
India Revives Strategic Chenab Dam Project Amid Indus Water Shift

After more than 60 years of stalled approvals, NHPC floats design tender for Jammu and Kashmir's biggest hydroelectric venture.

Srinagar: On the banks of the Chenab River, a project first imagined more than six decades ago is finally preparing to take shape.

The Sawalkot Hydroelectric Power Project, long billed as a potential game-changer for India's energy map, has officially moved to its tender stage, marking the first real step toward construction since it was conceived in the 1960s.

The National Hydroelectric Power Corporation (NHPC), the central agency overseeing the project, issued a 200 crore tender on July 29 for the planning, design, and engineering of

the 1,856-megawatt facility. The tender, which covers

"Package 1," is only the beginning. Additional tenders for construction and development will be floated in the coming months.

For Jammu and Kashmir, a region often marked by delayed promises and uncertain timelines, this signals a shift in pace.

Once completed, Sawalkote will be the largest hydroelectric project in the Union Territory,

capable of producing nearly 8,000 million units of electricity annually, enough to power millions of homes across the northern grid.

The scale of the project is matched only by the wait that preceded it.

Trump's Tariffs & Penalty For 'Friend' India

Washington: US President Donald Trump has announced a 25 per cent tariff on India from Aug 1, amid signs of some stalemate in the ongoing negotiations between the two countries on a bilateral trade deal.

Trump, announcing the tariff, listed India's high tariffs, its procurement of "vast majority" of military equipment and energy from Russia as well as "obnoxious non-monetary trade barriers". India will be paying a "tariff of 25 per cent plus a penalty" from August 1, he said, adding "we have a massive trade deficit with India".

The US president, in a social media post, however, described India as a "friend". While India is our friend, we have, over the years, done relatively little business with them because their



tariffs are far too high, among the "highest" in the world, and they have the "most strenuous and obnoxious" non-monetary trade barriers, he said.

Also, they have always bought a vast majority of their military equipment from Russia, and are Russia's largest buyer of energy along with

Srinagar: Chief Minister Omar Wednesday for a high-stakes two-day visit aimed at reassuring travellers and re-establishing Jammu and Kashmir as a safe and welcoming tourist destination. Boulder Hits Army Convoy In Ladakh, 2 Soldiers Killed

Srinagar: In a tragic incident eastern Ladakh, two Indian Army personnel, including a Lieutenant Colonel, lost their lives while three others sustained injuries when a massive boulder fell onto their vehicle during a convoy movement near Charbagh, close to Durbuk in the Galwan sector, officials said on Wednesday.

The accident occurred around 11:30 am during a routine training movement from Durbuk to Chongtash, about 200 kilometers from Leh. The boulder, dislodged from a cliff, came crashing down on one of the Army's SUVs, crushing the vehicle and injuring all five occupants.

The Army identified the deceased as Lieutenant Colonel Bhanu Pratap Singh Mankotia and Lance Dafadar Daljit Singh, both from the 14 Sindh Horse

regiment. The injured include Major Mayank Shubham (14 Sindh Horse), Major Amit Dixit, and Captain Gauray (60 Armoured Regiment), who were promptly evacuated and are currently undergoing treatment. "The vehicle was badly man-

gled under the weight and impact of the boulder," an official said, adding that recovery operations were launched swiftly despite the challenging terrain.

Lt Gen Pratik Sharma, Army Commander Northern Command, along with all ranks, paid rich tributes to the fallen soldiers. "Northern Command stands firm with the bereaved families in this hour of grief," the Army's Northern Command posted on X (formerly Twitter).

13.6 Mn Mobile Numbers Deactivated In Fraud Crackdown: GoI

Delhi: Union Communications Minister Jyotiraditya M. Scindia on Wednesday informed the Lok Sabha that the Government has disconnected over 1.36 crore mobile numbers as part of a nationwide crackdown on telecom fraud.

Responding to questions in Parliament, Scindia said the government has taken several tech-driven steps to combat cyber threats under the Department of Telecommunications (DoT), in coordination with the Ministry of Home Affairs.

A key initiative, the Digital Intelligence Platform, integrates 620 institutions—including 570 banks, 36 state police units, telecom



agencies-to enable realtime coordination against scammers misusing telecom infrastructure.

