eating a diet high in fruits and vegetables is also important for adults with asthma. Two studies found adults who were instructed to eat a diet with few fruits and vegetables (two or fewer servings of vegetables, and one serving of fruit daily) had worse lung function and were twice as likely to have an asthma attack compared to those eating a diet high in fruits and vegetables.

Why might the Mediterranean diet, or one rich in fruit and vegetables, help?

Researchers think it's because people are eating more antioxidants and soluble fibre, both of which have anti-inflammato-

ry action: antioxidants neutralise free radicals. These are the damaging molecules produced as a result of inflammation, which can ultimately cause more inflammation soluble fibre is fermented by gut bacteria to produce short-chain fatty acids such as acetate, propionate and butyrate, which reduce inflammation.

The Mediterranean diet is also high in omega-3 fatty acids (from oily fish, such as salmon, mackerel and tuna). However a review looked at five studies that investigated omega-3 intake (through the diet or with a supplement) in adults with asthma. None of the studies showed any benefit associated with omega-3 for asthma.

Of course there is no harm in eating foods high in omega-3 - such as oily fish, flaxseeds, chia seeds and walnuts. This has numerous other benefits, such as lowering the risk of heart disease.

Thumbs down for saturated fat, sugar, red meat

Saturated fats are found in highly processed foods such as biscuits, sausages, pastries and chocolate, and in fast foods.

Diets high in saturated fats, plus sugar and red meat, can worsen someone's asthma symptoms.

For instance, one study found a diet high in these foods increased the number

of asthma attacks in adults. Foods high in saturated fat can have an

impact in as little as four hours. One study looked at what happened when adults with asthma ate a meal high in saturated fat (consisting of two hash browns, a sausage and egg muffin, and a sausage muffin) compared with a meal with similar calories but low in saturated fat.

People who ate the meal high in saturated fat had reduced lung function within four hours. Within four hours, their puffer was also less effective.

These worsening symptoms were likedriven by an increase in inflammation. Around the four hour mark, researchers found an increase in the number of the immune cells known as neutrophils, which play a role in inflammation.

It's still OK to eat a sneaky burger or some hot chips occasionally if you have asthma. But knowing that eating too many of these foods can affect your asthma can help you make choices that might improve your quality of life.

School Girl Assaulted. Slaughtered In Langate Village

Police suspect criminal assault, *hunting three perpetrators*

rinagar- In a ghastly incident, a school girl was criminally assaulted by three unknown assailants in the outskirts of Langate on Friday, and then mercilessly slaughtered in a bid. to avoid identification (of the criminals). The enormity of the crime sent waves of shock through the area and thousands of people took to the streets in violent demonstrations.

The victim had, as usual, left her home in Batpora this morning for the 4 km trek to the Uqaab Public School in Langate where she studied in class 8.

It being Friday, school was over at 1:30 p.m., and she and two of her friends headed home through what the villagers call, the Wudar route.

From what could later be pieced together from her friends account, they were suddenly waylaid by three persons who tried to grab the victim.

The two friends fled from the spot terrified and weep ing, and out of fear did not say anything at home about their school-mate. But when pressed by the family of the missing girl, out poured the story that created alarm in the entire neighbourhood. Search parties made up of the victim's family and their

neighbours immediately set out for the track the girls had taken on their way home, and came across one of her shoes. With fears of the worst mounting, the villagers found the

girl's uniform, and shortly after came upon a body hastily hidden beneath clay and bushels of hay.

A villager, Ghulam Muhammad, said that the searchers

were shocked to find that the throat of the victim had been slit, and her uniform, school bag, shoes and other belongings had been dumped some distance away from the "grave." The Handwara police were informed about the gruesome

incident, and top officers of the force tried to take custody of the body. But by then the news had reached the village, and a large numbered men and women came out in grief and headed towards the scene of the crime. The huge procession demanded the immediate arrest of the killers. The Handwara police said that an autopsy would be carried

out to find out the motive behind the killing. The police fears that the victim might have been criminally assaulted before being murdered because the body bore marks of violence, and was without any clothes when discovered.

The police said that a liquor bottle and a tumbler were

found near the body.

ficial apathy" The local residents alleged that authorities including J&K Lake Conservation and Management Authority are "doing nothing" and their continuous inaction in not unclogging drainage and blocked nallah has turned the area into "a living hell" for residents.

