Who Used Chartered Flights? J&K Assembly Seeks Probe Into **₹35 Cr Expenses**

Jammu: The Jammu and Kashmir Assembly witnessed uproar on Thursday as treasury and opposition benches clashed over an Independent MLA's de-mand for a probe into alleged extravagant spending on chartered flights and other expenses

in the Union Territory. Members of the ruling National Conference (NC) and Congress called for the formation of a house committee to investigate the expenditure of crores of rupees by the administration on guests visiting the region.

During discussions on Chief Minister Omar Abdullah's grants, MLA Shabir Ahmed Kullay from Shopian raised concerns over 35 crore spent on chartered flights and hospitality, including for G20 events.

"I received details in the cut motion about this massive spending. A probe is necessary,' Kullay asserted. He questioned who authorized the funds and who benefitted from the chartered flights, calling it a case of bureaucratic corruption.

Several treasury bench members backed the demand for an inquiry. "A house committee must be constituted to investigate," NC's Javaid Beigh said, prompting NC, Congress, and some Independent members to stand in support.

BJP members, however, countered the demand, arguing that the funds were used for G20 guests and tourism promotion. BJP leader Balwant Mankotia defended the Chief Minister's authority over the expenditure and suggested the probe should also cover | More on P10

No 'Pick And Choose' Policy In **Newspaper Ads: CM**

Jammu: Chief Minister Omar Abdullah has ruled out any "pick and choose" approach in the allocation of government advertisements to newspapers in Jammu and Kashmir. Addressing concerns raised by MLAs in the Legislative Assembly, he assured that the distribution process would remain fair and transparent.

The Chief Minister emphasized that selective advertising must come to an end, asserting that publications overly dependent on government revenue cannot serve as true voices of journalism. He warned that such newspapers risk turning into mere government mouthpieces. newspaper that only carries press notes and my photograph on the front page is not



a newspaper; it's a mouthpiece," he said.

"Newspapers that rely solely on government ads cannot function as independent media. While we will support media houses, we must discourage mushrooming of newspapers that exist only to publish government press releases. Reaffirming his commitment to press freedom,

J&K Govt Plans To Fill 7,253 Vacancies By Year-End

Jammu: Chief Minister Omar Abdullah informed the J&K Legislative Assembly that the government aims to fill 7,253 Gazetted and Non-Gazetted vacancies by the end of this year. He highlighted that 11,526 selections have been completed over the past two years. Out of the total vacancies, 1,502 are Gazetted posts, while 5,751 are Non-Gazetted.

Responding to a query from MLA Satish Kumar Sharma, Abdullah shared that as of January 31, 2025, J&K had 32,474 vacancies across 38 government departments, including 2,503 Gazetted posts, 19,214 Non-Gazetted posts, and 10,757 Class-IV (MTS) posts. The Chief Minister outlined key recruitment efforts, stating that 13,466 Non-Gazetted vacancies were referred to the J&K Services Selection Board (JKSSB) in the past two years, with 9,351 selections completed. He added that 2.390 Gazetted vacancies were sent to the J&K Public Service Commission (JKPSC), leading to 2,175 appointments.

Additionally, 10,757 Class-IV vacancies have been identified and are under Finance Department review before referral, while more than 6,000 vacancies are ready to be sent to recruiting agencies.

To streamline the recruitment process, Abdullah announced several reforms, including the abolition of interviews for Pay Level 5 (29,200-92,300) under S.O. 180, dated May 28, 2020. He also said that interviews for Level 6 posts, including Junior Engineers and Naib Tehsildars, have been removed through S.O. 36, issued on February 14, 2025, and departments have been asked to identify additional Level 6 posts where interviews can be eliminated to further accelerate hiring. The Chief Minister stated that revised IKSSB regulations, notified on November 22, 2022, have introduced online CBT-based examinations and a single-exam system for multiple posts where feasible. He emphasized that JKPSC and JKSSB have been directed to take a proactive, target-based approach to | More on P10

'Dry Air, More Common In Warmer World, Could **Increase Risk Of Inflammation In Airways'**

n increased exposure to dry air -- occurring more due to global warming -- could heighten risk of dehydration and inflammation in breathing tracts, a study has found.


Inflammation in the airways can increase one's risk of respiratory infections and worsen conditions such as asthma.

The researchers, led by those at Johns Hopkins University, US, explained that as the Earth's atmosphere continues to heat up, with relative humidity remaining the same, 'vapour pressure deficit' -- a measure of the air's 'thirst' for water -- can increase rapidly.

Relative humidity is the moisture present in air relative to the maximum that it can hold at a given temperature.

The higher the vapour pressure deficit, the more the air's thirst and thus, water evaporates more quickly, thereby dehydrating ecosystems, the researchers said.

"Air dryness is as critical to air quality as air dirtiness and managing the



hydration of our airways is as essential as managing their cleanliness," said David Edwards, an adjunct professor of medicine at Johns Hopkins University, and lead author of the study published in the journal Communications Earth and Environment. "Understanding how our airways dehydrate on exposure to dry air can help us avoid or reverse the inflammatory impact of dehydration by effective behavioural changes and preventive or therapeutic interventions," Edwards said

"Water evaporation thins airway mucus layers and compresses epithelial cells during tidal (relaxed) breathing," the authors wrote.

For the study, the researchers first analysed how water loss or transpiration occurs in the mucus of upper airways in humans, when exposed to drv air.

High rates of transpiration in plants have been proven to cause damaging compression in cells in leaves, threatening survival, they said. To understand if similar compres-

sion occurred in cells lining the upper airway in humans, the team exposed lab cultures of these cells to drv air.

Mice already having the dryness showed immune cells in their lungs, indicating a high inflammatory response, while those exposed only to moist air did not, the team said. The study's results have implica-

tions for other similar processes in the body, namely dry eye and the movement of water in mucus linings in the eye, the researchers said.

Zakoora Mini Maternity Hospital **Vacated By Security Forces**

SRINAGAR: The Jammu and Kashmir government on Thursday announced that security forces have vacated the Mini Maternity Hospital at Zakoora after occupying the facility for four years. Plans are now underway to restore the hospital to full functionality.

