'Risk of Nuclear War Rising Amid Global Conflicts'

ONFLICTS raging around the world, including in Gaza, are heightening the possibility of a nuclear war, the winner of this year's Nobel Peace Prize warned, renewing calls for

the abolition of nuclear weapons. "The international situation is getting progressively worse, and now wars are being waged as countries threaten the use of nuclear weapons," said Shigemitsu Tanaka, a survivor of the 1945 U.S. bombing of Nagasaki and co-head of the Nihon Hidankyo group.

"I fear that we as humankind are on the path to self-destruction. The only way to stop that is to abolish nuclear," he said.

Nihon Hidankyo, the grassroots group of Japanese atomic bomb survivors, won the prize on Friday for its "efforts to achieve a world free of nuclear weapons".

In awarding the survivors, the Norwegian Nobel Committee highlighted the devastation

of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the Japanese group's decadeslong work to rid the world of nuclear weapons.

Nagasaki was the second Japanese city that was hit by a US nuclear bomb on August 9, 1945, killing at least 74,000 people. Three days earlier, the US bombing of Hiroshima had killed 140,000 people.

Hiroshima residents said on Saturday they hoped the world never forgets the bombings of 1945 – now more than ever.

Susumu Ogawa, 84, was five when the bomb all but obliterated Hiroshima 79 years ago, and many of his family members were among the tens of thousands killed.

"My mother, my aunt, my grandfather, and my grandmother all died," Ogawa told the AFP news agency.

"All nuclear weapons in the world have to be abandoned," Ogawa said. "We know the horror of nuclear weapons, because we know what happened in Hiroshima."

What is happening now in the Middle East, with Israel's wars in Gaza and Lebanon and escalating tensions with Iran, saddens him.

Wild Boars Present New Ecological

A wildlife official said the species has existed in the Dachigam area since the time of the Maharajas and often ventures outside the park during the fruit harvest season in search of food.

They said that during the fruit harvesting season, the species has been found usually roaming outside the peripheries of Dachigam National Park and its surrounding conservation reserves in search of their food.

While acknowledging that the wild boars are part of the wild population, a senior official said that

their movement cannot be restricted. However, he said, measures have been implemented to deter them from leaving their habitat.

"The main force driving them out is the easy availability of food. Wherever they find food, they will continue to move," the official explained.

The CCTV footage and pictures also showed the presence of wild boars near Asia's famous Tulip and Botanical Garden.

Surfacing of these wild boars has also thrown a big challenge for the floriculture employees in Srinagar, forcing them to go for fencing and to keep round-the-clock vigil

Death Risk Found To Rise Due To Adverse Effects On Health In Wake Of Extreme Rainfall Events

Risk of death was found to rise in the wake of an extreme rainfall event, including death due to heart and lung conditions, according to a study.

With climate change making short-term rainfall events more extreme and frequent, there is emerging evidence that suggests a compelling link between these events and their adverse effects on health, especially the spread of infectious diseases, researchers said based on a study of over 62,000

rainfall events across the globe. The study by the team, including researchers from the German Research Center for Environmental Health, provides a global perspective of how extreme rainfall events can impact health, they said.

They looked at the data of daily deaths and rainfall from 645 locations from across 34 countries and regions, recorded from 1980 to 2020. A total of over 100 million deaths from any cause, and more than 31 million and 11.5 million deaths due to heart and lung conditions, respectively, were

A day of extreme rainfall, that could likely recur over the following five years, was linked with an eight per cent increase in

deaths due to any cause over the 14 days following the extreme weather event. Such an event was also related with a five per cent increase in cardiovascular deaths and a nearly 30 per cent increase in lungrelated mortality in the fortnight following

"Daily rainfall intensity is associated with varying health effects, with extreme events linked to an increasing relative risk for all cause, cardiovascular, and respiratory mortality. The observed associations varied with local climate and urban infrastructure," the authors wrote in the study published in the British Medical Journal.

Acknowledging the limitations of the research, the team said the study was observational and thus, could not draw cause-and-effect conclusions. Further, locations analysed were largely in east Asia, Europe, and North America, they

The findings, however, highlighted the need for coordinated public health strategies targeted at the health impacts of extreme rainfall, the authors said.

"This is especially important considering the well established trend of increasing short term rainfall intensity as a result of climate change," they wrote.

RSS Launches JK Trifurcation Campaign

RINAGAR- The Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) has formally launched its campaign for the trifurcation of Jammu and Kashmir coming out in the open, for the first time, in support of the division of the only Muslim majority state. Advocating Reorganisation of the state by what it perceives as isolation of the Muslim majority valley from rest of the state, the organisation (visualizes the move as a step towards early solution of the Kashmir problem).