"The situation is extremely unpleasant or causes great suffering to us. The dirty water enters compounds of houses and with every bout of rain, the level raises and we have to wade through ankle-height water," the locals of Lane No 5, Umer Colony A, Lal

Bazar Srinagar, said. The drainage and nallah, they said, pass from the backside of their houses and due to the blockage

of drain and nallah, the grimy water enters residential houses. "We have been repeatedly requesting and pleading with authorities to come to our rescue but they pay no heed," they said, adding, "The illegal earth filling done around by some influential people has also affected the natural drainage system and it has in turn terribly affected our peaceful living," they said. The foul smell emanating from the water, they said, is "nauseating."

India's New Research Push

A university-centred model of enhancing research capabilities is as needed as an institutional redesign at the central government level—probably more so

he announcement of plans for a new National Research Foundation (NRF), meant to replace the Science and Engineering Research Board (SERB) that was created in 2008, has generated excitement and debate. The NRF proposal has its origins in a 2019 report requested by the Prime Minister regarding India's lagging performance in research spending, quality of research papers, patents, and university-based research.

Innovation is the driver of long-run growth, and the world is at a critical juncture in terms of adapting to climate change, so greater focus on research certainly makes sense. But what has to be done to make a real difference in India's innovation performance? Before one evaluates the institutional aspects of the plan, what do the numbers tell us?

India's GDP is \$3.75 trillion. Its Research and Development (R&D) spending is 0.65% of that, or about \$25 billion. The NRF plan envisages spending \$6 billion over five years, or \$1.2 billion a year. This is only a 5% increase in the R&D total, although the latter includes spending that is broader than the more basic research that the NRF will presumably fund. The net increase may be smaller, however, to the extent that the SERB already allocates money for research. The SERB is under the Department of Science and Technology (DST), itself part of the ministry of science and technology. That ministry has a budget of about \$1.8 billion, with less than half going to the DST. In addition, the NRF proposal envisages 70% of the funds coming from the private sector, implying the government will contribute only \$0.4 billion per year. If the SERB is spending anything



close to that amount out of the DST budget of about \$0.75 billion, then the net increase in government spending on research may be very small under this plan. Note that the Indian government spends about \$550 billion, so the planned increase in research spending is not even a significant percentage of government spending.

These numbers suggest that one should not get too excited about the NRF. It may not have a funding commitment at a level that will really make a difference. This is completely aside from the concerns that have been expressed. One is whether the corporate money will be forthcoming. Another is with respect to political interference. A third concern is whether a centralised bureaucracy can allocate research funds efficiently and effectively. All of these are legitimate points that need to be examined and addressed. To the extent that the SERB and

DST are already subject to the second and third of these concerns, the new institutions may be no worse, if no better.

Suppose that the corporate money does come in. The NRF budget will be about one-seventh of that of the US National Science Foundation (NSF), supposedly the model for the NRF. That ratio is about the same as that of India's GDP to US GDP. But the US government spends much more than what goes through the NSF. The National Institutes of Health, and the departments (equivalent to ministries in India) of defense and energy have large and active research programs. The key point, however, is that US universities are awash with global talent, and have sophisticated organisations to manage funding from government and private sources. Indeed, in the US, private money does not need to round trip through the government to end up in university research. Government grants

in the US also involve bureaucracy and even political factors in choices of areas that get funded. But US universities have become research factories. While the NSF was created in 1950, this development in US universities started with the influx of human capital from Europe as Hitler terrorised that continent.

From this perspective, the place to begin building India's research and innovation capabilities is not in any reorganisation of the government's funding

of research. An NRF that is a little more independent than the SERB, and has a little more funding, is not a bad thing. But it makes far more sense to build research capabilities at India's universities. To take one example, the now-famous IITs were founded from 1951 to 1961. The number staved at five until 1995, and at seven until 2008. There are now 23 IITs, but most of the new ones have barely established themselves. Human capital and organisational capital are sorely lacking. Directly bringing in private funding for researchers, research managers, and labs and equipment, and letting individual institutions develop would be more efficient and effective than the NRF plan for private money.

