

Srinagar: The Rules Committee constituted by the Speaker of J&K Legislative Assembly is set to hold its second meeting in Jammu on Tuesday (January 7) for framing Rules of Procedure & Conduct of Business for the House.

J&K Assembly Moots Proposal To Go Paperless

MLAs, MPs To Attend 3-day Session In Jammu

Srinagar: Experts from Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha and senior Parliamentarians are expected to attend a three days orientation programme for the MLAs of Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly in Jammu which is scheduled to be held from January 9-11.

One session has been exclusively devoted to the National e-Vidhan Project (NeVA) aimed at making the Legislature paperless.

There are 51 newly elected MLAs among a total of 88 legislators in the House of 90 in the Union Territory. Reportedly Legislative Assembly Speaker Abdul Rahim Rather has taken up the issue with senior experts of Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha and sent letters to the Secretariat of both the Houses through the Assembly inviting them to the orientation course. New Delhi: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday said that through the PM Kisan Samman Nidhi, farmers have received approximately Rs 3 lakh crore in financial assistance. Noting that over the past 10 years, the amount of agricultural loans has increased by 3.5 times, he mentioned that now livestock and fish farmers are being provided with Kisan Credit Cards.

Jammu: Meandering through the Himalayas and snowcapped mountains, the first trial train successfully ran on the Katra-Banihal section on Saturday, in a crucial step towards the final statutory safety inspection next week to determine the commencement of rail services to Kashmir.

The Railways has conducted six trials over the past month on various segments of the track, including major milestones such as India's first cable-stayed rail bridge, the Anji Khad Bridge, and the iconic arch bridge over the Chenab at Kauri - the world's highest railway bridge.

"Under the safety trials, we conducted today's trial.

We were part of this run, and it was successful," Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) of Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla Railway Link (USBRL) Sandeep Gupta told reporters.

He said that the Commissioner of Railway Safety would conduct statutory inspections and trials on January 7 and 8.

"After that, the commissioner will submit a report, which will guide further action on starting train services to Kashmir," he said.

"Everything has worked well so far. We will return to Katra at a speed of 75 kmph. When the Commissioner of Railway Safety conducts trials, they will be at 110 kmph. This trial is in preparation for that," Gupta added.

Overview of Drug Abuse in Colleges

Studies have indicated that drug abuse is not a new phenomenon in Kashmir's educational institutions. A recent survey highlighted a lifetime prevalence of substance abuse at 31.3% among college students in the region, with male students predominantly affected. However, the increasing involvement of female students in substance use highlights a worrying development that demands immediate attention.

The Surge in Drug Use Among Women

Recent reports from Jammu and Kashmir have revealed a significant rise in substance abuse among women. Estimates suggest that between 3,000 and 4,000 women in the valley are now struggling with drug addiction. These figures, while encompassing women from diverse backgrounds, underline a growing problem that is increasingly visible in college campuses.

Data from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment in the Lok Sabha states that in J&K, 36,000 women consume cannabis, 8,000 are addicted to opioids such as heroin, opium as well as pharmaceutical opioids like Codeine, Tramadol, Spasmoproxyvon and Tapentadol, and sedative addiction is prevalent among over 8,000 women.

Over the past three years, anecdotal evidence and limited studies suggest that drug use among female college students has increased substantially. The stigma traditionally associated with female drug abuse in conservative societies like Kashmir appears to be eroding, leading to a greater acceptance of risky behaviors among young women.

Why Women are Taking to Drug Abuse

The reasons behind this upward trend are multifaceted. Increased exposure to modern lifestyles, peer pressure, psychological stress, and socio-political instability are key contributors.

Many young women in Kashmir are reportedly turning to drugs as a coping mechanism to deal with mental health issues such as anxiety, depression, and trauma. According to, 'Life in conflict: Characteristics of Depression in Kashmir', published by the International Journal of Health Services, the prevalence of depression in Kashmir is 55.72%. The highest is 66.67% in the 15 to 25 age



group, followed by 65.33% in the 26 to 35 age group. "In rural areas the prevalence of depression among females is higher (93.10%) as compared to males (6.8%)."

The social implications of this rise in substance abuse are far-reaching. Not only does it jeopardize the educational and professional futures of these students, but it also places an additional burden on families and communities already grappling with the region's complex socio-political challenges.

