Partly Overcast Weather In J&K Till Oct 29 Majid Nabi

Srinagar: Weather is likely to remain dry until October 29 and to stay fair to partly over-cast with the possibility of minor precipitation in fewer spots during the next few hours, the Meteorological Department said on Tuesday.

There is no major rain or dry spell forecast for the valley until November 3, Deputy Director Meteorological Department, Mukhtar Ahmad said.

Although the weather is expected to remain dry till November 3, the MeT official however said that a Western Disturbance may occur around October 29.

The Deputy Director MeT informed Kashmir Observer that there is no significant forecast for Kashmir till 3 November and that weather is expected to be fair to partly overcast with the probability of small precipitation at fewer spots including Kupwara and Baramulla districts of north Kashmir.

"As of now, there is no significant rain or snowfall predicted for the plains of Kashmir; instead, the weather is expected to be dry till October 29. According to reports, in the first quarter of this year, handicrafts worth Rs 208.21 crore have been exported from Jammu and Kashmir to the rest of the world.

The said amount constitutes 55 per cent of the exports recorded during April- September last year.

Official figures reveal that

handcrafts worth Rs 375.97 make two quarters. Noteworthy, have been exported last year, handicrafts exports Kashmir during Aprilfrom Jammu and Kashmir September 2022, which almost touched Rs. 1116.37 crore mark.

During the first quarter this year, the largest growth has been seen in carpet exports. In Quarter 1, carpets valued at Rs 88.92 crore were exported. Rumals and Shawls totaling Rs 79.95 crore were exported during the first quarter.

In Quarter 1, chain stitch exports totaled Rs 32.85 crore. During that time, Papier Machie products were exported for Rs 2.23 crore. Exports of woodcarving and other items totalling Rs 2.54 crore were recorded during the first quarter.

Women Consuming Heart-Healthy Diet In Midlife Linked To Lower Cognitive Loss In Later Life

iddle-aged women consuming heart-healthy diets were about 17 per cent less likely to report cognitive decline decades later, researchers have found.

The finding suggests that switching to the DASH diet - Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension - could improve cognitive function in later life for women who make up more than two-thirds of those diagnosed with the most prevalent form of dementia, Alzheimer's disease, said the researchers from New York University's (NYU) Grossman School of Medicine.

The DASH diet includes a high consumption of plant-based foods rich in potassium, calcium, and magnesium and is rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy foods. The diet limits saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium, and sugar-sweetened foods and beverages.

"Subjective complaints about daily cognitive performance are early predictors of more serious neurocognitive disorders such as Alzheimer's,"



said Yu Chen, professor in the Department of Population Health and senior author of the study published in the journal Alzheimer's & Dementia.

"With more than 30 years followup, we found that the stronger the adherence to a DASH diet in midlife, the less likely women are to report cognitive issues much later in life," said Chen.

The researchers analysed the data

of 5,116 women out of the 14,000 enrolled in the NYU Women's Health Study, which examines the role of lifestyle and other factors on the development of cancer and other chronic conditions in women. They were asked about their diets through questionnaires when they enrolled for the study between 1985 and 1991.

Over a follow-up period of more than 30 years, 33 per cent of the

women reported having more than one of the six cognitive complaints, assessed using six validated standard questions indicative of later mild cognitive impairment, which precedes dementia.

The questions pertained to difficulties in remembering recent events or shopping lists, understanding spoken instructions or group conversation, or navigating familiar streets.

The chances of reporting multiple cognitive complaints reduced by 17 per cent in women consuming diets similar to the DASH diet, the researchers analysed.

"Our data suggest that it is important to start a healthy diet in midlife to prevent cognitive impairment in older age," said Yixiao Song, a lead author of the study.

"Following the DASH diet may not only prevent high blood pressure, but also cognitive issues," said Fen Wu, a senior associate research scientist who co-led the study.

Previous research has shown that high blood pressure, particularly in midlife, is a risk factor for cognitive decline and dementia.



Riding E-Bikes May Help Adults Manage Diabetes, Says Study IANS

The study, published in the journal Frontiers, said that engaging in e-cycling was perceived as an easier way of managing diabetes than diet or other types of exercise, largely due to the enjoyment of riding.