According to a report earned by The Times of India today, the RSS has planned "mass action programme' and has floated an umbrella organisation - the Jammu and Kashmir Nationalist Front (JKNF) - and was 'subtly' promoting groups to organist mass agitations to get the state divided into Hindu Jammu, Muslim valley and Budhist Ladakh The Front held its first dharna in Jammu interestingly on Gandhi Jayanti.

In fact, according to the report, the RSS plan would

not stop at the mere 'trifurcation' of the state It favours further division of the Muslim dominated valley by carving out a separate homeland for the migrant Kashmiri Pandits. The movement envisages mobilisation of public opinion in the Muslims majority districts of Poonch, Rajoujri and Doda, besides the Gujjar community against what it describes as 'Kashmiri hegemony'.

Quoting M G Vaidya, an RSS spokesman in New

Quoting M G Vaidya, an RSS spokesman in New Delhi, the report said, Trifurcation doesn't mean surrender to the Two-Nation theory. The reorganisation is basically an administrative measure." The Sangh Parivar believes that Kashmiri extremism can be dealt with only by separating the valley from rest of the state and focusing on the insurgency operations in the Muslim majority valley, the report said.

While the RBS-backid JKNF was gaining ground, the report said, the BJP had, curiously, kept itself away so far. The recent dharna in Jammu was joined by even the mainstream parties like the Janata Dal (U) and Bhin Singh's Panther's party. Explaining the reasons, the co-convenor of the JKNP, Yesh Bhasin, a former RSS Parcharak and state BJP leader, told the newspaper, "The BJP is not openly supporting us since they are bound by the NDA's policies."

Why Solidarity With Gaza and Lebanon Is Not Communal

eaceful solidarity rallies were held throughout the Muslim world to commemorate the assassination of Syed Hassan Nasrallah in an Israeli airstrike in Beirut. Nasrallah, the chief of Lebanon's Hezbollah had over time been perceived as one of the strongest non-state voices against Zionist hegemony in the Middle East and had been actively engaged in supporting the Palestinian cause, more so after the recent ongoing Israeli aggression against the hapless people of Gaza. As a matter of fact, Nasrallah's assassination has become a catalyst to broaden the contours of global support for the Palestinian nationhood, as he had been seen as the central point in the axis of resistance against the Israeli occupation of Palestine.

Cutting across nationalities, people have voiced their serious concerns over the worst sort of humanitarian crisis being unfolded by Israel's relentless and brutal bombardment of the civilian locales in Gaza, with majority of the victims being women and children. Understandably, there has been a furore in the Muslim world against these wartime atrocities and the genocide being committed against the innocent people of Gaza.

In the backdrop of the entire foregoing, it is easy to comprehend why Indian Muslims too have been vocal in lending moral support to their Palestinian brethren by way of conducting peaceful rallies and seminars to vent their dissent against the unprecedented aggression of Israel. Similarly, the assasination of Syed Hassan Nasrallah provided a spurt in this show of support for Palestinians across the globe. He was looked upon as one of the prominent faces of resistance against Israel's illegitimate policies vis a vis Palestine and the Middle East. Hence, Indian Muslims too could not remain aloof by way of manifesting their catharsis for the unfolding events.

Yet, unfortunately, certain media outlets in our country have tried to sensationalise this show of moral support emerging from India for Palestinian people as communal and detrimental to the secular fabric of our society. For them it was, albeit wrongly portrayed and that too with malafide intentions, a sort of a clarion call by the Indian Muslims to unite as if for some ultra communal purposes.

In order to increase its TRP ratings, a specific news channel even levelled wild accusations upon the Muslim Ulema in India that they were using the Palestinian as well as the Nasrallah sentiment to warm up Indian Muslims for some imaginary communal flare up. How can legitimate and globally endorsed sentiments for the people of Gaza be constructed as vicious? Indian Muslims have always been a part and parcel of the syncretic and composite culture of the Indian society. Indian Muslims never misconstrued India's call to the Bangladeshi authorities to protect the life and honour of our Hindu brethren during the recent political turmoil there or the allocation of domicile certificates to the non-Muslim subjects of Pakistan, Afghanistan or Bangladesh to settle down in India as communal. Then why should Indian Muslim's moral support for their Palestinian

Muslim brethren be seen as rabidly communal by these corporate media houses?