Responding to a query from MLA Salman Sagar, Health and Medical Education Minister Sakina Itoo stated that with the hospital now vacated, authorities are working in coordination with the Managing Director of the J&K Housing Board to finalize a Detailed Project Report (DPR) for necessary repairs and ren-ovations. "The government is committed to making the hospital operational at the earliest," she said.

Addressing another query regarding healthcare infrastructure at Fakir Gujri, Minister Itoo clarified that the term "Mini Hospital" is not recognized under Indian Public Health Standards (IPHS). However, she noted that the Sub Centre at Fakir Gujri had been upgraded to a New Type Primary Health Centre (NTPHC) in 2014 under Government Order No. 585-(HME). The upgrade included the corpointment of a

Medical Officer and the deployment of a Block Health Worker (BHW) and Multi-Tasking Staff (MTS) from Sub-District Hospital (SDH) Hazratbal.

Additionally, Itoo mentioned that a postgraduate doctor from the Department of Community Medicine visits the Fakir Gujri facility three times a week, while a Medical Officer provides ultrasound services once or twice a month. She emphasized that upgrading facili-ties into NTPHCs is part of a broader initiative to modernize healthcare services in Jammu and Kashmir.

In a separate update, the minister confirmed that the Anchar-side entry gate of SKIMS, Soura, remains closed for security reasons as per recommendations from security agencies. "There are no current plans to reopen the gate due to security concerns surrounding SKIMS," she said

The influx of visitors has also brought cheer to local vendors and photographers who capitalize on



WASHINGTON: Thousands of pages of digital documents related to the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy are now available for historians, conspiracy theorists and the merely curious, following orders from US President Donald Trump.

The president, shortly after taking office for his second term in January, signed an executive order directing national intelligence and other officials to quickly come up with a plan "for the full and complete release of all John F. Kennedy assassination records.

The archives' Kennedy assassination collection has more than six million pages of records, the vast majority of which had been declassified and made public before Trump's order. Trump told reporters on Monday that 80,000 pages would be released on Tuesday. Justice Department lawyers got orders Monday evening to review the records for release. The digital documents did not start appearing until 7 p.m. (2300 GMT) Tuesday on a National Archives web page. As of 10:30 p.m. Tuesday (0230 GMT Wednesday), the National Archives had published 2,182 PDFs totaling 63,400 pages.

The archives did not immediately respond on Wednesday to a request for comment on whether more documents would soon be released in response to a

US Indo-Pacific Chief Pushes 10-Year Defence Deal with India

New Delhi: Ways to further advance the India-US military ties, including a likely renewal of a 10year defence framework, figured prominently in talks Admiral Samuel J Paparo, the commander of the US Indo-Pacific Command, held with India's top civil

and military brass this week. Paparo met with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh and Chief of Defence Staff General Anil Chauhan, according to an American readout. The top American command-

er visited India from March 16 to 19 to advance the US-India comprehensive global strategic partnership and attend the Raisina Dialogue, India's flagship conference on geopolitics.

Paparo's trip advanced the US-India initiative, COMPACT (Catalysing Opportunities for Military Partnership, Accelerated Commerce and Technology) for the 21st Century, the readout said. In February, US President

Donald Trump and Prime Minister Modi launched the COM-PACT that seeks to drive transformative change across multiple

pillars of cooperation, including defence, trade and investment, energy, technology and innovation, and people-to-people ties.

It is learnt that top defence and security officials of the Quad nations -- India, the US, Australia and Japan -- held extensive talks on the sidelines of the Raisina Dialogue.

"The work throughout the Raisina Dialogue enhances the mutual understanding and alignment of goals as the US and India seek to renew a 10-year framework for the US-India Major Defence Partnership that will propel cooperation through the next decade," the US readout said.

"The US-India Major Defence Partnership has become a cornerstone of global peace," it added. In 2016, the United States designated India as a "Major Defence Partner".

Commensurate with this designation, India was accorded the "Strategic Trade Authorisation tier 1" that allowed the country to receive licence-free access to a wide range of military and dualuse technologies regulated by the US Department of Commerce.

The major defence partnership is up for renewal next year. In New Delhi, Paparo also

ASHINGTON: President Donald Trump plans to sign an executive order Thursday calling for the shutdown of the US Education Department, according to a White House official, advancing a campaign promise to eliminate an agency that's been a longtime target of conservatives.

The official spoke on the condition of anonymity before an announcement.

Trump has derided the Department of Education as wasteful and polluted by liberal ideology. However, finalizing its dismantling is likely impossible without an act of Congress, which created the department in 1979

A White House fact sheet said the order would direct Secretary Linda McMahon "to take all necessary steps to facilitate the closure (of) the Department of Education and return education authority to the States, while continuing to ensure the effective and uninterrupted delivery of services, programs, and benefits on which Americans rely."

'No wealth left in Bangladesh'

EW DELHI: Former Labour minister Tulip Siddiq, the niece of Sheikh Hasina, has accused Bangladeshi authorities of launching a "targeted and baseless" campaign against her and thereby urging an immediate end to what she described as damaging allegations.

In a strong response, Tulip Siddiq's legal representatives have called for an immediate halt to a series of "false and damaging" allegations made against the British Member of Parliament regarding financial irregularities linked to the Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant built with the Russian help.

In a letter to the Bangladesh's Anti Corruption Commission (ACC), Siddiq's lawyers from Stephenson Harwood reiterated her position that she had no involvement in the nuclear plant deal, despite being photographed at a signing ceremony in the Kremlin in 2013 alongside then Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and Russian President Vladimir Putin.

The letter said: "It is not uncommon for family members to be invited to accom-



pany Heads of State on state visits.

The lawyers also dismissed claims that a £700,000 flat in London's King's Cross, gifted to Siddiq in 2004, was linked to embezzlement, calling the allegations "absurd" as the flat was acquired a full 10 years before the nuclear deal was made.