If there are concerns about whether the money would be used well, foreign partners can be brought in, just as they were for the original IITs. Even the original five IITs can be incentivised to partner with newer ones and help to grow them. Combining cooperation and competition is not easy, but it can be done, and research consortia among universities are becoming more and more common, as research becomes more complex.

A university-centred model of enhancing research capabilities is at least as needed as an institutional redesign at the central government level, and probably more so. Indeed, the two ideas can be combined, so that private money goes directly to universities, perhaps incentivised through government matching, rather than forcing it to a round trip through a central bureaucracy.

Endless Winter Or Second Spring: Embracing The Season Of Menopause

The female design is encoded for change. Life cycles and menstrual cycles form concentric circles that orient us to nature around us, as well as the shifting seasons within us. The sun, our universal clock, awakens us with its rising and settles us with its setting. This daily orbit is known as the circadian rhythm. However, from menarche or the first period, a second clock attunes us to our menstrual cycles, which by no accident, are influenced by the phases of the moon. This monthly revolution is known as our infradian rhythm.

Over decades, our menstrual clock unwinds and our hormones shift to no longer ebb and flow as they did in our menstruating years. Estrogen levels drop and ovulation hopscotches to a new beat until our monthly bleed becomes irregular and then naturally ceases. Once we complete an entire year without menstruation, we reach what is called menopause, and for some this new season can be disorienting.

Menopause occurs when the ovaries no longer produce estrogen and ovulate. Without ovulation, progesterone is no longer produced in significant quantities, which makes conception impossible. Naturally, this tends to occur between the ages of 45 and 55. [Postmenopausal Hormone Levels | Menopause Now] However, surgery, illness, medical treatments, and intense stress can cause premature menopause prior to 40 years old. Additionally, family history, lifestyle habits, toxin exposure, genetics, and autoimmune conditions can contribute to ovarian insufficiency, meaning that the ovaries no longer make adequate amounts of estrogen. [Early Menopause in 20s: Symptoms, Causes, Concerns, & More (healthline.com)]

Closing the chapter on our fertile years shifts hormonal production from our ovaries to our adrenal glands which are also responsible for our stress response. For these reasons, accumulated stressors, whether adrenal, dietary, emotional, etc., can contribute to a more challenging experience of menopause, alongside micronutrient deficiencies. According to Alisa Vitti, author of In the Flo, "Your symptoms are always in direct proportion to your degree of micronutrient depletion and lack of self care."

For Menopause Coach [www. menopausetalk.org.uk], Aamilah Begum, menopause came on suddenly following a hysterectomy. After decades of painful periods, dismissive doctors, and persistent advocacy, she was finally able to confirm her long-held belief- she suffered from endometriosis. For years, Aamilah was expected to simply tolerate her heavy, painful periods and referred for psychological counsel instead of further investigation when her symptoms became unmanageable. When Aamilah pursued consultation with an out-of-town specialist, he confirmed what she had known all along and helped her explore treatment options.

When presented with the suggestion of removing her uterus, Aamilah thought it made sense as she had no intention of having children and was already over 40. She prayed istikharah and proceeded, but was blindsided by the sudden onset of menopause. Her moods became erratic and her relationships suffered. She felt like an entirely other person, even in her worship. An unfor-

gettable low for her was staring at the blessed Ka'bah during Umrah and feeling absolutely no connection to Allah.

Aamilah's quality of life started to return when she began hormone replacement therapy (HRT). She began feeling like herself again and found purpose in gathering women to discuss and understand the menopause journey. As for her spiritual life, her teacher and mentor Ustadha Iffet Rafeeq [About Us (thebluelantern.co.uk)] helped her feel a sense of connection to her womb space, even in spite of its physical removal. She felt affirmed that she still held the gift of womanhood within her, regardless of her ability to bear children.

Writer, Abda Khan [abdakhan | Twitter, Instagram, Facebook | Linktree], describes menopause as the "shifting of tectonic plates". Feeling like the very ground beneath her was unsteady, she noticed her life and the lives of her peers quaking in significant ways.

Divorce, new homes, and adult children leaving the nest added layers of complexity to the internal changes she noticed. As estrogen, our key bonding hormone, decreases, the tendency to forfeit self for family intactness also loosens its grip and ignored conflicts tend to surface.

