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No Evidence To Prove Left-Handed People More Creative, Researchers Find

he widespread belief that left-handed people are more creative may not be true, according to researchers who analysed studies published since the 1900s that examined the relationship between handedness and creativity.

Researchers from Cornell University in the US and The Chinese University of Hong Kong discovered that right-handed individuals may be more creative. The findings were published in the journal 'Psychonomic Bulletin and Review'.

Left-handed individuals, often referred to as "lefties", make up about 10 per cent of the global population and are frequently perceived as more creative. This perception may stem

from the idea that both lefthandedness and creative genius are rare, leading to the assumption that one explains the other.

Moreover, left-handed individuals are more commonly found among musicians and artists, but they also experience higher rates of depression and schizophrenia, contributing to the belief that creative genius and mental illness are linked. "This idea that left-handed-



ness, art and mental illness go together -- what we call the 'myth of the tortured artist' -- could contribute to the appeal and the staying power of the lefty creativity myth," Daniel Casasanto, the senior author and associate professor of psychology at Cornell University, said.

However, Casasanto emphasised that this "urban legend" results from statistical cherry-picking, where only a few studies with small or biased samples are cited.

The focus on these two creative professions where lefties are over-represented -- art and music -- is a common and tempting statistical error that humans make all the time," the senior author said.

The research team said they sifted through nearly 1,000 scientific papers published since 1900 and ultimately analysed 17 of them. Most studies were excluded due to non-standardised data reporting or because they included only right-handed participants. The authors "found no evi-

dence that left- or mixedhanders are more creative than right-handers. "People generalised that there are all these left-

handed artists and musicians, so lefties must be more creative. But if you do an unbiased survey of lots of professions, then this apparent lefty superiority disappears," Casasanto explained. On the contrary, righthanders were found to score higher on divergent

thinking in a lab test. Divergent thinking, which is associated with the brain's right hemisphere, involves generating numerous potential solutions to

a problem quickly, often facilitating connections between seemingly unrelated concepts

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Pahalgam Attack a War on the **Economy: EAM**

New York: The Pahalgam terror attack was an act of economic warfare meant to destroy tourism in Kashmir, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said, asserting that India has made it clear that it will not allow nuclear blackmail to prevent it from responding to terror emanating from Pakistan.

India has had a string of terrorist attacks over the years emanating from Pakistan and in the wake of the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack, there was a sentiment in the country that "enough is enough," Jaishankar said on Monday.

His remarks came during a conversation with Newsweek CEO Dev Pragad hosted at the publication's headquarters at One World Trade Centre near the 9/11 Memorial in Manhattan.

Jaishankar said that the Pahalgam attack "was an act of economic warfare. It was meant to destroy tourism in Kashmir, which was the mainstay of the economy. It was also meant to provoke religious violence because people were asked to identify their faith before they were killed."

Delhi: The India New Meteorological Department (IMD) on Tuesday said very heavy rain is expected in Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana and Rajasthan over some of the next six to seven days.

It said the monsoon will remain active in many parts of northwest, central and east India during this period.

Heavy rain is also likely in Madhya Pradesh, Vidarbha, Chhattisgarh, Bihar, West Bengal, Sikkim and Iharkhand. Some days may see heavy showers in Madhya Pradesh, Iharkhand and Odisha.

The IMD said heavy to very heavy rain may occur at some places in Konkan and Goa, Madhya Maharashtra and Gujarat. Saurashtra and Kutch may also receive heavy rain in the next seven days

Northeast India is likely to get heavy to very heavy rain at isolated places during this period. Coastal Andhra Pradesh,

The Long Goodbye: How The Qazi **Couple Lost Their Home In Kashmir**

Married in Rawalpindi, raised in Srinagar, the couple fought deportation for 35 years, until a recent court ruling changed everything.

Srinagar: For nearly four de-cades, Mohammad Khalil Qazi and Arifa Qazi made Srinagar their home. They raised a family, sought a sense of belonging, and fought a legal battle to stay in the city where they were both born.

But on May 9 this year, the High Court of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh ruled that their time in India had officially run out.

The couple's story began long before their case reached the courtroom.



Mohammad Khalil was born in Srinagar in 1945. As a young child during the turbulence of the India-Pakistan partition, he found himself stranded in Pakistan, separated from his home.

Over time, he became a Pakistani citizen. Arifa, also born in Srinagar, held an Indian passport. 1986. she married Mohammad Khalil in Rawalpindi, but the relationship with her inlaws soon turned bitter. Facing difficulties in Pakistan,

the couple returned to Srinagar in 1988 on Pakistani passports, bringing their young son with them. Local authorities initially al-

Srinagar: The Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) Srinagar has registered a case against a sitting District Development Council (DDC) member and his alleged associate for demanding a bribe of ₹5 lakh in exchange for facilitating No Objection Certificates (NOCs) for a private school in Srinagar's Dara Harwan area. ACB said it registered FIR No. 12/2025 under Section 7 of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 (as amended in 2018), and Section 61(2) of

How A School Swimming Pool Became A Battlefield In Kashmir What began as weekend swims turned into a fight over bribes and power that still shadows the school's gatesz

Srinagar: In a serene schoolyard in Harwan, a village on the northern edge of Srinagar, a simple swimming pool has become the centre of a corruption investigation that is now making its way through the region's antigraft offices.

For years, the pool at Scholars School had been a peaceful gathering place. On weekends, former students would return



to the school to swim under the summer sky, a ritual that

brought them back to the classrooms and courtvards where they had once studied.

But that familiar rhythm was interrupted this year when local officials accused the school of polluting a nearby canal and soon demanded a bribe to make the trouble go away.

On June 30, the Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) arrested Mohammad Shaban Chopan, local District Development Council (DDC) member, while he was allegedly accepting an initial bribe payment linked to

the dispute.

According to the ACB's statement, Chopan and his close aide, Ghulam Mohammad Khathana. had demanded ₹5,00,000 from the school's founder, Dr. Mushtaq Ahmad Rather, in exchange for securing clearances the school had already lawfully obtained.

The arrests have brought rare attention to a story that began silently and unfolded in the kind of slow, steady pressure that is

common in Kashmir's smaller villages

"They wanted me to buy Dr. Mushtaq told silence," Kashmir Observer. "But I chose

not to pay." The dispute focused on a canal that passes through the school's yard and continues downstream to a nearby fishery. The local DDC member accused the school of polluting the water by operating the swimming pool, but no similar concerns

were raised about the fishery, which uses the same canal and has expanded beyond its permitted land.

"They kept pointing at the school," Dr. Mushtaq continued. "They never looked anywhere else." Court records and ACB documents reveal a pattern of harassment.

Heavy Rain Likely Across India Over Next 7 Days, says IMD

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) on Tuesday said very heavy rain is expected in Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana and Rajasthan over some of the next six to seven days.