Siddiq's father was a university professor in Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh, and her mother was granted political asylum in the UK as the younger sister of Sheikh Hasina. In January, Siddiq resigned from her role as economic secretary to the Treasury, where she was responsible for addressing corruption in the UK's financial market.

In 20-years, J&K Witnesses More Than 7000 Bus Accidents

SRINAGAR: Jammu & Kashmir has recorded more than 7000 bus accidents during the past two decades.

In response to a query about bus accidents raised by MP Krishna Prasad Tenneti in Lok Sabha, the Union Ministry of Road and Transport stated that hundreds of bus accidents continue to be reported annually across the country.

The data shared by the union ministry revealed that J&K recorded 1,494 bus accidents in 2004, the number dropped to 612 in 2008. However, the trend did not remain consistent, with accidents rising again to 1590 in 2014 and 1,583 in 2015.

A decline was observed in 2017, with just 399 cases, but the numbers fluctuated again in subsequent years-425 in 2018, 344 in 2019, 348 in 2020, 412 in 2021, and 357 in 2022.

In Ladakh, separate accident data was not recorded until

2021, when no bus accidents were reported. However, in 2022, 36 bus accidents occurred. Responding to the data, Union Transport Minister Nitin Gadkari said that the government has implemented several measures to improve road safety, including road safety audits, rectification of accident-prone black spots, and new vehicle safety norms.

He said that the National Road Safety Strategy has also been expanded to cover Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh, aiming to reduce traffic-related fatalities further.

Authorities have introduced stricter enforcement of traffic laws, awareness programs for drivers, and improved emergency response systems to ad-

dress the issue Also, the installation of crash barriers, better road engineering, and the promotion of modern safety technologies in public transport vehicles are among the key initiatives.

ANANTNAG: A devastating fire incident in the Gujnag Kadipora area of South Kashmir's Anantnag district today reduced nearly 20 residential houses to ashes, leaving hundreds of people homeless in the holy month of Ramadan.

According to eyewitnesses, the fire started from the house of the late Nisar Ahmad Lulu and spread rapidly to adjacent houses. The densely packed structures and lack of adequate firefighting resources exacerbated the destruction, as flames quickly engulfed the entire row of homes.

Locals, assisted by firefighters and police, made desperate efforts to douse the blaze. However, they faced severe challenges due to a shortage of water and defunct fire hydrants. "We tried our best, but the unavailability of water and non-functional fire plugs made it impossible to control the fire in time," said a distressed resident.

Rationalizing Reservation

f any issue has assumed the most prominence in J&K's political discourse since the elected government took power, it is that of reservations in jobs. The recent data presented in the Jammu and Kashmir Assembly on the distribution of job quotas between Kashmir and Jammu regions reveals a glaring imbalance. One can't deny the rationale of affirmative action to uplift marginalized communities and create equitable opportunities, but it can't be done at the expense of the other communities, be it in the Valley or in Jammu. It is clear that the current policy appears to disproportionately favor one region over the other. This has rightly triggered a political chorus in the Valley for an urgent review and rationalization of the reservation system to ensure fairness and justice for all.

The figures tabled in the Assembly showed all Scheduled Caste (SC) beneficiaries from Jammu, and not a single recipient from Kashmir. Similarly, 85.3% of those benefiting under the Scheduled Tribe (ST) category are from Jammu, and only 14.7% from the Valley. Ditto for Economic Weaker Section (EWS) category: 92.3% of the beneficiaries are from Jammu and a mere 7.7% are from Kashmir. Jammu-based candidates also dominate across other categories, such as the Actual Line of Control (ALC) and International Border (IB).

This certainly is shocking especially considering that Kashmir comprises around 55% of J&K's population, as per the 2011 census. True, reservation policies are designed to uplift those in need, regardless of their geographical location, but the current arrangement is clearly skewed heavily in favor of Jammu at the cost of Kashmiri-speaking populations. This is neither just nor in line with the fundamental ideals of reservation. J&K has now just 30 percent reservation quota for the open merit category. The reduction followed the LG administration's decision early last year to raise reservation for Paharis by 10 percent and that of the other tribes and the Other Backward Classes by 8 percent. According to the 2011 census, 69 percent of the J&K's population falls under the general category, which includes those not classified under Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, and Other Backward Classes. But while reservations in the rest of the country have been capped at 50 percent, in J&K they have been fixed at 70 percent. This is a gross injustice. There's hope that the J&K Cabinet Sub-Committee examining reservations in recruitment will set things right. The subcommittee will present the report in six months and has promised rationalization of the job quotas.

Rethinking Ramazan Have We Forgotten the **Essence of Ramazan?**

amazan is a month of divine mercy, the crown jewel of all months, when the heavens seem to draw closer to the earth. Not long ago, its arrival would bring a palpable shift in the air—a blend of joy and reverence, hope and self-accountability. The mere mention of its approach would stir even the most heedless hearts. A week before its onset, the atmosphere would transform: streets would quieten, hearts would soften, and even those entangled in sin would feel the weight of Allah's gaze, prompting a longing for redemption.

The air itself carried a divine urgency, a call to purify, to repent, to rise.

But now, as I look around, I am struck by a painful truth: that Ramazan, that sacred transformation, seems to have faded. The mosques may be fuller, and the streets may echo with Quranic recitations, yet the hearts within them remain unchanged. The essence of Ramazan-its call to self-discipline, its demand for spiritual reckoning-seems buried under the weight of our distractions.

Have We Traded Reflection for Rituals?

