Hailstorm Hits South Kashmir Orchards Again

Srinagar: Apple orchards across south Kashmir's Pulwama, Shopian, and Kulgam districts have once again suffered significant damage following a severe hailstorm during the crucial harvesting season. The unexpected storm has dashed the hopes of thousands of local growers who rely on the fruit trade for their livelihood.

Farmers from areas including Sedow-Hirpora in Shopian and DH Pora in Kulgam said that the storm destroyed large portions of their apple crops, adding to losses from previous weatherrelated damages.

"The hailstorm was merciless," said Nazim Ahmad, an

orchardist from Shopian. "We invest heavily in fertilizers, pesticides, and labor every year. But these repeated natural calamities are ruining our hard work."

Growers have renewed calls for immediate government compensation and the implementation of a comprehensive crop insurance scheme, which has long been promised but remains pending. Many expressed willingness to pay annual premiums if it guarantees protection against such disasters.

"We are not asking for charity but for a sustainable safety net, said a local farmer. "The government must act now to protect the backbone of Kashmir's economy." The Fruit Growers Association | More on P10

A Clerk With Crores?

Srinagar Official's Wealth Triggers ACB Probe

Srinagar: Behind the unassuming facade of a clerk's desk in the Srinagar deputy commissioner's office lies a story of hidden wealth that has stunned investigators. Imtiyaz Ahmad Bhat, a 'Nazir' (clerk grade) by designation, now finds himself at the center of a major anti-corruption probe after the Jammu and Kashmir Anti-Corruption Bureau uncovered assets far beyond what his modest salary could justify.

A discreet verification by the bureau revealed that Bhat owns multiple immovable properties, including a spacious house and additional structures in Firdousabad, Batamaloo, along with two sizeable plots of land in Mouza Nowgam. These holdings cover significant land areas, far exceeding the financial reach expected from his official income.

But the assets are not limited to real estate. The investigation uncovered that Bhat possesses several luxury vehicles, including a Toyota Fortuner, Renault Duster, and Maruti Wagon-R. The probe also revealed multiple suspicious transactions and unexplained cash deposits in various bank accounts, raising red flags about the source of his wealth.

Further scrutiny showed that Bhat and his family operate several bank lockers in J&K Bank and maintain a lifestyle inconsistent with his declared earnings. The bureau also highlighted substantial expenditures on the higher education of his children, which appeared disproportionate to his income.

Patient's Death Over Alleged Negligence at Paras Hospital Sparks Protest

SRINAGAR: A 34-year-old man from Pampore, south Kashmir, died allegedly due to medical negligence at Paras Hospital in Srinagar, triggering protests from his family and calls for accountability from authorities.

The deceased, Waseem Ahmed Pathan, a resident of Bilal Colony in Pampore, had been admitted to the hospital eight days earlier for treatment of an intestinal infection. According to his family, he died on Saturday morning following complications arising after surgery.

Relatives and locals gathered outside the hospital premises, staging a protest and demanding strict action against the hospital administration and the doctor involved in Waseem's treatment. Holding placards and raising slogans, they accused the hospital of mishandling the case and called for an independent probe.

"Waseem had a cyst removed through surgery a few days ago and was discharged. The very next day, he experienced severe pain and had to be readmitted," his brother said, adding that the subsequent operation was necessitated because his intestine had allegedly been injured during the first surgery.

surgery. He claimed that the fam-

ily paid Rs 2.5 lakh for Waseem's treatment, but were given substandard care. "This is not just negligence, it is murder," he said, urging authorities to intervene.

Protesters also appealed to the Chief Minister and health authorities to initiate a thorough inquiry and hold those responsible accountable. They alleged that this was not an isolated incident, accusing the hospital of repeated negligence in recent years.

In response, Paras Hospital issued a statement refuting the allegations. The hospital said that Waseem Ahmed, whom they referred to as a 36-year-old patient, had been diagnosed with carcinoma of the left colon and underwent surgery on May 15.

The hospital also stated that Waseem had a known psychiatric history and had been prescribed fluoxetine, which was later discontinued. "We also provided psychiatric consultation during his recovery period," the official added.

Meanwhile, the family has reiterated its demand for a formal investigation, expressing distrust over the hospital's explanation. They called on the health department and legal authorities to ensure justice and prevent similar incidents in the future

Commuters Fume Over Pothole-Ridden Pantha Chowk–Pampore Road

SRINAGAR: A severely deteriorated road stretch between Pantha Chowk and Pampore has become a growing cause of concern for commuters and transporters alike, with residents and daily travellers accusing authorities of criminal negligence.

A delegation of frustrated commuters said that the road is riddled with deep potholes and craters, making travel not only uncomfortable but dangerous. "This road has turned into a death trap. Several vehicles have been damaged due to the poor condition of the stretch, and the uneven surface makes it a serious safety hazard," said Irshad Ahmad, a regular commuter.

He added that despite being a crucial and busy route connecting Srinagar with parts of South Kashmir, the condition of the road continues to worsen with no signs of repair. "I wonder why this road has been totally neglected. My vehicle suffered massive underbody damage due to these potholes," he said.

The Pantha Chowk-Sempora stretch is frequently used by heavy transport vehicles, including oil tankers, load carriers, and public transport. Local residents and drivers fear that the uneven road could easily lead to accidents, especially dur-

ing rainfall or at night.

"There is a real danger of heavy vehicles skidding or overturning, particularly when fully loaded," said another commuter. "In such cases, it's not just the driver's life at stake but also of other motorists and pedestrians. The authorities must be held accountable."

Despite repeated appeals from locals and transporters, the concerned department has failed to initiate repairs or even temporary patchwork. The road, part of a key economic corridor, has ironically been left in shambles even as developmental slogans echo across official platforms.

The aggrieved commuters have urged the Roads and Buildings (R&B) Department, along with higher civil administration, to immediately assess the condition of the road and take swift remedial measures. They warned that continued inaction may result in avoidable mishaps and public protests.

"We are not asking for miracles, just basic road maintenance to make this route safe again," said one member of the delegation.

The concerned legislator, Ahsan Pardesi, when contacted assured that the matter will be taken up with the department and the road will be macadamized without any delay. [KNT]





Centre-JK discuss truce plan

Delhi asks J&K to prepare action plan on CBM's

SRINAGAR: Centre today asked the Jammu and Kashmir Government to prepare a comprehensive time-bound action plan to implement the Confidence-Building Measures (CBM's) announced in India and Pakistan in the recent joint declaration and on the physical structures needed to implement them.

Meanwhile Centre and J&K government are actively considering a

ceasefire with militants in the state. This was revealed by the union home secretary V K Duggal during a press conference here today.

Asked whether there would be a ceasefire between the security forces and the militants, he said; "That is the objective, and I have

spoken to the state governor and the chief minister about this but it has to be a consultative process."

"The main important CBM is dialogue process. Any CBM which involves the movement of people, transport, goods and services

and implementation of trade needs a dialogue process... When can we start and how can we start." Mr Duggal said.

He said the central government would provide all infrastructure support to the state administration for opening meeting points

between the Kashmiris of India and Pakistan, increasing bus services across the border and facilitating trade through the new routes.

He said the other important component of the CBMs is the

He said the other important component of the CBMs is the infrastructure needed to implement them.

"The slate government has been asked to prepare the report? What all it can handle and where it needs the support of the

central government so that we can consider that." he added.
"PM Manmohan's intentions are very clear on this. We have specific instructions that these CBMs should be taken forward most-religiously and in a dedicated time-bound manner. Money and resources should not act as constraints in implementing these measures." he added.

On possible talks with separatist leaders. Duggal said Prime Minister Manmohan Singh was opposed to talks with Hurriyat Conference.

"The Prime Minister is most open to talks with anybody who has a concrete plan However, a mechanism has to be put in place for holding such talks," he told reporters. Duggal said important and positive steps were being taken in Kashmir-to restore normalcy. "The return Kashmiri Pandit migrants, and the Amarnath yatra are positive steps. I think Kashmir is on its way to peace.

New Delhi: India ripped through Pakistan's "disinformation" at the UN on the Indus Waters Treaty, asserting that Islamabad violated its spirit by inflicting three wars and thousands of terror attacks on India that seek to hold hostage lives of civilians, religious harmony and economic prosperity.

'We are constrained to respond to the disinformation being carried out by the delegation of Pakistan with regard to the Indus Waters Treaty. India has always acted in a responsible manner as an upper riparian state," India's Permanent Representative to UN Ambassador Parvathaneni Harish said on Friday.

Harish was addressing the UN Security Council Arria Formula meeting organised by the Permanent Mission of Slovenia on 'Protecting Water in Armed Conflict - Protecting Civilian Lives.

Harish highlighted four aspects to expose the "dis-information" by Pakistan, which spoke about India's decision to suspend the Indus Waters Treaty.

Iran Holds Firm as US Gains Clarity on Nuke Stance: FM

Tehran: Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi hails "one of the most professional" rounds of talks with the United States, saying Tehran will continue to hold its ground and insist on its "com pletely clear" positions.