It said the monsoon will remain active in many parts of northwest, central and east India during this period.

Heavy rain is also likely in Madhya Pradesh, Vidarbha, Chhattisgarh, Bihar, West Bengal, Sikkim and Jharkhand. Some days may see heavy showers in Madhya Pradesh, Jharkhand and Odisha

the risk of flooding. It said rainfall is likely to be below normal in large parts of the northeast, many areas of eastern India and extreme southern peninsular India.

IMD Director General Mrutyunjay Mohapatra said during an online press briefing that there is a high chance of heavy rainfall in central India and the adjoining southern peninsula.

This includes east Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Odi-sha, adjoining areas of Vidarbha and Telangana and parts of Gujarat and Maharashtra. "We should monitor the catchment areas of rivers such

The IMD said heavy to very heavy rain may occur at some places in Konkan and Goa, Madhya Maharashtra and Gujarat. Saurashtra and Kutch may also receive heavy rain in the next seven days.

Northeast India is likely to get heavy to very heavy rain at isolated places during this period. Coastal Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Kerala and Karnataka may receive heavy rain on some days of the week, it said.

Araghchi: Bombs Can't Erase Iran's Nuclear Knowhow

Tehran— Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi has asserted that the country's nuclear expertise remains intact despite a 12-day joint Israeli-American military campaign targeting its nuclear facilities, vowing a rapid recovery and warning against expectations of a quick return to diplomatic talks. In an interview aired

Tuesday by CBS News, dismissed U.S. Araghchi President Donald Trump's claim that American strikes "obliterated" Iran's had nuclear capabilities, citing Pentagon assessments that contradicted the White House's statement. "One cannot obliterate the technology and science for [peaceful ura-

nium] enrichment through bombings," Araghchi said,

emphasizing that Iran's nuclear knowledge was indestructible and that the country is fully capable of repairing damage and resuming its program. The remarks follow Isra-

el's unprovoked military assault on June 13, which triggered a 12-day conflict and saw U.S. forces join late in the campaign, striking key nuclear sites in central and northcentral Iran. Despite the coordinated attacks, Araghchi underscored Iran's resolve, noting that the nuclear program had become a source of national pride and public unity during the war. "During the war, we demonstrated and proved our ability to defend ourselves," he said.

The top diplomat also made it clear that Tehran is not prepared to resume nuclear negotiations with Washington in the near fu-

ture. Talks, which began in April through Omani mediation and spanned six rounds, had already stalled due to U.S. demands-amplified by Israel—that Iran completely cease uranium enrichment. Those conditions have been categorically rejected by Iranian officials.

"I don't think negotiations will restart as quickly as that," Araghchi stated, adding that Iran would need solid guarantees the U.S. would not return to military threats during any renewed diplomatic process. "We still need more time," he said.

The recent military escalation has cast a long shadow over diplomacy, with Iranian officials now openly questioning U.S. intentions and urging caution against placing trust in further talks while hostilities remain a possibility.

US Lifts Syria Sanctions Amid **Israel-Damascus** Thaw

Washington: President Donald Trump on Monday formally dismantled US sanctions against Syria, hoping to reintegrate the war-battered country into the global economy as Israel eyes ties with

its new leadership. Trump lifted most sanctions against Syria in May, responding to appeals from Saudi Arabia and Turkey after former Islamist guerrilla Ahmed al-Sharaa ended a half-century of rule by the Assad family.

In an executive order, Trump terminated the "national emergency" in place since 2004 that imposed farreaching sanctions on Syria, affecting most state-run institutions including the central bank.

"This is in an effort to promote and support the country's path to stability and peace," White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt told reporters.

"These actions reflect the president's vision of fostering a new relationship between the United States and a Syria that is stable, unified and at peace with itself and its neighbors," Secretary of State Marco Rubio said in a statement.

Rubio said he would start the potentially lengthy process of examining whether to delist Svria as a state sponsor of terrorism, a designation dating from 1979 that has severely discouraged investment.

He also said he would look at removing the terrorist classification of Sharaa and his movement Havat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS), which was once linked to Al-Qaeda. The United States already removed a bounty on Sharaa's head after he came to power.

Brad Smith, the Treasury Department official in charge of sanctions, said the move 'will end the country's isolation from the international financial system, setting the stage for global commerce and galvanising investments from its neighbors in the region as well as from the United States".

The order, released by the White House, said that Syria has been "transformed" since the fall of Assad, including through "positive actions taken by the new Syrian government under President Ahmed al-Sharaa'

The orders still maintain sanctions on elements of the former government, including Bashar al-Assad, who fled to Russia late last year

Syrian Foreign Minister Assaad al-Shibani said the US move marked a "major turning point".

With the lifting of this major obstacle to economic recovery, the long-awaited doors are opening for reconstruction and development" as are the conditions "for the dignified return of displaced Syrians to their homeland", he wrote on X.

Tougher UK Visa Measures For Foreign Workers **Tabled In Parliament**

London: The British government on Tuesday tabled the first set of tougher visa norms in the House of Commons to curb the recruitment of foreign skilled workers across different sectors, including the care industry, dubbing it a "complete reset" of the country's immigration system.

The new rules, proposed as part of an 'Immigration White Paper' back in May, will involve the skills and

Thailand PM Suspended Over Leaked Phone Call

Thailand's Constitutional Court suspended Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra from office Tuesday pending an ethics investigation over a leaked phone call with a senior Cambodian leader.

The judges voted unanimously Tuesday to take the petition accusing her of a breach of ethics, and voted 7 to 2 to suspend her from duty as a prime minister. The court gave Paetongtarn 15 days to give evidence to support her case.

Paetongtarn has faced growing dissatisfaction over her handling of the latest border dispute with Cambodia, involving an armed confrontation on May 28 in which one

Cambodian soldier was killed. The leaked phone call while she engaged in diplomacy with Cambodian Senate President Hun Sen set off a string of complaints and public protests.

Paetongtarn said after the court order that she would accept the process and would do her best to defend herself, as she had no other intentions but to protect the country and preserve peace.

Delhi Man Duped of 14 Lakh in 'Digital Arrest' Scam

New Delhi: Two men were arrested for allegedly duping a retired government employee of Rs 14 lakh by posing as cybercrime officials and threatening him with a fabricated digital arrest in north Delhi, an official said on Tuesday.

Banshi Lal and Prem Kumar, both 20 years old and currently pursuing their graduation, were arrested after Kailash Kumar Meena (57) filed a complaint stating that he received a video call from a man claiming to be a cybercrime officer from Mumbai, he said.

The caller falsely accused him of being involved in a cyber fraud and warned that police were en route to arrest him. Under duress, the complainant transferred Rs 14 lakh to a bank account provided by the caller," a senior police officer said.