We fast from dawn to dusk, abstaining from food and drink, yet we indulge in lies, gossip, and greed. We stand in prayer, our foreheads touching the ground in a gesture of humility, yet our minds remain entangled in the endless scroll of social media, the fleeting allure of entertainment, and the ceaseless distractions of a world that refuses to pause

Have we turned Ramazan into a mere cycle of hunger and thirst rather than a season of spiritual rejuvenation? Do we fast only to satisfy tradition rather than transform our hearts? The Prophet (peace be upon him) said, "Indeed, Allah does not look at your appearances or wealth, but He looks at your hearts and actions." (Muslim)

If we stand in prayer but our thoughts are elsewhere, if we recite the Quran without absorbing its meaning, if we ity while exploiting others-what of the Ramazan we claim to obser



On World Poetry Day Remembering **RASOOL MIR**

The Bard Beyond Time And His Struggle To Preserve Kashmir's Legacy

n World Poetry Day, as UNESCO's call to honour poets and preserve linguistic heritage echoes globally, my mind drifts to the immortal poet of my area-Rasool Mir Shahabadi, a poet whose name is whispered with reverence. Born around 1840 in the Mir Mohalla of Mirmaidan, Dooru Shahabad, Anantnag Rasool Mir's life-though tragically brief, ending around 1870-burned with a creative fire that forever altered Kashmiri literature. Misattributed by many that he lived near Khanqahi Faiz Panah shrine, the truth is different, his true roots lie in the Mir clan of Mirmaidan, Doru, a fact etched into the weathered wooden homes and cobbled paths of his ancestral neighbourhood, where his clan still reside today.

My earliest memories of Rasool Mir are painted in the vibrant hues of childhood wonder. Each year, our school celebrated Rasool Mir Day with a zeal and zest that transformed classrooms into stages. Debates crackled with energy, quizzes tested our knowledge of his couplets, and rehearsals of his poems filled the air. I was in the class 2nd when I first stumbled upon his verse "Rinde Poosh Maal Gindenay Draee **Lolo**". The rhythmic cadence of the words, sung by a group of girl students, captivated me. "Who wrote this?" I asked my teacher, expecting a living name. "Rasool Mir!" she replied, as though invoking a saint. After returning from the school that evening, I sprinted home to my father, who, with a playful wink without telling the truth, declared, "Rasool Mir is our neighbour!" He even recited one of his famous couplet.

Yi Chu Rasool Mir Shahabad Dooray Tami Chu Trovmut Ashiqeh Dukaan Yeveh Aashqow Cheveh Tor-Re Tor-Ray Meh Chu Mooray Lalvun Naar

Here stands Rasool Mir at Shahabad Dooru, Where a tavern of love he opens anew. Come, O lovers, drink deep from the chalice, For the fiery flames of love burn through me, true.

The next morning, during rehearsals, an Ghulam Ieelani Mir elderly man arrived. Sahab, a descendant of the poet and former village head. He corrected a misrecited line and I, wide-eyed, believed I'd witnessed Rasool Mir himself as last night my father had told me that Mir is our neighbour. Racing home, I breathlessly announced, "Rasool Mir



light filtered like gold dust. "This," he murmured, "is where Rasool Mir walked, wrote, and dreamed."

The air felt heavy with ghosts of poetry. I traced my fingers over the grooves of ancient wood, imagining the poet's hand on the same beams. In that moment, the boundary between past and present blurred. Though just seven years old, I felt the weight of legacy settle on my small shoulders. By the time we returned home, my tears had dried into awe.

The next morning, I marched to school, chest puffed with pride. To my wide-eyed classmates, I became a storyteller-a keeper of secrets. "I've seen his house!" I declared, recounting the wooden planks, the school's chalk-dusted windows, the very air that once held his breath. For a fleeting moment, Rasool Mir lived again-not in verses or textbooks, but in the wide-eyed wonder of children. Years melted into decades, but Rasool Mir's presence never faded. As I grew older, his name blossomed from a local tale into a cultural monument. He is celebrated as the "Keats of Kashmir"-a title that mirrors his

nals of Kashmiri poetry not merely through verses, but by forging a linguistic alchemy uniquely his own. His genius lay in the meticulous selection and fusion of words-Persian elegance woven into Kashmiri earthiness; mystic abstraction tethered to visceral emotion. To read him is to navigate a labyrinth: his poems, dense with layered metaphors and philosophical depth, challenge even seasoned scholars. Yet this very complexity rendered his work inimitable. While many poets borrowed from tradition, Rasool Mir became tradition-a standard against which Kashmiri lyricism is measured.

Celebrated as the "Keats of Kashmir", the title transcends mere comparison. Like Keats, Mir possessed an almost supernatural insight into human frailty and desire. His exploration of romance was not monochromatic: it spanned the spectrum from earthly passion to divine yearning. He is the first Kashmiri poet who introduced Kashmiri Gazals. In his ghazals, love is a paradox-a destructive flame and a redemptive force, a personal ache and a universal truth. This multidimensionality, coupled with his psychological acuity, cemented his place as "Imam-e-Ishqiya Shayri"—the master/pioneer of romantic verse. A defining chapter of his legend unfolded in his youth, during a fateful encounter with Mehmood Gami, the towering poet-sage of the era. Drawn by Gami's renown, young Rasool Mir ventured into a mehfil (poetic gathering), where the air thrummed with reverence. Gami, seated like a mystic monarch amidst disciples, was immersed in meditation as singers performed. Mir, the unassuming newcomer, sat transfixed, his soul swaying to the rhythm of the ghazals. When the song ended, Gami's gaze fell on the unfamiliar face glowing with silent intensity. Summoning the boy, he asked, "Who are vou?" Rasool Mir, trembling yet resolute, introduced himself. Gami, intrigued, invited him to recite. Hesitation gripped Mir-here was a colossus of poetry, and he, a sapling. But courage prevailed. He recited his verses, each word a brushstroke painting world. The room stilled. Gami, renowned for his stoicism, sat wide-eyed. The verses-crafted with a maturity belying Mir's youth-were flawless. Thematic depth, structural precision, emotional resonance-all hallmarks of a master. Gami, uncharacteristically speechless, finally murmured to his disciples: "Amis Cheh Jaaneh Margi Hind Kairan" (This boy will not live long). The prophecy, chilling yet poetic, stemmed from a belief that such perfection, achieved in boyhood, defied nature's balance. A soul so luminous, he implied, was destined to burn briefly. This encounter, etched into oral histories, reveals Rasool Mir's duality: a prodigy who mastered life's profundities in a handful of years, yet remained tethered to mortality. His early death, as Gami foresaw, transformed him from a poet into a myth-a comet whose fleeting blaze still illuminates Kashmir's literary sky. While Rasool Mir's romantic poetry earned him the title "Imam-e-Ishqiya Shayri", his true genius lies in the mystic undercurrents that ripple through his verses-a

dimension often overshadowed yet radiant with spiritual profundity. Beyond the sighs of earthly lovers, Mir's pen danced with divine longing, crafting poems that transcend time and dogma. His Sufi ethos, steeped in the quest for union with the Infinite, pulses through lines where love is not merely hu-man passion but a sacred dialogue with the cosmos.

