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
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Pandrethan Tragedy The Cost Of Warmth In Kashmir's Harsh Winters

Srinagar: Ghulam Mohammad Bhat, his body frail and his mind clouded with worry, sits alone in his home in Boniyar. He remains unaware of the tragedy that has befallen his son, daughter-in-law, and grandchildren. Unbeknownst to him, they are gone, victims of the invisible killer - carbon monoxide - that crept into their rented room in

Ajaz Ahmad Bhat, his wife Saleema, and their three young children - Areeba, Hamza, and a month-old infant succumbed to toxic fumes apparently from an electric blower on Sunday.

"I pray to God that my family members regain their senses soon. I want to see them, but I can't stand or walk," Ajaz's father, Ghulam Mohammad said. The family had moved

to Pandrathan, Srinagar, two months ago in search of better opportunities. Ajaz worked as a chef at a prominent hotel, striving to provide a brighter future for his children.

The tragic incident came to light when Ajaz's sister, unable to reach him by phone, contacted the house owner, Mukhtar Ahmad. "She called me, saying Ajaz had not responded since 4 PM. I sent | More on P6

Prime Minister Srinagar: Narendra Modi on Monday virtually inaugurated the new Jammu Railway Division, calling it a historic milestone in the development of Jammu and Kashmir's connectivity and infrastructure.

Addressing the nation during the ceremony, PM Modi congratulated the people of Jammu and Kashmir, saying, "Integration of I&K into the national railway network is a monumental step towards transforming Indian Railways into a global leader in efficiency, speed, and passenger experience.

Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla Railway Link (USBRL) project is a landmark achievement that demonstrates India's

engineering excellence Highlighting the feats of modern engineering, he said, "India's first cable-stayed rail bridge, the Anji Khad Bridge, and the iconic arch bridge over the Chenab River-the world's highest railway bridge-are marvels that

are making waves globally." The Prime Minister emphasized that the new Jammu Railway Division would not only benefit the people of Jammu and Kashmir but also extend



Pradesh, Punjab, and Ladakh.

PM Modi described the inauguration as a symbol of India's collective progress un-der the vision of "Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas," filling colors in the dream of 'Vikshit Bharat' (Developed India).

"To achieve Vikshit Bharat, it is essential to develop Indian Railways," he said, adding that the past decade has witnessed a transformational change in

ization, enhanced connectivity, and improved facilities for

passengers. He stated that the government has laid more than 30,000 kilometers of new railway tracks in the last 10 years, nearing 100% electrification, compared to just 35% in 2014. Additionally, he noted that the country has eliminated all manual crossings

on broad-gauge tracks. "Today is a big day for new-age entire nation is moving forward

together," PM Modi remarked. The Prime Minister stressed that new railway divisions, terminals, and modernized stations are creating unprecedented opportunities for trade, business, and employment.

"The development of railways is creating lakhs of job opportunities. In the last 10 years, lakhs of youth have been employed in the railways, and initiatives

like Gati Shakti University will further enhance the workforce's skillset," he said.

Referring to the strides in high-speed train services, PM Modi noted that more than 50 Vande Bharat trains are now operational, connecting long distances in shorter times and setting a benchmark for modern Indian trains.

'The time is not far when bullet trains will traverse across the country, making railway journeys memorable," he added.

Handwara-Bungus Road Environmental Violations

NGT Directs Secretary PWD To Appear In Person

Srinagar: The National Green Tribunal -NGT has sought the personal appearance of Administrative Secretary of Public Works Department -PWD I&K in connection with a petition filed regarding alleged environmental destruction on Handwara -Bungus Road in north Kashmir's Kupwara district.

The three member Principal Bench of Justice Prakash Srivastava (Chairperson) Justice Sudhir Aggarwal (Judicial Member) and Dr A Senthiol Vel (Expert Member) while hearing the petition filed by Rasikh Rasool Bhat -lawyer and RTI activist from Handwara has directed Administrative Secretary PWD I&K Govt to be present before the NGT on next date of hearing -i.e. 22.04.2025

The petitioner Advocate Rasikh Rasool has alleged that there have been environmental violations during the execution of the Handwara-Bungus road project. The NGT has been hearing this case for almost one year.

" I was forced to move to NGT as the Govt failed to act on my repeated pleas. The PWD R&B Handwara as well as PWD R&B Administrative Department failed to respond to an earlier notice issued on February 21, 2024" said Rasikh Rasool.

Srinagar: Chief Minister Omar Abdullah on Monday said post-snowfall restoration work in the valley was underway in full swing and being closely monitored.



IIT-Guwahati Develops Advanced Nanotechnology For Cholesterol, Triglyceride Detection

esearchers at Indian Institute of Technology (IIT), Guwahati have developed an innovative approach to improve the detection of cholesterol and triglycerides by integrating Surface-Enhanced Raman Scattering (SERS) on the nanoscale objects, officials said.

The findings of the research were recently published in the noted journal --Biosensors and Bioelectronics.

According to Dipankar Bandyopadhyay, Professor at Centre for Nanotechnology and Department of Chemical Engineering, IIT-Guwahati, the work utilises bimetallic nanostructures that are 10,000 times thinner than the width of a human hair for the highfidelity detection of the biomarkers in the human blood.

"The metabolic biomolecules like cholesterol and triglycerides play pivotal role in maintaining a harmonious cardiovascular health of a human body. The high (HDL) and low (LDL) density lipoproteins transport cholesterol to the cellular sites for various metabolic activities," he said.