A case was registered on April 22 at

the North Cyber Police Station and an investigation was launched. Police conducted a detailed analysis of call data, money trails, and access logs from various digital platforms.

The accused frequently changed locations to avoid detection, but continued mobile surveillance helped the police zero in on their presence in Barmer in Rajasthan.

A raid was conducted on June 15, leading to the arrest of Banshi Lal. Based on his interrogation, his associate Prem Kumar was also nabbed from the same village, he added.

"During questioning, Banshi Lal revealed that he had opened a bank account and handed over the linked mobile number and internet banking details to Prem Kumar for Rs 8,000. Prem Kumar, in turn, provided this account to a key conspirator. Satpal Bishnoi, in exchange for Rs 15,000," the DCP said.

69-Year-Old Woman Silently Cleans Dal Lake For 5 Years

Srinagar: It is 'Hollandse Schoonmaak' (Dutch cleaning) in Kashmir as a 69-year-old woman from the Netherlands has made it a mission to clean the waters of the famous tourist attraction Dal Lake of plastic waste.

J&K Second Most Corrupt State: Survey

EW DELHI - Kerala has emerged as the country's least corrupt state while the dubious distinction of being the worst in this regard went to Bihar followed by Jammu and Kashmir according to global corruption watchdog Transparency international first state wise analysis.

The India Corruption Study 2005 conducted by Transparency International India (TII) land Centre for Media Studies (CMS) said Kerala, Himachal Pradesh. Gujarat, Andhra Pradesh and Maharash tra - in that order - were the least corrupt states.

The study had a sample of 14405 respondents in 15 cities and 306 villages across 20 States and covered 11services including police, Judiciary, schools and public distribution system. While Kerala topped in all the departments. Bihar was the last, it said.

The national capital Delhi was ranked 11th in the least corrupt state preceded by Chhattisgarh (6) Punjab (7), West Bengal (8), Orissa (9) and Uttar Pradesh(10).

Tamil Nadu was placed 12th followed by Haryana, Jharkhand, Assam. Rajasthan, Karnataka and Madhya Pradesh.

Jammu and Kashmir was placed very low at 19th position only to be followed In Bihar.

Degrees Without Direction

oung Kashmiris, degree in hand, are returning home not to take up careers, but to sit behind shop counters, wait for exam results, or prepare for another shot at a government job that may never come. As highlighted by a story published in this paper, the valley's education system has been producing graduates trained for a world that no longer exists. A generation was told that if you became an engineer, a doctor, or a civil servant, success was guaranteed. That story has expired. Yet our classrooms continue to push students into streams without asking if these fields still hold opportunity - or whether they suit the child at all.

Meanwhile, the global economy has changed. Artificial Intelligence is not just transforming industries, it's redefining what work itself looks like. Skills like data analysis, coding, design thinking, and digital communication are not optional anymore. They are essential. And yet, in most government schools and colleges across Kashmir, there is barely a whisper about these fields. At the same time, it is also true that even some of these skills are being rendered redundant by the AI.

This disconnect is not just academic; it is deeply personal for students. Many of them aren't failing because they lack ambition. They're failing because the system has never shown them what's possible. They're carrying degrees, not direction. They've memorized answers for exams, but never learned how to solve real-world problems. They know what to study for the UPSC, NEET or JEE, but not what new technology is doing to the education and jobs.

The solution is not simple, but it is clear. We must update the syllabus - not just tweak it, but overhaul it. Courses should reflect the realities of today's job market. Vocational education must be treated with dignity and seriousness. Career counseling should begin in high school, not after failure. Teachers themselves must be trained to understand and explain the opportunities of a tech-driven world.

There are some hopeful signs - isolated efforts by a few schools, training centers, and local entrepreneurs who are showing that alternatives exist. But they remain exceptions in a system built on inertia.

If we truly care about the future of Kashmiri youth, we nust reimagine what education prepares them for. Not the past. Not the dreams of their parents. But the world that is already here - and the one that's fast approaching. To keep teaching the old ways is not just outdated. It is manufacturing future unemployment crises as the youth armed with existing degrees will struggle to find a place for themselves in the evolving economy,

The 1971 Test

How a crop record from 1971 became the gatekeeper of land rights, and why it still haunts farmers in Jammu & Kashmir today.

n the story of land in Jammu & Kashmir, a single harvest still holds the key. It's not about what you grow today or even how long you've tilled the soil. It all comes down to what's written in the record books for the Kharief season of 1971.

For farmers across the valley, this entry is not just a line on paper. It decides who owns the land and who doesn't.

The 1976 Agrarian Reforms Act promised a revolution. It broke the centuries-old grip of landlords by giving ownership rights to the people who actually worked the land. But this promise came with one strict condition: the farmer's name had to appear in the Girdawari, the seasonal crop inspection record, for Kharief 1971. No other entry would do.

It's a detail that still stings. For many farmers, this record is missing. Sometimes the Patwari didn't visit. Sometimes landlords blocked names from being written. Sometimes it was just clerical neglect. Yet the law has rarely allowed room for these stories.

The Agrarian Reforms Act did not offer half-measures. Section 4 made it clear: the land would automatically transfer to the tenant without needing the landowner's approval. But this life-changing shift rested on one small proof: the Girdawari of Kharief 1971.

Why that season? The government chose it carefully. It was a moment before the political upheavals of the mid-70s, before records could be tampered with. It was supposed to be a clean, untouchable benchmark.

But it also became a gate that shut many farmers out

Judges have consistently ruled that this Girdawari entry is non-negotiable. In Ghulam Mohammad Wani v. State of J&K, the High Court ruled that a Kharief 1971 entry is essential. Later entries, no matter how convincing, don't carry the same legal weight.

In State of J&K v. Abdul Ahad Mir, the court stressed the same point: the law only protects those whose names appeared in the 1971 record. Even if a farmer can show continuous cultiva-

tion since then, the courts have often refused to look past that missing entry.

For the system, it's a clear line. For the farmers, it's a cold one

On paper, the rules are neat. On the ground, they are messy

Across Kashmir, thousands of farmers have no Kharief 1971 entry in their name. Some were excluded by mistake. Some were never recorded because landlords pressured the Patwaris. Some cultivated informally, with nothing written down.

In the late 2000s, revenue officers started attesting land mutations based on later entries. They looked at continuous possession, land revenue receipts, even statements from village elders. It was a way to honour the spirit of the law, even if the original record was missing.

But these decisions didn't always hold up in court. Revenue circulars from 2006 to 2009 made it clear: no Girdawari, no mutation.

Some officers argued they could rely on other evidence. Some even invoked oral testimonies. But legally, the foundation remained shaky.