Araghchi made the remarks following the end of the fifth round of indirect talks between Tehran and Washington which lasted for more than three hours in the Italian capital Rome on Friday. The talks are mediated by Omani Foreign Minister Badr Albusaidi.

"This round was one of the most professional rounds of negotiations we have ever had. We once again announced the positions and principles of the Islamic Republic of Iran regarding the negotiations. Our positions are completely clear, and we stand firm on them," the top Iranian negotiator said.

Araghchi said the American side has "now a better, clearer and more precise understanding of our positions."

Before his departure to Rome, Araghchi reiterated Iran's resolve to continue its uranium enrichment program and stressed that there will be no deal if the US insists on an excessive demand to slash Iran's legitimate right to enrichment to zero.

Monsoon Arrives In India, Earliest Onset Over Indian Mainland Since 2009

New Delhi: The southwest monsoon hit Kerala on Saturday, marking its earliest arrival over the Indian mainland since 2009 when it reached the southern state on May 23, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said.

Normally the southwe monsoon makes its onset over Kerala by June 1 and covers the entire country by July 8. It starts retreating from northwest India around September 17 and withdraws completely by October 15.

The monsoon had set in over the southern state on May 30 last year; June 8 in 2023; May 29 in 2022; June 3 in 2021; June 1 in 2020; June 8 in 2019; and May 29 in 2018, IMD data showed.

Data available since 1975 showed that the monsoon reached Kerala the earliest in 1990 (on May 19), 13 days before the usual date.

According to meteorologists, there is no direct reladate and the total rainfall over the country during the season.

The monsoon arriving early or late in Kerala does not mean it will cover other parts of the country accordingly. It is characterised by large-scale variabilities and global, regional and local features, an IMD official said.

The IMD in April forecas above-normal cumulative rainfall in the 2025 monsoon season, ruling out the possibility of El Nino conditions. which are associated with below-normal rainfall in the Indian subcontinent.

According to the IMD, rainfall between 96 per cent and 104 per cent of the 50-year average of 87 cm is considered 'normal'. Rainfall less than 90 per

cent of the long-period average is considered 'deficient'; between 90 per cent and 95 per cent is 'below normal': between 105 per cent and 110 per cent is 'above normal'; and more than 110 per cent is considered 'excess' precipitation.

According to his jail records, he was arrested in 1977. He was involved in the death of a man who was killed during a fight between two groups.


Man, Sleeping Under Tree, Buried Alive As **Workers Dump Sludge On Him**

Statehood Restoration Prerogative Of Parliament: LoP Sharma

SRINAGAR: Leader of Opposition (LoP) in the Jammu and Kashmir Assembly, Sunil Shar-ma Saturday said that restoration of Jammu and Kashmir's statehood is the prerogative of the Parliament and the Bharatiya Janata Party, not of regional parties like the National Conference or Peoples Democratic Party (PDP).

Sharma, who was on a visit to shelling-hit areas of Kupwara also hailed Operation Sindoor as a decisive strike. He also defended the Tiranga rallies against Congress criticism, and issued a stern warning to Pakistan, asserting that any provocation would meet with unprecedented retaliation.

Statehood Will Be Restored—But Not Through NC Or

The Leader of Opposition stated that the restoration of Jammu and Kashmir's statehood lies solely in the hands of the Parliament and the central leadership, particularly Prime Minister Narendra Modi. "Statehood will come, we will bring it, but not at the request of the National Conference or the PDP," he said.

"NC and PDP's role is limited to subsidised LPG, ration, and pension," he said, urging the people of Kashmir not to be misled. He emphasized that neither party holds any significant presence or influence in Delhi, with only three MPs combined. "In Parliament, they are not even counted. Outside of Jammu and Kashmir, most people don't even know what the National Conference is."

He contrasted this with the BJP's political clout, claiming the party rules over 20 states. "Even if you add up their strength, we still have over 1,600 MPs more," he said. "So, there is no question of comparison." Operation Sindoor & Tiranga Rallies: "Not Politics, But Patriotism"

Defending Operation Sindoor, which was hailed as a significant military success by the BJP, the Leader of Opposition dismissed Congress's criticism that the operation and subsequent Tiranga rallies were politicized. "The Tiranga is not a symbol of a political party; it represents the pride and honor of India. To carry it is an act of patriotism, not politics," he

He accused the Congress and what he termed the "evidence



al sentiment. "They asked for proof of surgical strikes, proof of airstrikes-now they're questioning Tiranga rallies. This is part of their DNA. If someone holding the Tiranga shouts slogans in favor of our army, is that politics? Congress should apologize."

On Pakistan: "We Are Worshippers Of Peace, But Will Not Tolerate Threats" Addressing recent threats

from Pakistani leadership, including remarks that Pakistan might "shut down India's breath" in retaliation for water blockade measures, the Leader of Opposition issued a sharp warning. "We are peace-loving, but if provoked, the response will be such that Pakistan will not find a place on the world map," he said.

He recalled a historic moment involving former Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, who told then-U.S. President Bill Clinton that while Pakistan may have nuclear weapons, any misadventure would lead to its erasure. "That spirit of deterrence still lives in India today," he said.

Although he refrained from commenting on foreign policy directly-citing his role as a leader in a Union Territory-he emphasized India's growing global stature and military strength. "The Indian Army is the third-largest in the world, and India is the fastest-growing economy. Let there be no doubt about our capabilities."

CS Chairs State Level Sanctioning Committee Meet

Approves Rs 75.80 Cr AAP For Watershed Development Under PMKSY

SRINAGAR: The State Level Sanctioning Committee (SLSC) for the Watershed Development Component of Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yo-jana (WDC-PMKSY) 2.0, which met here Saturday under the chairmanship of Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, gave nod to Annual Action Plan worth Rs 75.80 crore for Watershed Development under PMKSY.

The meeting was convened to review implementation of the scheme besides assessing the Annual Action Plan for the year 2025-26.

Present in the meeting were Principal Secretary, Finance; Secretary, RDD; representatives from JSD, PWD, Revenue and other concerned officers.

The Chief Secretary exhorted the concerned to make the best use of this scheme for creation of durable assets in the water stressed areas. He called for community participation in such initiatives so that these could prove to be the most beneficial for them.

He assessed the progress registered in different districts being covered under this flagship scheme and stressed on prioritizing works which are most suitable for the particular areas. He directed the senior officers in the department to conduct frequent visits to the sites to take first hand appraisal of the works being executed under this scheme.

Principal Secretary, Finance and APD Departments, Shailendra Kumar, while speaking in the meeting, stressed on including other minor irrigation works in the DPRs so that the water reaches up to the last fields in these areas. He also suggested measures to make the execution of works more transparent and beneficial for the public at large.



The meeting reviewed the progress and approved the proposals under the centrally sponsored flagship programme aimed at enhancing the water conservation, climate resilience and sustainable agriculture in the UT.

While highlighting broad contours of the scheme, Secretary RD&PR Department, Aijaz Asad, informed that WDC-PMKSY is continuation of the earlier Integrated Watershed Programme Management (IWMP), which had been subsumed into PMKSY in 2015-16.

He revealed that under WDC-PMKSY 2.0. several initiatives and infrastructure projects had been implemented to boost watershed-based development. Besides, physical and financial progress has been recorded across various districts, with special emphasis on construction of water harvesting structures, ponds and irrigation channels.

Additionally, the rainwater harvesting tanks and bunds for soil and moisture conservation, beautification and rejuvenation of water bodies including springs and streams also constitutes the actions being taken under this programme.

A significant highlight of the year has been the Watershed Yatra Campaign 2025, launched on 5th February in Kathua district by the Union Cabinet Minister for Agriculture and the UT Minister for Rural Development. The campaign underscored the integrated watershed governance and community participation for which J&K secured the 2nd rank nationally for strategic planning and participatory implementation of WDC-PMKSY 2.0.

Moreover, it was divulged that as part of a new initiative under WDC-PMKSY 2.0, 300 springs have been allocated to J&K for rejuvenation as pilot projects. Further, under the national initiative to rejuvenate 50,000 springs, 3,100 more have been tentatively assigned to the UT for which the final project guidelines are awaited from DoLR.

The SLSC also reviewed and approved the Annual Action Plan (AAP) for 2025–26 with a proposed budget of Rs 75.80 crore, focusing primarily on Natural Resource Management (Rs 42.70 crore), Production Systems (Rs 15.03 crore), Consolidation & Withdrawal Phase (Rs 2.15 Cr), Work done claims from AAP 2024-25 (Rs 8.14 crore) and Administrative Expenses of Rs 4.15 crore to be utilised over the ensuing financial year.

The committee also approved the revision of Detailed Project Reports (DPRs) to include the newly allocated 300 springs and asked for creation of DPR in consultation with the Jal Shakti Department.

The approved initiatives, as concluded in the meeting, are expected to accelerate the sustainable agricultural growth and foster inclusive rural development across the region.

28 Govt Schools In Ladakh **Run With Zero Students**

SRINAGAR: In a shocking revelation, at least '28 governmentrun schools in Ladakh Union Territory are functioning with zero student enrolment. The UT is also reeling under an adverse Pupil Teacher Ratio (PTR), with 65 schools functioning with a single teacher.