For Abda, the overlap of menopause and divorce was especially challenging, as she did not have the support of her spouse to anchor and comfort her in this rite of passage. Through her own written expression and lifestyle habits that center her personal wellness, Abda feels no need for hormone replacement therapy to compensate for hormonal changes. Her shift to vegetarianism significantly reduced nuisance

symptoms like hot flashes and night sweats. Abda feels affirmed that menopause is, in fact, her second spring, opening possibilities of new

growth, wisdom and experiences. For Naimah Abdullah, triathlete and entrepreneur, menopause is her initiation into queendom. She is guarding her energy and protecting her health by remaining fit, cutting sugar from her diet, and prioritizing boundaries that protect her mental health and her availability to her adult children. Naimah recently completed an entire month of fasting in Ramadan for the first time without the interruption of menstruation, pregnancy or breastfeeding. In this season of her life, she feels Allah drawing her in closer. She enjoys the consistency of daily prayers without "a break" and is experiencing a new intimacy in worship that was harder to attain while tending to the demands of childrearing and family.

In a recent Instagram live [Angelica Lindsey-Ali (@villageauntie) | Instagram], Angelica Lindsey-Ali, also known as the Village Auntie, gives voice to the fine line between menstrual health and mental health. After a sleepless night fraught by panic, she was reminded that perimenopause, the phase of life leading up to menopause, can bring on challenging emotions and symptoms that are not spoken about. Angelica referenced recent studies that report how anxiety and depression often go unnoticed in Black women because they may present as overwhelm and irritability. She reminds women to check in with their medical providers about mental health challenges as they may intersect hormonal changes.

While polling middle-aged women at The New Pause, a meno-

pause symposium held in March 2023, menopause advocate, Tamsen Fadal, shared reels of attendees reporting surprising menopausal symptoms like brain fog, hair loss, itchy ears, dry skin, burning tongue sensations, 'frozen shoulder', etc. They also shared tips for coping with menopause like exercise, tending to neglected areas of your life, managing stress, naps, and self-care.

self-care.

The same participants polled also reported not being prepared for menopause by their mothers, which sadly mirrors menstruating ending much like it begins for many unexpecting girls—being left to figure things out on our own, alongside neers.

The medical doctors present also reported to Tamsen that they received no significant education about menopause in medical school, but had to learn through self-study and experience that cardiovascular, gastrointestinal, joint, sexual function and sleep challenges can also be connected to menopause. Their honest responses might explain why women like Aamilah were poorly prepared and inadequately supported when seeking medical support.

ing medical support. Like a second puberty, transitioning towards and through menopause can feel clumsy and uncomfortable as our bodies adjust to a significant reorientation. In societies where women are only praised in their youth and valued for their fertility, aging women might feel forgotten or discarded. However, menonause can also be seen as a gift that brings neglected areas of our life to the surface and gives women the hormonal footing to be fearless in their truth-telling, no longer yielding to the sensitivities attributed to the bonding hormone of estrogen.

To ease the transition, holistic hormonal experts Dr. Christian Northup and Alisa Vitti, recommend the following practices to support endocrine health while transitioning through the portal of menopause. [How to Prepare for Menopause in Your 30s and 40s – First For Women]

Limit Sugar and Stress: All reproductive hormones are significantly impacted by our cortisol and blood sugar levels. When both are high, estrogen tends to dominate in proportion to progesterone which tends to worsen menopausal symptoms.

Eat more fiber and omega- 3's: Adequate dietary fiber supports daily bowel elimination which can help our body reduce levels of excess estrogen in the body. The anti-inflammatory effects of omega-3 fats can help soothe hormonal disruption and safeguard against early menopause. Important note — the longer we ovulate, the lower our likelihood of inflammatory diseases, cardiovascular conditions, and cancer later in life.

Get more sleep: In spite of the popular obsession to biohack, doing more with our time and functioning with minimal rest, sleep is still the best known way to digest stress hormones. If getting more sleep is a challenge, we can protect the quality of sleep that we do get by sleeping in a dark, cool room, limiting screen use within two hours of going to bed, and having a consistent bedtime routine.

Exercise responsibly: Metabolic changes during menopause can make weight gain easy and weight loss stubbornly slow. The temptation to work out harder and longer might arise while watching the scale. However, intensive and long workouts can raise our cortisol levels and turn on fat storage in the body. Instead, focus on functional fitness that prioritizes muscular and skeletal strength, flexibility, and use, with special attention to the muscles around the hips. Weight lifting strengthens bones which can safeguard against osteoporosis later in life.