Sufis and scholars alike regard his mystic verses as masterpieces of Kashmiri literature, believing Mir attained a spiritual ze-nith few poets ever reach. His work is not just art; it is a revelation—a mirror reflecting the soul's journey from mortal confines to eternal truth. Two couplets, inscribed on his tombstone, encapsulate this transcendent vision:

Kad Choon Alif, Laam Zulf, Meem Dahaan Tchuie, Pur Aqaleh Sabak Shakleh Alim Laam Nigaroo.

Your stature is like Alif, your locks resemble Laam, and your lips are as beautiful as Meem. O beloved, your form is a divine script, and my soul has witnessed its sacred essence.

Here, Mir merges the Arabic alphabet with celestial metaphor. Alif, the first letter, symbolizes the upright, God-conscious human; Laam mirrors cascading locks, embodying worldly beauty; Meem evokes the curve of a lover's lips. Together, they spell Alif laam -- "the Knower" or Divine-a sublime play on script and spirit. Together, this first couplet speaks of divine beauty, the sacred allure of the beloved, and the wisdom of recognizing this beauty on a higher, spiritual level. The poet uses the Arabic alphabet as metaphors to evoke the divine and the connection between spirituality and physical beauty

tellectual currents of his time. His poetry is rich with intricate metaphors, such as the "Kandhar Zoon" (moon of Kandhar), which not only reflect his deep understanding of Persian and Kashmiri poetic traditions but also show his awareness of global cultural and literary influences. The moon, often symbolizing divine beauty and unattainable perfection, is a metaphor widely used in Sufi poetry across regions. Rasool Mir's use of such imagery demonstrates that he was not only familiar with the local literary landscape but was also attuned to the intellectual currents of the wider world. Due to space constraints, I could not include specific couplets, but these metaphors reveal that Rasool Mir's education and knowledge were far-reaching, integrating both regional and global literary influences into his work.

It is a bitter irony that Rasool Mir, Kashmir's poetic titan, remains a stranger in his own land. The bulk of literature celebrating his genius has been penned by outsidersscholars from distant cities, historians in ivory towers—while his hometown, Dooru Shahabad, has watched in silence. Despite being home to educators and intellectuals, the village has failed to honour its prodigal son beyond token gestures. A tombstone stands as a mute relic, and annual cultural programs—flashy yet hollow—reduce his legacy to performative rituals. Children today, though bright-eyed and curious, know Rasool Mir as a name in textbooks, not as the heartbeat of their heritage.

UNESCO's World Poetry Day (March 21), established in 1999 to revive poetic tradi-tions and safeguard linguistic diversity, offers a mirror to our neglect. While the world unites to celebrate verse, Shahabad's apathy reflects a broader malaise: we have outsourced our cultural memory. The poet who immortalized our valleys, rivers, and longing now belongs more to academia than to the soil that nurtured him. This is not just about Rasool Mir-it is about every local legend fading into oblivion. Festivals and tomb renovations are meaningless if children cannot recite a couplet, if parents cannot recount how his words once healed broken hearts, or if teachers reduce his mysticism to exam footnotes. Heritage is not preserved in marble; it lives in the stories we tell, the songs we sing, and the pride we instill On this World Poetry Day, let us pledge to rewrite this narrative. Parents: Replace bedtime screens with bedtime couplets. Teachers: Turn classrooms into mehfils where students dissect wisdom word of our ancestors. Institutions: Digitize oral histories, translate verses of local celebrated personalities into global tongues, and collaborate with artists to reimagine his work. The stakes are existential. In an age of algorithm-driven amnesia, we risk losing not just our legends, but a piece of our soul. To forget our ancestors is to surrender our identity; to celebrate him is to armour our future. UNESCO's vision was clear: poetry is not a relic—it is resistance. Let people of Kashmir rise again and save their heritage this time particularly people of Shahabad should rise from its slumber. Let Rasool Mir's ghazals echo in kitchens, fields, and WhatsApp statuses. Let his tombstone be more than a photo op-let it be a pilgrimage for poets, a classroom under the sky. For in the end, heritage is not inherited-it is chosen. And on this day, we choose to say: No more. No more outsourcing our pride. No more reducing legends to hashtags. From Shahabad to Srinagar, let Rasool Mir's words become the anthem of a generation that refuses to let its roots wither.

visited our school!" My mother, with tender amusement, shattered the illusion: "He died 127 years before you were born." The revelation struck like a summer storm. When my mother gently explained that Rasool Mir had passed away long before I was born, my young heart shattered. Tears streamed down my cheeks-a blend of betrayal and grief-as I grappled with the idea that the poet I believed was my neighbour existed only in whispers of the past. Sensing my anguish, my father, with his quiet wisdom, took my hand and led me on a tour to Mir Mohalla, a mere 50 meters from our home.

There, time folded into itself. Before me stood a weathered building of creaking wooden planks which belong to the clan of Rasool Mir, its facade etched with decades of sun and rain. The ground floor buzzed with the hum of shops-tailors stitching, bakers kneading, vendors calling and barbers trimming-while one wing housed the Government Middle School Mirmaidan famously known as "Muqdam School". My father guided me deeper into the labyrinth of the Mohalla, through narrow lanes where sun-

lyrical intensity-and revered as "Imam-e-Ishqiya Shayri" (the sage of romantic verse), a beacon for generations of Kashmiri poets who've dipped their pens in the ink of his influence. His verses, once confined to recitals, now echo in academic corridors, Sufi gatherings, and the quiet hum of lovers' whispers.