The official documents available reveal that out of the total 841 government schools in Ladakh, 28 schools, including 20 primary and 8 upper primary, have zero enrolment.

"316 primary schools have less than 30 enrolment, and two schools have less than 256 enrolment. There are 65 single-teacher schools in the UT. In addition, the number of schools with adverse PTR at the primary level is 23.1%," the data reveals.

The Government of India (GoI) has urged the UT authorities to examine these schools with low enrollments and adverse PTRs, identify the reasons behind them, and take immediate corrective measures, including rationalising the allocation of teachers.

The documents further reveal that based on Ladakh's proposal in different years, a total of 48 schools have been approved for skill education under Samagra Shiksha. Out of these approved schools, the UT has been able to implement skill education in 40 schools only, leaving 8 approved schools pending."

"Further, the current school coverage stands at only 36.92%, with implementation across eight sectors (Apparel, Agriculture, Beauty & Wellness, Electronics & Hardware, Healthcare, Retail, Information Technology and Tourism & Hospitality)," it reads.

The UT was advised to ex-

tend the coverage of skill education to the uncovered schools and students by introducing appropriate sectors and job roles—(KNO)

Police Arrests Three Drug Peddlers

SRINAGAR: In a series of successful anti-narcotics operations, police on Saturday said to have arrested three drug peddlers and smugglers in multiple operations in Anantnag & Sopore. Police also said to have recovered a significant quantity of contraband substances from their possessions.

A police party from Police Station Uttersoo, during routine naka checking, apprehended one individual identified as Wasim Ahmad Khan son of Gull Mohammad Khah, resident of Sunglan, a police spokesman said in a statement issued Kashmir Observer.

Upon the search, 800 grams of a Charas-like substance was recovered from his possession, the statement reads.

"In another operation, a police team from PS Aishmuqam during naka checking at Logripora/ Manzigam Road near Singhpora Crossing, apprehended one person identified as Jalal Din Bhat son of Ghulam Nabi Bhat resident of Salia Panchalpora. A staggering 12.9Kgs of raw Poppy buds was seized from his possession," police said.

Similarly, during routine patrolling near Mughal Garden, Verinag, a police party from Police Post Verinag observed a suspicious individual carrying a nylon bag. Upon noticing the police, the suspect fled the scene, abandoning the bag. A thorough search led to the recovery of 6.9 kg of Green Poppy Straw. The accused has been identified as Sajad Ahmad Padder, son of Mohd Yousuf Padder, resident of Gutligund, Verinag. However, efforts are on to apprehend the absconding suspect, the statement added.

Moreover, in Sopore, police arrested a drug peddler during naka checking at Wagub Crossing and recovered 25 strips (200 capsules) of banned psychotropic substance from his possession. The accused has been identified as Farooq Ahmad Bhat, son of Ghulam Mohammad Bhat, resident of Hadipora, Rafiabad, the spokesman said.

Accordingly, police said that cases under relevant sections of law have been registered at respective police stations, and further investigation is underway to trace the supply chain and expose the broader network behind the drug peddling.

Rahul Gandhi Walks Through Poonch's Grief: "I Will Be Their Voice"

After deadly shelling killed 15 and injured dozens, the Congress leader met with grieving families in a border town struggling to return to normal.

POONCH: Rahul Gandhi stood silent outside a broken home in Poonch on Saturday, listening to a woman recall how her sons, Zain and Zohaib, never made it to breakfast.

The two boys were among the 15 civilians killed when shells rained over this border district earlier this month, in one of the deadliest episodes of Indo-Pak escalation in recent years.

The Congress leader arrived mid-morning, unaccompanied by fanfare.

He walked through narrow lanes where homes still smelled of smoke and metal. At each stop, he sat with families, heard their stories, and asked about the things they needed most.

In his words, it was "a very big tragedy." In theirs, it was a life turned upside down.

"I spoke to the people, tried to understand their problems," Gandhi told reporters after the visit. "They told me they want to raise some things at the national level. I will raise them."

The shelling, which started on May 7 and continued for four days, left 43 injured and entire neighborhoods scarred.

Most of the victims were either inside their homes or tending to livestock when the shells hit.

At a small seminary near the border, the fragments punched through tin roofs and classrooms alike. One of the teachers, Qari Mohammad Iqbal, lost his life in the blast. Some national media falsely painted him as a terror sympathizer. Gandhi made it a point to meet his family too.

The Digital Deed

cture this. A farmer in south Kashmir walks for miles o reach the tehsil office. He's holding a paper so faded it's barely legible. It's the only proof he has that the land he tills belongs to him. Or maybe he has no paper at all, just his grandfather's word. He waits for hours, only to be told that the land he's claimed for generations doesn't show up in official records. Or worse, it does, but under someone else's name.

That's not a one-off story. That's the system. For decades, land ownership in Jammu and Kashmir has lived in dusty files, missing maps and family lore. Courts are jammed with land disputes. Banks refuse loans because no one trusts the paperwork. Builders stay away. People fight, not just over land, but over what that land means: home, inheritance, history.

Now, something big is happening. The government is trying

Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo is leading a statewide push to digitize every land record, map every plot and verify every claim. That might sound like just another government scheme. But in a place where a mismarked boundary can start a feud, or stall a family's future, this could be a big revolution.

And it's already started.

In the past six months, more records have been digitized than in the previous two years combined. Districts like Pulwama and Ganderbal are nearly ready for public review. New software lets officials update land titles in real time. Google Earth and satellite tools help spot conflicts. Village camps are popping up where people can check their land records, speak to officials, and fix mistakes right there.

It's not perfect. Plenty of errors still slip through. Some old maps don't match what's actually on the ground. In some cases, entire boundaries have shifted, or never existed on paper to begin with. So retired officials, legal experts and digital mappers have been brought in to double-check everything. In each tehsil, they go file by file, name by name.

The public can see what's happening too. Soon, anyone with a smartphone can pull up land records online and flag a problem. For families who've never held a formal deed, it's more than paperwork. It's protection. It's proof. It's peace of mind.

This isn't just about efficiency. It's about fairness. In Kashmir, land is often the only thing people own. When the system gets it wrong, the fallout isn't just legal. It's personal. Families lose what's theirs. Farmers lose access to credit. Whole generations miss out on opportunity.

Can this new digital push fix a century of confusion? Maybe not all at once. But it's a start. And it's working: silently, steadi-

It'll take grit. Some people will resist. Many won't trust the access and honest ground work, the fog around who owns what can start to lift. This is not about flashy announcements. It's

about getting the small things right. Kashmir deserves that clarity. And it's long overdue.

Harvard's Trumpian Blues

As the "Dean of Disruption" swings at the Ivy citadel, the question isn't what Harvard was, but what it still dares to be.

'n a convoluted, zigzagged, sometimes nice, at times vicious but mostly serendipitous way, I have been the beneficiary of the western university system.

Admittedly, a broad term, the 'western university system' may not be an entirely accurate one. Would, for example, most European and Scandinavian universities - dead end ideological, and academically stultifying universities be co-eval with American universities? (I recall my time with a Danish university where I went against its ideological moorings and set to write my thesis on American foreign policy, with a slant for America as a potential force for good, the program co-ordinator, out of pique and ignorance called me a 'Muslim terrorist'!.)

If then there is a western university system, worth its name, it is the Anglo- Saxon universities with American ones topping the list.

How have I been a beneficiary of the western universities I attended?

Reductively and roughly, the education in these unis has helped me cultivate and develop critical thinking skills, expansive mental vistas and horizons, ability to hold different and different ideas in my mind, appreciate these, yet hold my own, tolerance of opposing points of views and ability to see the world in a different(salubrious)

This, most would agree, in both normative and ideal terms should constitute the end(s) of education. The rest-skill(s), analytical ability, and so on- are merely corollariesalbeit important ones.

But maybe the overall credit accrues mostly to me and some outstanding scholars and teachers I met and interacted with: I may have been a pupil whose orientation was 'naturally' oriented toward curiosity determined learning of a non-utilitarian learning.

By way of a digression, this non-utilitarian learning has been and is my special privilege.

In this sense, I may have been an outlier in a university system that, over time, came to privilege money (through international students) and a narrowly utilitarian focus- with vocational courses and an assembly line of oneyear degree programs serving as its 'cash cows'.

To be sure, I paid prices for my non-utilitarian approach toselves or in some cases went contra the nature of universities- that is citadels of learning and as repositories of competing ideas

On this, comes American president, Donald Trump's disruptive and 'insurgent' sledgehammer. (The latest in the saga of smashing shibboleths is Harvard university. With varying intensities, the indelicacies postulated in this essay

Now, the approach taken by Mr. Trump corresponds to his style: stake an extreme position, hit hard, make a given institution, or individual untenable and get it(him/her) where Mr. Trump wants them to be.

Shorn of lip gloss, fake niceties and other fake accoutrements, this approach has worked eminently for Mr. Trump. And this is what the 47th president of the US is doing with Harvard.

While the disruption engendered by Mr. Trump is likely- at the end of the saga- will have traction and intended effects, but the risk is that of 'unintended consequences.'