"Physical activity (PA) is a key component in the management of type 2 diabetes. However, this population have low rates of PA engagement. Electrically assisted cycling has been identified as a means to increase PA by incorporating activity into daily life while overcoming some of the barriers to conventional cycling," the study authors said.

According to the study, both men and women believed that riding an e-bike had a favourable influence on a range of health outcomes, including enhanced mental health, increased fitness, and diabetes control-through significant decreases in blood sugar levels.

The capacity to ride a bike comfortably with less physical exertion than a normal bike, as well as the ability to go further, quicker, and on hillier terrain, provided enjoyment. High degrees of satisfaction also tended to increase the sample's e-cycling habit. The majority of participants also claimed that e-bike training improved their perceived competence to ride an e-bike over time.

In addition, the study identified obstacles to e-bike riding, with users most typically identifying physical opportunity limitations, including cycling infrastructure, parking facilities and traffic, time and weather constraints, e-bike specific issues, along with weight and size of the bike and cost, and personal health issues.

Srinagar: 17-year-old Mohammad Anas Bhat was fed up with hearing daily taunts from his parents for not contributing to his family's support. His day would start at noon as he was accustomed to waking up late. The same was true for his childhood friend Mohsin Mir, 18, who wanted to start his own business.

"But the idea for starting a business wasn't there. We explored all the options," Bhat told the Kashmir Observer.

Even though both friends are still studying, they had a strong desire to start a business and stand on their own feet. However, they wanted to create something unique and "solution-oriented.'

On a typical day, Bhat's parents once again told him to fetch at least Kashmiri bread, popularly known as Kander Cxot for the breakfast.

"My father can't stand in the queue at the bakery shop for a long time because of the cold. So I decided to get the bread myself," Bhat said.

This was the time when the idea of delivering Kander Cxot to people's doorsteps came into Bhat's mind. He shared this idea with Mohsin, and both

started working on it, creating a model for the implementation of the idea.

"It was a very challenging idea since we don't come from business families. Also, with no initial investment, the job was challenging," Mir told the Kashmir Observer.

The duo created an Instagram page under the name Kander Cxot: Now at your doorstep" and shared their personal phone numbers for orders. With just eight posts, their Instagram page gained more than four thousand followers in just two weeks.



'Kashmiri' Held With \$71,000 In New Delhi

EW DELHI- Busting the second major currency racket in the capital in a week, the enforcement directorate (ED) has arrested a person and recovered huge quantities of foreign and Indian currencies from his possession.

Escalating Conflict

The ongoing Israeli-Palestinian conflict has reached a critical juncture. Israel's response, primarily targeting Gaza, has been disproportionate, killing over 5000 Palestinians, raising serious concerns about the impact on the civilian population and the potential for further escalation. As history has shown, military responses alone may not lead to a lasting solution, and a different approach is desperately needed to bring the crisis to an end.

But this is not happening. The US recently vetoed a UN resolution calling for a humanitarian pause in the Israel-Hamas war, with the US ambassador saying draft resolution did not do enough to underscore Israel's right to self-defense. True, even if we concede that the October 7 attack on Israel by Hamas necessitated a response, the retaliation has now gone far beyond self defense. Israel has killed four times more Palestinians and leveled entire neighborhoods. It is time that the world steps in and enforces a ceasefire. But that doesn't seem to be the case. Instead Israel is preparing for a ground offensive which will result in more civilian killings. And there is every possibility that the conflict could escalate and involve neighbouring countries, which would not only destabilize the region but the world. Though US has deployed forces to the region to forestall such a possibility, the situation could get out of hand if Israel persists with its offensive and civilian casualties continue to mount.

UN Secretary-General António Guterres has issued a stark warning about the potential for the conflict to spill over into the wider region. Diplomatic efforts are underway to secure the release of Israeli hostages and prevent further escalation. The international community is advocating for restraint and adherence to international law but Israel has so far not heeded any of it. What is more, the US and European Union seem happy to overlook Israel's gross violations of international law.

This is the time that the war is brought to an end. The alternative is grim: a large-scale invasion would result in more casualties, and trigger a humanitarian catastrophe. It could also lead to broader regional conflicts, involving regional players and the major powers.