Bandyopadhyay explained an imbalance of LDL and HDL causes arterial plaque formation leading to hypertension, formation of blood clots, or isch-

On the other hand, triglycerides (TGA) transform into fatty acids and glycerol during digestion which in turn is packaged inside lipoproteins namely very low-density lipoprotein (VLDL), for

transportation to the cells. An elevated level of triglycerides leads to atherosclerosis and coronary artery disease, pancreatitis, type 2 diabetes, or fatty liver, he said.

"Therefore, the timely detection of any abnormality and a close monitoring of cholesterol and triglyceride levels in blood is highly sought for. While traditional lipid profile tests of blood are reliable, they often require laboratory settings, are not available as a pointof-care solution, and can take time to provide results," he said.

IIT-Guwahati claimed that their researchers have focused on a technique that combines nanotechnology and molecular detection, which can further be translated into a point-of-care as device with an enhanced diagnostic

"The researchers employ SERS active bimetallic nanostructures - the silver shelled gold nanorods, which enable a plasmonic resonance hybridisation of silver and gold to produce augmented spectral resolutions as compared to pristine silver or gold nanorods.

"Subsequently, these bimetallic nanorods are linked to two different Raman active receptors and immobilised with the enzymes cholesterol oxidase and lipase for concurrent detection of different concentrations of cholesterol and triglycerides. Such innovations help in the development of a platform for the ultrafast pointof-care detection kit with a higher level of the detection sensitivity," Bandyopadhyay said.

A Quarter Of Indian Population Can Access Stroke Facility In An Hour

oughly a fourth of the Indian population has access to a rehabilitation centre within an hour of experiencing an ischaemic strokecaused when a blood clot affects supply to the brain, a study found. The research, published in the International Journal of Stroke, also estimated that there is less than one ischaemic stroke centre per million population.

Ischaemic stroke is the most common, accounting for about 70-80 per cent of all strokes in India, according to a September 2024 study, published in the journal Scientific Reports.

In the recent study, researchers, including those from the US' Ascension Health and All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Hyderabad, found that a total of 566 stroke centres equipped with the 'intravenous thrombolysis' method of treatment (which breaks up



blood clots) were spread across 26 states and union territories. Of the 566, over 60 per cent (361) were found to be also equipped

with endovascular therapy for stroke patients, considered superior.

Typically, an ischaemic stroke patient was 115 kilometres away from the nearest intravenous thrombolysis treatment centre and about 130 kilometres away from the nearest endovascular therapy centre, the researchers found.

Further, a little over 26 per cent of the Indian population can access intravenous thrombolysis centre in under an hour, while about a fifth can access endovascular therapy centre.

The data on "intravenous thrombolysis capable (IVT-C) and endovascular treatment capable (EVT-C)" stroke centres were collected in March 2021 from medical devices and pharmaceutical industry providers. Time taken to drive to the nearest stroke care centre was estimated using the application 'Google Distance Matrix API'.

"Access within one hour to an IVT-C and an EVT-C centre was available to 26.3 per cent and 20.6 per cent of the Indian population, respectively," the authors wrote.

The average stroke centres per million (SCPM) population was 0.41 and 0.26 for IVT-C and EVT-C, respectively," they wrote.

Further, "median (typical) distances to the nearest IVT-C and EVT-C centres were 115 kilometres and 131 kilometres, respectively."

Diet, lifestyle influences chances of age-related brain disorders: Study

The scientists at the Allen Institute for Brain Science have identified the molecular changes that occur in the brains of ageing mice and located a hot spot where most damage is centralized. The cells in the area are aWlso connected with metabolism, thus suggesting a connection between diet and brain health.

Scientists at the Allen Institute have identified specific cell types in the brains of mice that undergo major changes as they age, along with a specific hot spot where many of those changes occur. The discoveries are published in the journal Nature.

The study found that in ageing brains, genes associated with inflammation increased in activity while those related to neuronal structure and function decreased.

"Our hypothesis is that those cell types are getting less efficient at integrating signals from our environment or from things that we're consuming," said Kelly Jin, Ph.D., a scientist at the Allen Institute for Brain Science and lead author of the study.

"And that loss of efficiency somehow contributes to what we know as ageing in the rest of our body. I think that's pretty amazing, and I think it's remarkable that we're able to find those very specific changes with the methods that we're using."

Avoid Unvented Gas Heaters: Doctors

Srinagar: Medical experts have issued a stern warning against the use of unvented gas heaters in closed spaces, saying these could cause fatalities due to carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. They have urged the people to take the dangers seriously, particularly in light of recent tragic incidents, including one in Pandrethan, Srinagar.

Dr Murtaza Ahmad, a doctor at the Directorate of Health Services Kashmir (DHSK) said that unvented gas heaters emit combustion byproducts like carbon monoxide, which can accumulate to lethal levels in poorly ventilated rooms. "Carbon monoxide poisoning is a grave risk associated with these heaters. The best way to prevent such deaths is to stop using unvented gas heaters altogether and switch to vented alternatives," he said.

Dr Ahmad said that if unvented gas heaters are still used, they should only be operated in rooms with adequate ventilation and never in bedrooms, bathrooms, or enclosed spaces. "These heaters lack a chimney to vent harmful combustion products outside. As a result, toxic pollutants like carbon monoxide remain inside the room, posing a severe threat," he explained.

Carbon monoxide, dubbed a "silent killer", is undetectable by sight, smell or taste. Victims

often become unconscious during sleep without realising the danger. Vulnerable groups, including children, the elderly, pregnant women, and those with chronic health conditions, are at greater risk.