It is also pertinent to mention and set the record straight that since the assassination of Hizbollah chief Syed Hassan Nasrallah, there have been joint Sunni-Shia rallies held to commemorate his martyrdom in Kashmir and elsewhere in India. The rationale behind this being that Nasrallah was a Shiite Muslim who is understood to have sacrificed his life for the Palestinians with the majority of them being Sunni Muslims. Therefore, this general sentiment of the Muslim Ummah to rise against the petty sectarian diatribe of Shia and Sunni in wake of the pan Zionist tendencies of the Israeli state to dislodge Palestinian Muslims from their home and hearth and in the aftermath of Nasrallah's assassination, got mirrored in the collective consciousness of Indian Muslims on the same lines as it did elsewhere across

Therefore, the general sentiment of the Indian Muslims in wake of Nasrallah's assassination and the worst human catastrophe unfolding in Palestine, has more to do with the global influence of social media to affect the opinions worldwide. Moreover, with the sense of belongingness of Indian Muslims to the extended Muslim Ummah this sentiment is unsurprising. It does not have to do anything with any

sort of a localised communal build up detrimental to national unity and security, as has been wrongly projected by the aforementioned sensationalists.

In fact, it was this fellow feeling of the Indian Muslims for their Muslim brothers across the globe which had earlier got culminated in to the Khilafat movement; a movement whose charm and force was used by the great freedom fighters like Maulana Abul Kalam Azad and nonetheless by Mahatma Gandhi in service of India's national struggle for independence. This historical fact must therefore always be kept in view that the religious sense of Indian Muslims' belongingness to global Muslim civilisation never ever makes them oblivious of their responsibilities and of their duties towards the nation.

I was personally shocked when I found my own video being tailored out of context by a specific media channel to get it fitted to its communal diatribe and to its favourite pastime of Muslim bashing. The video pertains to a specific congregation which was held in Srinagar, nonetheless with the permission of authorities and wherein many religious and social figures had gathered to express their moral solidarity with the victims of Israeli air strikes in Gaza and Lebanon. It was a mixed gathering of Shia and Sunni Muslims and like other speakers I too urged upon the listeners to rise above the narrow sectarian di-

vides and pray for the deprived people of Palestine irrespective of their sectarian or religious affiliations. So as to foster a sense of unity among the Shia and Sunni communities I raised the slogan: "Shia Sunni bhai bhai" meaning Shias and Sunnis are brothers. This gesture of fostering a sense of brotherhood amongst the communities, was mischievously interpreted and portrayed by a private news channel as some sort of clarion call to the Muslims to unify for some ulterior communal agenda. In fact, it is the context of the gathering which always decides our choice of words and till the time our expression is not unparliamentary and till the time we don't use our freedoms of expression to hurt others' sentiments, constitutionally speaking nobody can snatch our rights of expression as such. If it would have been an occasion to address a pluralistic audience, then it would not have been out of place to raise slogans like "Hindu Muslim Sikh Isai. Aapas main hain bhai bhai." But the context of the aforesaid event demanded a speech and a slogan that could depict the brotherhood and love between the members of the two communities, Shia and Sunni who were present there during the occasion.

The media outlets wrongly portraying the sympathy of the Indian Muslims with their Muslim brethren in Palestine, Lebanon and elsewhere as anti national or communal presents a stark reminder of the mistrust with which certain fringe elements in the corporate media often see Muslims in India. If the terminology of Vasudeva Kutumbakam signifies a global society and still doesn't offend our sense of belongingness to our country of origin, then why should an Indian Muslim's empathy for the Millat (the global Muslim Civilisation) be looked down with suspicion by these fringe media outlets breeding hatred amongst the communities?

If the lofty ideals of Santana Dharma have the tendency of binding the diverse groups of Hindu society for good into a common bond of fellow feeling, then how do certain fringe but powerful elements in the media portray the invocations of certain Muslim Ulema to the diverse schools of thought in Islam to be bound by the fellow feelings of brotherhood and compassion for each other as some sort of a battle cry? In fact these acts of sensationalism and post truth tendencies mostly in the corporate media have of late been a prime factor in lowering the standards of professional ethics in journalism, which at times takes the shape of artificially created communal flare ups and mistrust in the society. This approach further leads to the exclusivist tendencies among the communities which often overrides our sense of 'Unity in Diversity.' In order to safeguard the core values of our composite culture, we must therefore be empathetic towards each other rather than being judgmental. If being judgmental is our compulsion, then at least we must be judging everyone judiciously.

rime Minister Narendra Modi's third term in office is a legacy term marked by his 'coming of age' — taking bold decisions in foreign policies. Hardly has the dust settled down on Modi's controversial decision to visit Kiev as peacemaker even as the Ukraine war is only accelerating, Modi took the decision in the solitude of his mind apparently to call on Donald Trump during his brief 3-day visit to the US starting Saturday.