The urgent need for a humanitarian ceasefire is thus clear. The international community, including the US, UK, EU, China, Russia and Arab states, should unite in supporting this proposal. Failing to do so risks a wider and more devastating conflict that could have far-reaching consequences. That said, it is also time that the international community unites to find a permanent solution to lingering. Israeli-Palestinian conflict. The long-stalled effort to arrive at a two state solution based on 1967 borders needed to be resurrected. Further delay would only continue the ongoing instability and bloodshed.

Scrutinising Skill-Based School Education in J&K

In the last 8 years how many students have benefitted from vocational education in J&K? The Government needs to come up with a clear data

r quite some time now there has been a pedagogical debate about implementing a skill-based approach to learning among school children. Though many are hoping for a definitive universal rule to make this decision for their classrooms, it is simply not that easy. In fact, at the secondary school level, skill based education has been started several years back in India. However, it still remains a challenging task to make the students really skilled.

The Government and the NGOs need to undertake a study to see how many students have benefitted from skilled based courses like National Skills Qualifications Framework -NSQF. This NSQF programme is a nationally integrated education and competency-based framework that enables people to acquire desired competency levels. It organises qualifications according to a series of levels of knowledge, skills and aptitude. These levels, graded from one to ten, are defined in terms of learning outcomes which the learner must possess regardless of whether they were acquired through formal, non-formal or informal learning. It was launched in India in 2013 during UPA-II Govt but the Govt led by PM Modi enhanced budget ary allocation for this programme


In November 2015, the J&K Govt introduced skill based programmes in Govt run schools for the students of class IX to XII. A formal order was issued by Directorate of School Education Kashmir on 13.11.2015 which reads:

"In order to enhance employability of students and equip them with skills commensurate to market requirements it has been decided to introduce vocational education from class IX th onwards under NSQF."

The courses that were started included Information Technology, tourism, automobile repair, healthcare, security, among others. Later, from 2016, many other courses were also introduced and several training partners approved by National Skill Development Corporation -NSDC started providing manpower (educators and trainers) to the J&K Government through the school education department to implement this scheme in government-run schools. In J&K alone, as on date, almost 600 schools have this facility available and every year more and more Govt higher secondary schools are being included in this list.

Why skill-based education important

Skill-based education helps build a strong foundation for students at the school level. It helps build self-esteem, confidence, and leadership skills. It develops problem-solving skills and students understand the benefits of coordination and collaboration.

It builds confidence in them to participate in collaborative ventures.

It helps them take responsibility for their actions and students learn to make their own decisions and understand how their decisions can have repercussions and negative impact as well

Vocational education in J&K

The erstwhile Ministry of Human Resource Development -MHRD now known as Ministry of Education-MoE in September 2011 brought out a revised Centrally Sponsored Scheme for Vocationalisation of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education to integrate employability education into School Education . In 2018, this scheme got further revised and brought under the integrated initiative (Samagra Shiksha) by Ministry of Education -MoE and termed as Vocationalization of School Education (VSE).

The revised norms allow a student to complete training in one Job Role in 9th and 10th standards which is followed by another Job Role in 11th and 12th standards.

As explained above, the scheme is operated within the NSQF (National Skill Qualification Framework), which establishes a system of clear educational nathways from school to higher education while providing certification of vocational skills. The Government of Jammu & Kashmir has been implementing VSE in nearly 600 schools till date, as per approval and funding from the Govt of India. However, now the question arises, whether this vocational or skill-based education has helped students at all? Does the Government have data about the students who underwent training in different trades in 2015,2016 and 2017. What is their status as on date ? If a vast majority of them are still jobless, then that is a matter of serious concern. The School Education Department J&K needs to come up with clear figures on this and a third party should be appointed to monitor the outcomes. It has been about 8 years since skillbased education is being offered in Govt-run schools and we need to have clear figures on the outcomes of this programme.

J&K. These trainers are hired by service providers who are themselves hired by the J&K Govt. This means the vocational trainers are not directly appointed by the Govt and are contract based workers. On the other hand, these trainers are highly qualified who work very hard to give quality skill-based education to students. There has been no enhancement in their monthly salaries since their appointment 4 to 5 years back. The vocational trainers have held several protests in J&K in the past few years. These trainers allege that they are not getting any annual pay increase along with CPF, leave or insurance cover.