Dr Showkat Ahmad from GMC Anantnag called for avoiding unvented gas heaters. He and other exdescribed telltale signs of suffocation, including small red or purple splotches in the eyes, face, and neck and petechial haemorrhages in the lungs. Other symptoms include shortness of breath, slow heart rate, hoarseness, sore throat, confusion, loss of consciousness, nosebleeds and visual changes.

"Prolonged exposure to CO can cause symptoms such as headache, dizziness, nausea and confusion. In severe cases, it can be fatal," Dr Showkat said, adding that nitrogen dioxide, another byproduct of combustion, can irritate the respiratory system and worsen conditions like asthma.

Dr Irfan, another doctor at DHSK, said carbon monoxide is produced when fuels like gas, oil, coal, or wood do not burn completely. In poorly ventilated spaces, CO can reach dangerous levels, impairing the blood's ability to carry oxygen to vital organs. "Symptoms of CO poisoning include dizziness, headache, nausea, confusion, and, in severe cases, unconsciousness or death," he said.



'Illegal' Fishing Nets Threaten **Dal Lake's Biodiversity**

Srinagar: The Centre for Environmental Law (CEL), an independent environmental body in the Kashmir region, has appealed to the fisheries department to ensure compliance with existing bans and penalize violations through routine inspections and enforcement drives.

In a letter addressed to J&K's fisheries department, it highlights the reports of use of 'banned' fishing nets in the Dal Lake, stating that it was leading to injuries and trapping of migra-

The letter states that the use of these illegal nets was not only a violation of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, but also a direct threat to the region's biodiversity.

This unlawful practice has led to alarming instances of migratory birds being trapped and injured. These species, vital to the biodiversity of our region, are now at significant risk due to these activities," reads the letter.

The letter further states that the adverse impact of such actions extends beyond harming migratory birds, it disrupted the delicate ecological balance of Dal Lake, which was already under strain from various anthropogenic pressures.

The CEL in the letter has urged the fisheries department to take immediate measures, like conducting routine inspections to

ensure compliance with the ban and penalizing violators. It has also asked for community awareness programs, highlighting to educate the fishing community about the environmental impact of their practices and promoting sustainable alternatives.

The CEL letter has also called for collaborative conservation efforts, calling for partnering with environmental organizations to develop longterm strategies for the protection of Dal Lake's wildlife.

"I trust that the Department of Fisheries will treat this issue with the urgency it demands and take immediate steps to mitigate the threats posed by the use of banned nets," reads the letter—(KNO)

Delete Sindh Add Kashmir To 'Jan Gan Man'?

Supreme Court Serves Notice To Government On National Anthem

EW DELHI- The Supreme Court Thursday sought the government's response to a petition seeking the deletion of the word "Sindh", now a part of Pakistan from India's national anthem and replace it with the word "Kashmir"

A bench comprising Chief Justice R. C. Lahoti and Judge G.P. Mathur issued notice to the government in response to public interest litigation filed by Sanieev Bhatnagar, a scientist and speed skating champion who represented India in the Asian Games

In September, the court while rejecting his plea had given the petitioner the liberty to draw the government's attention to this and then approach the court if no action was taken. According to the petitioner, who is also an advocate, approached

the court stating that the inclusion of the word Sindh in the national anthem was an infringement on the sovereignty of Pakistan. The inclusion of the word in the anthem for the past 54 sears had

also hurt the feelings of over one billion people in India, he claimed. Bhatnagar said the petition was being filed to avoid any future international dispute as such "flaws" in the anthem could bring dis-

honour and disrespect to the nation. He sought a direction for the deletion of the word Sindh from the anthem and its substitution with the word Kashmir. In response to his representation, the home ministry replied the

anthem was adopted by the Constituent Assembly Jan 24, 1950. At that time, Sindh had become a part of Pakistan and therefore the assembly was conscious of this fact.

"The word Sindh refers not mere to the province of Sindh but also to the Sindhi culture which is an inalienable part of the rich and diverse culture of India." the home ministry said.

"Moreover, the contribution of Sindhi people in the making of modern India has been extremely noteworthy and cannot be overlooked. It may not therefore be appropriate to delete the word Sindh from the national anthem. "Former deputy prime minister and senior Bharatiya Janata

Party (BJP) leader Advani is a member of the Sindhi community.

China's Fresh Virus Spike

hina is witnessing a surge in human metapneumovirus (HMPV) cases, another potential epidemic, which is overwhelming hospitals, raising concerns in the world. Like COVID-19, it causes respiratory symptoms like cough, fever, and shortness of breath. Although usually mild, it has been found to lead to severe complications in vulnerable groups such as infants, the elderly, and immunocompromised individuals. Like COVID-19 again, it has so far no specific vaccine or treatment, and authorities are recommending preventive measures like handwashing, mask-wearing, and social distancing to curb its spread.

The Chinese government, however, has stressed that the situation does not warrant alarm, and assured the public that the rise in HMPV cases are typical winter respiratory illnesses. The World Health Organization too has so far stopped short of declaring this viral infection a public health emergency. This means that the UN body doesn't think that the HMPV is likely to cause a pandemic. People have been urged to follow hygiene protocols and seek medical attention for severe symptoms.

India is closely monitoring the rise in cases in China. However, no unusual surge in respiratory illnesses has been reported within the country. The government has reassured the public that the country is well-prepared to manage respiratory illnesses, with recent preparedness drills confirming readiness. Health experts have advised standard precautions to address respiratory health concerns.