Various news reports have also highlighted the difficulty for women to access de-addiction facilities due to stigma and lack of women-centric treatment with separate wards. This means that it is often difficult for women to get out of the cycle of addiction even if they wish to do so.

Very often, women are forced into drug addiction by their peers or male partners. Studies carried out by UNODC (United Nations Office of Drugs and Crime), have time and again highlighted the close relationship between drug abuse and intimate partner violence as well. This means that even if women do or do not take drugs, if their partners or close male members are taking drugs, they become vulnerable to domestic and physical abuse.

The high cost of opioids also puts women in danger as they end up putting themselves in vulnerable positions to acquire drugs. This has also pushed some women into drug trafficking, making women more susceptible to crime.

Need for Targeted Action

Addressing the issue requires a multi-pronged approach. Comprehensive research into the extent and causes of drug use among female students is urgently needed. Awareness campaigns targeting students, parents, and educators can help destigmatize conversations around mental health and addiction. Furthermore, the establishment of counseling centers and rehabilitation programs tailored to young women is critical in mitigating this growing crisis.

Conclusion

The rise in drug abuse among female college students in Kashmir is a wake-up call for policymakers, educators, and community leaders. Without swift and targeted interventions, the future of many young individuals and the broader societal fabric may be at risk. A collective effort is essential to curb this troubling trend and ensure a healthier and more prosperous future for the region.

The Man Who Relaunched India

he passing of Manmohan Singh, India's prime minister from 2004 to 2014, has led to an unexpected eruption of nostalgia and appreciation. Singh's modesty and low-key style made it easy for many to overlook his achievements in boosting India's economic growth and elevating its global standing. His death, at 92, has thrown a spotlight on an impressive record.

Singh will be remembered as one of the world's most important – and most unlikely – political leaders. I first met him in the late 1980s in the East Delhi housing complex where my family lived at the time. Singh had finished his term as governor of the Reserve Bank of India and was looking to buy a simple apartment in our locality. A friend of mine called to ask if he could bring Singh to see ours.

Singh came and met us and chatted with my mother. But he never moved to the area, because soon thereafter he was appointed secretary-general of the South Commission in Geneva; and, after that, in 1991, he became India's finance minister. In 2004, my mother called me, excitedly informing me that the soft-spoken, unassuming Singh had just become India's Prime Minister.


In 2009, when I was chair of the economics department at Cornell, Singh invited me – quite out of the blue – to join his government as chief economic adviser. I agreed, but only if he assured me regular, direct access to him. He said he would, and he did. I met with him about once a month and got to know him well during nearly three years in his government.

By that point, Singh had already laid the groundwork of India's economic liberalization, with the most important reforms carried out between 1991 to 1993, when he was finance minister. The transformative effect was evident from the subsequent acceleration in India's economic growth. India's early investment in the sciences and engineering during this period nurtured talent not only in research and development but also in corporate leadership and policymaking.

In 2005, when he visited Delhi's Jawaharlal Nehru University, well-known for left-wing activism, students with black flags turned out to protest. The university authorities were embarrassed and furious, and offered to take strong action against the students. Show-cause orders were sent to some students, and the Delhi police also detained some.

It was Singh who intervened on the students' behalf, arguing that they were exercising their "democratic rights." Later, in a speech at the university, he quoted the famous aphorism attributed to Voltaire: "Every member of a university community, if he or she wishes to aspire to be worthy of the university, must accept the truth of Voltaire's classic statement: 'I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it.' That idea must be the cornerstone of a liberal institution."

It was also a cornerstone of Singh's own political career. Because he took ethics seriously, he insisted on the highest standard of honesty. When, in 2010, inflation was raging and some bureaucrats suggested that it might be best not to hurt his political standing by releasing so much price data, he put his foot down, insisting there should be no compromise on statistical transpar-



G G Singh will be remembered as one of the world's most important – and most unlikely – political leaders. I first met him in the late 1980s in the East Delhi housing complex where my family lived at the time ency, even if it dented his poll numbers.

This raises a puzzling question. In a world where political success seems to depend so much on intrigue, dissimulation, and subterfuge, how did such a person make it to the top?