Conclusion

Skill-based education gives students ownership of their learning and helps them close the comprehension gap. The evaluation, rather than grades, scores or marks proves their proficiency. Crores of taxpayers' money is being spent on imparting vocational education to students in dozens of Govt schools in the country, especially in J&K. The Samagra Shiksha wing in the Ministry of Education is implementing this programme. There is a separate Mission Directorate of Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan in every state and UT. Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan is an overarching programme for the school education sector extending from pre-school to class 12. The scheme has been prepared with the broader goal of improving school effectiveness measured in terms of equal opportunities for schooling and equitable learning outcomes. The Samagra subsumes the three Schemes of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) and Teacher Education (TE). This programme was launched in 2018 across the country. Lots of questions are being raised against the functioning of J&K Mission Directorate Samagra as the skills based programme in schools isn't taken up effectively. The selection of Vocational Training partners is also being questioned.

Media Double Standards are Dangerous

o why is media coverage of Israel and Palestinians so asymmetrical? The truth is: Palestinians are depicted as less decerting of our sumpathy because they are seen as

deserving of our sympathy because they are seen as less than human. When Politico (and others) quote Israeli ministers saying they are fighting "human animala", mimoring the No.

ing they are fighting "human animals" – mirroring the Nazis' description of Jews as "rats" ahead of the Holocaust or the Hutus' description of Tutsis as "cockroaches" ahead of the genocide in Rwanda – it contributes to a dehumanisation of people that makes them easier to kill (dehumanisation is a stage of genocide)...We must face up to a difficult truth. Many Western media see Palestinian and Syrian lives as less important than Israeli and Ukrainian lives because they are subject to the legacies of colonial, white supremacist thinking.

The racist coverage of the war in Ukraine proves this point.

Western journalists presented European people "with blonde hair and blue eyes" being killed in Ukraine as worse than elsewhere. Ukraine "isn't a place, with all due respect, like Iraq or Afghanistan, that has seen conflict raging for decades," one senior CBS foreign correspondent said live on air. "This is a relatively civilised, relatively European... city, one where you wouldn't expect that, or hope that it's going to happen."

We in the media can do better than that. We owe it to the professional standards we committed to as journalists to stick to verified facts, provide the broader historical perspective that helps our audiences put news into context, avoid amplifying hate speech, and call out all abuses of power, regardless of who the aggressor is.

We have a responsibility to examine the assumptions – conscious or unconscious – that underpin our framing; to recognise how perpetuating dominant narratives upholds inequitable power dynamics; and to realise that the way we frame things has a real impact on people's lives.

When we dehumanise people in a way that makes them less worthy of public sympathy and thus makes violence against them more acceptable, we have blood on our hands.

The New Humanitarian

ashmir's YouTube scene has seen an unprec-edented boom in recent years. From vlogs to music videos, talk shows to tutorials, comedy sketches, dramas; you can find everything on the platform. However, with the rise of this new medium, there is also a darker side that is emerging – the rampant use of clickbait titles and thumbnails.The use of clickbait titles and thumbnails has become a trend in the Kashmir YouTube community. With the increasing number of content creators, it has become a common practice to use exaggerated titles and irrelevant thumbnails to attract views.

However, this trend is causing more harm than good. Clickbait is a term used to describe content that is designed to attract attention and

encourage people to click on a link, often with the use of sensational or misleading headlines, thumbnails, or descriptions. The goal is to create a sense of curiosity or intrigue in the viewer to generate clicks and views Many of these content

creators use this crying emoji '🕪 and provocative thumbnails, which are misleading and have nothing to do with the actual content of the video. These techniques are used to lure viewers, but often the content fails to live up to the expectation, leaving the audi-ence feeling cheated. They also use sad background music and other emotional triggers to lure viewers into watching their videos. Additionally, many of these creators use viral videos from social media platforms and add their own face cam for a few seconds, which does not add any value to the video. They then present it as their own content and use clickbait titles to attract views.

This practice undermines the value of original content and contributes to the spread of misinformation. The consequences of clickbait titles and thumbnails are significant. It

causes good content to be ignored and overshadowed by the fake, provocative ones. The focus of these content creators is to attract views rather than providing quality content, leading to disappointment for the viewers who end up being misled.Furthermore, the clickbait titles and thumbnails can negatively impact the overall perception of the YouTube community in Kashmir.