To hark back to my experiences with the western university system, I would like to think my cognitive and intellectual universe became more dynamic, better and nuanced.

In this sense, as an ideal type, the western university can be a force for good in the world- with a determined focus on dispassionate learning, vigorous scholasticism, tolerance of different points of view (which should however not turn into bullying slanging matches), nuanced sophisticated thinking and so on.

It can be if there is reversion to the ideal of learning by western universities but not to these institutions being mere money spinners employing their brand equity

Harvard university- a hallowed and a venerable institution - that has past glory affixed to its brand, pedagogy and scholasticism – should set the 'new gold standard'.

IF this - imbibing what the western university's raison d'etre is among Mr. Trump's major aims, then it may not be an insalubrious one.

While there is, to use a very indecorous and poor phrase, always some 'collateral damage' in sanguine disruption, the hope is that Mr. Trump's shake up does not lead to burn out of students and that Harvard as the bell weather institution of the world becomes what it was: a bastion of non -ideological learning and robust scholasticism that reflects the best of

gnantly in Australia, but all in all the experience(s) have been decidedly enriching.

So, if the western university system disavowed its 'core functions' of disinterested, non-partisan enquiry, the quest for vigorous scholarly pursuits, non -ideological scholarship and allied themes, what did it morph into?

Client oriented (read clients of international students), ideological, money determined, bastions where the quest for learning and scholasticism became residual detritus to the, 'core functions and competences of the firm' (to employ business parlance).

Even this may, for the sake of hypothesis may be justified but the consequences were deleterious: the universities became arenas where dominant ideologies did not countenance alternate points of view (in fact, these were viciously excluded- conservative views being a case in point), client-students became arbiters of academics' careers and trajectories thereof, mono-focal thinking became almost normative, group think echo chamber thinking became prominent, viciously subtle exclusion jostled with cancel culture and labelling and so on.

All in all, then the western university system emblematized by American universities became either pale husks of their former

Schooled into Silence

Inside the high-stakes race for academic success that's costing Kashmir's youth their mental health and happiness.

I remember standing in morning assemblies being punished for not saying prayers loudly enough. Teachers hitting kids for small things like a late arrival or a messy uniform was normal. Those memories still hurt.

Honestly, striking a six-year-old because their uniform isn't clean is not discipline. It shows a deeper problem with how adults see kids.

If teachers think violence is the answer, they need more than training. They need real help. The

same teachers who could be so harsh would then tell us how to succeed in life and be good people. That contradiction hurts.

And it's not just in schools. Parents have also learned this culture of punishment. A six-year-old who wants to skip school because they are tired or scared often gets beaten or scolded. No one listens to their fears or feelings. Their tears are ignored.

My younger brother once told my six-monthold baby, "You're a king now, but soon a frustrated teacher will force you to do homework, punish you for tiny mistakes, and drain the joy out of learn-

It's a sad joke between us, half humour, half truth. Because the system doesn't reward curiosity, creativity, or emotion. It rewards compliance.

Success, as our system defines it, is measured by marks. Kids stress over half a mark difference, a number that doesn't say anything real about their

Instead of nurturing them, we're making them anxious. Instead of building character, we're training obedience. This is not education. It's endurance.

We say we believe in God's plan, yet we act like everything depends on test scores. But life is not a race against others. It's about finding who we are, what we can give, and how we grow.

Every child is born with a unique purpose. Some are artists, some thinkers, some healers. Reducing their value to marks on paper is unfair and cruel.

It's time to change how we define success. Let's raise children to be kind, curious, and confident, not just competitive. Let's measure worth in meaning, not marks. Let's stop comparing children and start nurturing their potential.

The idea of "survival of the fittest" doesn't belong in a community that values compassion and faith. True success comes from resilience, purpose, and peace of mind. If we let our children grow instead of making them compete endlessly, we might finally earn the right to call them kings again.

n Kashmir, a child's birth brings endless joy. But the moment that child walks into school, something changes.

Suddenly, they are measured, compared, and pushed to compete. School stops being just a place to learn. It becomes a battleground where even five-year-olds find themselves running a race they never agreed to.

What was once pure joy turns into pressure to be productive, focused, and competitive. Being happy isn't enough anymore.

From early on, kids are taught life is about proving their worth. "Work hard or get left behind" is the message, and "survival of the fittest" stops being a biology lesson and becomes a harsh reality drilled into their minds by parents, teachers, and society. Here in Kashmir, this idea is even more strict.

Our society has fixed academic milestones as the only way to measure a child's future. Class 10 board exams become the first big judgment day. The marks kids earn get picked apart and

compared, defining their entire academic identity. Class 12 is the second, bigger test, where kids are told whether they will "make it" or "fail." But "making it" means something very specific:

top grades, cracking tough exams like NEET or IIT-JEE, and landing a government job. Only then is someone seen as truly successful. This narrow view leaves no room for creativity, happiness, or even individuality. Every child has to

squeeze through the same small tunnel no matter who they are or what they dream of. And it's damag-What starts as encouragement becomes pressure.

The joy of learning disappears, replaced by anxiety and fear. We see more and more students breaking down-mentally, emotionally, and sometimes physically. Rising suicide rates linked to exam stress are not isolated. They show a system that is broken.

Recently, two young kids in Kashmir faked their own kidnapping just to escape school pressure. When children fear school so much they run away, we have to ask: what are we doing wrong?

Looking back on my own school days, I feel angry and sometimes bitterly amused. It's not just teachers to blame, though some methods were harsh. The system itself is flawed.

Kashmiri Kids Deserve Better

Listening to Kashmiri children, I uncover stories that demand more than sympathy. They call for action.

Sheeba Nair

was sitting in my living room, scrolling through my phone, when a voice message stopped me cold.

It was Ayesha, a Class 7 student from Jammu & Kashmir. Her voice was small, shaky. "I get terrified when there's an explosion,

even on TV," she said. "I can't focus on my studies. Please help..

My chest tightened. I played it again, her fear sinking deeper into me.

A month ago, a terror attack in Pahalgam killed 26 people. It shook the nation, and it's still shaking kids like Ayesha.

I've been talking to children and families in J&K, trying to understand what life feels like for them now. The attack wasn't just a headline, it ripped through their sense of

Ainoor, a 12th-grader with bright eyes and gritty smile, tells me about the hope they'd built over the last few years.

"Since March 2021, our schools have stayed open for over 1,500 days straight," she says, her voice proud but heavy. "No random closures. That was huge for us. We thought we were finally getting a normal life."

Then April 22 hit. Explosions echoed through their valleys, sirens wailed, and blackouts darkened their homes.

"Our fears came rushing back," Ainoor

continues. "Will it all start again?" She's not alone in her worry. Shehnaaz, another 12th-grader, wants to pursue science. She's scared the disruptions will widen the education gap that's already left Kashmiri students struggling to keep up. "Why can't our lives be normal like other students'?" she asks over a crackling phone line. I don't have

Ufaq, who's studying for her medical entrance exam, and Zeenat, preparing for college admissions, tell me the tension makes it impossible to focus.

Reyaan, a soft-spoken boy from Baramulla near the Line of Control, says four days of war-like chaos left him and others rattled. "What if it lasted longer?" he asks. I can feel the weight of his fear, living so close to the

It's not just the immediate threat. Kashmiri students studying across India face their



own battles

Reyaan tells me about students targeted and assaulted in other cities, some forced to return home mid-exam. "The actions of a few have painted us all as threats," he says, his voice tight with frustration.

Nighat, who dreams of studying law outside J&K, says her parents are too scared to let her go. "They think I won't be safe," she tells me.

Usmaan, a science student, is considering studying abroad just to feel secure. But Kubra, a humanities student, shakes her head. "Even abroad, how do you find peace when

your family's in danger here?" she asks. They're trapped, stuck between a home that feels unsafe and a world that doesn't al-

ways welcome them. Í speak to Vaibhav Jindal, who's worked in J&K's education system for years.

"We need safe spaces for Kashmiri stu-dents in cities across India," he says. "Businesses, communities, and local governments should work together now, in peacetime, to create a network of homes or hostels where students can feel secure during crises."

He also stresses the need for counseling in schools. "Teachers could be trained to support students emotionally, not just academi-

I nod, thinking of Ayesha's fear-gripped

Authorities in Jammu and Kashmir moved quickly to reopen schools after a cease-fire and it definitely helped. But kids today need more than open classrooms. They need someone to help them process the fear.

I learn about creative workshops some local groups are trying—art, music, story-telling, theatre—to let kids express their silences and in the process, heal their wounds. There's talk of interstate visits too, where students from J&K could meet peers elsewhere, feel accepted, and see a world beyond the conflict.

Ainoor lights up when she talks about this. "We've tasted normalcy these past few years," she says. "We don't want to go back to how our parents lived, always afraid. We want to chase our dreams, contribute to this country like anyone else.'

Beyond the kids, I hear the pain of entire communities. Kashmiris are known for their warmth, their hospitality, but behind their smiles is a history of loss.