Take Ghulam Nabi Dar from Pulwama. He had worked five kanals of orchard land since 1969. His name never appeared in the 1971 Girdawari. Landlord pressure, he says, kept him off the record. His name finally showed up in Rabi 1972.

When he applied for mutation under the Agrarian Reforms Act, he brought everything he could: land revenue receipts, sworn statements from village officials, proof of continuous possession. Still, his claim was rejected in 2009. Without that 1971 entry, none of it counted. It's a story that echoes across the valley.

There are legal options, but they're often out of reach for the average farmer. A civil suit can take years. A writ petition can get stuck in technicalities. A revenue review requires strong evidence, sometimes impossible to gather after decades.

The gap between what's legal and what's just has left many farmers stranded.

There's a reason the law holds tight to the 1971 cut-off. It creates consistency. It prevents false claims. It draws a firm line that keeps the system orderly.

But laws are not only about order. They are about people.

The rule was supposed to protect genuine cultivators. Yet many of them, those who lacked the power, the papers, or the connections, fell through the cracks. They worked the land. They raised their families on it. They still don't own it.

This isn't just a legal glitch. It's a lingering injustice

There's a way to fix this, but it requires political will and administrative courage

Authorities could launch a special verification drive to examine these stuck cases. Courts could offer a more flexible interpretation that allows additional evidence when records are missing. Digitizing old revenue records and using satellite images could help rebuild lost histories. A one-time legislative amendment could offer relief to those left out for no fault of their own.

The point is not to tear down the law, it's to make sure it still serves the people it was meant to protect.

The Kharief 1971 Girdawari gave farmers in Jammu & Kashmir a path to ownership. It also left many locked out. It's time to bridge that gap.

Without action, the land that was meant to free farmers could become the very place where they stay trapped. Not because they didn't work it, but because their names didn't make it to the right piece of paper.

This tension between being part of the larger whole and fighting for local fairness is not new to India.

The country's map has changed many times to make space for voices that felt left out. But the Chenab Valley is not asking for a redrawn map. It is asking for a seat at the table it already belongs to.

The 2019 decision to scrap Article 370 shifted the region's political ground. In its place came new policies and new rumours, like whispers of a separate Jammu state. Meanwhile, the 2024 reservation policy that cut the general merit quota to 40 percent left many in Chenab Valley feeling even more sidelined. It wasn't just about percentages. It was about what gets left behind when no one is paying attention. These debates on social media often slide into sarcasm or partisanship. But at their core is something real. Anzer's fight isn't about scoring political points. It isn't about siding with one party or one region. It's about his home. It's about a valley that keeps asking the same question in different ways: when will we matter? In the end, this is not a story about division. It is a story about belonging. The Chenab Valley isn't asking to leave. It's asking to be seen.

Kashmiris Bet on Mutual Funds

Simple, steady investments like mutual funds are helping Kashmiris move beyond risky shortcuts toward safer wealth-building.

aving money has always been a way of life in Kashmir. But growing that money is a newer idea. As people here look for safer ways to build wealth, many are turning to mutual funds: small, steady investments that can change lives.

The key is compounding. It's how money grows when earnings start earning. Put in 1 lakh today, and over time it can double, then double again. It's not magic, it's patience.

What's changing in Kashmir is that more people now see mutual funds as a safer option. You don't need big money to start. With as little as 500 a month through a Systematic Investment Plan (SIP), anyone can begin.

These funds are handled by professionals and monitored by India's market regulator, SEBI. That makes them safer than the risky schemes that still trap many in the region.

Too often, Kashmiris have been lured by unregulated plans promising fast profits. Many lose their savings chasing these shortcuts. The smarter move is to pick regulated funds, stay invested for years, and let time do the work.

The trick is to focus on quality. Look for strong, steady funds with honest advisors. Past performance matters, but it's not everything. The future depends on careful choices and patience.

In Kashmir's uncertain economy, learning to save is no longer enough. Learning to invest smartly is now part of building a safer future. Wealth comes, not from chance, but from small, steady steps.

On Monday, June 30, Anzer Ayoob, a journalist from the region, said it plainly. "There is no reservation for the Chenab Valley," he wrote in a post on X. "Every Chenabi knows the discrimination that has held us back."

The scribe was not making a new demand. He was giving words to what many already know: the region is falling behind.

The schools, the roads, the jobs are never enough. The potholed streets of Kishtwar speak for themselves. This is a place that powers the rest of the region through hydroelectric projects like Dul Hasti and Ratle, yet the benefits rarely stay. The gains move downstream. The risks remain.

The push for Chenab Valley to have its own administrative division isn't about separating from anyone. It's about making sure someone is responsible. Someone who lives close enough to understand. Someone who will visit more than once a year.

This is not the first time the idea

has surfaced. In 1996, Farooq Abdullah promised more control for the

region. In 2000, a Hill Development Council was proposed. In 2014, people marched through Doda to call for divisional status. In 2019, Omar Abdullah pledged his support. The promises faded, but the need did not.

The latest round of debate began when Muzamil Vaid, a social media user, floated the idea of carving out a Jammu state that would include Chenab Valley. For many in the valley, this idea

felt like a step backwards. It would fold the region into a larger plan that overlooks its own distinct history, language, and culture.

Anzer Ayoob pushed back. The Chenab Valley, he said, cannot be reduced to a bargaining chip in bigger power games. It is not simply an extension of Jammu, nor does it see itself as a pawn in these talks of divi-

sion. It has its own rhythm, its own stories, its own scars.

The online conversation that followed showed how deep these divisions run. Some, like Burhan Dar and Sabir Ayub, supported the idea of a unique "Chenabi" identity, one that holds together different communities, languages, and cultures. Others insisted the Chenab Valley has always belonged to the Jammu division. Some accused Anzer of ignoring local identities or promoting outside interests.

His response was measured. He called himself "a native Kishtwari, ethnically Kashmiri." His focus was not on labels. It was on basic needs: roads that hold up in the rain, schools that open on time, jobs that don't require leaving home.

His call was for a Divisional Commissioner who would focus on Chenab Valley's people, not just

Why Airlines Shouldn't Penalize Kashmir's Stranded Trekkers

'm writing to share the distress faced by hundreds of Indian trekkers who had planned to explore the Kashmir trails this season.

Many of us had carefully planned these trips, some months in advance, only to see them abruptly cancelled after the recent terror attack in Pahalgam.

Security concerns and new restrictions have now forced trekking operators to suspend major expeditions, including the famous Kashmir Great Lakes and Tarsar Marsar routes.

In the face of such an emergency, the cancellations clearly fall under what is commonly known as force majeure-a situation beyond anyone's control.

But what's deeply unfair is how the trekkers are being treated by airlines. Despite the extraordinary circumstances, travelers are being denied full refunds. Many are now losing a significant portion of their travel expenses to cancellation fees, with no real alternatives like rescheduling or credit options being offered.