That, at least, is the signal from the silence of the lambs in the US State Department and our Mission in DC. Actually, the 'breaking news' came from the great man himself. The US media promptly flashed it.

Now that the cat is out of the bag, spin masters in Delhi are playing up PM's meeting with Trump. The ANI took an interview with the prominent New York-based entrepreneur and Trump's close aide Al Mason (who figures in Trump's inner circle) and Doordarshan promptly carried the news agency's entire 760-word report on its website, titled PM Modi, Trump Are Strong Leaders Who Respect Each Other, Says Former US President's Close Aide.

Despite the orchestrated campaign against Trump by mainstream US media, Delhi apparently keeps an open mind. Modi is on the same page as Hungarian PM Viktor Orban and Polish President Andrzej Duda, the flag carriers of rightwing conservative-nationalist ideology in European politics, who reject the neoconservative-globalist outlook that President Biden represents.

In the US political culture, it is not unusual that foreign dignitaries call on opposition politicians. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, accompanied by wife Sara, capped a weeklong US visit in late July by visiting Trump at his Mara-Lago resort in Florida.

US-India: It's A Chicken And Egg Situation

Orban met Trump more than once during the past year. But then, Orban is highly critical of Biden and the Ukraine war and openly voices support for Trump's candidacy. Orban flew to Moscow and Kiev before meeting Trump in July.

Modi will be likewise meeting Trump. Ukraine crisis will almost certainly figure in their conversation.

Last week, at a meeting with the visiting Indian National Security Advisor Ajit Doval in Moscow, Putin proposed yet another 'bilateral' with Modi when he visits Russia soon after his return from the US on the sidelines of the BRICS summit (October 22-24) in Kazan.

The last time Modi visited Russia in July and met with Putin, their first such meeting since the Ukraine war started in February 2022, US officials went ballistic. The US National Security adviser Jake Sulivan cautioned that strong ties with Russia were a "bad bet" for India.

State Department spokesperson Matthew Miller said the US was concerned about India's relations with Russia. And Eric Garcetti, the US ambassador to India, publicly rebuked the Modi government that it could not take Washington's friendship with Delhi "for granted". Garcetti questioned the raison d'être of India's strategic autonomy.

Against such a complex backdrop, can it be a coincidence that the controversial

Khalistani activist settled in the US, Gurpatwant Singh Pannun has filed a civil lawsuit in the US Federal District Court in New York against the Government of India, Doval and senior Research & Analysis Wing officials and the 'Indian businessman' Nikhil Gupta (who was extradited to the US from Prague earlier this year) for their "unprecedented attempt to assassinate a US citizen on the US soil"?

Importantly, the lawsuit also says: "Mr. Pannun at this time has not named Narendra Modi as a defendant due to the immunity he now enjoys under US and international law as head of a foreign sovereign government. However, Mr. Pannun reserves his right to amend the complaint to include Narendra Modi as a defendant should his status as head of state change during the course of these proceedings."

The development has serious implications insofar as "it brings matters almost to the doorsteps of the Prime Minister whose work with the NSA [Doval] is intertwined and inextricable," to quote V Sudarshan, senior journalist who writes on national security affairs.

Pannun's lawsuit is carefully timed to coincide with Modi's visit. The US spy agencies and FBI actively keep in touch with Pannun and in all probability greenlighted his lawsuit. The US diplomacy has a history of blackmailing countries that pursue independent foreign policies.

By Monday, Modi will be back in India and the UN General Assembly's Summit of the Future, which occasioned his US trip, will start fading away as a distant memory. An international consensus on "how we deliver a better present and safeguard the future" will remain elusive in our Age of Geopolitics.

The remains of the day will be largely the fallouts from Pannun's lawsuit. This

could be Doval's last visit to the US as he may soon become a fugitive from American law. That puts External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar in a dual role in the high-level exchanges with Washington — doubling up also as India's security czar. The Americans won't mind it.

However, the transactional relationship as such acquires a new dynamic. Delhi's appeasement strategy may now translate as more mega arms deals with the US, generating substantial business and job creation in the American economy. It's a chicken-and-egg situation. Make no mistake, Americans will use it

to pressure India.

The BRICS summit at Kazan becomes a trial run. At a press conference in Moscow on Monday, Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said that "alternative payment platforms are being developed within BRICS which allow countries to trade, invest, and conduct other economic transactions without being dependent on those who have decided to weaponise the US dollar and the euro." Lavrov added that the new payment system will not only be used to settle cross-border transactions, but will act as a complete financial set-up.