My belief is that he would not have made it on his own. It was the political leadership of the time that recognized the need for a person of his talents to have the space to craft and implement seemingly unpopular economic policies. This space was provided by then-Prime Minister Narasimha Rao's appointment of Singh as finance minister in 1991, by Congress party leader Sonia Gandhi appointing him as prime minister in 2004, and Singh's finance minister, Pranab Mukherjee, who worked closely with him from 2004 to 2014 and managed much of the politics.

This enabled him not only to design necessary economic reforms, but also to implement reforms which bolstered India's democracy, such as the Right to Information Act and the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act of 2005, which gave ordinary citizens some potential levers to hold the newly liberalizing state accountable.

It was this pairing of politics and professional acumen that put India on its upward economic trajectory, and it was Singh who embodied it. Indians today are far better off as a result and, recognizing this, are bestowing well-deserved praise on him and his legacy.

Raindrops on the windows of my jet mimicked those I had seen so many times in Kashmir.

Upon entering the Dublin airport, as I went through immigration, I couldn't help but notice the officer's perplexed expression as he inspected my passport. A long gap ensued, causing my heart to rush. But then, with a polite "Welcome and have a good day," he handed it back to me, and I felt relieved.

When I finished collecting my luggage, I stepped outdoors and was greeted by a cold breeze that sent chills down my spine. I felt both the weight of my travel and the joy of

the new beginning ahead.

After four or five months of separation, I was eventually reunited with my husband. His relief reflected mine as we loaded the baggage into the car and headed to Quinn. The long journey from Dublin to Quinn was a revelation in itself. As we drove our way through the Irish countryside, I couldn't take my eyes off the vast landscapes, the fog-laden trees, and the misty windows of the car from the early morning cold.

Train Makes First

The train reached Banihal railway station around 1:30 pm, officials said.

Gupta, along with officials from USBRL Northern Railway, and construction companies, was onboard.

The USBRL project aims to provide rail connectivity between the Kashmir Valley and the rest of the country.

The Anji Khad Bridge, featuring a single pylon rising 331 m above the riverbed, is another engineering milestone achieved under the USBRL project.

Described as a "true engineering marvel", the bridge has 48 cables on its lateral and central spans. Construction of the pylon began in 2017, with the structure now standing 191 m above its foundation level.

It is the second-highest railway bridge after the iconic arch bridge over the Chenab at Kauri, which is the world's highest railway bridge at 359 metres above the riverbed - 35 m taller than the Eiffel Tower in Paris.

The Anji Khad Bridge has a total length of 473.25 m, with the viaduct spanning 120 m and the central embankment measuring 94.25 m.

In November, Minister of State for Railways Ravneet Singh announced that Prime Minister Narendra Modi is likely to inaugurate the Vande Bharat train connecting Kashmir to New Delhi on the USBRL project in January.

With the expected commissioning of train services in phases, the Railways will complete 255 km of the 272-kilometre USBRL project, leaving only a small stretch between Katra and Reasi to be finished by December.

adding, "Drug trafficking and abuse has continued its significant toll on valuable human lives and productive years of many persons around the globe.'

With the growth and development of the world economy, the court said the drug traffickers are also seamlessly trafficking various type of drugs from one corner to other ensuring availability of contrabands for vulnerable segment of society who fall into trap of drug peddlers and traffickers. "Due to India's close proximity with major opium growing areas of the region, India is facing serious menace of drug trafficking and as a spill-over effect, drug abuse especially among the youth is a matter of concern for us," the court said.

The Constitution framers, the court said, had visualised danger of misuse of such type of substances and, thus, made it part of directives issued to the State.

"The Directive Principles, which are part of our Constitution, lay down that the State shall make endeavours to bring about the prohibition of substances injurious for health except for medicinal and scientific purposes. In recent years, India has been facing a problem of transit traffic in illicit drugs," the court said, adding, "The spill over from such traffic has caused tribulations of abuse and addiction." This trend has created an illicit demand for drugs within the country, the court said. 'The illicit traffic in narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances poses a serious threat to the health and welfare of the people and activities of persons engaged in such illicit traffic have a deleterious effect on the national economy as well," the court said, adding, "Having regard to the persons by whom and the manner in which such activities are organised and carried on, and having regard to the fact that in certain areas which are highly vulnerable to the illicit traffic in narcotic drugs, such activities of a considerable magnitude are clandestinely organised and carried on, it is necessary for the effective prevention of such activities to provide for detention of persons concerned in any manner therewith."