Most of the affected trekkers are

young professionals, students, and adventure lovers. They followed government advisories and prioritized their safety, but are now being made to pay the price for a situation they neither caused nor could have predicted. It feels as though the systems meant to protect us in times like these are simply missing.

There seems to be no coordination between the airlines, the Civil Aviation Ministry, and the Tourism Boards to create a fair response for travelers caught in emergencies. It leaves ordinary people stranded, financially and emotionally.

Kashmir is one of India's most treasured trekking destinations, and incidents like this shouldn't scare travelers away. But unless airlines show empathy, and unless the authorities step in to build proper protections, this will only weaken the trust people place in the system.

I sincerely hope the government, airline companies, and tourism authorities will listen and offer a solution that puts fairness first.

A Wonder That Lives Off the Map

In the hills of Ramban, far from the noise, a town waits with meadows, healing springs, and a way of life that stays with you.

The road to Gool winds through the hills of Ramban like a forgotten thread, stitching together forests, small homes, and the hush of mountains that seem to listen more than speak.

In this corner of Jammu and Kashmir, where the air grows sweeter and the summers softer, Gool sits, not in a hurry, not trying to be seen, just there, as it has always been.

When I first heard about the town, it was a passing mention, the kind of place people recommend with a wave of the hand, half expecting you won't go.

But something about it called me. Maybe I was looking for air that didn't burn in June. Maybe I was just tired. The valley had been wilting under

a hard sun. Srinagar was gasping at thirty-five degrees, the streets thick with dust and restlessness.

In Gool, I was told, the breeze still ran cool across the meadows, and the forests still smelled of pine.

I packed light and left for a place I had only heard in stories. What I found was something I had not known I was missing.

The days in Gool do not follow the same rhythm as the cities. They stretch and soften.

The mornings arrive with a thin gold light that falls over the hills and slips into the streams. The evenings walk in slowly, the air growing tender, the sky folding itself in a soft blue-grey.

The pine trees lean over the paths, the leaves whisper under your feet, and the meadows seem to hold their breath as you pass.

One afternoon I wandered toward Ghora Gali, where the grass opened up in wide, gentle patches between thick forests. I sat there for hours, listening to the birds and the faint rustle of wind moving through the trees. There was no rush to leave. The place seemed to know that.

Further along, about ten kilometers from Gool, the road led me to Dagantop, a place that knows how to fill your eyes.

tired muscles.

It was like standing on the edge of a green sea, the meadows rolling out in soft waves, stitched with wildflowers and brushed by air that carried the sharp, clean scent of the mountains. In the distance, the folds of hills rose

In the distance, the folds of hills rose and fell like the slow breathing of the earth. They say in winter, the place transforms, thick with snow, alive with sledges and skiers.

But in June, it felt like standing inside a story where the pages turned with the wind.

Some places in Gool are not known for grand views, but for the way they let you be still. Rama Kunda is like that, a small space tucked into the lap of the hills, where the trees stand tall and close.

There, you can sit with your thoughts and let them settle, like dust in a glass of water. You don't need to speak. The place understands.

On the last day, I found myself at Tatta Pani, where warm sulphur springs bubble up from the earth, known to soothe aching joints and People come here from nearby villages, from towns further away, to feel the water on their skin, to lean into its slow medicine. I let my feet sink into the warmth and watched the way the steam curled up into the air, soft and steady, as if the ground itself was breathing.

The places we stayed became part of the memory. In Gool, we spent our nights at a small Forest Hut, where the scent of pine slipped in through the windows, and the air was fresh enough to wake you before dawn.

In Sangaldan, the Farooq Naik Guest House welcomed us with simple comfort: a room that felt like it belonged to the hills, not borrowed from somewhere else.

But places, no matter how beautiful, become something more because of people. My brother-in-law, Syed Abid, made sure of that. His warmth, his careful planning, his small kindnesses stitched the trip together in a way that no guidebook could. His team, Bashir Sahib, Amir, moved like old friends, making sure every path we took, every meal we had, felt like it had been waiting for us. In their company, I was not a visitor. I belonged.

Gool is not a place that calls attention to itself. It is not loud. It does not clamor for tourists. But it holds something rare: the ability to make you slow down, to feel the air, to see the way light falls on grass, to hear the story of a stream as it moves over stone.

When I left, I carried more than just pictures. I carried the shape of mornings spent in meadows, the sound of crickets in the dark, the touch of warm springs on tired feet, and the memory of a place that does not ask you to be more, only to be present.

Some places you visit. Some places stay with you. Gool, for me, is the latter.

In a Father's Shadow

In the valley's pervasive silence, a father's love continues to speak where words have long fallen away.

t has been five years since my father Abdul Rehman Khanday passed away. Yet, his absence never learned how to stay still. It moves through my days. It sits across from me. I still turn, at times, half-expecting to see him

where I know he isn't. Some people go, but they do not leave. My father lived without ceremony. His life had weight, but no noise. He spoke the truth, even when it unsettled people. Some misunderstood his words, but no one who knew him doubted his heart. He didn't know how to be dishonest. His words could be sharp, but his

soul was light. He was not a man

who carried bitterness. At home, his love lived in the small things. He didn't just provide; he stayed. On long exam nights, when my siblings and I studied into the early hours, he would rise silently, make tea, and place it on our desks with his own hands. He would sit in the corner of the room, his presence enough to steady us, and he would not leave until we closed our books and drifted to sleep. He never said much. He didn't need to. His being there was the language he spoke best.

There were no easy doors for him. He built everything from the ground up, inch by inch. No shortcuts, no inherited comforts. His life was a slow, deliberate climb. He worked so that we wouldn't have to start where he did. For his children, he became the ladder. And he made sure the ladder held.

He raised us to stand upright. He made us careful, made us curious, made us aware that dignity was not a gift, it was a responsibility. That was his craft. That was what he left behind.

I grew up inside his mind as much as his home. He loved to follow world affairs. In the early 2000s, Kashmir's sky was heavy with conflict. Credible news was hard to find. But we had Sharbeen, the BBC's Urdu service on the radio. Every morning at seven, and every



evening at nine-thirty, I would sit beside him, listening. He didn't ask for silence, but we fell into it. We followed the distant voices that made the world feel both larger and closer. Those hours shaped me more than he knew. He didn't hand me opinions. He gave me the tools to form them.

He met life's difficulties with calm. When hardship came, he did not crumble. His faith carried him. "Whatever Allah does is for the best," he would say. It is that same belief that steadies me now.

He did not leave behind wealth. What he gave us was better. He gave us the dignity of his name, the weight of his kindness, the shelter of his values. He taught us to move through the world without arrogance. He taught us to speak carefully. He taught us to live in a way that did not harm.