Driven by pride and curiosity, I plunged into the labyrinth of his life. Maturity had sharpened my questions. Who was Rasool Mir beyond the myths? Did his bloodline still pulse through our neighbourhood? I interviewed elders with memories as fragile as autumn leaves, and traced oral histories that twisted like village alleys. Yet, the poet's descendants remained phantoms. A neighbour claimed Mir's two sons had migrated to Banihal long ago, vanishing into the mist of time. No records, no graves, just rumours, fragile as cobwebs. The irony stung, the man who immortalized love in Kashmir's soul left no tangible thread to his own lineage. His legacy, like the Jhelum River, flows unseen in some places, surges boldly in others but never truly dries.

Rasool Mir carved his name into the an-

In these lines, Mir dismantles the binaries of religion. The beloved's beauty-both face (rukh) and curls (zulf)-obliterates the boundaries between kufr (disbelief) and Islam (faith). For Mir, divine love exists bevond labels: it is a force that renders dogma meaningless. To the Sufi, this is fanaa–the annihilation of self in the Beloved-where rituals dissolve into rapture. It discusses the intense spiritual and emotional struggle of the lover who is so deeply enamored by the beloved (who symbolizes the divine or spiritual truth) that it confounds religious distinctions. The poet implies that such intense love might transcend the boundaries of religious practice, where the beloved represents the ultimate spiritual attraction, and the lover feels caught between devotion to the beloved and the question of spiritual purity.

These verses are not mere poetry; they are portals. Mir's mysticism challenges readers to see the sacred in the sensuous, the eternal in the ephemeral. His words echo the Sufi credo: "Wherever you turn, there is the Face of God." Yet, as he warns, "every eye may not be perceptible"-only those attuned to the unseen can grasp the layers beneath his metaphors.

It is a harsh but prevailing misconception that all Sufi poets are illiterate, yet this is far from the truth. In the case of Rasool Mir, his adept use of metaphors in poetry clearly illustrates that he was an educated individual, well-versed in the literary traditions and in-

high level, while silver surged by Rs 2,300 per kg to reach its fresh peak during the period.

Similarly, Comex gold futures for April delivery slipped 0.11 per cent to USD 3,038 per ounce. During the session, it touched a fresh peak of USD 3,065.09 per ounce.

However, the eventual payout depends on the market returns on that corpus, mostly invested in government debt.

BMW To Hike Car Prices By Up To 3% From April

NEW DELHI- BMW Group India on Thursday said it will increase prices by up to 3 per cent across the BMW and MINI car range from next month.

This is the second price hike this year by the carmaker.

The new prices will be effective from April 1, 2025, onwards, the group said in a statement.

It had also undertaken a similar price hike in January this year.

Earlier in the day, automaker Renault India said it will increase prices of its entire model range by up to 2 per cent from April. This is the first price hike announced by Renault India since February 2023.

Various carmakers, including Maruti Suzuki, Hyundai, Tata Motors, Kia India and Honda Cars, have already announced plans to hike vehicle prices from the next month citing rising input costs.

'Indian 5G User Base to Grow to 770 Million by 2028'

NEW DELHI- Average 5G data consumption in India has peaked to 40 GB per user per month and its total subscriber base is expected to grow by 2.65 times to around 770 million in the next three years, telecom gear firm Nokia said on Thursday.

The mix of data consumption across 4G, 5G etc has increased by compounded annual growth rate of 19.5 per cent over five years to 27.5 GB in 2024, Nokia's annual mobile broadband index (MBiT)

report said. According to the report, there was a remarkable threefold year-on-year surge in 5G data traffic across India in 2024.

"Average 5G data consumption in India per user was recorded at 40 GB in December 2024. We expect the 5G user

base to grow to around 770 million by 2028 from 290 million in 2024," Nokia India. Head of Technology and Solutions (Mobile Networks), Sandeep Saxena said during the report launch.

According to the report, the continued rise of 5G Fixed Wireless Access (FWA) is driving increased data usage, with FWA users now consuming over 12 times more data than the average mobile data user, driven by new services in both residential and business settings.

'The 5G device ecosystem in India continues to evolve rapidly, with the number of active 5G devices doubling year-on-year to reach 271 million in 2024. This trend is expected to accelerate, with nearly 90 per cent of smartphones to be replaced in 2025 are expected to be 5G-capable," Saxena said.

Govt Asks ARAI To Probe Ola Electric's Sales Figure Mismatch, Consumer Complaints

NEW DELHI- The Heavy Industries Ministry has directed Automotive Research Association of India (ARAI) to probe the mismatch between Ola Electric's reported sales figures and actual vehicle registrations along with numerous consumer complaints against the Bhavish Aggarwal-owned electric two-wheeler maker and submit a report within 15 days, sources said.

While the total number of registrations by Ola Electric on the Vahan portal for February stood at 8,652, the company had reported sales of over 25,000 units during February 2025. As of March 20, the company's registrations stood at 11,781 on the Vahan portal.

Ola Electric is a beneficiary of the FAME II and PM E-DRIVE

schemes and its eligibility certificate has been provided by ARAI, a certification and testing agency under the administrative control of the ministry. "It is the responsibility of ARAI to ensure that the guidelines of the PM E-DRIVE Scheme are followed. The ARAI will probe the sales figures mismatch and also the consumer complaints against Ola Electric. We have told ARAI to submit a report within 15 days," officials said, requesting anonymity.

Ola Electric has been facing regulatory heat with multiple authorities including consumer rights regulator CCPA ordering probes into complaints related to alleged "deficiencies" in services and electric two-wheelers manufactured by the company. When contacted, Ola Electric declined to comment.

However, sources said, due to negotiations with registration agencies, Vahan numbers for February have been temporarily impacted and the same was informed to the stock exchanges on February 19.

"The company's registration process is now back on track and daily registrations of around 1,500 are almost double of the average daily sales of around 800. With this process in place ,the company has fast-tracked the clearance of the registration backlog," a source said.

The company expects to register all the vehicles sold in February within March itself, the source said, adding that vehicles sold in the last week of March may have a registration spill-over in the first week of April 2025.

PDP's Fayaz Mir also weighed in, supporting the demand for a house committee, emphasizing that the issue involved state guests, including G20 delegates.