After the Pahalgam attack, something

shifted. For the first time in decades, the Valley shut down. Not in fear, but in protest. People poured into the streets, condemning

"This is an attack on all of us," one woman shouted, her voice raw. "We don't want this violence in our name," said another.

These weren't politicians or activists. They were just ordinary Kashmiris standing together. Their words were a plea for trust and support. I saw their faces on social media, brave and

vulnerable, risking everything to speak out. Then came another blow: border shelling in Uri, and Poonch-Rajouri sectors of Jammu, leaving over a dozen civilians killed.

I heard people there, their voices thick with grief. "War devours the innocent," one community leader shares amid personal loss. "Peace isn't weakness, it's strength."

These communities in Jammu and Kashmir, living on the frontline, have lost the most to cross-border violence over the years. For many young people, it's the closest they've come to war.

What's unfolding in the hinterland casts a shadow over the heartland, transmitted through screens and smartphones. And it's already unsettling students like Jaza from

Srinagar, who tells me she lives in fear at school every day. "What if my dad or brother gets picked up?" she asks.

Reports of mass detentions, including young people, if true, are disturbing and create fear of reprisals in the innocents.

What perhaps could help is for the authorities to also take ameliorative steps like maintaining proper communication lines with the population that help strengthen their trust and ease the environment, especially in the young.

Else we risk alienating the very people who've shown such courage in speaking out and could end up burning bridges so assiduously built over past years.

I think about what Madhu N, a writer and educator from Kerala, told me. "We all must acknowledge that Kashmiris and those on the Jammu frontline are caught in a geopolitical mess that won't end soon," he says. "As a nation, we need to show empathy, give them a fair shot at life, wherever they are. Can we be their safe place to land?"

His words stick with me. These are our fellow citizens, facing the same dangers as our armed forces, yet often invisible to us. Their kids deserve the same stability we want for our own. I keep coming back to Ayesha's voice, her plea for help.

The dreams rekindled in J&K over the last few years—open schools, hopeful students, communities rebuilding—are fragile. How do

Maybe it starts with small steps: responsible tourism to show Kashmiris they're not alone, ensuring their students feel safe studying in our cities, rebuilding trust.

I think of the 1990 UN Convention on Child Rights, which says kids have a right to be heard. Ayesha, Ainoor, Shehnaaz, and the others are shouting to us. They want peace, a chance to study, to dream, to belong.

The Pahalgam attack was a national tragedy, but it's also a call to action. We can't erase the conflict, but we can listen. We can open our hearts, our cities, our schools. We can show J&K's children, they're not forgotten.

Jigar in Trouble

Young people are being blindsided by a disease they've never heard of, and doctors say it's just the beginning.

isease often comes silently in Kashmir. There are no sirens, no symptoms, no urgent warnings. You feel fine, until vou don't.

That's how fatty liver works. And right now, it's working Doctors in Srinagar are see-

ing it more than ever, in housewives, government employees, university students. People walk into clinics with a stomachache or fatigue

and leave with a diagnosis they've never heard of. Some don't believe it. Others nod and go home. They think: "At least it's not cancer." But it could be, one day. The official term is non-

alcoholic fatty liver disease, or NAFLD. It happens when fat builds up in the liver, even in people who don't drink.

At first, it's harmless. Then it turns into inflammation. Then scarring. Then, for some, liver failure. For others, cancer. There's no drama to it. Just slow, irreversible damage. The rise in Kashmir is hard

to quantify. There's no state-wide study. But ask any lab technician in the Valley and they'll tell you the same thing: it's showing up on scans more than ever. At times, multiple cases a day. Often in people under 40.

The causes aren't mysterious. A sharp drop in physical activity. Processed food everywhere. A culture that prizes heavy meals and dismisses moderation.

Wedding feasts here involve twelve-course wazwan platters, thick with mutton and ghee. School kids gulp soda between tuition sessions. Working adults skip breakfast and eat greasy late-night dinners.

When doctors say "change your lifestyle," they're talking



about all of this.

But it's not just food and exercise. Kashmir is a place that lives under pressure. Conflict, economic anxiety, joblessness and uncertainty don't just stay in the head. Chronic stress changes the body. It slows metabolism, raises blood sugar, fuels weight gain. Researchers believe it can worsen liver health, too.

Some of it may be in the genes. Studies suggest certain populations, including South Asians, have a higher genetic risk for NAFLD.

That could explain why some people here get the disease even if they don't look overweight or eat poorly. The bigger issue is invisibili-

ty. Fatty liver doesn't cause pain. You don't wake up with a fever. Most people never get tested unless they're undergoing a check-up for something else.

There are no awareness posters in hospitals. No school programs. No national health campaigns. Some doctors don't catch it early. Many patients don't know what it means when they do.

And when symptoms do

show up - tiredness, bloating, trouble concentrating they're easy to brush off. You blame the weather. Or stress.

All of this makes NAFLD a slow-moving epidemic, hidden in plain sight. It's costing lives and piling up pressure on a healthcare system already stretched thin.

Liver specialists are few. Ultrasound machines aren't always available in rural clinics. Diet counseling is rare. Most of the time, even when people get a diagnosis, they're told to go home and eat better. With what help?

It doesn't have to be this way. Liver function tests are simple and cheap. A routine ultrasound can catch the problem early.

Schools could talk about it in health classes. Local leaders - doctors, clerics, even celebrities – could warn people that this isn't just about overeating. It's about survival.

Kashmir's Animal Alarm

As Kashmir bakes under record heat, its animals endure a harsh and often overlooked battle to survive.

T never thought I'd see a cow pant like a dog. But this scorching spring, I did. She stood in the corner of a shed, foam collecting around her mouth, chest heaving, eyes dull.

It was 2 p.m., and the tin roof above her trapped the heat like an oven. The thermometer read 39°C, but it felt much hotter inside. There was no fan, no breeze and barely any water left in the trough.

This wasn't an isolated case. All over the Jammu and Kashmir this year, we have been recording animals buckling under the weight of a heat they aren't

Cats are collapsing. Dogs are overheating. Calves won't feed. Birds are falling out of trees.

The Kashmir I've known—cool, green, shaded by chinars—is changing fast. And our animals are paying the price.

I work as a veterinary surgeon in the government's animal husbandry department. Summers were once the serene season. Not anymore. In the last few weeks, I've seen more heat-related cases than I can count.

Srinagar recorded its hottest Mav in sixty years. Jammu hit 41.4°C. Even the mornings now feel heavy. Nights offer little relief. The India Meteorological Department says more heatwaves are on the way for late May and early June. But they're already here.

We tend to think about heatwaves in terms of people, and rightly so. Children, the elderly and those who work outside are vulnerable. But the animals that share our lives suffer too, often in

Unlike us, they can't walk into cooler rooms or drink ORS. They don't know what's happening to them. They just endure it, until they can't. Most people don't realize how poorly

animals cope with heat. Dogs and cats don't sweat through their skin. They pant to cool down, but that only works when the air is cooler than their bodies. In this heat, panting does nothing. Cows stop rumination and go anorexic.

Poultry fall limp. Sheep lie down and

refuse to get up. I've seen goats lose

interest in food and then lose weight

rapidly. By the time owners call us, it's

there. looking down. The government and international



often too late.

I remember a pet owner who left his Labrador on the balcony while running errands. When he came back, the dog was unconscious.

The tiles had burned his paws and he was breathing fast and shallow. We rushed to cool him with wet towels and IV fluids, but he didn't make it. He died within an hour.

The science backs up what we see. More than 10% dehydration in an animal can be fatal. And in this kind of heat, it happens faster than you'd think. In rural areas, the heat is compound-

ing other problems. Water sources are shrinking. Ponds dry up by midday. Streams that once gurgled through villages now carry a trickle, if anything. Wildlife—porcupines, monkeys, bears are being spotted in human settlements more often. They come looking for water and shade. They're confused.

Recently, a farmer brought me a cow who'd stopped giving milk. She had been his main source of income. Her body was warm to the touch, her breath shallow. There was no disease, just heat stress. We set up fans and gave her fluids, but the milk never returned. The farmer didn't say much. He just stood

agencies have issued advisories. They say: keep animals in shaded areas,

ing water constantly, feed them in the cooler hours of the day. For pets, they recommend avoiding walks during peak sun and never leaving animals in parked vehicles.

All good advice. But it's not always practical in remote or low-income areas. Some people don't even have electricity, let alone fans in their barns.

So much of animal care during heatwaves comes down to watching closely. Noticing when a cow stops eating or chewing. Recognizing when a dog pants too hard. Checking if a hen's wings are drooping.

Heatstroke doesn't announce itself. It sneaks in. One minute they're fine and the next, they're on the ground.

In Kashmir, we're used to snow warnings, not heat alerts. But this year has made something very clear: our climate is shifting. The cool shade we took for granted is thinning. The glacial streams we relied on are receding. And the animals who've always lived beside us are struggling to survive in a world that feels suddenly unfamiliar.

Harvard Has Long Been The World's Top College. Trump's Sanction Puts Its Allure At Risk

AMBRIDGE, USA: For students around the world, an acceptance letter to Harvard University has represented the pinnacle of achievement, offering a spot among the elite at a campus that produces Nobel Prize winners, captains of industry and global leaders.