Even now, his presence lingers. His voice, his steady hands, and his soft laughter live in the rooms I walk through. He is not gone. He has simply become part of me.

has simply become part of me. I carry him in the way I think, in the way I sit with silence, in the questions I still ask.

When my own time comes, I pray Allah reunites me with him. Let that be my Paradise.

Gross GST Collections Rise 6.2% To Over Rs 1.84 Lakh Cr In June

NEW DELHI- Gross GST collections increased by 6.2 per cent to over Rs 1.84 lakh crore in June but slipped below the Rs 2 lakh crore mark recorded in the previous two months.

Gross GST collections stood at Rs 1,73,813 crore a year ago, as per government data released on Tuesday.

In May, the Goods and Ser-vices Tax (GST) collection was Rs 2.01 lakh crore. It touched a record high of Rs 2.37 lakh crore in April this year.

In June, gross revenues from domestic transactions rose 4.6 per cent to about Rs 1.38 lakh crore, while GST revenue from imports grew 11.4 per cent to Rs 45,690 crore.

The gross Central GST revenues stood at Rs 34,558 crore, State GST revenues at Rs 43,268 crore and Integrated GST at about Rs 93,280 lakh crore in June. Revenues from Cess were Rs 13,491 crore.

Meanwhile, total refunds during the month rose by 28.4 per cent to Rs 25,491 crore.

The net GST mop-up stood at about Rs 1.59 lakh crore, registering a 3.3 per cent year-onyear growth.

Looking at the numbers on a month-on-month basis, the net GST collections of June this year have shown a reduction of



8.48 per cent, with collections from the domestic market and imports showing a fall, Karthik Mani, Partner, Indirect Tax,

Coming on the 8th anniversary of the introduction of GST, it is hoped that such muted growth in collection on a yearon-year basis is just an aberration and GST collections would be back to the usual growth trajectory in the coming months, he added.

While large states like Maharashtra, West Bengal, Karnataka, Rajasthan, and Tamil Nadu have reported collection increases of 4 to 8 per cent, other states like Uttar Pradesh, Punjab and Gujarat reported contraction between 1 and 4 per cent.

Some states like Haryana, Bihar and Jharkhand have shown median increases of 10 per cent. According to Vivek Jalan, Partner, Tax Connect Advisory, after two successive months of Rs 2 lakh crore plus GST revenues and double-digit growth, Rs 1.85 lakh crore collections in June

NEW DELHI- The central government on Tuesday approved an Employment Linked Incentive scheme with an outlay of Rs 1.07 lakh crore to create 3.5 crore jobs over the next two years through social security schemes run by the retirement fund body EPFO.

Rs 2000 banknotes continue to be legal tender. On May 19, 2023, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) announced the withdrawal of Rs 2000 denomination

banknotes from circulation. In a statement, the RBI said the total value of Rs 2000

banknotes in circulation, which was Rs 3.56 lakh crore at the close of business on May 19, 2023, when the withdrawal of Rs 2000 banknotes was announced, has declined to Rs 6,099 crore at the close of business on June 30, 2025. "Thus, 98.29 per cent of the



Rs 2000 banknotes in circulation as on May 19, 2023, have since been returned," the central bank said.

The facility for deposit and/or exchange of such banknotes was available at all bank branches till October 7, 2023. However, this facility is still available at the 19 issue offices of the Reserve Bank. Since October 9, 2023, the

RBI issue offices are also accepting Rs 2000 banknotes from individuals and entities for deposit into their bank accounts.

Further, people can also send Rs 2000 banknotes through India Post from any post office within the country to any of the RBI issue offices for credit to their bank accounts.

Maruti, Hyundai See **Double-Digit Fall In June Sales Amid Demand Slowdown**

utomakers Maruti Suzuki and Hyundai Motor India reported a double-digit drop in vehicle dispatches in July amid a demand slowdown in the domestic market.

Mahindra & Mahindra saw an increase in dispatches to dealers last month, while Tata Motors witnessed a dip compared to June last year.

The country's largest carmaker Maruti Suzuki said its total domestic passenger vehicle dispatches to dealers dipped 13 per cent to 1,18,906 units last month compared to 1,37,160 units in the year-ago period.

Sales of mini-segment cars Alto and S-Presso declined to 6,414 units against 9,395 units in the same month last year.

Sales of compact cars, including Baleno, Celerio, Dzire, Ignis, Swift, and WagonR, also fell to 54,177 units from 64,049 units in June 2024. Utility vehicles Grand Vitara, Brezza, Ertiga, XL6, and Jimny clocked sales of 47,947 units last month compared to 52,373 units earlier.

"The slowdown in passenger vehicle sales is largely due to a sharp decline in the smaller segment cars. Historically, passenger vehicle sales used to grow at 1.5 times the GDP growth. But now, even after 6.5 per cent GDP growth, the car market is nearly flat," MSI Senior Executive Officer Rahul Bharti said.

"Markets traded lacklustre and ended almost unchanged, taking a breather after Monday's decline. Following an initial uptick, the Nifty moved in a narrow range and eventually settled at 25,541.80. Buoyancy in global markets-especially the US-along with stable domestic cues suggests that the prevailing trend is likely to continue," Ajit Mishra - SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said.

Gold Snaps 7-Day Losing Streak; Rallies Rs 1,200 To Rs 98,670/10 G

98,150 per 10 grams (inclusive of all taxes) on Tuesday. It had closed at Rs 97,050 per 10 grams in the previous market close.

"A retreat in the US dollar, driven by concerns over the ballooning US fiscal deficit and the market's focus on President Donald Trump's proposed tax-cutting and spending bill, has made gold more attractive," Abans Financial Services' Chief Executive Officer Chintan Mehta said.

President Donald Trump has also threatened new tariffs on Japan ahead of the July 9 deadline for the implementation of reciprocal tariff. These shifts are helping non-yielding assets like gold hold up, especially with inflation expectations still running high, Mehta added.

In addition, silver prices rallied by Rs 2,000 to Rs 1,04,800 per kilograms (inclusive of all taxes) on Tuesday. The white metal had finished at Rs 1,02,800 per kg on Monday.

'The petitioners have not placed on record any documentary proof of the fact that they had applied for the citizenship in terms of the Citizenship Act or Rules," the court said, adding, "There is thus, clear evidence to explain the fact that the petitioners on the strength of passport of Pakistan and Visa, permission were granted to them to visit India."