The Met office said a moderate to strong western disturbance was likely to affect Jammu and Kashmir and light to moderate snow at most places was possible, with the peak activity from Saturday night to Monday morning.

There is a possibility of heavy snow over the middle and the higher reaches of Kashmir and the Chenab valley from Saturday night to

Sunday late night or Monday morning. The Met has issued a 'yellow' alert for Saturday. An 'orange' warning has been issued for Sunday when there is a possibility of widespread snowfall with heavy snow at isolated places.

Meanwhile, the night temperature rose at most places in Kashmir.

In Srinagar, the mercury settled at a low of minus 1.6 degrees Celsius, slightly up from the previous night's minus 2.2 degrees, the Met said. Gulmarg recorded a low of minus 2.2 degrees

Celsius, up from the previous night's minus 4.5 degrees.

Pahalgam registered a minimum of minus 2.6 degrees Celsius.

Qazigund logged a minimum temperature of minus 6.6 degrees Celsius and was the coldest place in the valley, while Konibal in Pampore town recorded a low of minus 2.6 degrees.

Kupwara in north Kashmir registered minus 2.2 degrees Celsius while Kokernag in south Kashmir recorded minus 5.8 degrees.

Kashmir is currently under the grip of 'Chillai-Kalan' -- the harshest period of winter -- that began on December 21. During the 40 days of 'Chillai-Kalan', the chances of snowfall are the highest and the temperature drops considerably.

Project NeVA is aimed at digitization and making the Legislature paperless. It is part of the Digital India Initiative and is led by the Union Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs.

Several Legislatures across the country have already gone paperless. However, the Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly also planned to implement the project. Worthwhile to mention here that there was no Legislature from the middle of 2018 to 2024 till Assembly elections were held in Jammu and Kashmir in September-October and the first session of the House was held from November 4-8.

"Project NeVA is of paramount importance to enable transparent, efficient and technologically advanced legislative process in both the Legislative Assembly complexes at Jammu and Srinagar for which a training/introductory session is required to be held. For the purpose, an expert Resource Person is required to be deputed," the Legislative Assembly communiqué addressed to the Secretary Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs, read.

It said that Chief Minister Omar Abdullah and Assembly Speaker Abdul Rahim Rather are very keen to implement Project NeVA in the Jammu and Kashmir Assembly at the earliest.

Besides Project NeVA, the orientation course is aimed at briefing the new MLAs on functioning of the Legislature and how to take up the business in the Legislature including raising questions, issues of public importance, bills, resolutions etc. Focus will be on 51 new MLAs belonging to different political parties in the Legislature.

The orientation course comes ahead of budet session of the Legislature scheduled to be held in the middle of February.

According to him, the weather would remain generally cloudy with possibility of dry weather from January 7 to 10 while from January 11 & 12, there is a possibility of light snow at isolated to scattered places.

Ahmad said the weather would remain generally dry from January 13-15.

According to the details shared by MeT, the yellow and orange warnings have been issued for tomorrow (January 05). The orange warning has been issued for the areas including Bandipora, Kupwara, Ganderbal, Shopian, Kulgam and Ramban while the yellow alert has been issued Baramulla, Kishtwar and Doda.

For January 6, the MeT has issued yellow warning for Anantnag, Kishtwar, Doda, Ramban, Kulgam and Shopian.

As per the details, the yellow warning signals to be aware while the orange warning signals to be prepared and updated.

There could be temporary disruption of surface and air transportation, particularly on Sunday, it warned.

Lastly, the court said the commercial establishments in the area be asked to install the solid waste management treatment plants as per the norms in their premises so that all nonbiodegradable waste is disposed of.

Essentially, the court said, there are four aspects to the Sonamarg area. The first is the attraction of the meadows in the Sonamarg. "The very name, Sonamarg, reflects its actual nature, in the sense that it means 'golden meadow

The second aspect which needs immediate attention is the Thajiwas Glacier, the court had said

The third aspect which also requires immediate concern is the Thajiwas Wildlife Sanctuary and the associated forest areas, the court had further said. Lastly, the court had said that the fourth area of concern, which is often neglected, is the Sindh River which passes through Sonamarg.