Last year, the world saw a brief spread of monkeypox, a contagious skin infection spread through close contact with someone who has symptoms. India also saw several cases but the epidemic soon died down. Let us hope that HMPV also ends soon. But we shouldn't take the infection lightly. This is how COVID-19 too had emerged in China in February 2020 and then in the blink of an eve spread through the world. More than 776.8 million cases and 7 million deaths from COVID-19 have been recorded globally since the pandemic began in early 2020, according to the latest data released by WHO. From January 2020 to November 2024, over 28.1 million COVID-19 hospitalizations were reported to WHO across 172 countries. The takeaway from the horrific COVID-19 experience is that we can't ignore the advent of any new infection. The world will be watching the HMPV, its severity and its spread in the weeks to come. In Kashmir, we experience many winter-related infections, some of them very severe, so we also need to take precautions. While the current surge in HMPV cases may not yet pose a global threat, it serves as a reminder of the need for vigilance, preparedness, and adherence to preventive measures to mitigate the risk of any potential health crisis.

I kicked back at my alltime favorite coffee shop, nervously waiting for them to call my friend's double espresso macchiato. I pleasantly sipped my tea with a tad bit of guilt. He sprung up, walked to the front, and asked about his drink. His order had been overlooked. He returned with his signature little coffee cup. My guilt turned to admiration.

As a woman, assertiveness is not something I have always valued or sought to develop. What others might call confidence, I feared would be viewed with judgments of nothing but privilege if I were to attempt.

My worries were not unfounded. Women experience a disproportionate amount of 'assertiveness backlash,' a construct that describes subtle and notso-subtle ways of punishing individual attempts to speak up. And it's not just a legend. Research supports this phenomenon. One recent study showed 223 participants videos of female and male agents showing varying levels of assertive gesturing as they spoke (Wessler et al., 2022). Even in this modest demonstration, the dominant females were rated less favorably than the dominant males.

Yet, time has shown me the value of resolute, clear, and direct communication. Initiative sometimes gets you your coffee. Rather than seeing assertiveness as "mean" or "bad," I have come to appreciate it. I have taken time to cultivate my style of assertiveness. What follows are four common misunderstandings about assertiveness and a new perspective. Assertiveness is not

bossiness: Bossy. Whether on the playground or in the office, many strong female leaders have unfairly been cast this unkind title (Ciancetta, 2018). Yet, assertiveness is not merely about telling others what to do, it's about being crystal in our communication, intentions and expectations

Assertiveness is clarity: When someone communicates directly, their message should ideally be heard loud and clear. Clarity is a gift. Understanding what someone is asking or

expressing is essential for effective communication, a key ingredient in professional and personal relationships.

Assertiveness is not judging others: Assertiveness is not about making harsh judgments of others. On the contrary, clear communication can prevent a buildup of resentment and prevent misunderstandings.

Assertiveness is honesty: Sometimes, to avoid clear assertiveness, people engage in indirect communication, specifically something that radically open dialectical behavioral therapy calls 'disguised demands' (Lynch, 2018). Disguised demands can take a range of forms, from little lies to feigned incompetence. These communication patterns tend to harm relationships and are often dishonest.

Assertiveness mean: The word 'assertive' brings to mind a picture of a person with hands on both hips while wearing an abrasive face. Yet confidence is often appreciated. When someone is assertive, we can communicate effectively. In addition, unlike passive aggression, assertiveness does not typically project guilt to the receiver.

Assertiveness is kindness: Assertiveness is an act of kindness to ourselves and others. Clear boundaries prevent burnout on both sides and show a sense of respect.

Assertiveness is not control: Unlike disguised demands, assertiveness is not about controlling other people's behaviors. Although we may make requests assertively, in the end, it is up to the other to decide whether or not to accept the rules of engagement that we are offering.

Assertiveness is about trust: Honest and direct communication is one of the most basic expressions of trust. By being truthful and clear, we show that we recognize the other person as a capable human.

Conclusion

If you are struggling with assertiveness, you are not alone. Steps like practicing honest, clear, and direct communication gradually can help to hone these skills. Psychotherapy also offers a setting to master assertiveness skills while challenging beliefs that could perpetuate a lack of assertiveness.

another tenant to check on them," Mukhtar said.
"When the tenant knocked and got no response, we forced the door open and found the entire family lifeless," Mukhtar recounted. Officials suspect suffocation caused by the electric blower, which likely depleted oxygen levels in the room.

Many say that the presence of a newborn likely heightened the family's efforts to maintain a warm environment within their rented accommodation. The desire for warmth, a basic human need, tragically turned into a deadly trap.

As the bodies were brought to their hometown (Gingle Uri) for burial, an atmosphere of sorrow gripped the entire locality, with villagers and relatives gathered in large numbers to offer their condolences — their sobs and wails breaking the sombre silence.

Hundreds joined the funeral procession of the deceased, braving the winter chill to pay their last respects.

"We have lost an entire family. Ajaz, who was working at a renowned hotel in Srinagar for several years was the backbone of his household. His children were so young, full of life. This is an unimaginable loss," Bashir Ahmad, a neighbour said. "Ajaz was the sole breadwinner for the family and an honest, hardworking man who dreamt of a better life for his children."

But this is not an isolated incident. Earlier, two minors lost their lives when a fire engulfed their tin-shed home in Tangmarg, Baramulla. In Kulgam, a 24-year-old man lost his life, and his mother remain critical after suffering asphysiation

Across Kashmir, families grapple with the dual challenges of economic instability and the brutal winter season. Poor ventilation, reliance on outdated heating methods, and inadequate safety awareness leave many at risk of similar fates.