To increase citizen involvement, the Sanchar Saathi portal, launched in May 2023, has received over 15.5 crore hits, while its mobile app-launched in January 2025—has over 44 lakh downloads. | More on P6

Major Doctor Reshuffle On Cards In J&K: Itoo

Srinagar: Health Minister Sakina Itoo on Wednesday said that a major reshuffle of doctors is on cards in J&K to address long standing issues in the healthcare system.

Itoo expressed concern over the practice of doctors being posted at their preferred locations for decades, which she said hampers the system's progress.

"We are now considering a major reshuffle. It is ironic that doctors have been sitting at the same place for ten years or more. People have told us that such practices-staying in one place for so long—do not help the system. If this continues, the system will not improve." Itoo said.

She emphasized that the government's focus is on ensuring proper patient care, with a commitment to providing good treatment to the people of Jammu and Kashmir. "We have also implemented strict vigilance and equipped hospitals with necessary equipment," she added.

Addressing recent com-plaints, the Minister highlighted issues related to night-duty staffing in hospitals. "There have been many complaints that senior doctors are absent during night shifts. Interns are present, but senior doctors are not on duty. We conducted several visits to hospitals to verify this situation," she said.

Itoo acknowledged that while some hospitals have junior doctors on duty, senior doctors often do not stay through the night. "This issue needs to be taken seriously—senior doctors must be present during night shifts, not just | More on P6

Study Reveals Genes Responsible For Stuttering, Could Be Similar To Those Causing Autism, Depression



n analysis of genetic data of more than a million people has revealed genes responsible for stuttering and could be similar to those causing autism, depression and impaired music abilities. Researchers from universities and '23andMe', a genetics research company, in the US found 57 distinct points on a chromosome -- which carries genes -- that were associated with stuttering, a speech disorder marked by repetition in words and syllables, prolonged sounds and frequent breaks between words.

The findings, published in the journal Nature Genetics, could help develop methods for an early identification and treatments for stuttering, the team said.

"There have been hundreds of years of misconceptions about what causes stuttering -- from ideas about lefthandedness to childhood trauma to overbearing mothers. Rather than being caused by personal or familial failings or intelligence, our study shows that stuttering is influenced by our genes," author Jennifer (Piper) Below, director of the Vanderbilt Genetics Institute at Vanderbilt University, US,

Stuttering or stammering while speaking is related with a reduced quality of life, affecting one's performance in school and prospects at work, along with mental and social well-being. The researchers added that an improved understanding of causes may



replace outdated perspectives of stuttering that contribute to stigma surrounding the speech disorder.

The study analysed data from 99,776 people who either stuttered or stammered and from a million others who did neither. Genome-wide association studies -- a

technique to analyse entire genomes of a group of individuals to identify gene variants linked to a specific trait "of more than one million individuals (99,776 cases and 1,023,243 controls), (helped in) identifying 57 unique loci." the authors said.

'We further show genetic similarity of stuttering with autism, depression and impaired musical rhythm across sexes. with follow-up analyses highlighting potentially causal relationships among these traits," they said.

The team added that stuttering can set in during a child's development between ages two and five. However, it is more common among teenage boys and adult men, they said.

The 57 distinct genomic loci uncovered in the study were mapped to 48 genes, associated with stuttering risk. Genetic signatures differed between men and women, which could relate to a persistent stuttering versus recovered stuttering. Below said.

This meant that an adult with a stuttered speech could be more likely to reflect current stuttering in a male and recalled stuttering in a female, she explained

The researchers also determined traits previously associated with the genes they identified for stuttering and found links with neurological, obesity or metabolic, cardiac or circulatory traits, among others.

Further, the gene 'VRK2' was the "top hit" for genes associated with stuttering in men, which was also the top hit in a study of beat synchronisation (which looked at one's ability to clap to a beat) and that of language decline Below said.

'Burn Fat, Not Fuel

Public Bicycles Remain Unused In City

Srinagar: The much-hyped Srinagar Smart City Limited's public bicvcle-sharing initiative, once launched under the catchy slogan 'Burn Fat, Not Fuel', has seemingly collapsed under the weight of poor planning, lack of infrastructure, and dismal public engagement.