That allure is now in jeopardy. In its intensifying fight with the White House, Harvard was dealt its heaviest blow yet on Thursday, when the government blocked the Ivy League school from enrolling foreign students. The move threatens to undermine Harvard's stature, revenue and appeal among top scholars globally.

Even more than the government's \$2.6 billion in research cuts, the administration's action represents an existential threat for Harvard. The school summed it up in a lawsuit seeking to block the action: "Without its international students, Harvard is not Harvard."

Within hours of the decision, the consequences started becoming clear. Belgium's Princess Elisabeth, who just finished her first year in a Harvard graduate program, is waiting to find out if she can return next year, the palace said. The Chinese government publicly questioned whether Harvard's international standing will endure.

"The relevant actions by the U.S. side $\,$ will only damage its own image and international credibility," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said at a briefing in Beijing.

A federal judge on Friday blocked the administration's decision as the lawsuit plays out, but the order is only temporary.

International students face uncertainty as new government policies impact their status and future at a leading

Students say their hopes and dreams are at stake

On the Harvard campus, international students said they were stunned, confused and deeply concerned about what the government's action means for their degrees, future plans and legal status in the United States.

Walid Akef, a Harvard graduate student in art history from Egypt, said the Trump administration action would cost him "20 years of my life."

"Coming to Harvard — I'm not exaggerating — I planned for it for 15 years,' Akef said. He earned two master's degrees and learned multiple languages before arriving at the university. He also worries what the changes will mean for his family, since his wife is pregnant and will soon be unable to travel.

"This is absolutely disastrous. I'm going to lose not just stability, but I also lose my dreams and then lose, I don't know, my beautiful life.'

Akef is cautiously optimistic that Harvard "will take care of this," but he is also considering other options as U.S. policy becomes increasingly inhospitable to foreign students.

A graduating law student from Asia said he had planned to stay in the United States and find work, "but not anymore.'

"I don't know what I'll do, but my future doesn't appear to be here," said the student, who spoke on condition of anonymity out of fear of retaliation.

Changes could erase a quarter of the student body

With a \$53 billion endowment, Harvard can weather federal funding losses that would cripple other institutions. But this new sanction strikes at the heart of its campus.

Already, the change is causing disarray, as thousands of students consider whether to transfer or risk being in the country illegally. It could wipe out a quarter of the university's student



body, while halving some of its graduate schools and threatening students who work as researchers and teaching assistants. Some sports teams would be left nearly empty.

For many, it has been a time of panicked calls home and huddles with fellow international students. For Kat, a data science student from China, the news comes as she prepares to graduate. Foreigners set to receive degrees from Harvard next week can still do so.

"My biggest fear is whether I would get deported immediately" after graduation, Kat said. She spoke on the condition that she be identified only by her first name out of concern about retaliation. "We're not sure about our status."

If the government's action stands, Harvard would be banned from admitting new international students for at least two school years. Even if it regains

its place as a global magnet, top students may shy away for fear of future government reprisals, the school said in its lawsuit.

The university enrolls almost 6,800 foreign students at its campus in Cambridge, Massachusetts, near Boston. Roughly 30% of those come from India and China.

Asked if he was considering restrictions on other universities. President Donald Trump said Friday: "We're taking a look at a lot of things.

"Harvard's going to have to change its ways. So are some others," the president told reporters in the Oval Office. "We don't want troublemakers here" from other countries.

A time to weigh other opportunities In its court filing, Harvard listed some of its most notable alumni who enrolled as foreign students. The list includes Benazir Bhutto, the former prime minister of Pakistan; Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, the former president of Liberia; Empress Masako of Japan; and many leaders of major corporations.

Many of the world's top students spend years preparing for their college applications, sometimes working with admissions consultants such as Crimson Education, a company named after Harvard's school color. Crimson clients recently admitted to Harvard were shocked by the government's action, said Jamie Beaton, a Harvard alumnus from New Zealand who founded the company. But rather than looking for other options, many students quickly shifted to finding a way forward with Harvard, he said.

Still, some current students and those bound for the university in the fall were weighing other opportunities. Two universities in Hong Kong on Friday extended invites to affected students.

"It feels like my world has exploded," said Fang, a Chinese student who was accepted to Harvard for a master's program. She also spoke on the condition that only her first name be used out of fear that she could be targeted.

Her student visa was approved just this week. "If America becomes a country that doesn't welcome me, I don't want to go there."

The recent developments forced Aleksandra Conevska, a Canadian graduate student researching climate change, to cancel her summer research and briefly look for jobs in Canada. But her thinking has since shifted, and she says she plans to remain at Harvard.

"I've already invested in this country, and I'm not going to give in," she said.

The U.S. government's action against Harvard has dominated news in countries around the world, said Mike Henniger, president and CEO of Illume Student Advisory Services, which helps colleges in the U.S., Canada and Europe recruit international students. He is traveling in Japan and awoke to the news Friday with dozens of emails from colleagues

The reactions from the international community, he said, were incredulous: "'Unbelievable!' 'Oh My God!' 'Unreal!'"

For incoming freshmen who just got accepted to Harvard — and already committed — the timing could not be worse, but they are such strong students that any top university would want to offer them a spot, he said.

"The bigger story is the students around the country that aren't a Harvard student, the students that scraped by to get into a state university and are thinking: 'Are we next?"" he said. "The Harvard kids are going to be OK. It's more about the damage to the American education brand. The view of the U.S. being a less welcoming place for international students.

You Should Wear Sunscreen Even If You Have Darker Skin. Here's Why

eople with darker skin still need to wear sunscreen — for more

Too much ultraviolet exposure from the sun can lead to sunburn, dark spots and wrinkles, and increased risk of skin cancer.

The melanin in darker skin offers some extra protection from the sun, but dermatologists say that isn't enough on

"Everyone needs sunscreen. But the reasons that one might be reaching for sunscreen may differ depending on your skin tone," said Dr. Jenna Lester, who founded the Skin of Color Clinic at the University of California, San Francisco.

Do darker-skinned people need sunscreen?

White people are overall more likely to get skin cancer compared to Black and Hispanic people. But Black and Hispanic people are less likely to survive the most dangerous kind of skin cancer called melanoma, according to the American Cancer Society.

Black patients more commonly get melanoma on their hands and feet places that are more shielded from the sun. Still, sunscreen is an additional protective layer that helps prevent a host of other problems including sunburns, hyperpigmentation after acne, rosacea and dark patches on the face.

Dr. Oyetewa Asempa at Baylor College of Medicine often reminds her darker-skinned patients: "All of the problems that you're coming to see me for are caused or worsened by the sun.



How much sunscreen do people of color need?

To stay safe in the sun, it's importection factor or SPF of at least 30 and reapply every two hours. People headed for the pool or beach should put on sunscreen beforehand, remembering to reapply liberally and after getting out of the water.

Most people don't wear enough sunscreen when they apply, Lester said. Make sure to put two long fingers' worth on the face and a hefty blob for the body.

Look for chemical-based sunscreens to avoid ashy white cast. Two key ingredients in mineral-based products zinc oxide and titanium oxide — are the culprits for that pesky discoloration on

Tinted sunscreens contain pigments that block visible light from the sun, offering additional protection against dark spots. And wearing a hat or sunprotective clothing with an ultraviolet protection factor or UPF grading can provide an extra safety boost.

Whatever the sun protection routine, it's important to keep it up, Lester said. Some UV rays can climb right through car and house windows to cause sun damage even when indoors, making it even more important to take care of the skin while the sun shines.

the Ministry of Finance.
"Ministry of Finance has given concurrence to 8.25 per cent rate of interest on the EPF for 2024-25 fiscal year and labour ministry sent a communication regarding this to the EPFO on Thursday," a labour ministry official told PTI.

Now, the interest amount as per the rate ratified for FY25 will be credited to the accounts of over seven crore subscribers

Property Prices Rise In 48 Cities In Q4 Of FY25: NHB RESIDEX

NEW DELHI- As many as 48 cities out of 50 registered an increase in property prices during the fourth quarter of 2024-25, according to data released by the National Housing Bank (NHB)

Out of the 50 cities covered, two cities Howrah and Thiruvananthapuram registered a decline in property prices, the latest residential housing price index NHB RESIDEX said.

The 50-city Housing Price Index (HPI), based on valua-

tion prices of properties collected from banks and housing finance companies, recorded an annual increase of 7.5 per cent during the fourth quarter of 20224-25 compared to 5.1 per cent a year ago, it added.

Eight key primary residential markets witnessed an appreciation in property prices during January-March 2025,

As per the Housing Price Index, published by the NHB, prices in Ahmedabad recorded a 6.1 per cent rise, Bengaluru (13.1 per cent), Chennai (9 per

cent), Delhi (2.9 per cent), Hyderabad (4.8 per cent), Kolkata (9.6 per cent), Mumbai (5.9 per cent) and Pune (6.8 per cent).