"This pandrethan incident underscores the daily struggle for survival faced by many Kashmiris during the harsh winter months, where the fight against the cold can inadvertently become a fight for life itself," Aasiya Jan, a teacher said.

"Warmth is a luxury they cannot afford safely. Many families in Kashmir rely on firewood or coal for heating during winters. This isn't the first time such an incident has happened. Authorities must create awareness about safer heating options," said a relative of the deceased.

Pediatrician Dr. Suhail Naik also linked the incident to poverty. "The father, who tragically lost his life along with his family due to suffocation, faced an impossible choice: either endure the deadly cold or keep the gas heater on for warmth. He was trapped in both scenarios. Sadly, the gas heater filled the room with carbon dioxide—often referred to as a sweet poison."

Experts warn that suffocation cases rise during winter as people use heating gadgets in closed spaces/rooms throughout the night, leading to excessive carbon monoxide and carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions and Oxygen (O2) depletion that can cause immobility and death.

"Unchecked use of heating gadgets increases carbon monoxide levels and depletes oxygen, leading to suffocation," warned an official.

Authorities have urged residents to adopt safety measures when using heating appliances. They emphasize the need for adequate ventilation and regular maintenance of devices to prevent similar incidents.

The tragedies have prompted calls for greater awareness and safer heating alternatives, especially for vulnerable families living in poorly ventilated homes. Social organizations and local leaders have also called for government intervention to provide safer heating solutions during the harsh winter

Doctors Warn Against

Srinagar. Dr Murtaza Ahmad, a doctor at the Directorate of Health Services Kashmir (DHSK), said that unvented gas heaters emit combustion byproducts like carbon monoxide, which can accumulate to lethal levels in poorly ventilated rooms. "Carbon monoxide poisoning is a grave risk associated with these heaters. The best way to prevent such deaths is to stop using unvented gas heaters altogether and switch to vented alternatives," he

Dr Ahmad said that if unvented gas heaters are still used, they should only be operated in rooms

with adequate ventilation and never in bedrooms, bathrooms, or enclosed spaces. "These heaters lack a chimney to vent harmful combustion products outside. As a result, toxic pollutants like carbon monoxide remain inside the room, posing a severe threat," he explained.

Carbon monoxide, dubbed a "silent killer", is undetectable by sight, smell or taste. Victims often become unconscious during sleep without realizing the danger. Vulnerable groups, including children, the elderly, pregnant women, and those with chronic health conditions, are at greater risk.

Dr Showkat Ahmad from GMC Anantnag called for avoiding unvented gas heaters. He and other experts described telltale signs of suffocation, including small red or purple splotches in the eyes, face, and neck and petechial haemorrhages in the lungs. Other symptoms include shortness of breath, slow heart rate, hoarseness, sore throat, confusion, loss of consciousness, nosebleeds and visual changes.

"Prolonged exposure to CO can cause symptoms such as headache, dizziness, nausea and confusion. In severe cases, it can be fatal," Dr Showkat said, adding that nitrogen dioxide, another byproduct of combustion, can irritate the respiratory system and worsen conditions like asthma.

Dr Irfan, another doctor at DHSK, said carbon monoxide is produced when fuels like gas, oil, coal, or wood do not burn completely. In poorly ventilated spaces, CO can reach dangerous levels, impairing the blood's ability to carry oxygen to vital organs. "Symptoms of CO poisoning include dizziness, headache, nausea, confusion, and, in severe cases, unconsciousness or death" he said

The doctors recommend the following safety

- Install Carbon Monoxide Detectors: These devices can provide early warnings of dangerous CO levels.

evels.
- Ensure Proper Ventilation: Keep rooms well-

ventilated when using gas heaters.

- Regular Maintenance: Regularly inspect and maintain heating appliances to ensure their safety.

- Recognize Symptoms: Be alert to signs of CO

poisoning and seek immediate medical attention if they appear.

Medical experts call for awareness and preventive actions to safeguard lives during colder

months. They said carbon monoxide poisoning is

preventable with proper precautions and that reliance on unvented gas heaters should be minimized. They warn that unvented gas heaters remain a silent threat to public safety. They said the Pandrethan incident should serve as an eye-opener for everyone to prioritise safer heating alternatives and take proactive measures to prevent tragedies caused by carbon monoxide poisoning. Awareness, education and vigilance can save lives during the

winter months, they added. (KNO) **Fresh Snowfall**

Sonamarg and Gulmarg, have recorded the heavy snowfall with accumulation of 16 inches and 15 inches respectively till Monday morning.

According to the details, Doodhpatri and Yusmarg in Central Kashmir's Budgam and Pir ki Gali in Shopian recorded a snowfall of one foot each while Srinagar City recorded 2-3 inches of snow during the period.

As per an Independent Weather Forecaster, Aadil Maqbool, the maximum areas across Kashmir Anantnag, Qazigund, Kulgam, Kokernag, Pulwama, Budgam plains, Ganderbal, Kupwara and others recorded a light snowfall during the period with majority of these areas witnessing an accumulation of just 1-2 inches of snow till this morning.

Pahalgam has recorded a snow accumulation of

6 inches till this morning, he said.

Moreover, the Meteorological department (MeT),
Dr Mukhtar Ahmad, said that the weather conditions would remain generally dry from tomorrow till January 10 while on January 11 and 12, there is a possibility of light rain in plains of Jammu and snow at isolated to scattered places.

He added that from January 13-15, the weather would remain generally dry.