As the debate grew more intense, Speaker Abdul Rahim Rather intervened, urging members to maintain decorum. He assured that the Chief Minister would address the concerns in his reply to the grants discussion.

"The chief minister is still here. He will address them during his reply on the grants. The concerns will be addressed," he said.

CM Omar Abdullah began his speech with a Kashmiri proverb: "Vandi txalli, sheen gal-lie, bai yee bahaar" (Winter will pass, the snow will melt, and spring will come again). Responding to discussions on the Demands for Grants, the Chief Minister acknowledged concerns raised by members and emphasized the government's commitment to transparency and accountability.

"Some honorable members felt that I was too pessimistic in my previous speeches. So today, I decided to start differently. We are not afraid of discussions. We do not shy away from difficult questions. We answer them openly, no matter how tough these are.'

Addressing remarks made by an opposition member comparing his political strategies to cricket, the Chief Minister said: "A smart player adapts to the game. I was bowling pace when conditions favored it; now, I am bowling spin. But I have not changed the game–I remain committed to my responsibilities.'

On Equality and Legal Changes

The Chief Minister also addressed concerns regarding legal changes in Jammu and Kashmir. "Five years ago, we spoke of equality. Today, we are still demanding it. Ask yourself are we truly equal to other states? The reality speaks for itself." He refuted allegations that his government had disrespected the legacy of Maharaja Hari Singh.

"The laws governing state subjects were not altered by us but by others. Before 2019, you practiced under the Ranbir Penal Code, named after Maharaja Ranbir Singh. Today, you follow a different law. Who, then, changed history?"

On Economic Development and Employmen

Urban Development and Infrastructure Speaking on urban infrastructure, the Chief Minister acknowledged shortcomings in Smart City projects. "We built footpaths, yet people still walk on roads. We created cycle tracks, but motorcycles now occupy them. We constructed multi-level parking facilities, yet vehicles remain parked on the streets. Infrastructure alone is not enough; we need a collective shift in mindset.'

He also stressed the importance of decongesting cities through planned residential townships. "We are not settling outsiders. When your government spoke of New Srinagar and New Jammu, no one objected. Our goal remains the same-to develop new residential areas and prevent urban decay."

Management and Cultural Disaster Preservation

Regarding disaster management and relief efforts, the Chief Minister reassured members about the government's commitment to providing proper rehabilitation and housing for displaced communities.

On cultural preservation, he highlighted ongoing restoration efforts at 33 heritage sites across Jammu and Kashmir, with a budget of 65 crore. Future plans include restoring 73 additional sites with an estimated cost of 170 crore. "Heritage defines our identity. Projects like the Mubarak Mandi restoration must be completed soon. We cannot let historv fade

The Chief Minister reiterated the need for efficient governance and accountability in planning and finance. "The Planning Department's role is crucial. It is not just about drafting policies but ensuring their execution. We must reconsider the decision to merge planning with finance and restore its independent role."

Hospitality, Protocol & State Infrastructure The Chief Minister emphasized that government expenditure on state guests is a common practice and has been followed by previous governments as well. While he refrained from detailing the exact spending, he assured the House that steps are being taken to utilize existing assets effectively.

Addressing concerns about lost properties after the reorganization of J&K and Ladakh, he stated, "The properties that are gone cannot be reclaimed, but we must make the best use of those that remain."

He highlighted ongoing efforts to convert the structure in Sector 17, Chandigarh, into a state guest house, which will cost approxi-13 crores and cater to patients, stumately dents, and public representatives. He reiterated the importance of vertical expansion due to space constraints, drawing parallels with Motibagh in Delhi, and assured the House that alternative accommodations for government officials are being planned.

Government Accommodation & Discipline in Allotment

The Chief Minister acknowledged the acute shortage of government accommodations, forcing many MLAs and ministers to seek private housing or live below their entitlement. At the same time, he pointed out the issue of unauthorized occupation, stating, "There are individuals who exceed their entitlement, and some who have no entitlement yet refuse to vacate.We are working towards enforcing discipline in this regard."

He assured that new infrastructure projects would be undertaken with comprehensive planning and strict adherence to Detailed Project Reports (DPRs). Aviation & Mismanagement of State Aircra

Jammu Airport for five years, exposed to the vagaries of weather. This was an unnecessary and avoidable waste." He lamented the uncertainty over the cost of restoring the aircraft to make it airworthy and stressed that better management of public assets is crucial.

Tourism Development & Infrastructure Expansion

The Chief Minister highlighted the need for robust tourism infrastructure to fully exploit J&K's tourism potential. He noted that many MLAs had requested gondolas for their constituencies but clarified, "Building a gondola does not guarantee tourists will come. We need comprehensive infrastructure development."

He emphasized the importance of promoting pilgrim tourism in Jammu and proposed creating religious tourism circuits to enhance connectivity between different pilgrimage

He invited MLAs to provide insights on their local religious sites to facilitate this development. He also acknowledged the suggestion of developing agri-tourism, particularly in regions known for Basmati rice cultivation, and assured collaboration on this front.

Media Advertisements & Transparency

Addressing concerns regarding the distribution of government advertisements, the Chief Minister assured transparency and fairness.

He stated, "Newspapers that rely solely on government ads cannot function as independent media. While we will support media houses, we must discourage mushrooming of newspapers that exist only to publish government press releases."

He also declared that the Srinagar Press Club would be re-established and a fair election would be held to elect its members. He emphasized the need for a unified institution, stating that journalists would be responsible for forming a managing committee to oversee it's functioning.

Power Amnesty & Consumer Responsibility Regarding power amnesty, the Chief Minister announced the extension of the amnesty scheme but stressed that frequent waivers are unfair to those who pay their bills on time

He said, "We have given amnesty multiple times, but we must not continue this indefinitely. It is unfair to those who pay regularly."

He proposed a new scheme that would offer incentives on outstanding dues in proportion to future payments, encouraging a culture of timely bill payments. He also reiterated the importance of metering to improve revenue collection and reduce losses.