Focus on micronutrients: Longterm use of hormonal birth control, chronic stress, and consuming packaged foods can contribute to micronutrient depletion over time. Paying special attention to Bvitamins, magnesium, probiotics, antioxidants, and trace minerals in the diet are helpful ways to restore key nutrients needed for hormone production.

Meditate: Relaxation practices are known for easing physical and psychological discomfort, including the reduction of hot flashes, anxiety, etc. Dr. Northrup describes perimenopause as when "all the unfinished business of the first half of your life comes up." Therefore, being able to sit with and take stock of where you are enables more presence and awareness to do the course-correction needed and proceed further in the direction you want to go.

Menopause might be presented as a death or ending of our fertility, but this season can also usher us into our wise woman years. By fully embodying the creative power that we have practiced through decades of cycling, birthing, and bringing projects and ideas to fruition, we can stand in our truth, enabling us to become the aunties and elders that our communities need.

It's A Miracle, Say Family Of Japanese Soldier Killed In WWII, As Flag He Carried Returns From US

Tokyo: Toshihiro Mutsuda was only five years old when he last saw his father, who was drafted by Japan's Imperial Army in 1943 and killed in action. For him, his father was a bespectacled man in an old family photo standing by a signed good-luck flag that he carried to war.

On Saturday, when the flag was returned to him from a US war museum where it had been on display for 29 years, Mutsuda, now 83, said: "It's a miracle."

The flag, known as "Yosegaki Hinomaru," or Good Luck Flag, carries the soldier's name, Shigeyoshi Mutsuda, and the signatures of his relatives, friends and neighbours wishing him luck.

It was given to him before he was drafted by the Army. His family was later told he died in Saipan, but his remains were never returned.

The flag was donated in 1994 and displayed at the museum aboard the USS Lexington, a WWII aircraft carrier, in Corpus Christi, Texas. Its meaning was not known until it was identified by the family earlier this year, said museum director Steve Banta, who

brought the flag to Tokyo.

Banta said he learned the story behind the flag earlier this year when he was contacted by the Obon Society, a nonprofit organisation that has returned about 500 similar flags as non-biological remains, to the descendants of Japanese servicemembers killed in the

The search for the flag's original owner started in April when a museum visitor took a photo and asked an expert about the description that it had belonged to a "kamikaze" suicide pilot.

When Shigeyoshi Mutsuda's grandson saw the photo, he



sought help from the Obon Society, group co-founder Keiko Ziak said.

"When we learned all of this, and that the family would like to have the flag, we knew immediately that the flag did not belong to us," Banta said at the handover ceremony.

"We knew that the right thing to do would be to send the flag home, to be in Japan and to the family."

The soldier's eldest son, Toshihiro Mutsuda, was speechless for a few seconds when Banta, wearing white gloves, gently placed the neatly folded flag into his hands. Two of his younger siblings, both in their 80s, stood by and looked on silently. The three children, all wearing cotton gloves so they wouldn't damage the decades-old flag, carefully unfolded it to show to the audience.

"After receiving the flag to-day, I earnestly felt that the war like that should never be fought again and that I do not wish anyone else to go through this sadness (of separation)," Toshihiro Mutsuda said.

The soldier's daughter, Misako Matsukuchi, touched the flag with both hands and prayed. "After nearly 80 years, the spirit of our father returned to us. I hope he can finally rest in peace," Matsukuchi said

Toshihiro Mutsuda said his memory of his father was foggy. However, he clearly remembers his mother, Masae Mutsuda, who died five years ago at age 102, used to make the long-distance bus trip almost every year from the farming town in Gifu, central Japan, to Tokyo's Yasukuni Shrine, where the 2.5 million war dead are enshrined, to pay tribute to her husband's spirit.

The shrine is controversial, as it includes convicted war criminals among those commemorated. Victims of Japanese aggression during the first half of the 20th century, especially China and the Koreas, see Yasukuni as a symbol of Japanese militarism.

However, for the Mutsuda family, it's a place to remember the loss of a father and husband.