Meanwhile, in its advisory, the MeT has stated that the tourists, travelers and transporters are advised to follow administration and traffic advisory.

Furthermore, the night temperatures improved across Kashmir and settled above normal with Srinagar recording a minimum temperature of minus 0.5 degree while Qazigund recorded a night

temperature of 0.0 degree.

Pahalgam recorded a low of minus 1.4 degree Celsius while Kokernag, Kupwara and Gulmarg, a famous ski-resort have recorded a low of minus 0.4 degree, minus 0.3 degree and 4.5 degree Celsius respectively.

Meanwhile, all the morning flights at Srinagar airport were delayed due to bad weather.

Director Srinagar airport, Javed Anjum said that flights that were scheduled for the morning have been delayed till 11 am due to bad weather. "The runway is clear, and the flight status

is on standby. Operations will resume after 11 am, depending on weather conditions," he had said.

The flight operations were, however, re-

The flight operations were, however, resumed after 11:00AM with officials stating that the operations have resumed as the first flight from Amritsar landed at Srinagar International Airport.

The flight operations resumed after a daylong suspension as all the flights scheduled to and from Srinagar International Airport were cancelled after the dense fog reduced visibility to zero at the airport.

"Two days ago, we got this good news through media that the trial train reached Katra from Srinagar. It is expected that very soon, the prime minister will inaugurate this section which will complete the railway line and immensely benefit the people of the region," the chief minister said.

However, he said there are some concerns among the people related to the rail service, especially in lammu.

"It is often said that when rail service reached Jammu from Pathankot (Punjab), the situation in Pathankot became a bit difficult. Here too, at some places, there is a notion that if trains reach Kashmir directly from Jammu, the latter might face the same situation as Pathankot.

"On behalf of my government, I want to assure the people of Jammu that the rail service to Kashmir will have no impact on the region. Rather, we assure that Jammu will benefit from it as it will enhance trade and tourism, besides increasing travel between the two regions," Omar said.

Praising the prime minister for his efforts to improve connectivity and road network in Jammu and Kashmir, Omar said the expansion of railway line to Poonch-Rajouri in Jammu and beyond Baramulla in Kashmir will be the responsibility of the Jammu railway division.

"In my previous tenure as chief minister, the last function I attended was the inauguration of the Katra railway station. After assuming charge again, this is my first major function. And both are linked to railways and held under the leadership of Modi," he said.

The inauguration of the Jammu division is the biggest proof of the efforts of the prime minister to improve connectivity and road network in the region, he said.

The ongoing work on the Delhi-Amritsar-Katra expressway project, four-laning of the Jammu-Srinagar national highway, Z-morh and Zojila tunnels to provide all-weather road connectivity to Ladakh, along with airport expansion will further enhance connectivity on their completion, he said.

Lauding the railway ministry, Omar said that people used to get down from the train in Pathankot before it slowly reached Jammu, but in the last four decades, the railway service kept expanding -- first from Jammu to Udhampur, and then from Udhampur to Katra.

Similarly, rail service started in Kashmir from Srinagar to Baramulla, and was extended to Anantnag and Banihal and later to Sangaldan, he said.

Referring to the steep hike in air fare during the winter months when most of roads remain closed in Kashmir due to heavy snowfall, Omar said, "We are forced to buy air tickets worth Rs 5,000 for Rs 25,000... I hope the new rail service will not only benefit the railways, but also boost trade and industries with the induction of cargo trains."

Congratulating the people of J-K on getting a separate railway division in Jammu, Omar said it was a long-pending demand which has been fulfilled now.

"I am thankful to Prime Minister Modi and Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw," he said.

"The biggest thing is our coordination and control will not be from Firozpur (railway division), but from Jammu. And in this, we will definitely see benefits in recruitment. A small part of Punjab and a part of Himachal Pradesh have been added to this as well," Omar said.

back in 1972 but for as long as 50 years after that, there was no further progress and we had to wait for over half a century for Narendra Modi to take over as the Prime Minister and resume the rail extension work in J&K after a gap of 50 years. He said , some day the question would be posed why the successive governments during these long years did not give priority to this sector in J&K or were there certain elements not in support of Kashmir valley getting connected to the rest of India by railway and thus becoming a part of the national mainstream.

He said that the railway infrastructure recorded rapid expansion in the past 10 years across the country under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Addressing a function organised at the Jammu railway station to mark the inauguration of the

Jammu railway division by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Singh said Kashmir is getting connected by train very soon, fulfilling a long-lived dream.

The BJP MP from Udhampur also raised a question mark on the delay of over five decades in extending the railway line from Jammu to Kashmir Valley, as he urged people to celebrate the creation of the Jammu division for the bright future of their children.

"The first train will go from here to Kashmir (very soon), giving a new impetus to business, industry and tourism besides creating new job opportunities in the region. Modi Ji has done it for us, in a realistic way," Singh said.

"Many elderly people will remember that exactly

53 years ago in 1972, a train arrived at the Jammu railway station. So the question that arises is what took so long to extend the service to Kashmir," he said.

"In the past five decades, many governments came and went. Someday, this delay in extending

service to Kashmir will be a subject of discussion. Were the priorities different or the earlier governments did not have the willpower?

"Were there people who did not want Kashmir to be connected to the rest of India by rail and be

made a part of the national mainstream? Or was it the creator's will that we had to wait for 50 years for Modi to become the prime minister," Singh asked. When the Modi-led government took over in 2014, the work on Kashmir's rail project was almost stopped as the railway line and its alignments were

entangled in the midst of controversies, the minister said.