Designed to promote ecofriendly commuting and healthy lifestyles, the initiative installed cycle docks at various prominent locations in the city. Today, however, rows of green-colored bicycles lie idle, untouched and gathering dust, as citizens increasingly view the project as a symbol of wasted potential.

While the vision was ambitious, to weave cycling into Srinagar's daily urban life, the execution, locals say, has been uninspiring at best. "The cycles are there, but no one uses them. Why would anyone, when there's no safe space to ride

them?" questioned a shopkeeper near Lal Chowk.

Absence of dedicated, uninterrupted cycling tracks has emerged as the primary concern. Where tracks do exist, residents complain they are either incomplete or encroached by roadside vendors, robbing cyclists of any sense of safety. "Cycling amidst honking cars and encroachments is more stressful than convenient," a college student said.

Moreover, the requirement of installing an app-based registration system to unlock the bikes has also discouraged many, particularly the elderly and those with limited digital literacy. "It's not user-friendly. Why can't it be simpler?" asked a commuter who once tried the service but never returned to it.

Adding to the project's woes is the lack of any awareness campaign or on-ground promotional drive from the Srinagar Smart City Limited (SSCL). Residents say the initiative was launched with flair but forgot-

ten soon after. "There has been no motivation, no follow-up, no cycling events, not even posters. How do you expect people to adopt something they barely know about?" said a school teacher from Rajbagh.

According to KNT, citizens and civic groups now urge a critical reassessment of the project. "This initiative had promise, it could have helped reduce traffic congestion, cut down emissions, and promoted health. But it turned into a stillborn idea due to official indifference," remarked a local environmental activist.

Ironically, what was meant to encourage citizens to burn fat instead of fuel, has ended up burning public funds, with little to show in return.

Urban mobility experts believe that without dedicated lanes, easier access systems, community engagement, and a sustained promotional effort. such initiatives are bound to fail, no matter how noble the intent.

Build On The Stability

ome Minister Amit Shah's statement in Parliament that terrorism in Jammu and Kashmir has dropped by nearly 80 per cent in the past decade is significant. He said the union territory has witnessed a steep fall in terror incidents, civilian casualties, and attacks on security forces, a reality borne out by the data. According to figures he shared, while 7,217 incidents occurred between 2004 and 2014, the number fell to 2,150 from 2015 to 2025. Civilian deaths came down from 1,770 to 357 and security personnel deaths from 1,060 to 542.

Shah credited this change to the Centre's post-2019 policies, especially the revocation of Article 370. The abrogation remains contentious in the Valley, but the government believes it allowed for tighter administrative and security control, resulting in what it calls the "destruction of terror infrastructure." The Home Minister also praised Operation Mahadev, a recent offensive said to have wiped out lingering terror cells, and claimed that not a single terrorist in the region today is of Indian origin, a bold assertion that shows a shift in both the geography and psychology of militancy in the region.

However, this security narrative needs to be examined alongside other ground realities. The revival of tourism in Jammu and Kashmir is a key marker. Over the past two years, the region has seen a dramatic uptick in tourist footfall. From the Dal Lake to the meadows of Gulmarg and the spiritual routes of Vaishno Devi, the numbers have soared. Hotels are running at full capacity during the summer months, and new routes, including homestays in offbeat locations like Bungus Valley and Doodhpathri, are gaining popularity. This is a silent but powerful vote of confidence in the improving security situation.

Yet, J&K has still some way to go. The path ahead can be complex and fraught. More time is needed for the stability to culminate into a long-term peace. Nevertheless, an 80 per cent decline in terror is no small feat. It is a rare moment of optimism in a region longmarred by violence and despair. What we need to for this stability to sustainis for this to be matched with political outreach and sustained economic growth. The progress tourism needs to be backed up with investment in the economy and job creation. This can give the youth a stake in the altered state of affairs.

India's New Education Vision

Five years after NEP 2020, the shift to local languages and indigenous knowledge is reshaping how young Indians learn.

s July 2025 marks five years since the ratification of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, India stands at a pivotal point in its education reform journey.