As a result, the audience may lose interest and trust in the platform, leading to the loss of valuable content creators and viewers. Creators should focus on producing high-quality content that is informative, entertaining, and engaging. Clickbait tactics should be avoided as they are harmful to the community as a whole. Instead, creators should rely on their skills and creativity to attract views and build a loyal audience. In conclusion the use of clickbait

titles and thumbnails on Kashmir YouTube has negative consequences for both the content creators and the audience. 3 Ways AI Is Transforming Music

ach fall, I begin my course ➡ on the intersection of music and artificial intelligence by asking my students if they're concerned about AI's role in composing or producing music.

So far, the question has always elicited a resounding "yes."

Their fears can be summed up in a sentence: AI will create a world where music is plentiful, but musicians get cast aside.

In the upcoming semester, I'm anticipating a discussion about Paul McCartney, who in June 2023 announced that he and a team of audio engineers had used machine learning to uncover a "lost" vocal track of John Lennon by separating the instruments from a demo recording.

But resurrecting the voices of long-dead artists is just the tip of the iceberg in terms of what's possible - and what's already being done.

In an interview, McCartnev admitted that AI represents a "scary" but "exciting" future for music. To me, his mix of consternation and exhilaration is spot on.

Here are three ways AI is changing the way music gets made - each of which could threaten human musicians in various ways:

1. Song composition

Many programs can already generate music with a simple prompt from the user, such as "Electronic Dance with a

Warehouse Groove.'

Fully generative apps train AI models on extensive databases of existing music. This enables them to learn musical structures, harmonies, melodies, rhythms, dynamics, timbres and form, and generate new content that stylistically matches the material in the database. There are many examples of these kinds of apps. But the most successful ones, like Boomy, allow nonmusicians to generate music and then post the AI-generated results on Spotify to earn money. Spotify recently removed many of these Boomy-generated tracks, claiming that this would protect human artists' rights and

royalties. The two companies quickly came to an agreement that allowed Boomy to re-upload the tracks. But the algorithms powering these apps still have a troubling ability to infringe upon existing copyright, which might go unnoticed to most users. After all, basing new music on a data set of existing music is bound to cause noticeable similarities between the music in the data set and the generated content.

Furthermore, streaming services like Spotify and Amazon Music are naturally incentivized to develop their own AI music-generation technology. Spotify, for instance, pays 70% of the revenue of each stream to the artist who created it. If the company could generate that music with its own algorithms, it could cut human artists out of the equation al-

together.

Over time, this could mean more money for giant streaming services, less money for musicians - and a less human approach to making music.

2. Mixing and mastering


Machine-learning-enabled apps that help musicians balance all of the instruments and clean up the audio in a song what's known as mixing and mastering – are valuable tools for those who lack the experience, skill or resources to pull off professional-sounding tracks. Over the past decade, AI's

integration into music production has revolutionized how music is mixed and mastered. AI-driven apps like Landr, Cryo Mix and iZotope's Neutron can automatically analyze tracks, balance audio levels and remove noise.

These technologies streamline the production process, allowing musicians and producers to focus on the creative aspects of their work and leave some of the technical drudgery to AI.

While these apps undoubtedly take some work away from professional mixers and producers, they also allow professionals to quickly complete less lucrative jobs, such as mixing or mastering for a local band, and focus on high-pay-

ing commissions that require



more finesse. These apps also allow musicians to produce more professional-sounding work without involving an audio engineer they can't afford.

3. Instrumental and vocal reproduction

Using "tone transfer" algorithms via apps like Mawf, musicians can transform the sound of one instrument into another.

Thai musician and engineer

Yaboi Hanoi's song "Enter Demons & Gods," which won the third international AI Song Contest in 2022, was unique in that it was influenced not only by Thai mythology, but also by the sounds of native Thai musical instruments, which have a non-Western system of intonation. One of the most technically exciting aspects of Yaboi Hanoi's entry was the reproduction of a traditional Thai woodwind instrument - the pi

nai – which was resynthesized to perform the track.

A variant of this technology lies at the core of the Vocaloid voice synthesis software, which allows users to produce convincingly human vocal tracks with swappable voices.

Unsavory applications of this technique are popping up outside of the musical realm. For example, AI voice swapping has been used to scam people out of money.