'De-dollarisation' is becoming a campaign issue in battleground states in the US elections. Trump said at a campaign rally in Wisconsin, "I hate when countries go off the dollar.... I'll say, 'You leave the dollar, you're not doing business with the United States, because we're going to put 100% tariff on your goods" (here). Washington will expect India to slow down the 'de-dollarisation' process on the BRICS platform.

oncluding my last write-up, that found space in these pages on 28 Sep 2024, I had very briefly spoken about an interesting milestone of the 16th Century; stating, that one king of Ladakh, namely Jamyung Namgial, invaded Chigtan, around 1600, but it was the Askardo-chief, Ali Mir Sher khan, who tasted Victory and King Jamyung was captured.

About the marriage of this Ladakhi/ Buddhist king with that of a Muslim princess, Ali Mir's daughter, Gyal Khatoon,(-gone down in history as the famous queen of Ladakh). Also talking about other elements of the story... What led to the marriage of Ali Mir's daughter, zi zi khatoon, with this Buddhist/ Ladakhi king Jamyung,(-whose first wife was Tsering Gyalmo).... the Vision that a Tiger jumps on her and enters her womb; whereafter the birth of a child, who in Ladakh's history, came to be known as Senge (lion)Namgyal, unsurpassed by successors, i mean, achievement-wise. [For me such things lend a somewhat necessary flavour to the story, and above all it is an interesting episode, caricatured by history.].

The ladakhi's reconciled themselves to their Balti queen by recogn izing in her an incarnation of Buddhist goddess- the white Tara (--Dolma). Jamyung relieved his Buddhist subjects of taxation. From 1590-1615 Gyal Khatoon acted as regent. Some say that in 1594 AD, land for the first Leh- Mosque was alloted by her. Some years later we hear that Senge Namgial turned to the Tsan kingdom of Tibet; in one more interesting piece of information that I would like to share is that writers say by destroying Guge and weakening Tsang, at a most crucial time, Seng Namgial all unwittingly prepared the way for the final eclipse of Ladakh. From Kashmir and Baltistaan the Moghuls entered pressure. Senge thus failed to foresee his real foes-Turko-Mongols from Central Asia, Balti's from Baltistan and also rulers of kashmir. Around 1639 there were battles at Kharbu with Mughals.

On 25 Oct 1631 Father Francesco de Azevedo and Giovani visited ladakh and met king Senge-Namgial; described him as " a man of tall stature...wore a string of skull bones around his neck".

At one point in history, that is around the late 15th century, two kingdoms existed in Ladakh; namely Leh-kingdom and Basgo kingdom. A man of calibre,namely Lhachen- Bhagen, (1470-1500), founded the New Dynasty, after reuniting the aforementioned areas and took the surname of Namgials (= victorious).

This Bhagen had two sons, Lha-Chen-Lhawang reNamgyalg and Bkra-sis (Tashi) rnam-rgyal. Elder brother Lhawang had Three sons; Tsewang, Gonpo and Jamyang.

One Interesting piece of information: Leh, for the first time, became the royal residence at the beginning of the 16th Century. Prior to that Shey was the capital. The Present palace that we see today, above the Leh-city, didn't exist then. King Tashi Namgyal only built a fortified castle on the precipitous peak, called as tsemo. Tashi built the guardian temple (Gon-khang) above the Maitreya temple, on the peak after repelling a Turk invasion; built the Red sect Phylang Gompa/ Monastery- 18 kms west of Leh; got the holy scriptures, (kangur & sTan-gur copied; erected many chortens; renovated Alchi chosker (-70 kms from Leh)--where his inscription exists. It was king Tashi who made the rule according to which every Buddhist family must send a male child to become a

In 1532 Turko-mongol expedition (- instigated and also partly led by the khan of kashgar, Sultan Sayeed Khan), was 'a holy war against Buddhist infidels'. King Tashi was killed. Mirza Haider Dughlat established himself at Shey, attacked Zanskaar in 1535

Tsewang Namgial died In 1555, he was

followed by his eldest son. 1n 1538 Ladakh was attacked by Sultan Sayeed Khan of kashghar. Enough of kings for today.

There existed a number of trade routes that connected Ladakh with Baltistan; e:g from Hanu to Skardu; kharul of Kargil to Skardu and from North Ladakh to Baltistan, along the Shyok river; just to name a few. Above all, dear reader, underline my next sentence: MEN OF THOSE TIMES WERE WELL CONSCIOUS ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF TRADE SO ALL EYES WERE SET, ALMOST, DAILY, ON THE ROADS THAT LED TO CENTRAL ASIA.