Legislators' Salaries & MLA CDF

The Chief Minister addressed concerns over MLAs' salaries, noting that it had not been revised in ten years. He suggested forming a committee comprising leaders of political parties to implement a structured salary revision mechanism based on the parliamentary model. He also proposed aligning the CDF guidelines with the MPLADS framework for better fund utilization. While acknowledging the demand for an increase in CDF allocations, he stated that a reasonable enhancement crore would be considered to increase it from Rs 3 to Rs 4 crore for each MLA.

e-Governance & Judicial Reforms

The Chief Minister commended the successful implementation and functioning of e-office. which has improved efficiency and transparency in government processes. He highlighted efforts to integrate video conferencing in High Court proceedings, ensuring that virtual hearings remain a permanent feature

Providing an update on key vacancies, Abdullah informed the Assembly that 150 Junior Engineer (Civil) posts have been referred to IKSSB for selection and that once the Cadre Schedule for Engineering Gazetted and Subordinate Services is finalized, the remaining engineering vacancies will also be sent for recruitment. He said that 150 Gazetted vacancies, including those for Assistant Professors, Librarians, and Physical Training Instructors in Higher Education, are under process for referral. Out of 840 vacancies referred, 476 have already been filled, while 364 are in the final stages of selection. In addition, 116 Non-Gazetted vacancies in Higher Education have been forwarded to the Finance Department for concurrence before referral.

Abdullah added that 56 Gazetted and 660 Non-Gazetted vacancies in Health and Medical Education have been referred for selection. He said that 597 Lecturer posts across 27 disciplines in the School Education Department were referred to JKPSC between November 2024 and January 2025. He further stated that all Administrative Departments have been directed to refer available vacancies to recruiting agencies without delays.

On the issue of regularizing daily wagers, the Chief Minister said the government has announced a high-level committee, headed by the Chief Secretary, to examine humanitarian, legal, and financial aspects related to the regularization of casual, seasonal, and other workers. He reiterated that the committee will propose a comprehensive policy for their regularization.

Highlighting key recruitment reforms, Abdullah said the J&K government extended the deadline for notifying recruitment rules by six months in November 2024. He explained that this decision, taken through executive orders, aims to resolve delays in formulating recruitment policies and ensure timely hiring for critical government positions. Furthermore, he noted that the JKSSB's mandate has been expanded to oversee Non-Gazetted recruitment in public sector undertakings, government companies, boards, and other state-controlled entifies to streamline the hiring process. BCCI Lifts Saliva Ban In IPL After Getting Captains' Thumbs Up

NEW DELHI: The BCCI on Thursday lifted the ban on use of saliva on the ball in the upcoming Indian Premier League after a majority of captains agreed to its proposal, making it the first major cricket competition to do away with the restriction that was a consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The decision was taken at the captains' meeting in Mumbai ahead of the league starting on Saturday.

"The saliva ban has been lifted. Majority of captains were in favour of the move. Some had reservations about the re-introduction, some sat on the fence but majority of them supported the move," a top BCCI official told PTI.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) had banned the age-old practice of applying saliva to shine the ball as a precautionary measure during the COVID-19 pandemic, during which health practitioners advocated strict hygiene protocols and physical batters' game. distancing. In 2022, the world body

England Must Shed Fear Of Losing, Says New Coach Tuchel

LONDON: For the fans who grimaced their way through England's run to the Euro 2024 final, new head coach Thomas Tuchel's pledge on Thursday that his team will focus on the joy of winning and not the fear of losing will be music to their ears.

German Tuchel takes charge of his first game on Friday as England host Albania at Wembley in their opening World Cup qualifier -- the first step in a journey the Football Association hope will lead to glory in the United States.

England reached their second successive European Championship final last year in Germany but it was anything but a barnstorming run with timid displays against the likes of Denmark, Slovenia and Slovakia.

Tuchel was reminded about comments he made while working as a pundit at Euro 2024 in which he said Gareth Southgate's England were shackled by pressure.

"It was my feeling, was my feedback in front of TV long before I thought I would be in charge," the former Chelsea manager told reporters before taking



the final training session at Tottenham Hotspur's training ground.

"I think it has to be the other way around. I want us to play with excitement and hunger and the desire to win and the joy to win and the acceptance of failure is part of it.

"I want players to feel safe to express themselves and play with joy to win, not the fear to lose.

Asked if the England shirt weighed heavily on a squad full of regular trophy winners, a relaxed Tuchel injected humour, displaying his linguistic expertise.

"I heard that's it's a heavy shirt, but it's in fact not, it's a high quality shirt that will weight less when we come to America that adapts to the climate there," he said.

LONDON: Cristiano Ronaldo was 40 last month and is top scorer in Saudi soccer's top flight. Lewis Hamilton hit the same age in January and is after an eighth Formula One title. LeBron James, also recently 40, is the first NBA player to score 50,000 combined points.

They are big name examples of the growing multitude of modern sportspeople performing at remarkable levels at an age when in yesteryear they would probably be long retired.

Experts attribute the growing longevity in elite sport to a host of steadilyevolving conditions: from improved diet and mental wellbeing to better recovery and training facilities.

'A whole constellation of factors ... it's like pouring gasoline," Canadian performance nutritionist Dr Marc Bubbs, author of "Peak" about science in sport, told Reuters of the additional factors fuelling top performance.

In his field - nutrition athletes are far more thoughtful about what they eat, some hiring chefs to prepare tailored meals, others like Hamilton embracing high-fibre, plant-based diets. "They should be getting injured more, but they aren't," added Bubbs of the improved health for older competitors. In Europe's top five soc-

cer leagues, the number of over-35 players topped 100 for the first time in 2020 and has been there for all but one of the following years, according to database Transfermarkt. By contrast, in 1980, there were only 12 men of that

age playing in those elite leagues.

In tennis, the trio of Novak Djokovic, Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer famously dominated their sport into ages that would previously have been considered

prime. Still at it aged 37, Djokovic attests to the advances in nutritionary science after switching to a gluten-free



diet mid-career. "Suddenly there was an X factor, a change in my diet that allowed my body to perform the way it was meant to," he wrote in his book "Serve to