"It's like an old love story across the ages coming together ... It doesn't matter where,' Banta said, referring to the Yasukuni controversy. "The important thing is this flag goes to the family."

Toshihiro That's why Mutsuda and his siblings chose to receive the flag at Yasukuni and brought the framed photos of their parents.

Amit Shah hails Abdul Kalam, says nation advancing in space tech under PM Modi's leadership

Rameswaram (TN): Under Minister Narendra Modi's leadership the nation is making giant strides in space technology, a vision nurtured by iconic scientist and late President APJ Abdul Kalam, Union Home Minister Amit Shah said here on Saturday.

Kalam's name would be written in golden letters for giving DRDO (Defence Research and Development Organisation) and ISRO (Indian Space Research Organisation) a new direction.

Shah said, "Under PM Modi's leadership opportunities in space science for our students, youth and their startups are open. APJ Abdul Kalam's dream of achievements in space science will be accomplished by PM Modi's innovations and new initiatives. And I believe that India will lead the entire world

in the field of space science."
Following the late former
President's footsteps, under PM Modi's leadership, the nation launched 55 spacecraft missions, 50 launch vehicle missions and 11 student satellites, Shah noted. A record 104 satellites were

(PSLV-C37, Polar launched Satellite Launch Vehicle) in a single flight and the re-entry (to earth's atmosphere) experiment of a satellite was also successfully

completed, he outlined.

"I believe India will certainly fulfil Dr Kalam's dreams and India will certainly lead in the sector of space."

Amit Shah addressed a rally here on Friday and flagged off the state-wide padayatra 'En Mann En Makkal' (My Land, My People) of his party's state unit president K Annamalai. Rameswaram is the home town of the former President Abdul Kalam (1931-2015).

The Home Minister said Kalam, who attained many achievements for India in the field of rockets and space, placed his vision for the nation in the public arena. In the book, "India 2020 Vision For the New Millennium," Kalam presented the roadmap for India's development.

Shah said he had read the book's translation in which three aspects had been underscored by the former president.

The first was identifying India's strengths and developing the nation according to it and the second was on developing a technology-based economy. The third point was adopting a balanced growth by developing both cities and villages and also agriculture and

"In 2023, when we look back now, under the leadership of PM Modi we have fulfilled all the three conditions and India is heading towards becoming a developed nation."

Tracing the life and times of the former President, Shah said Kalam, who began his life as a 'paper boy' delivering newspapers later himself made headlines through his work for the nation and eventually assumed the high office of the President of India.

Kalam demonstrated probity in public life by his action, and that explains people remembering him as 'people's president'.

Devsar Kulgam. Reports of Zuljana procession were taken out in Yousufabad, Magam, Iskinderpora Beerwah and Sonpah areas in central Budgam district.

All government and semi government offices, banks, educational institutions, shops and business establishments remained closed in Kashmir including the summer capital Srinagar while a nominal movement of private and public transport was witnessed on the roads.

Authorities had made elaborate security arrangements in Srinagar with additional deployment of police and paramilitary forces on roads to ensure the day passes off peacefully.

Officials said that the situation remained peaceful with no untoward incident reported from anywhere in the valley.

In Lucknow, several Muharram processions were taken out by mourners, especially in the old city area.

In Varanasi, a clash broke out between members of Shia and Sunni communities and stone pelting during a Muharram procession, a police

The official said some people were injured in the incident, but added the exact number was not immediately available.

In Jharkhand, four people were killed and 10 others injured after a tazia came in contact with a high-tension wire while preparing for a Muharram procession in Bokaro district.

The incident occurred at Khetko village, around 80 km from the state capital Ranchi.

All the injured people were taken to a nearby hospital. Thereafter, they were referred to the Bokaro General Hospital where four succumbed to their injuries

The deceased were identified as Sajid Ansari (18), Ashif Raza (21), Ghulam Hussain (19) and Enamul Rab (34).

Jharkhand Chief Minister Hemant Soren expressed grief over the death of four people.

Elaborate security arrangements have been made in Ranchi and other parts of Jharkhand on Saturday to avoid any untoward incident during Muharram processions, police said.

In Gujarat, two persons died due to electrocution and 22 were injured during a Muharram procession in Raikot district.