It is said that out of the five main trade routes two main ones for caravans were Leh-Srinagar and Leh-kulu; and Major centres like Mandi Hoshiapur, Amritsar too were roped in; also Leh-yarkand (chinese- Turkistan), Leh-Lahasa, Leh-Shimla were much thronged places, besides Srinagar. Items of trade were: Dried Apricots, pashmina, goat-skin. rice, sugar, opium, almonds, saffron, silk carpets, silver jewellery, silk, rice, etc. Leh and Srinagar etc were big trade centres. Speaking of 1845 Alexander Cunningham saw 60 merchants from Kashmir readying for road journeys. In 1894, as per Godfrey-survey trade per year of Ladakh alone, was to the tune of sixty lac rupees. In 1950's nearly Six dozen ladakhi traders, including some Argoan traders traded with Tibet, alone. Ladakh had become a great Central Asian trade-player. Baltis visited Leh and kargil. Very frequently. Dried Apricots is said to have been one of the main items for trade, propagation of its tree-stock is said to have been carried by the Guru padmasamb-

Earlier in 7th & 8th centuries, the Tibetan army went to war through Zangskaar, Baltistaan. Traders of Central Asia were called Hor; those of Chinese Turkistan as yarkandi's. As per Dr.A.H.Francke(1907) the famous fresco in Namgyal Tsemo of leh depicting a court scene clearly shows the influence of Central Asia, especially in terms of dress. During 1984-86,somewhere in Leh, the family head of a Ladakhi friend told me that the famous pass of ladakh, Daulat Beg Oldee, got its name from a rich Yarkandi trader.///

Not having any competing interests, in addition to the wisdom gained from life, were fostering a new and different form of love between him and his baby son (named Aristotle) that Taylor could only describe as "fulfillment." The psychological benefits of receiving pure, unadulterated love from a child were well-documented, but at the time, relatively little had been written about the rewards of giving the same kind of love to that child; this was the thing that Taylor found to be such a transformative

experience.

Neuroscientific research related to fatherhood backs up such stories. "When men morph into fathers, they experience a neural revival that benefits their children," Brian Mossop explained in Scientific American Mind in 2011, with both baby's and dad's brains forever altered in the days following birth. If the idea of some kind of cognitive symbiosis taking place is not amazing enough, a father's brain will typically alter its hormonal outputs and neural activity depending on his particular parenting responsibilities. Dads' brains can switch back and forth between a network geared towards social bonding and vigilance and one designed for planning and thinking, according to a 2014 study published in Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, changing its output based on the situation

Nurture is certainly important in parenting but, as in an increasing number of other activities, it is nature that researchers are discovering predisposes an individual toward certain behavior. Being a "good" parent is thus heavily determined by the brain's wiring, this research suggests, making us rethink much of what we have assumed about the practice of fatherhood. Although fatherhood has been around as long as humans, we are clearly embarking on a new frontier of understanding it, with many exciting adventures no doubt looming for the future.

As the J&K union territory is directly

"Everyone knows who says what before and after elections, but since the J&K UT is directly under the control of the central government, the new government will have less power to act. They have to follow the center's orders," the JD-U leader said, adding, it would be difficult for the new government to last a year.

The addition of the five members to be nominated by the J&K Lieutenant Governor will bring the total strength of the J&K Legislative Assembly to 95.

Political parties have already expressed strong opposition to the nomination of five MLAs before the government formation in Jammu and Kashmir, labelling any such move as an assault on democracy and the fundamental principles of the Constitution.

Any such move is an assault on democracy, the people's mandate, and the fundamental principles of the Constitution," Jammu and Kashmir Pradesh Congress Committee (JKPCC) senior vice-president and chief spokesperson Ravinder Sharma said.

National Conference president Farooq Abdullah said his party would go to the Supreme Court if the BJP-led Centre went ahead to give powers to the LG for nominating the five members to the assembly.

The distribution of panchayats varies across districts, with notable numbers in Udhampur (236), Ramban (143), Poonch (229), and various districts in the Kashmir division, including 21 in Srinagar and 402 in Baramulla.

State Election Commissioner BR Sharma confirmed that the Panchayat and Urban Local Bodies elections will take place once OBC reservation is finalised.

Leh Apex Body Calls For Solidarity **Hunger Strike On October 13**

Leh: The Leh Apex Body has made a vehement appeal to the people of Ladakh to observe a hunger strike on October 13 in solidarity with Sonam Wangchuk and his team, who have been on hunger strike for the past 10 days at Delhi's Ladakh Bhavan.