The court said that there is nothing on record to suggest that their request for grant of citizenship of India has been accented "They are staving in India on the strength of Pakistani passports, the period of which has expired and after expiry of the extension of their stay they had to return to their country," the court said, adding, "The petitioners are residing in Srinagar since 1988 and during this period they have not placed anything on record to show that they are citizens of this Country." Referring to of the Citizenship Act of 1955, the court noted that in terms of legislation's Section 9(1), "a citizen who voluntarily acquires citizenship of another country after commencement of the 1955 Act or between 26th January, 1950 and date of commencement of the 1955 Act, upon such acquisition, such citizenship automatically cease to be citizen of India." "Petitioner No. 1 (Mohd Khalil Qazi) ceased to be a citizen of India as he migrated to Pakistan and is a citizen of Pakistan. Petitioner No. 2 (Arifa Qazi) has voluntarily acquired the citizenship of Pakistan after her marriage and their son is a citizen of Pakistan by birth," the court said, adding, "Therefore, immediately upon acquiring the citizenship of Pakistan, they cease to be citizens of India. Thus, voluntary acquisition of citizenship of another country by an Indian citizen results in the termination of his Indian citizenship.

The corruption case has already rattled the campus, where students and alumni once gathered freely on weekends to swim. Those visits have grown less frequent in the months since the harassment began.

"We used to hear laughter in the yard," Dr. Mushtaq said. "Now, the weekends feel quieter."

The swimming pool remains in place, but it now carries the weight of a story that is still unfolding.

The accusations came during a year when water levels in Kashmir's canals have visibly shrunk Across the valley, shrinking water flows, longer dry spells, and uneven rainfall have deepened concerns about how resources are shared. In such an environment, it becomes easier to weaponize environmental claims, and more difficult to separate genuine concerns from the use of those claims to exert pressure. In Harwan, environmental language became a tool. "They said they were protecting the canal," Dr. Mushtaq said. "But they were never really looking at the water." The nearby fishery, which continues to draw water from the same canal, has not faced similar scrutiny. No inspections have been ordered at its site. The case has also highlighted the power that local officials can hold over small institutions like village schools. Across Kashmir, schools, farms, and businesses often operate within a delicate balance of official permissions, local politics, and community ties. When that balance tips, as it did in Harwan, there are few protections available. The Anti-Corruption Bureau's case is still moving through official channels. Statements have been recorded. Files have been submitted. The legal process, though now active, moves carefully. For Ďr. Mushtaq, the experience has left the school standing, but not untouched. He walks the schoolyard now with a slow pace. He stops by the pool, watching its still surface, aware that its meaning has changed.

in large parts of the northeast, many areas of eastern India and extreme southern peninsular India.

IMD Director General Mrutyunjay Mohapatra said during an online press briefing that there is a high chance of heavy rainfall in central India and the adjoining southern peninsula.

This includes east Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Odisha, adjoining areas of Vidarbha and Telangana and parts of Gujarat and Maharashtra.

"We should monitor the catchment areas of rivers such as the Godavari, Mahanadi and Krishna. Our models show a high probability of above-normal rainfall in the upper Mahanadi catchment, which includes Chhattisgarh and Madhya Pradesh. There are several other rivers in the region. We must closely watch rainfall activity and the water levels in reservoirs." he said.

He added that good rainfall is also expected in Uttarakhand and Haryana.

"This region includes several cities and towns, including Delhi. Many south-flowing rivers originate in Uttarakhand. We must take The pilgrims will be escorted by a

robust security convoy along the 270km Jammu-Srinagar National Highway (NH-44) to ensure their safety.

More than 3.31 lakh devotees have registered for this year's yatra so far, officials said. On-the-spot registration has also begun at Jammu, with nearly 4,000 tokens distributed over the last two days. Over 3,500 pilgrims are currently staying at the Bhagwati Nagar base camp.

Reviewing the final arrangements on Tuesday evening, LG Sinha said, "I have witnessed the last four yatras, and from the perspective of pilgrims and facilities, the arrangements this time are better than before. From the security point of view as well, the forces have made foolproof arrangements," Sinha told reporters during his visit to the base camp on Tuesday evening.

The LG was greeted by enthusiastic devotees chanting "Bum Bum Bhole", "Har Har Mahadev", and "Baba Barfani Ki Jai" as the atmosphere at the base camp turned devotional. He interacted with the pilgrims, who expressed satisfaction with the arrangements.

"Considering the way devotees are pouring in from across the country, hope the numbers will increase in the coming days," he said, adding that more than 5,000 pilgrims have already arrived in Jammu.

Seeking the support of the people of Jammu and the wider region, Sinha said, "I seek the support and cooperation of the media and every citizen of Jammu and Kashmir. This yatra belongs to everyone. It is not just the responsibility of the administration or security forces.'

The LG, who also chairs the Shri Amarnath Shrine Board (SASB), chaired a high-level meeting earlier to assess preparedness. Jammu and Kashmir Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo also reviewed arrangements at the base camp and confirmed that all required facilities, including medical aid, transportation, and security, are in place.

Âuthorities have implemented a robust security plan with a multi-tiered grid, CCTV surveillance, and daily traffic advisories. The Security Wing of J&K Police has taken charge of the

systems and K-9 squads, with vul-nerable areas like Udhampur and Ramban receiving heightened focus.

Meanwhile, BSF personnel are on high alert along the 200-km International Border from Akhnoor to Kathua. The area is under a three-tier security mechanism involving the BSF, Army, and local police to pre-empt cross-border threats.

A key safety feature introduced this year is the mandatory RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) tracking for all pilgrims, allowing real-time monitoring of their movement. This is expected to enhance response time in case of emergencies.

Joint mock drills, including landslide preparedness exercises, were recently conducted in Udhampur and Pahalgam to test coordination among the forces and ensure operational readiness.

Due to security and logistical constraints, helicopter services for the yatra will not be available this year. Authorities have strongly advised all pilgrims, including those traveling in private vehicles, to move only with official convoys.

To ensure the smooth passage of yatra vehicles, the Traffic Police have enforced a detailed traffic management plan effective from July 2 to August 9. Certain routes in Jammu city and along the highway will be temporarily closed or diverted to prioritize pilgrim convoys. The public has been urged to cooperate and adhere to the traffic advisories issued.

But the key fact that shaped the court's decision was their Pakistani citizenship, which they had both acquired – Arifa through marriage and Mohammad Khalil long before their return.

The High Court, led by Justice Sindhu Sharma, has now pointed to Section 9 of the Citizenship Act, 1955. The law makes it clear: when an Indian citizen voluntarily becomes a citizen of another country, Indian citi-

zenship is automatically lost. The court found no evidence that the couple's efforts to reclaim Indian citizenship had ever been formally approved.

"They are staying in India on the strength of Pakistani passports," the court noted. "There is nothing on record to suggest that their request for grant of citizenship of India has been accepted."

The court reviewed several communications the couple had sent to Indian authorities over the years, including a letter to the Chief Minister of Jammu and Kashmir in 1989.