But musicians and producers can already use it to realistically reproduce the sound of any instrument or voice imaginable. The downside, of course, is that this technology can rob instrumentalists of the opportunity to perform on a recorded track.

Al's Wild West moment

While I applaud Yaboi Hanoi's victory, I have to wonder if it will encourage musicians to use AI to fake a cultural connection where none exists.

In 2021, Capitol Music Group made headlines by signing an "AI rapper" that had been given the avatar of a Black male cyborg, but which was really the work of Factory New non-Black software engineers. The backlash was swift, with the record label roundly excoriated for blatant cultural appropriation.

But AI musical cultural appropriation is easier to stumble into than you might think. With the extraordinary size of songs and samples that comprise the data sets used by apps like Boomy – see the open source "Million Song Dataset" for a sense of the scale – there's a good chance that a user may unwittingly upload a newly generated track that pulls from a culture that isn't their own, or cribs from an artist in a way that too closely mimics the original. Worse still, it won't always be clear who is to blame for the offense, and current U.S. copyright laws are contradictory and woefully inadequate to the task of regulating these issues.

These are all topics that have come up in my own class, which has allowed me to at least inform my students of the dangers of unchecked AI and how to best avoid these pitfalls.

At the same time, at the end of each fall semester, I'll again ask my students if they're concerned about an AI takeover of music. At that point, and with a whole semester's experience investigating these technologies, most of them say they're excited to see how the technology will evolve and where the field will go.

Some dark possibilities do lie ahead for humanity and AI. Still, at least in the realm of musical AI, there is cause for some optimism – assuming the pitfalls are avoided.

Gaza authorities say 700 Palestinians killed in overnight Israeli strikes as calls rise for aid to stricken civilians

GAZA/JERUSALEM:- More than 700 Palestinians were killed overnight by Israeli air strikes, Gaza's Hamas-run health ministry said on Tuesday, the highest 24-hour death toll in Israel's two-week-old "total siege", as pressure grew for aid to be allowed into the enclave unimpeded.

The Israeli military said it had hit over 400 Hamas militant targets and killed dozens of its fighters overnight, but that it would take time to destroy Gaza's ruling Islamist group, whose deadly cross-border attack on Oct. 7 shocked Israel

With international aid agencies warning of a humanitarian catastrophe unfolding in Gaza, French President Emmanuel Macron flew to Israel to offer it support.

Macron told Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu that France stood "shoulder to shoulder" with Israel in its war with Hamas but that it must not fight "without rules". Netanyahu said Israel would try to protect civilians as it worked to ensure they "will no longer live under Hamas tyranny".

United Nations agencies called "on our knees" on Tuesday for emergency aid to be allowed unimpeded into Gaza, saying more than 20 times current deliveries were needed to support its Palestinian population after two weeks of Israeli bombardment.

The World Health Organization, in the latest of increasingly desperate U.N. appeals, called for "an immediate humanitarian ceasefire" to allow safe deliveries of aid.

Doctors in Gaza say patients arriving at hospitals are showing signs



of disease caused by overcrowding and poor sanitation after more than 1.4 million people fled their homes for temporary shelters under Israel's heaviest-ever bombardment.

But there appeared to be little prospect of a ceasefire any time soon in the bloodiest episode in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict for decades.

Gaza's health ministry said at least 5,791 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli bombardments of the densely populated territory since Oct. 7, including 2,360 children. A total of 704 were killed in the previous 24 hours alone, it said.

Ministry spokesman Ashraf Al-Qidra said it was the highest 24-hour number of deaths in the two weeks of Israeli bombing.

After an air strike in Khan Younis, Abdallah Tabash held his dead daughter Sidra, refusing to let go as he held her bloodstained face and hair. "I want to look at her as much as I can," he

said. Israeli tanks and troops are massed on the border between Israel and the enclave awaiting orders for an expected ground invasion - an operation that may be complicated by fears for the hostages' welfare and militants heavily armed by Iran dug into a crowded urban setting using a vast network of

tunnels. The bombardments were unleashed in response to a shock cross-border Hamas assault into southern Israel in which gunmen killed over 1,400 people - mostly civilians - in a single day.

'I'VE BEEN THROUGH HELL'

Hamas on Monday freed two Israeli women who were among the more than 200 hostages taken during the



rampage - the third and fourth to be released.