Ladakh is demanding the implementation of a four-point agenda, which includes the inclusion of Ladakh in the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution, statehood, a public service commission, and separate Lok Sabha seats for Leh and Kargil districts.

Chairman Leh Apex Body,

Residents of Kenihama Demand **Repair Of Water Pipe Leakage**

Srinagar: Residents of the Kenihama area in Nowgam, Srinagar, have expressed frustration over ongoing issues with their water supply pipeline, which has been witnessing leakage for a long period.

Despite numerous complaints to the relevant authorities, residents claim no effective action has been taken to resolve the problem.

Locals said that officials have made empty promises without providing any tangible solutions.

They said the damaged pipeline has led to inconsistent and causing severe inconvenience for the community for over a month.

"We have been raising

this issue for a long time, but it seems our concerns are falling on deaf ears," said one resident, adding that there is an urgent need to restore the leaked pipeline.

Wahid, another local, said, "We have been contacting the local PHR lineman and other concerned officials for more than a month, but nothing has changed. We've reached out to the lineman, his superiors, and others in the PHE/Jal Shakti department, yet no repairs have been made."

When reporter attempted to contact the department for an update, officials said the issue would be resolved in a day or two. However, as days went by, further attempts to reach the department went unanswered, leaving residents increasingly frustrated—(KNO)





World Arthritis Day: Experts Stress Urgent Need For Awareness, Prevention

Srinagar: "Arthritis is a widespread condition affecting millions globally, leading to pain, stiffness and inflammation in the joints, which can severely diminish a person's quality of life and complicate daily activities," doctors said on World Arthritis Day.

According to healthcare professionals there are over 100 types of arthritis, with osteoarthritis (OA) and rheumatoid arthritis (RA) being the most common.

Dr Mukhtar, an orthopaedician at DHSK, said various factors contribute to arthritis, including genetics, age, joint injuries, infections, obesity, immune system dysfunction and lifestyle choices. "Excess body weight places additional stress on weight-bearing joints such as the knees, hips, and spine, leading to accelerated cartilage wear," he said, adding that obesity is linked to increased inflammation, which raises the risk of developing different forms of arthritis.

Smoking and lack of physical activity are associated with a higher risk of developing rheumatoid arthritis," Dr Mukhtar said. "Smoking can trigger inflammatory responses in the body, while a sedentary lifestyle ing and scheduling regular medical check-ups.

"Although arthritis is common, it can often be managed and even prevented through lifestyle changes," he said. "Staying active, maintaining a healthy weight, and seeking early medical care are crucial steps in reducing the risk of ar-

contributes to joint stiffness and muscle weakness.

Dr Mukhtar, a rheumatologist, said the best preventative measures for arthritis include maintaining a healthy weight, engaging in regular physical activity, avoiding joint injuries, following a balanced diet, refraining from smokthritis and promoting joint health throughout life.'

He urged individuals to seek timely medical intervention if they experience any symptoms of arthritis, as early diagnosis and treatment can help patients lead normal, fulfilling lives—(KNO)

their colleagues during Kashmir's long-standing conflict.

"Some so-called separatist leaders who never went to jail, never experienced torture seem to have forgotten the killings, torture, and jailing of their colleagues. They are actually glorifying the very forces that either killed their colleagues or tortured them or iailed them. What a shame. Such a short memory. Time has come to name and shame them." Lone tweeted.

FMG's Demand More Internship Seats In J&K

Srinagar: Foreign Medical Graduates (FMGs) from Jammu & Kashmir who passed their exams in June 2024 are facing a critical shortage of internship seats in Government Medical Colleges (GMCs) across the union territory.

Several FMGs expressed their frustrations citing poor management by the Jammu and Kashmir Medical Council (JKMC) as a key factor in their predicament. Many are anxious about missing the opportunity to sit for the NEET PG exam in 2025.

The graduates said the Council's delayed responses and inadequate planning are jeopardising their careers and that they fear losing another year and a half. Despite the National Medical Commission (NMC) issuing clear guidelines earlier this year to accommodate students, the JKMC's slow and ineffective actions have

compounded our challenges, they said.

The council recently advised students to register in other states, but many of these states had already closed their weeks earlier, registration leaving FMG graduates confused and distressed.

"We cannot afford to waste more time due to administrative incompetence," one student said.

The FMGs are urging the Jammu and Kashmir Medical Council to act swiftly to rectify the situation or risk further damage to the reputation of medical education in the state.

The All India Students Union has formally written to the Health and Medical Education Department of J&K, calling for the urgent need for more internship seats. "Despite clearing the Foreign Medical Graduate Examination (FMGE), approximately 120 doctors are currently unable to secure internship

placements. With only 20 seats confirmed by JKMC, the FMGs have been directed to seek internships in other states (as per JKMC notice no. JKMC/S/ NOTICE/2024/4312 dated 28-09-2024)," the letter states.