The incident took place in Rasul Para area of Dhoraji town as a "tazia" came in contact with a 22 KV overhead electricity wire. The deceased were identified as Junaid Majothi (22) and Sajid

CS For Universal Screening Of UT Population For NCD

Also Asks For Participation Of All Health Facilities Of The UT Under Kavakalp

SRINAGAR: Chief Secretary, Dr Arun Kumar Mehta, while chairing a review meeting of the performance of National Health Mission (NHM) on Saturday asked the health professionals to screen the entire population of the UT for Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD) like Hypertension, Diabetes and common types of cancers.

Besides the Secretary, Health, the meeting was attended by the Principals of GMCs, Director Health Jammu/Kashmir and other officers of the concerned Departments.

The Chief Secretary maintained that the NCD are major cause of deaths across the globe, and their early diagnosis could lead to better prevention and cure of such diseases. He asked for organizing camps all across J&K for conducting free screening of people.

Dr Mehta also observed that that there is still scope for improvement in institutional births despite it being ahead of national average. He also emphasised on further improving the ranking of the UT in SDG goals related to health.

The Chief Secretary asked the department to digitize all the health records of the patients so that it is accessible to them from anywhere by using their ABHA numbers. He also advised them to allow them to add their previous records to it for saving the same for future.

Dr Mehta enquired from the officers about the defunct machinery and poorly managed infrastructure in the hospitals of the UT. He made out that the Department should make a plan to repair all of such machines and upgrading the infrastructure to put it to optimal use for the benefit of general

He asked for instituting mechanism for screening all school going children of J&K by the Department. He directed them to visit the faroff schools and Anganwadi Centres for the purpose. He directed the concerned to extend every support to children requiring any kind of medical assistance and popularize the same so that people come forward readily to screen their children at their early age.

Dr Mehta also stressed on assessing all the health facilities of the UT right from the Sub-Centres on a set of parameters. He told them to repeat the exercise periodically and put the results in public domain so that people are able to see for themselves about the status of these health facilities besides giving them opportunity to make improvements.

Over 2,000 Pilgrims Leaves Jammu For Amarnath Cave

JAMMU: A fresh batch of more than 2,000 pilgrims left Jammu city in a convoy of 87 vehicles early Saturday morning for the two base camps in Kashmir to undertake the annual Amarnath pilgrimage, officials said.

This was the lowest-strength batch of Lord Shiva devotees leaving the Bhagwati Nagar base camp in Jammu since the first batch flagged off by Lt Governor Manoj Sinha on June 30.

The 62-day-long yatra had started from the twin base camps of Pahalgam in Anantnag district and Baltal in Ganderbal district the next day.

About 3.78 lakh pilgrims have so far paid their visit to the cave shrine located at the height of 3,880 metres in south Kashmir Himalayas, and which ensconces the naturally



formed ice-shivling which has now melted completely the main reason for the present trend of declining pilgrim footfall, the officials said.

They said around 7,000 pilgrims are still visiting the cave shrine almost every day to offer their prayers.

Officials said the 27th batch comprising a total of 2,050 pilgrims 357 women, 12 children, 54 Sadhus and nine Sadhvis left the Bhagwati Nagar base camp for the valley in a convoy, escorted by security personnel, between 3.30 am and 3.45 am.

While 1,442 pilgrims are heading for the traditional 48-km Pahalgam track, 608 yatris are performing the yatra through the 14-km Baltal route, the officials said.

Apni Party Holds Protest To Press For Reservation For Sikhs In J&K Assembly

JAMMU: Activists of Apni Party on Saturday held a peaceful protest demonstration here, seeking reservation of two legislative assembly seats for the Sikh community in Jammu and

Apni Party provincial president (women wing) Pavneet Kaur led a protest as the central government on July 26 introduced a bill in the Lok Sabha proposing nomination of two members from Kashmiri migrant community and a Pakistan-occupied J&K refugees to the legislative assembly in the

Union Territory. "The community has remained neglected in terms of their political representation in governments and the legislative assembly while priority was given to other communities," Kour said.

She said the Sikhs form a large chunk of population who have contributed to the society as well as J&K and the nation "incomparably in defence, police, administration, social works, and education system but the community was not given preference by the governments".