But the government decided to go ahead with the work, leading to the construction of the world's highest railway bridge over Chenab river in Reasi district along the Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla railway line, which was completed recently and is presently undergoing trial runs between Katra and

Srinagar, he said.

Stating that the BJP-led government ensured fast-track work on the rail project to ensure its completion within the shortest possible time, Singh said, "Railway infrastructure in the country expanded at a very rapid pace in the past 10 years

after Modi took over as the prime minister in 2014." "Electrification of tracks has been completed in over 61,000 kilometres, while the length of metro rail, which was only 248 kilometres in 2014, has been expanded to 1,000 kilometres," he said.

He also termed Jammu one of the best connected destinations in north India which will get a further boost with the completion of the Delhi-Amritsar-Katra expressway within six months, which will enable commuters to reach Delhi in just six hours.

Referring to the northeast, Singh said there is no part in the region where double-track railway line has not been set up in the past decade, while the Arunachal Expressway inaugurated by Modi has improved connectivity and transport network.

Dr. Jitendra Singh Hails New Railway Chapter in Kashmir

PDD Restores 100% Electricity In Kashmir

SRINAGAR: Following the fresh snowfall in Kashmir, Power Development Department (PDD) Monday said that it has restored electricity in all areas. Besides, the department further said that there was no major damage recorded because of the snowfall.

A top official said that "Although there was no major fault or damage that could have disrupted the electricity because of the snow, in some areas there was a minor smash up to transmission lines and DTs which we restored immediately."

"As of now we have restored electricity in all areas of Kashmir region," the official said.

The official further said that the department was estimating the minor damage to DTs caused by the snowfall.

On asking about the ongoing power supply and curtail-ment schedule, the official said that it was supplying over 1800 MWs of power to the consumers.



"The power supply has increased and as of now we are supplying over 1800 MWs of power to the consumers of Kashmir region," the official said.

It also said that from a couple of weeks the power supply has touched 1950 MWs.

About the unscheduled power cuts in both metered and non-metered areas, the official informed that the distress cuts usually occur in flat rated and non-metered areas.

"Majorly the consumers of

It also said that the flat rated consumers were using crude heating gadgets. "There is no judicious use of power in flat rate and non-metered areas."—(KNO)

Pulwama's Litter Tehsil Emerges As **Hub For High-Density Apple**

PULWAMA: In a groundbreaking development, the Shahoora area in south Kashmir's Pulwama district is rapidly transforming into a hub for high-density apple varieties, reshaping the traditional orchard landscape.

Hundreds of growers from the Litter Tehsil of Pulwama district are converting their land to cultivate a diverse range of premium apples, which promises not only increased yields but also unique flavours and textures.

Growers from the Litter area of Pulwama said that a few farmers initially planted highdensity varieties and earned handsome returns. Inspired by their success, many more have now prepared land on a large scale to plant high-density apple varieties.

This area, which traditionally did not have any apple orchards, saw some people converting their paddy land into apple orchards After the experiment yielded grand success, almost everyone in the area started adopting high-density apple farming.

The growers said these new varieties of apples were introduced in Kashmir after 2015. The standout feature of these apples is that they begin bearing fruit just a year after plan-



tation and reach full production in the fourth or fifth year. They said traditional apple

trees start bearing fruit at least ten years after plantation and are typically harvested in November, which sometimes exposes growers to damages due to untimely snowfall. However, high-density apples are harvested in August and are supported by facilities that protect them from hailstorms and other climatic challenges.

Iavid Ahmad, who has highdensity apples on around 8 kanals of land in the Shahoora area, said this farming method has benefits. "We have prepared fresh 12 kanals and are going for high-density apple farming as it requires low input and labour costs. The quality of such apples is also high, with uniformity in colour and size," he said.

One grower shared his success story: "I planted highdensity apples on around 3 kanals of land and fetched over

8 lakhs in just two years. The same land would have generated 8 lakhs from paddy cultivation over 100 years.'

In September 2015, the then J&K Chief Minister Mufti Mohammad Sayeed inaugurated the erstwhile State's first-ever high-density apple orchard at Bamdoora in south Kashmir's Anantnag district.

Kashmir produces over 20 lakh metric tonnes of apples annually, with some years reaching 25 lakh metric tonnes. According to the 2017 economic survey in J&K, half of Kashmir's population is directly or indirectly dependent on the apple industry with over 3.5 lakh hectares under apple cultivation.

J&K's Business Rules Draft Yet To Be Finalized

SRINAGAR: The formulation of business rules for the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir remains a work in progress, with the government yet to finalize the framework that aims to ensure better governance and transparency.

A committee, headed by Deputy Chief Minister Surinder Choudhary, has been constituted to oversee the process. However, progress appears to be moving at a slow pace, raising questions and concerns among stakeholders.

Business rules are critical for administrative streamlining functions, defining responsibilities, and ensuring accountability across various government departments. In the context of Jammu and Kashmir, these rules are particularly significant as they would set the stage for transparent and efficient governance under the administrative structure of the Union Territory.

Political observers say that the absence of finalized business rules has led to procedural ambiguities and hindered smooth decision-making. They believe that a robust frame-work could bridge the gap between policy formulation and execution, benefiting citizens and businesses alike.

While the government has initiated steps by forming a committee led by Deputy Chief Minister, there is little clar-

ity on the progress. According to sources, the draft business rules are yet to be prepared, and no official communication has been issued by the General Administration Department (GAD) to outline the roadmap or timeframe for their completion.