The letter further notes that many states have already closed their registration and counselling deadlines, while others refuse placement to non-domicile FMGs, leaving these graduates with no viable options to complete their internships and delaying their careers.

"We respectfully request vour intervention to increase the number of internship seats in J&K, either through placements in nonteaching hospitals or by raising the FMG intern quota as a one-time measure. This will allow these graduates to fulfill their mandatory internships and contribute to healthcare in the region," it concludes.(KNO)

Anantnag Police Busts Major Interstate Drug Racket

Anantnag: In a significant operation, Anantnag Police have dismantled a major interstate drug trafficking network, arresting three individuals involved in the illicit trade. Acting on credible intelligence about a consignment of narcotic drugs being transported from Delhi to Srinagar, Police established multiple checkpoints along the route. A vehicle was intercepted at Doonipora Sangam, leading

to the arrest of three suspects. The arrested individuals, identified as Monty Singh of Bulandshahar, UP, Ashish Bardawaj, and Rahul from Chhatarpur, New Delhi, were travelling in a Toyota car. Upon inspection, Police recovered 413 bottles of Codeine Phosphate (NRX), branded as Codril-T, concealed in the car's door panels.

The consignment was reportedly intended for delivery in Sopore and Srinagar. Following further investigations, multiple raids were conducted, resulting in the detention of a local smuggler from Sopore for questioning. Cooperation with the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) in New Delhi led to a raid at a warehouse in Noida's Sector 135, where a substantial quantity of Codeine was recovered.

There's Always An Element Of Attrition **To India: Cummins**

Australia captain Pat Cummins is expecting the upcoming series against India to be a survival of the fittest as his team look to avenge consecutive losses on home soil when the two nations go head-to-head over five tests from late November.

The latest series begins in Perth on November 22 with the Australians attempting to overturn defeats to the Indians in 2018-19 and 2020-21, when India edged a four-Test series 2-1 with a three-wicket win in the final clash in Brisbane.

"The couple of home series I've played against India there's

always an element of attrition to them," said Cummins. "The last series came down to the last session at the Gabba on the last day of the last test match.

"That's a good thing to keep in mind. It is a long series, and it might be tightly held until the last game, so you've got to manage your resources throughout."

It is almost 10 years since the Australians last lifted the Border-Gavaskar Trophy and Cummins will go into the series well rested having missed his nation's recent white ball tour of England and Scotland.

The Australians will be without fast bowler Cameron Green due to back surgery and Cummins, who had injury issues earlier in his career, is backing the 25-year-old to return to the team in the future.

"We want him bowling, Cam wants to be bowling, and he has a long career ahead of him," said Cummins.

"It's about trying to place Cam the cricketer in the best position he can be to have the career that he's hoping for. He's young, so I'm sure he'll be right in the long run."

Cummins' management of his own workload means the 31-year-old is hoping he can continue to captain Australia for longer than originally intended, having set 2025 as his intended cut-off when he was handed the role three years ago.

Brook Has Everything To Be England's Finest: Anderson

MULTAN: England batter Harry Brook has all the attributes needed to overtake the country's highest run-scorer in test cricket, Joe Root, and former top order batter Kevin Pietersen, bowling great James Anderson

The 25-year-old Brook became the first England batter in 34 years to score a triple-century when his side thrashed Pakistan by an innings and 47 runs on the fifth day of their opening test of the three-match series in Multan on Friday.

Root, 33, made a double ton during the same test, placing him fifth on the all-time list

"He's on the way to being in the top three that I've played with," Anderson said on the Tailenders podcast on Friday. "It's Root, Pietersen and him. He's definitely got all the attributes to overtake them.

"He's just got everything. Without trying to big him up too much because he's still really early in his test career, I do think that he's got the perfect amount of each of those two and that's what will make him the best that we've ever had."

Anderson, 42, retired in July



after finishing his 188th test and having taken 704 wickets in a career spanning 21 years, during which he became the third-highest wicket-taker in the format.

Having played with Root and Pietersen, Anderson believes Brook has the temperament and technique of the former.

"But he's got the shots of both Root and Pietersen. He can destroy an attack if he wants to, he can play a longer innings if he needs to," Anderson added.

"The thing that's really similar between Root and Brook is that they love batting. They literally couldn't care less what format it is. They just want to bat.

"They want to have fun doing it. As much as Brook's the younger player and will be learning loads from Rooty, I still think Rooty learns from him as well."