But these attempts, the court said, did not amount to a formal citizenship process. Their passports, the court concluded, were proof enough that they remained Pakistani citizens.

The decision also leaned on earlier Supreme Court rulings, which affirmed that acquiring foreign citizenship automatically ends Indian citizenship.

In one recent case, the court noted that a child born to parents who had obtained citizenship elsewhere could not claim Indian citizenship by birth. In the Qazi case, the judges said

2nd Test: Gill Hopes To Take Measure Of Dukes Balls' Changing Behaviour

BIRMINGHAM: The rapidly evolving behaviour of Dukes, including the ball going soft 40 overs onwards, has created a major challenge for the Shubman Gill-led India in England.

Gill has been getting inputs from the likes of KL Rahul, Rishabh Pant and Ravindra Jadeja, who have been to England multiple times, on how the Dukes has evolved in the last 7-8 years

At Leeds, India missed the services of a second spinner on day five as England made short work of the 371-run target to go 1-0 up in the five-match series.

India needed their pacers to strike in the run chase but, barring Bumrah, none was able to make inroads. By the time the new ball was due, the game was as good as over.

On Tuesday, Gill spoke about his preference for an extra spinner in the 40-60 over phase over a pacer who would find it tough to contain the aggressive England batters.

"I have spoken to some of the players who were part of the 2018-19 series and they said the balls were slightly different in that series.



Even in the 2021 series as well, the ball was doing a little bit more. The ball stopped doing between 40-60 (overs) but then 60-80, the ball started doing again a little bit," said the

captain. "And in this match that we played and even in WTC that we saw, after the 40 overs or 45 overs, the ball becomes quite soft.

"So even if there is something happening from the ball because it's soft, it's not the carry or there's not enough from the ball where you keep creating chances from the ball.

"We felt that it is easier to contain the runs for spinners than for fast bowlers, especially when the ball is old. In these conditions, the ball does not swing as much after 30-40 overs," he added.

Sighting The Red Cherry, A **Problem Area**

India dropped as many as seven catches at Leeds and that hurt them badly. Gill hoped that the worst is behind the team on the fielding front and the players can sight the ball better going ahead.

"This is one factor that the ball swings behind the wicket. You must have seen here that there are many problems in sighting the ball, especially when the fielders are standing in the square behind the wicket.

'Their team and our team, when there are stands behind the wicket or there are visuals behind the wicket, sometimes the ball is in sight very late. But we all know that it is difficult to sight the ball and the ball swings behind the wicket.

"It is very rare that 5-7 catches are missed in very few matches. Hopefully, it will not happen in the future," added Gill.

Indian Cricketers Stay Indoors After Suspicious Packet Found

"We were alerted just before 3pm, and a number of buildings have been evacuated as a precaution while it's assessed. Please avoid the area," the message read.

Prima Facie RCB Is Resp onsible For The Gatheing: CAT

The Central Administrative Tribunal (CAT) on Tuesday observed that the Royal Challengers Bengaluru are "prima facie responsible" for the stampede outside Chinnaswamy Stadium on June 4, which led to the death of 11 people.

Nearly 2.5 lakh fans thronged the MG Road and Cubbon Road areas near the stadium after RCB announced a victory parade from the Vidhana Soudha and a fan engagement programme at the stadium to celebrate the team's maiden IPL triumph.

.therefore, prima facie it appears that the RCB is responsible for the gathering of about three to five lakh people. The RCB did not take the ap-propriate permission or consent from the Police," the CAT noted.

The RCB had posted in its social media handles about the parade and the fan engagement on the morning of June 4, and the Tribunal noted that the police department did not have sufficient time in its hands to manage such a large gathering at such short notice.

"Because of shortage of time on 04.06.2026, the Police was unable to do the appropriate arrangements. Sufficient time was not given to the Police. Suddenly, the RCB created the aforesaid type of nuisance without any prior permission." (PTI)

India is bidding to host the 2036 Olympic Games for which there has been a massive push to create infrastructure and bring events of international stature

to the country.

MANCHESTER: The great Saudi Arabian soccer experiment is on full show at the Club World Cup.

The oil-rich kingdom, which is spending billions of dollars to become a major player in the world's most popular sport, scored a big win on the field Monday when Al Hilal beat Premier League giant Manchester City 4-3 to advance to the quarterfinals.

It was a seismic result in soccer terms; possibly the biggest upset of the tournament and precisely the type of statement Saudi Arabia has wanted to make since embarking on a project that will ultimately see it stage the World Cup in 2034.

We wanted to show that Al Hilal has the talent, the power to be here," said defender Kalidou Koulibaly, who was among a slew of star players paid fortunes to leave



Europe's top clubs for the Saudi Pro League in recent years.

Superstar signings and ones that got away

The biggest of them all was Cristiano Ronaldo, who completed one of the most stunning moves in soccer history when joining Al Messi and Kylian Mbappe.

Confirmation that Saudi Arabia had won the right to host the World Cup came in December. On the field, the Club World Cup was the first chance for the country to make a global statement about the growth of its domestic game, which is largely unheralded outside of Asia.

It is likely why Al Hilal – Saudi Arabia's most successful team was so eager to make another marquee signing before the tournament began and tried, but failed, to lure Manchester United captain Bruno Fernandes.

It pulled off a coup by hiring coach Simone Inzaghi. The Italian arrived after leading Inter Milan to a second Champions League final in three seasons and he is already making a mark with his new team after drawing 1-1 against Real Madrid in the group stage and then beating City.

The broader picture is what Al Hilal's run says about the standard of soccer in Saudi Arabia, which has been dismissed by some as a cash grab for players, who can earn far more than if they'd remained in Europe.

Despite recruiting so many players from Europe's top clubs – including Champions League winners N'Golo Kante, Riyad Mahrez and Roberto Firmino - it is difficult to judge the quality of the Saudi League.

Can Al Hilal win the Club World Cup?

The question now is how far Al Hilal can go. Next up is Brazil's Fluminense in the quarterfinals in

No HMV other than designated HPSVs shall be allowed as per order issued by SDM Chhatroo vide No. SDM/C/2025-26/146-53 dated 16-05-2025 and SDM Kokernag vide No. SDM/KNG/665-71 dated 16-05-2025.

Mughal Road:-

Subject to fair weather and good road condition, after getting green signal from Road maintenance agencies (GREF). LMVs Passenger/Private Cars shall be allowed from both sides on Mughal road viz from Jammu towards Srinagar and vice-versa via Poonch. However, HMVs (Local Livestock) upto six tyres only shall be allowed from Poonch towards Shopian. These vehicles shall be allowed from Behramgala (Baffliaz) and Herpora (Shopian) at 0600 hrs. upto 1900 hrs. as per order issued by District Magistrate Poonch vide No. DMP/JC/8517-23 dated 05-06-2025.