On a quarter-on-quarter basis, the 50-city index registered an expansion of 1.9 per cent in January-March 2025. The index has shown an increasing trend on the Q-o-Q

basis since September 2021. Meanwhile, the interest rate on home loans moderated by 25 basis points in February 2025, when RBI reduced the repo rate by 25 basis points, the first rate cut in 5 years.



Okay To Go To India, But You're **Not Going To Sell In US Without Tariffs: Trump To Apple**

NEW YORK/WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump has said it is ok for Apple to go to India to build its plants, but then the tech company will not be able to sell its products in America without tariffs.

Trump's remarks came as he signed multiple executive orders in the Oval Office to boost US nuclear power.

"...But I had an understanding with Tim (Cook) that he wouldn't be doing this. He said he's going to India to build plants. I said, 'That's okay to go to India, but you're not going to sell into here without tariffs.' And that's the way it is," Trump said on Friday.

"We're talking about the iPhone. If they're going to sell it in America, I want it to be built in the United States," he said.

Early on Friday, Trump said in a social media post that he expects Apple iPhones that will be sold in the US to be manufactured in America and "not India, or anyplace else", threat-ening to put a 25 per cent tariff on the tech company's prod-

ucts if it does not comply.

"I have long ago informed

their iPhones that will be sold in the United States of America will be manufactured and built in the United States, not India. or anyplace else. If that is not the case, a Tariff of at least 25% must be paid by Apple to the US. Thank you for your attention to this matter!" Trump

Just last week, Trump had said in Doha during his visit to the Middle East that he had told the Apple CEO to not build in India and instead build its manufacturing capacity in the US.

"We have Apple, as you know, that's coming in, and I had a little problem with Tim Cook yesterday," Trump had said in Doha in remarks to top executives.

"I said to him, 'Tim, you're my friend. I treated you very good. You're coming here with USD 500 billion but now I hear you building all over India. I don't want you building in India. You can build in India if you want to take care of India because India is the highest, one of the highest tariff nations in the world. It's very hard to sell into India. And they've (India) offered us a deal where, basically they're willing to literally charge us no Tim Cook of Apple that I expect tariff," he had said.

Goyal Meets EU Counterpart for Second Time in a **Month on FTA Talks**

BRUSSELS: Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal has met European Commissioner for Trade Maros Sefcovic in Brussels, their second meeting within a month, to discuss the proposed free trade agreement (FTA), currently under negotiation between the two regions.

Goyal travelled to Brussels on May 23 from Washington, while India's chief negotiator L Satya Srinivas and his team are already at the EU headquarters for the FTA negotiations.

The Indian minister held meetings with his EU counterpart earlier this month.

"Delighted to welcome my friend and counterpart @PiyushGoval. We continue to make progress. Let's maintain the momentum - with hard work, clear focus - and I look forward to our next meeting soon," Sefcovic said in a post on X.

In response, Goyal, in a post on the social media platform, said, "We remain committed to the shared prosperity of India and the EU. Let us keep this pace going!".

These deliberations assume

significance as India and the 27-nation European Union are looking at concluding the talks for an early harvest trade agreement by July.

The early harvest or an interim trade agreement could include issues like intellectual property rights (IPRs), government procurement, tariffs, and non-tariff barriers.

Officials of both sides recently concluded the eleventh round of talks on May 16 here in the national capital.

"We are looking for an early harvest. We are trying to do it as early as possible," an official has said recently.

The two sides have agreed to conclude the agreement phases on account of the uncertain global trade environment, particularly due to the US tariff actions under President Donald Trump.

India has followed the practice of negotiating trade pacts in two phases with Australia.

The early harvest pact would lead to a full-fledged free trade agreement.

Besides demanding significant duty cuts in automobiles and medical devices, the EU wants tax reduction in products like wines, spirits, meat, poultry and a strong intellectual property regime.

Indian goods exports to the EU, such as ready-made garments, pharmaceuticals, steel, petroleum products, and electrical machinery, can become more competitive if the pact is concluded successfully.

India's Forex Kitty Drops Usd 4.88 Bn To USD 685.72 Bn

MUMBAI- India's forex reserves dropped USD 4.888 billion to USD 685.729 billion for the week ended May 16, the Reserve Bank of India said on

The overall reserves jumped by USD 4.553 billion to USD 690.617 billion in the previous reporting week. The forex reserves touched an all-time high of USD 704.885 billion in September 2024.

For the week ended May 16, foreign currency assets, a major component of the reserves, increased by USD 279 million to USD 581.652 billion, the data released on Friday showed.

Expressed in dollar terms, the foreign currency assets include the effect of appreciation or depreciation of non-US units like the euro, pound and yen held in the foreign exchange reserves.

After the sharp USD 4.52 billion jump in the previous reporting week, the gold reserves dropped by USD 5.121 billion to USD 81.217 billion during the week, the RBI said.

The Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) were down by USD 43 million to USD 18.49 billion, the apex bank said. India's reserve position with the IMF was also

down by USD 3 million at USD 4.371 billion in the reporting week, the apex bank data showed.

Jaishankar's visit injects fresh momentum into India-Germany Strategic Partnership: MEA

Berlin, May 24: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar held extensive discussions with his German counterpart Johann Wadephul in Berlin covering the full spectrum of bilateral cooperation and the two sides reaffirmed their shared commitment to further expand collaboration in key strategic areas, including defence and AI.

The Ministry of External Affairs in a statement here said the external affairs minister visited Germany from May 22-24. His visit within a month of the new government formation in Germany is "reflective of the high priority" both sides attach to bilateral ties, it said.

The ministry said Jaishankar's visit to Germany at the time when both countries are celebrating the milestone of completion of 25 years of Strategic Partnership is "significant".

"It led to renewed engagement with the newly-constituted German government, injecting fresh momentum into the India-Germany Strategic Partnership and reaffirming commitment of both sides to further strengthening political, economic, technological and people-to-people ties between India and Germany. Germany is a strong votary for furthering India-EU ties, including for expeditious conclusion of FTA,"

During the visit, Jaishankar called on Chancellor Friedrich Merz, held comprehensive talks with his counterpart, and met with Katherina Reiche, Federal Minister for Economic Affairs and Energy and Günter Sautter, Foreign and Security Policy Advisor to the Federal Chancellor.

He also engaged with members of the German Parliament, foreign and security policy experts and members of the Indian community.

In his meeting with Chancellor Merz, the external affairs minister conveyed the



warm greetings and best wishes of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to the new federal government in Germany.

"Chancellor Merz expressed strong support for further deepening the increasingly multifaceted India-Germany Strategic Partnership across diverse sectors. The EAM also conveyed India's appreciation for the German government's expression of solidarity and support to India in the fight against terrorism," the MEA said.

The external affairs minister had extensive discussions with Foreign Minister Wadephul covering the "full spectrum of bilateral cooperation".

"The two sides also reaffirmed their shared commitment to further expand collaboration in key strategic areas including defence, digital technologies, AI, green and sustainable development and talent mobility," it said.

They also exchanged perspectives on regional and global developments, reaffirming their countries' shared position on combating terrorism without exception, upholding international law, and promoting a multipolar, rules-based international order.

The ministers also launched the official logo commemorating the 25th anniversary of the Strategic Partnership.

Jaishankar also held productive discussions with Günter

Sautter, Foreign and Security Policy Advisor to the Federal Chancellor.

"Both sides reaffirmed their commitment to strengthening strategic, defence, and security cooperation, including in the areas of cyber security, Indo-Pacific, and defence industrial collaboration," it said.

Jaishankar's meeting with the Federal Minister for Economic Affairs and Energy focussed on further strengthening India-Germany and India-EU trade and investment ties.

"Both sides also discussed the progress in the Green and Sustainable Development Partnership including in the field of green hydrogen and infrastructure sector and railways," it added.

The minister also interacted with parliamentarians from across the political spectrum. These interactions focused on advancing political dialogue, strengthening economic and technological cooperation, and exchanging views on key global and regional developments, it said.

The external affairs minister participated in a high-level think-tank dialogue at the DGAP (German Council on Foreign Relations), engaging with thought leaders and experts on foreign and security policy to advance India-Germany strategic partnership in promoting global security and stability.

All party delegations conclude visits to Russia, Japan; drive home India's stance on fight against terror

Moscow/Tokyo/Manama, May 24 (PTI) All party delegations from India to Russia and Japan on Saturday concluded their visits with "constructive meetings" with diplomatic leaderships discussing global fight against terror as a third similar team reached Bahrain to highlight New Delhi's response to cross-border radicalism.

The three delegations that exchanged views on furthering cooperation in counter-terrorism and combating radicalism, especially after the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack that saw 26 people dead, are part of India's global outreach with its seven multi-party delegations travelling to 33 global capitals to meet the international community.

Meeting with the political leadership, media, senior officials and members of the diplomatic corps, the delegations spread awareness about Pakistan's designs and India's response to terror and shared information about Operation Sindoor.

The delegation to Moscow, led by DMK MP Kanimozhi Karunanidhi, addressed a press conference at the end of the visit and described Russia as a "close and tried and tested" friend.