Designed as a sweeping roadmap to reshape the nation's learning landscape, this policy lays out a vision for an inclusive, flexible, and skilloriented education system.

It imagines a country where learning is deeply grounded in India's cultural ethos, and where students develop strong cognitive abilities, critical thinking skills, and a deep sense of ethical and social responsibility.

At its core, NEP 2020 is a deliberate move to reconnect India's education system with its rich intellectual and cultural roots.

By promoting indigenous knowledge traditions that were long overlooked or marginalized, the policy does more than set academic goals. It seeks to restore a sense of intellectual independence.

Its success, therefore, must be measured not just in test scores or literacy rates, but in how effectively it reclaims and integrates India's civilizational heritage into modern learning.

Among the most significant shifts NEP 2020 introduced is its strong emphasis on multilingual education and mother tongue-based instruction.

The policy recommends that children receive instruction in their mother tongue or local language at least through Grade 5, and preferably until Grade 8. This departure from previous policy frameworks marks a new clarity of purpose and direction.

Over the past five years, meaningful strides have been made toward promoting linguistic inclusion.

According to the Unified District Information System for Education Plus (UDISE+) 2020–21, instruction for Grades 1 to 5 is now delivered in 28 Indian languages. This reflects a conscious recognition of the country's linguistic diversity.

The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) has approved the use of local languages for technical education, with 19 institutions in 10 states already implementing this change.


National-level entrance exams such as the JEE and NEET are now offered in 13 Indian languages, broadening access for students across the country.

The DIKSHA portal supports these efforts by providing textbooks and teaching resources in 33 Indian languages, including Indian Sign Language, for Grades 1 through 12.

Early indicators suggest these initiatives are beginning to yield results.

The ASER 2024 report notes gains in foundational reading and arithmetic skills, particularly in government schools. These improvements point to the benefits of instruction in familiar languages, helping children grasp concepts more confidently and retain knowledge more effectively.

The NEP also reaffirms the three-language formula, giving priority to the mother tongue

or regional language, alongside Hindi and English. This model aims to build linguistic versatility, encouraging both cultural rootedness and global competence.

Still, implementing this approach has been far from simple.

Some states, such as Tamil Nadu, remain firm in their preference for a two-language model, reflecting deeper political and cultural concerns.

Moreover, the All India School Education Survey (AISES) reveals a declining trend in mother tongue education in urban schools, where English is often perceived as a more valuable tool for upward mobility.

These tensions underscore the challenges of balancing educational best practices with societal aspirations and perceptions.

Another central aim of NEP 2020 is to bring India's civilizational knowledge into the mainstream, particularly through the structured integration of Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS). This effort seeks to harmonize traditional wisdom with contemporary learning to address current societal needs while nurturing moral, humanistic, and constitutional values.

Implementing IKS involves significant curriculum reforms led by institutions such as NCERT and SCERTs. The goal is to include age-appropriate and relevant content rooted in India's knowledge traditions.

The teaching methods being promoted emphasize hands-on, project-based, and inquiry-driven learning instead of rote memorization.

For instance, new Class 6 science textbooks now include Sanskrit shlokas, traditional units like angula (a unit based on finger width), and local stories about celestial bodies, clear examples of how ancient knowledge is being made relevant to today's learners.

In higher education, the University Grants Commission (UGC) has mandated that at least 5 percent of academic credits in undergraduate and postgraduate programs be dedicated to IKS-related coursework.

The creation of dedicated IKS Research Centers and Teacher Training Centers is underway, and digital platforms such as DIK- SHA and SWAYAM are being leveraged to make open educational resources available on IKS themes.

These are foundational steps toward building an education system that respects and reflects India's unique knowledge ecosystem.

Still, the path to full implementation remains complex.

Teacher shortages, especially in regional and classical languages, persist, and many educators lack specialized training in multilingual instruction or in teaching IKS effectively.

The success of both these initiatives depends heavily on building a professional, well-resourced, and motivated teaching workforce.

The government remains committed to realizing the NEP's full potential by 2030–40, in alignment with the broader "Viksit Bharat 2047" vision for national development.

This long-term goal places education reform at the heart of India's future, emphasizing that investing in knowledge, values, and skills is fundamental to becoming a truly developed nation.