Yocheved Lifshitz, 85, said she was beaten by militants as she was abducted and had difficulty breathing. "They stormed into our homes. They beat people. They kidnapped others, the old and the young without distinction," she said, seated in a wheelchair and speaking in barely a whisper to reporters.

"I've been through hell," Lifshitz said.

Inside Gaza, a group of hostages were led into what Lifshitz called a "spider's web" of damp tunnels and eventually reached a large hall where, under 24-hour guard, a doctor visited every other day and brought them medicines they needed.

"They treated us gently and met all our needs," she said.

'NO GREEN LIGHT'

How soon Israel might launch a fullscale invasion of Gaza remains unclear. The Middle East's most powerful military faces a group that has built up a powerful arsenal with Iran's help.

World powers are concerned the conflict could ignite the entire region and some have urged Israel to exercise restraint, while affirming its right to self-defence.

The outcome is unclear: Palestinian hopes for an independent state in Israeli-occupied territory were already remote, with peace talks a distant memory, and Netanyahu's rightwing government expanding Jewish settlements in the West Bank.

Deadly clashes have worsened between the Israeli military and Palestinians in the West Bank, and resurged between Israel and Lebanon's Iran-backed Hezbollah group along the two countries' volatile border.

Fears of regional escalation focus on Iran's network of proxies in Syria, Iraq and Yemen. Any wider conflagration would jeopardise security in a region key to global energy supplies. U.S. officials told Reuters the U.S.

military is taking new steps to protect its troops in the Middle East as concerns mount about attacks by Iranbacked groups, and it is leaving open the possibility of evacuations of mili-tary families if needed.

Kerala temple body issues fresh circular banning RSS activities on shrine premises

Thiruvananthapuram: The Travancore Devaswom Board, the apex temple body which manages major shrines in Kerala's Travancore region, has issued a new circular banning the activities of the RSS on temple premises and its properties.

According to the circular issued by the Devaswom Commissioner, the 'namajapa protests' (protests by chanting mantras) have also been banned inside the premises of shrines

managed by the temple body. It said all the activities of the RSS and outfits with "extreme ideologies," without the permission of the TDB, have been prohibited.

The circular, dated October 20. directed the Devaswom Vigilance Wing to carry out surprise raids to find out whether the RSS or other outfits were running 'shakhas' (branches), mass drills, or arms training on temple properties.

It directed employees and priests of respective temples to inform the TDB management about the presence of such outfits and their operations, if any. Those who failed to inform the same would face disciplinary action, it said.

The circular also made it clear that photos, flags and flex boards of those who have no relation to the temples should not be kept on their premises. Any failure to follow the directives would be treated as a violation of high court verdicts in this regard, it added.

Last month, the Kerala High Court had said that no mass drill or weapons training shall be permitted on the premises of Sarkara Devi Temple in Thiruvananthapuram district, which is under TDB's management.

The direction came while disposing of a plea filed by two devotees seeking an order to prevent "illegal use and unauthorised occupancy" of the temple premises by the RSS and its members.

In May this year also, the TDB had issued a circular asking officials to strictly follow its earlier order banning RSS 'shakhas' (branches) or mass drills at the shrines under it.

In a circular issued on May 18, the TDB said its 2021 order directing the officials to stop the sangh parivar organisation from using the temple properties for arms training, was not being implemented.

In 2016, the TDB had issued a circular banning all types of arms training on temple complexes by the RSS. Later, on March 30, 2021, the board reissued the circular, asking the officials to take action in this regard.

The then Devaswom Minister, Kadakampally Surendran, had alleged that the RSS was trying to turn temples into storehouses of arms in Kerala and that the government had been receiving a large number of complaints in this regard.



In J&K, GI Index Of Hr Edu **Institutes Above National Average** For 18 To-23-Year Old Students

SRINAGAR: In Jammu and Kashmir, Gender Parity Index (GPI) is above the national average in higher educational institutes for 18-23 year-old students.

As per the official figures, the national average of GPI in higher educational institutes for 18-23 years old students is 1.05 in all categories.

However, Jammu and Kashmir has a GPI of 1.18 in all categories.

In the education space, GPI is used to measure gender equality in education access.