District president Rural-B Harpreet Singh expressed concern over "discriminatory approach" towards the Sikh community and also demanded reorganization of Punjabi language as one of the official lan-

guages in the Union Territory. The Punjabi speaking people's work, and their heritage must be recognized by the government, he said, adding "we are not against anyone being given anything, but Sikhs should be given political reservation. Thus, two Legislative Assembly seats must be reserved for them.

Welcoming the bill to nominate two members, including a woman, from Kashmiri migrants and one from the displaced persons of PoJK, J&K BJP Minority Morcha president Ranjodh Singh Nalwa demanded nomination of Sikhs too to the assembly.

"The Sikh community has from time to time raised from different platforms the demand of nomination of a community member to the legislative assembly," he said.

Woman Jumps Into River In Doda, Accuses In-Laws **Of Harassment**

JAMMU: A woman was feared drowned after she jumped into the Chenab river in Jammu and Kashmir's Doda district, shortly after posting a video on her social media account claiming harassment by her husband and in-laws.

Anju Devi, a resident of Gundana village, reportedly jumped into the river near Pul Doda around 10 am, officials said.

Later, a 6.28-minute video of the woman went viral on the social media, claiming that she was committing suicide due to the alleged harassment by her husband, his brother and sister-in-law.

"I am heartbroken after both mv children, one studying in class 9 and another in class 6, were enticed. They were living with me for the past three years and I was raising them by working as domestic help I was left with no reason to live," the wailing woman said.

She accused her husband of

beating, confining her in bathroom and claimed that she was being subjected to constant harassment by his sister-in-law and her husband.

"They are responsible for my death," Devi said and demanded that her children be raised well.

Doda Senior Superintendent of Police Abdul Qayoom said the handbag of the woman was recovered from the scene where she had jumped into the river.

"The woman is feared drowned and our first priority is to recover her body," he said when asked about the viral video. However, the SSP said police have taken cognizance of the video and initiated an investigation.

T20 WC 2024: ICC Marks June 4-30 Window

NEW DELHI: The International Cricket Council (ICC) has tentatively identified the June 4-30 window for the T20 World Cup 2024 to be jointly hosted by the West Indies and the USA, and it has started inspecting the venues at the latter nation. There were speculations about USA's readiness to host the big-ticket event but the ICC team this week visited the venues marked to host the matches, quashing such doubts.

The inspection team checked on stadiums at Lauderhill, Florida, New York, Dallas and Morrisville.

Among them, Lauderhill has already hosted international matches and will play host to fourth and fifth T20Is between India and the West Indies on August 12 and 13.

The venues at Dallas (Grand Prairie Stadium) and Morrisville (Church Street Park) are currently hosting the



Major League Cricket matches.

However, those two grounds and the Van Cortlandt Park in New York are yet to receive international venue status from the ICC, mandatory to stage top-flight cricket matches.

The venue at New York, which has a capacity of nearly 35000, has been earmarked as the host to the highly-anticipated match between India and Pakistan. The reason being considerable presence of the people from the

diaspora in that region.

However, it has not been finalised as yet because the stadium is still getting readied.

But the ICC felt that it can be worked around with at the earliest.

"The ICC has support from New York City Hall and the Mayor. So, we expect the work to be completed on time. Everything is on course as most of India's matches will be played in the US," an ICC board member told PTI.

The T20 World Cup 2024 will see 20 teams participating in it.

The ICC is very keen to have USA as the co-host of the T20 World Cup because the global governing body feels that it will increase cricket's chance to be included in the Los Angeles Olympics 2028.

The ICC has already made a presentation to the Los Angeles organising committee and the International Olympic Committee (IOA) will take a call on this later this year.

Ashes 5th Test: England Lead Australia

LONDON: Half-centuries from Zak Crawley and Joe Root and an overall quick batting effort by England helped the hosts increase their lead to over 250 runs at the end of the second session during day three of the fifth and final Ashes Test against Austra-

lia at The Oval on Saturday. England ended session two at 265/4, with Root (61*) and Bairstow (34*) unbeaten. They lead by 253 runs.

England started the second session at 130/1, with Zak Crawley (71*) and skipper Ben Stokes (12*) unbeaten. Skipper Pat Cummins struck early for Australia, dismissing Crawley for a well-made 73 off 76 balls, consisting of nine fours. England was 140/2 after a 78-run partnership between Stokes and Crawley was over.