The consequences of drug use, the court said, usually are not limited to user and often extend to the user's family and the greater community.

"The consequences of illicit drug use impact the entire criminal justice system, taxing resources at each stage of the arrest, adjudication, incarceration and post release supervision process," the court said, adding, "It impacts productivity. It causes premature mortality, illness, injury leading to incapacitation and imprisonment all serve to directly reduce national productivity. Public financial resources expended in the areas of health care and criminal justice as a result of illegal drug trafficking and use are resources which could otherwise be available for other policy initiatives."

The global drug problem presents a multifaceted challenge that touches the lives of millions worldwide, the court said. "From individuals struggling with substance use disorders to communities grappling with the consequences of drug trafficking and organized crime, the impact of drugs is far reaching and complex."

There is a great loss of productivity associated with drug-related premature mortality, the court underlined.

"Although it is difficult to place a dollar value on a human life, a rough calculation of lost productivity can be made based on the present discounted value of a person's lifetime earnings," the court said, adding, "There are also health-related productivity losses. An individual who enters a residential drug treatment program or is admitted to a hospital for drug treatment becomes incapacitated and is removed from the labor force." The court made the observations while upholding the PSA detention of an alleged drug peddler Hilal Ahmad Dar of Kupwara.

Diet Plays Vital Role In Fertility For Both Men, Women: Doctors

SRINAGAR: Medical experts have said diet impacts fertility in both men and women by influencing overall reproductive health, hormonal balance and the quality of sperm and eggs.

Dr Tabasum, a gynaecologist at the Directorate of Health Services Kashmir (DHSK) said nutrition plays a crucial role in fertility. "Diet directly affects hormonal balance, sperm quality, egg health, and the overall reproductive system in both men and women," she said

She highlighted the importance of omega-3 fatty acids, found in foods like fish, nuts and seeds, which help regulate hormones. "However, excessive sugar and high-glycemic-index carbohydrates can lead to insulin resistance, disrupting ovulation and hormonal balance," she added.

Dr Tabasum said there is a link between body weight and reproductive health. She explained that maintaining a healthy weight through a balanced diet is crucial, as both obesity and being underweight can interfere with ovulation and sperm production.

"Fruits and vegetables rich in vitamins C and E, zinc and selenium can reduce oxidative stress. which may harm sperm and egg cells," she said, adding that iron is vital for ovulation and reducing the risk of ovulatory infertility, while vitamin D supports reproductive hormone production, with its deficiency potentially leading to infertility.

Dr Tajamul, another gynaecologist, said that lifestyle choices play a critical role in fertility. "Excessive alcohol and caffeine consumption can negatively impact fertility, while trans fats found in processed foods impair insulin sensitivity and ovulation," he said. For men, Dr Tajamul said a diet rich in antioxidants and zinc are rich in antioxidants and can im-

prove sperm quality. He advised avoiding processed meats and excessive soy products, which can disrupt testosterone levels. "A low-glycemic-index diet can help manage insulin levels and improve ovulation in women with polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS)," he added.

Both doctors stressed the importance of a diet that includes a variety of fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins and healthy fats. They recommended limiting processed foods, sugary drinks, and trans fats while incorporating fertility-boosting foods into daily meals.

"For better reproductive health and to avoid infertility, people must adopt a nutrient-rich diet and avoid unhealthy eating habits that disrupt the body's natural balance," the doctors said-(KNO)



He will take no further part in the Test against the Proteas at Cape Town.

The Pakistan Cricket Board said on Saturday that MRIs and other tests were carried out on him and the doctors have advised Saim six weeks rest.

Saim had hurt his ankle while fielding on the boundary on the first day of the second Test against South Africa on Friday.

Saim's fractured ankle has been put in an Ankle Medical Moon Boot as part of his rehabilitation process.

Hence, He is also certain to miss the two-Test series at home against the West Indies later this month and also the tri-series with South Africa and New Zealand in February before the Champions Trophy, starting across Pakistan and Dubai from February 19.

Saim could be replaced by discarded opener Imam-ul-Haq for the Tests and Fakhar Zaman for the ODIs.

LaLiga Again Denies Barcelona's **Request To Register Olmo**

The Spanish league and Spain's soccer federation on Saturday again denied Barcelona's request to register Dani Ölmo and Pau Víctor for the rest of the season.