"We naturally seek an understanding that Russia is by our side in this time of difficulty. It is better that people are aware of our suffering from state-sponsored terrorism from Pakistan," the delegation members said while answering a media question.

Opening the press conference, Kanimozhi described the Russia visit as a "great opportunity to explain our stand" and said, "Pakistan chooses to protect the terrorists, they go ahead and spread false propaganda. We had only targeted terror hubs. India is very clear, we would not come to the table for peace talks when Pakistan



continues attacking us."

Earlier on Friday, Russia had reiterated its decisive commitment to "an uncompromising joint fight" with New Delhi against all forms of terrorism.

When the delegation to Russia met Andrey Denisov, First Deputy Chair of the Committee on International Affairs, Russia, and Senators on Friday, Kanimozhi, in a post on X, described the meeting as "constructive" and said they two sides "exchanged views on issues of mutual concern with respect to terrorism."

The Parliamentary delegation to Japan on Saturday wrapped up its three-day visit after engaging extensively with Japan's political leadership, policymakers, media and the Indian community and said it was deeply encouraged by Tokyo's unequivocal support in New Delhi's war against terror.

JD(U) Rajya Sabha MP Sanjay Kumar Jha, who led the delegation, said: "At every forum, we firmly reiterated India's zerotolerance policy on terrorism and exposed Pakistan's continued patronage of cross-border terror." "We are deeply encouraged by Japan's unequivocal support," he added.

The delegation visited the Tama Cemetery here and honoured freedom fighter Rash Behari Bose on the eve of his birth anniversary.

"India follows Gandhi's path of peace, but when peace is threatened, we also carry forward the fearless spirit of Rash Behari Bose. Non violence is our choice, not our compulsion. If terror challenges peace, India will respond with unity and resolve," Jha said in his post on X

Trinamool Congress MP Abhishek Banerjee, who is also part of the delegation to Japan, said if terrorism is a "rabid dog", Pakistan is its "vile handler", and the world must unite to tackle it.

"We are here to convey the truth— India refuses to bow down," he said.

The delegation also interacted with members of the Indian diaspora at the Embassy. Urging them to take India's message in the global fight against terrorism, Banerjee told them to raise awareness about the issue "within your circles, through your networks, and via local influencers, in your unique ways."

In Bahrain, the all-party Indian delegation that reached Manama on Saturday is led by senior BJP leader Baijayant Jay Panda. "India's unwavering stand against cross-border terrorism will be highlighted in all the engagements," the Embassy of India in Bahrain posted on X.

Meanwhile, in Dubai, Sunjay Sudhir, India's Ambassador to the UAE, hailed the visit of the all-party delegation led by Shrikant Shinde to the country to highlight India's stance on the issue of terrorism.

"The narrative, our thoughts, our perspectives, were well received, very well reciprocated. And again, it was a clear reciprocation, a clear reiteration of the fact that in the UAE, we have a true strategic partner, a friend, whom we can rely on," the ambassador told PTI.

Ambassador Sudhir also highlighted a shift in the response by the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) nations - Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates - after the Pahalgam terror attack in comparison to the response they had shown after the 2008's 26/11 Mumbai attack.

The ambassador said that the UAE was perhaps the first country to issue a clear and categorical statement condemning the attack as an act of terror and calling for the elimination of terrorism in all its forms.

Tensions between India and Pakistan escalated after the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack that claimed 26 lives.

As part of the Operation Sindoor in response to the Pahalgam attack, India carried out precision strikes on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir in the early hours of May 7, following which Pakistan attempted to attack Indian military bases on May 8, 9 and 10.

Sinha concluded with a call for national unity, invoking the spirit of Ek Bharat, Shreshtha Bharat, and prayed for peace and brotherhood in society.

"May Prophet Muhammad and Baba Amarnath bless our land and strengthen love, harmony and unity."

LG Sinha did not mince words in blaming Pakistan for continuously sponsoring terrorism in the region. "Since independence, Pakistan has done everything to disturb the peace in J&K. From sending Kabalis in 1947 to the present day, terrorism has been their state policy," he said. "Their own people struggle for basic needs, while their leaders, despite holding a begging bowl, continue to fund terrorism in

As of May 2025, the World Health Organization (WHO) classifies LF.7 and NB.1.8 subvariants as Variants Under Monitoring (VUMs), not as Variants of Concern (VOCs) or Variants of Interest (VOIs). But these are the variants reportedly driving the rise in COVID cases in China and parts of Asia.

In India, the most common variant remains JN.1, comprising 53 per cent of samples tested, followed by BA.2 (26%) and other Omicron sublineages (20%) according to INSACOG.

As of May 19, the country had 257 active cases. Delhi recorded 23 new cases, Andhra Pradesh reported four in the last 24 hours, Telangana confirmed one, and a nine-monthold in Bengaluru tested positive amid a gradual rise over the past 20 days. Kerala reported 273 cases in May alone.

Officials in several states reported more cases on Saturday, May 24.

In Maharashtra, a COVID-19 patient suffering from severe diabetes died of comorbidities in Thane while eight new cases of the viral infection were reported in the city on Saturday, the Thane Municipal Corporation (TMC) said.

Two men were detected with coronavirus in Madhya Pradesh's commercial capital Indore. In Uttarakhand, a 57-year-old tourist from Gujarat in Rishikesh and a woman doctor from AllMS Rishikesh have been found infected with Covid.

All 23 recent COVID-19 patients in Delhi experienced only mild symptoms and were under home quarantine, said the health officials in the Delhi government.

A 55-year-old woman was placed under home quarantine after she tested positive for COVID-19 in Noida on Delhi's outskirts.

Jasprit Bumrah Not Available For All 5 England Tests: Agarkar

A rejigged Indian Test team with massive boots to fill is already staring at its first big challenge with premier fast bowler Jasprit Bumrah declared not fit enough to play all five Tests in England later this summer.

While announcing an 18-member squad for the England tour here on Saturday, India's chairman of selectors Ajit Agarkar said Bumrah does not have the clearance from the medical staff and physios to feature in all five Tests of the series starting in Leeds on June 20.

"I don't think he's available for all five Tests going by what the physios and the doctors have told us," Agarkar said when asked if Bumrah was available for the entire series.

Bumrah had won the Sir Garfield Sobers Trophy for ICC Men's Cricketer of the Year as well as the Men's Test Cricketer of the Year in 2024 for his exemplary performances across formats.

With 11 wickets, Bumrah played a vital role in India's title-winning run in the T20 World Cup in the Americas in 2024, and he finished with a rich haul of 71 wickets in only 13 Tests last year.

MUMBAI: Batting star Shubman Gill was on Saturday entrusted with India's Test leadership to steer through a "massive transition" phase with the swashbuckling Rishabh Pant as his deputy for next month's tour of England that is expected to be nothing short of a trial by fire.

At 25 years of age, Gill will be India's fifth youngest Test captain after Mansoor Ali Khan Pataudi (21), Sachin Tendulkar (23), Kapil Dev (24) and Ravi Shastri (25). The five-match series against England will begin on June 20 in Leeds.

"Last year or so we have looked at Shubman (for leadership). We are hopeful he is the guy who is going



(to take the team forward). It is a high pressure job but he is a terrific player. We wish him all the best," said chief selector Ajit Agarkar after announcing 18-member squad, which

offered no major surprises. "Pant is one of our best batters in Test cricket over the last four-five years. A wicketkeeper can see the game well and that's why he is Shubman's deputy," Agarkar added while explaining the 27-year-old Pant's role. The selectors' decision

on the team's leadership was on expected lines following the retirement of senior stars Rohit Sharma and Virat Kohli, both of whom called it quits within a week of each other earlier this month.

Young left-hander B Sai Sudharsan and left-arm pacer Arshdeep Singh earned their maiden Test

"Sai has not been picked based on IPL, he has shown the right temperament and has the game to succeed at the top level...we have been looking at him for a while," Agarkar said, referring to Sudharsan's fine IPL form.

The squad also features Karun Nair, who returns to the national set-up after eight years. Having last played in 2017, Nair was dropped from the team soon after becoming the second triple centurion in Tests from India.

A notable exclusion was pacer Mohammed Shami, who was deemed not fit enough for the long series.

NOTTINGHAM: Zimbabwe folded inside three days as expected yet made England sweat for its innings win in their one-off test at Trent Bridge on Saturday.

In reply to England's 565-6 declared, Zimbabwe was all out for 265 and 255.

England won by an innings and 45 runs with four sessions to spare in a worthy warmup for India's fivetest tour starting on June 20 in Leeds. The stark figures don't do justice to a defiant effort by Zimbabwe.

Starting its first test matchup with England in 22 years as a severe underdog, Zimbabwe was further handicapped from day one when Richard Ngarava, one of its four seamers, suffered



only nine overs and took no further part in the match.

England was inserted and plundered 498-3, its highest ever first-day score in a home test, then declared on the second morning knowing it had to take only 18 wickets without Ngarava batting.

After Brian Bennett's brilliant maiden century led Zim-

babwe's fightback on Friday, Sean Williams led the charge on Saturday, making England appear out of ideas about how to stop the 20-year international from reaching his sixth