Government and international organisations such as

UNESCO and the United Nations monitor the gender gap in education access, using GPI to identify sectors where intervention is needed to address gender disparities.

Among the scheduled caste students, GPI in Jammu and Kashmir is also above the national average with 1.27 whereas the national average lies at 1.7.

Likewise, the GPI of Schedule Tribe students of higher education in Jammu and Kashmir is 0.92 while the national average is 1.02. A GPI of less than 1 suggests girls are more disadvantaged than boys in learning opportunities and a GPI of greater than 1 suggests the other way around-(KNO)

SRINAGAR: After over three decades of long wait, scores of families in Bandipora's Shamtahan are returning to their native village with a hope to live a peaceful life ahead.

These families were forced to leave the village after facing the severe impact of terrorism. All these years, they were living with their relations with some of them putting up in Kothas many kilometres away from their home. These families have been homeless in their own home district since 1990. The village, which consists

of 25 households, has now embarked on a journey to revive their long-deserted homes after two decades, with the hope of resuming peaceful lives in their ancestral dwellings, driven by the overall tranquillity that has prevailed in J&K over the past few years.

According to local residents, in the 1990s, when militancy was at its peak in Kashmir, the village suffered significant damage, traumatizing its residents and eventually forcing them to leave their homes for Dardpora village in Bandipora. "We had been longing for

the day when we could return to our homes and lead peaceful lives in our village and now that day has arrived. We have

our long-neglected homes," the local residents told a local news agency KNO. With a belief in the power of hope, the locals now wish to live peacefully in their homes, preserving their traditional culture for years to come.

We had our apprehensions due to the situation in the 1990s, but now with normalcy in Kashmir, we've returned to our decades-old homes, filled with cherished memories," said an elderly resident.

Resurgent Australia Face Tenacious Netherlands

NEW DELHI: Bolstered by the revival of their batting firepower, a rejuvenated Australia will look for another dominating show but need to be cautious when they face a tenacious Netherlands in their next World Cup match here on Wednesday

After a disappointing start to their campaign, the five-time champions turned it around with two solid performances against Sri Lanka and Pakistan but they know very well that they can ill-afford to take the Dutch lightly in what is turning out to be a World Cup of upsets.

The Netherlands have been one of the success stories of this showpiece event as they stunned an inform South Africa at Dharamsala after returning to the World Cup following a 12-year hiatus. They will look to take a cue from Afghanistan's win over Pakistan to keep their story alive.

However, it will be easier said than done, especially after the marauding show of the Aussies against Pakistan.

The return to form of David Warner and Mitchell Marsh is good news for Australia as they can blow away any opponent with their sheer ruthless batting. A case

in point is the 259-run opening partnership that the two shared against Pakistan

But Australia will need to add firepower in their middle order, especially with Steve Smith and Marnus Labuschagne struggling at the moment.

The Dutch, on the other hand, have never beaten Australia in ODIs. They lost the two times they met way back in 2003 and 2007.

But the Orange Brigade as shown what they are capable of in the run-up to the World Cup and also during their sensational win over South Africa and a narrow loss to Sri Lanka in the last match.

De Kock Leads Batting Carnage As South Africa Trounce Bangladesh

MUMBAI: Quinton de Kock led South Africa's batting carnage with an incendiary 174 as they crushed Ban-gladesh by 149 runs to stay on course for a place in the semi-finals of the 50-overs World Cup on Tuesday. De Kock smashed the ongoing tournament's highest individual score and South Africa's middle order hectored a listless Bangladesh attack to amass 382-5 after electing to bat at the Wankhede Stadium.

KARACHI: Sarfaraz Ahmed, Muhammad Rizwan and Shaheen Shah Afridi are being discussed as potential candidates who could replace Babar Azam as captain when the national team returns home from the World Cup in India.

Pakistan are scheduled to tour Australia immediately after the World Cup. The team also needs to plan for the 2024 T20 World Cup and 2025 ICC Champions Trophy. "Only if Pakistan can stage a miracle and win all their remaining matches to qualify for the semi-finals of this World Cup does Babar stand any chance of surviving as captain and even then he might be relegated to skipper in just the red ball for-



mat," one reliable source close to the developments said.

The source said that the knives were out for Babar and he might as well announce his resignation as captain if the team returns home without playing in the World Cup semifinals.