The lack of transparency in the process has also raised concerns about the individuals and entities involved in drafting the rules. "Who is working behind the scenes to frame these rules remains a mystery," remarked

Once the draft rules are ready, they will undergo vetting by the Omar Abdullah led cabinet before being sent to the Lieutenant Governor's office for final approval. "This stage could potentially lead to friction between political and administrative authorities, particularly if there are disagreements over the provisions in the rules," said an observer who warned that such a scenario could pose a significant challenge to the current government led by Omar Abdullah.

"By finalizing and implementing the business rules promptly, the Jammu and Kashmir government has an opportunity to set a benchmark for governance in the region. Clear and wellstructured business rules could pave the way for more accountable, efficient, and transparent administration, fostering trust and improving the lives of the people," he added. (KNT)

Budgam: 17 Injured In Stray Dogs Attack



BUDGAM: Seventeen persons were injured after they were attacked by the stray dogs in Budgam town of central Kashmir on Monday, with one severely injured person referred to SMHS Hospital in Srinagar for advanced treatment.

ICC, BCCI, CA, ECB Exploring Two-Tier Test System

SYDNEY/NEW DELHI: The ICC in collaboration with cricket boards of India, Australia and England is exploring the possibility of a two-tier Test system to facilitate more series between big three nations.

The Age reported that Jay Shah, the new ICC chairman, is set to meet Cricket Australia chair Mike Baird and his England counterpart Richard Thompson later this month to discuss the finer points. "Any plan for a move to two divisions in Test cricket would kick in after the end of the current Future Tours Program in 2027," the Age reported quoting its sources.

The BCCI is currently gearing up for its Special General Meeting on January 12 in Mumbai where interim secretary Devajit Saikia is expected to get a full-time role. Saikia was appointed in the interim role after Shah vacated his post last month to take over as ICC chairman. A BCCI official indicated that the discussion floated around the ICC corridors in 2016, the first-time when a two-tier Test system was seriously considered. "We don't have any news of any such move as yet. Currently, preparations are being made for SGM and the recent tour to Australia too needs to be discussed.



"There was such a move sometime back, but we haven't heard anything since," a BCCI source told PTI. The BCCI and cricket bodies of Zimbabwe and Bangladesh opposed the move, citing the possibility of decreasing revenue.

They had also argued that smaller nations would miss out on the opportunity of playing against top teams if such a system comes into existence.

However, nine years down the road the modalities have changed and even some of the reputed experts such as former Indian skipper Ravi Shastri are supporting the division.

"I've been a firm believer in that if you want Test cricket to survive and be alive and thriving, I think that's the way to go. "The top teams play against each other more often, so there is a contest; you want contests," Shastri told SEN during the recent fifth Test between India and Australia.

Bumrah Likely To Miss Majority Of England Series

Pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah, who sustained back spasms, is likely to be rested for the majority of India's home white-ball series against England, keeping an eye on the ICC Champions Trophy, starting from February 19.

Bumrah, who was India's stand out player with 32 wickets in their 1-3 thrashing at the hands of Australia in the just-concluded Border-Gavaskar Trophy, couldn't bowl in the final innings of the series here after suffering back spasms. The 30-year-old Bumrah who bowled more than 150 overs in the series.

The injury has a direct link to his excessive workload in the series, and the BCCI medical team will try to ensure the new Test captain is ready for the ICC showpiece where his presence is mandatory to India's fortunes. According to sources privy to the development, the grade of Bumrah's back spasm has not yet been ascertained. India will open their Champions Trophy campaign against Bangladesh on February 20 in Dubai.

If Bumrah's injury is in grade 1 category, then it will take a minimum two to three weeks of rehabilitation before Return to Play (RTP).

Defiant Shan Masood Narrows Pakistan's Deficit To 109

Pakistan captain Shan Masood continued to defy South Africa as the tourists cut down the deficit to 109 runs on the fourth day of the second and final test on Monday. Masood progressed to a defiant 137 off 232 balls and led Pakistan to 312-3 at lunch with Saud Shakeel getting a lucky escape and staying unbeaten on 16.

South Africa enforced the follow-on after Pakistan collapsed to 194 on a dry wicket in reply to the home team's massive first innings score of 615.

Shakeel could have been out leg before wicket to Kwena Maphaka in the penultimate over before the break, but South Africa didn't go for a television review against Indian on-field umpire Nitin Menon's not out decision. TV replays clearly showed the ball would have hit the leg stump of the left-hander and earned South Africa its third wicket of the session.

But Masood stood firm and continued to lead Pakistan's strong fightback on Monday after sharing a record-breaking double century opening partnership with Babar Azam (81) that had anchored the tourists to 213-1 on Day 3.

Afghanistan Seal Historic Test Series Win In Zimbabwe

A fghanistan took only 15 balls to wrap up victory on the last day of the second Test against Zimbabwe at the Queens Sports Club in Bulawayo on Monday, winning by 72 runs to claim the two-match series 1-0. Zimbabwe were dismissed for 205, failing to add to their overnight score but losing their last two wickets in only 13 minutes.

Richard Ngarava was run out in the second over of the day amid confusion with captain Craig Ervine, who went in the next over trapped leg before wicket by Rashid Khan, who finished with 7/66 in 27.3 overs.

It was Khan's leg spin on Sunday that saw Afghanistan move into a winning position after Zimbabwe initially looked victory-bound when they were 157/4, chasing a winning target of 278 runs. The first Test, also in Bulawayo, ended in a high scoring draw. Afghanistan have now won four of 11 Tests played since getting Test status in 2017 -- two of them against Zimbabwe.

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