Five years into its journey, NEP 2020 has established itself as a bold and necessary roadmap for reimagining education in India. It provides a forward-looking framework to equip the country's youth with the tools they need to navigate an ever-changing world, while staying connected to their cultural inheritance.

The road ahead will require steady resolve, sustained cooperation among stakeholders at every level, and flexible strategies that adapt to the needs of learners and communities.

Yet the promise is clear: to build an education system that is fair, inclusive, and truly empowering, one that prepares every learner to contribute meaningfully to both national development and global progress.

Kashmir's Fragile Landscapes Are Falling Apart

From the alpine meadows of Sonamarg to the shimmering waters of Dal and Wular, the valley's beauty carries generations of meaning. But all of it is now under growing threat.

In places like Gulmarg, Dachigam National Park, Hokersar, and Haigam, the signs are clear: forests are thinning, wetlands are vanishing, glaciers are retreating. And with every passing season, the changes feel more permanent.

In Sopore, where I grew up, elders still talk about the wetlands as if they are alive. Today, many of those wetlands have shrunk or disappeared altogether.

appeared altogether.

A scientist at the University of Kashmir put it plainly: in just two decades, half of our wetlands have been lost. Forest cover is declining. Glaciers are melting faster. These are the daily reality in the region.

The causes are many, and they

all point to us. Tourism has exploded without much planning. There's no serious waste management in highaltitude tourist zones. Forest land is being encroached upon, sometimes illegally and sometimes by design. Sewage flows unchecked into rivers and lakes. And urban expansion, especially around Srinagar, is swallowing up green zones.

Then there is the changing climate. Snowfall patterns have become unpredictable. Glaciers no longer behave the way older generations remember. Weather is erratic, and so are the rivers that depend on it.

We saw what that meant in 2014, when the valley experienced one of its worst floods. Entire neighbourhoods were washed away. Thousands were displaced. Experts later said the damage could have been reduced if wetlands had not been encroached upon. But here we are, nearly a decade later, and the story is repeating

itself, just in slower motion.

The impact is everywhere

The impact is everywhere. Farmers are facing erratic seasons. Apple orchards are flowering too early or too late. Saffron fields are drying out. Rice paddies don't get enough water. Water sources are polluted, and that has led to a rise in disease.

And there's more at stake than just livelihoods. Kashmir's economy depends on tourism, and tourism depends on nature. If the snow thins out in Gulmarg or the Dal loses its sparkle, visitors will stop coming. That would be devectating

would be devastating.

Nature is livelihood as well as identity in Kashmir. This land is part of who we are. The forests, lakes, and rivers carry our memories. Our songs, crafts, and customs are tied to them. To lose the environment is to lose something far deeper than scenic beauty.

So what can be done? Experts say we need clear rules for tourism, especially in mountain zones. Footfall should be limited. There must be strict checks on construction and pollution. Wetlands should be revived, not drained. Forests should be replanted. The laws for protecting land and water already exist. They just need to be enforced.

And without local communities involved, none of this will last. People must be part of the solution, through awareness campaigns, village-level conservation work, and schools that teach children how to care for their own surroundings.

Right now, Kashmir is at a tipping point. If these trends continue, the land will not be able to recover. The beauty that brings poets to write and tourists to marvel could soon turn into memory.

And once it's gone, it won't come back.

The Old Guards Kashmir Needs Today

As rural Kashmir battles addiction and administrative disorder, it's time to revive the overlooked power of traditional village sentinels.

grew up in a south Kashmir village where everyone knew ev-Leryone. If a stranger passed by or a dispute flared up over land boundaries, it was the lumberdar or chowkidar who stepped in. They didn't wear uniforms or hold degrees, but they carried something rarer: the village's trust.

Today, I rarely hear their names mentioned in serious conversations about rural policy or reform. Their duties have become symbolic, their roles reduced to lines in revenue

And yet, the village is hurting again, just in newer, more complicated ways.

Across Jammu & Kashmir, especially in rural districts, heroin, opioids, and synthetic drugs have begun to hollow out communities. Young men who once helped harvest apples or attend college now loiter, lost and restless.

Families stay silent out of shame. Villagers whisper but don't report. Local police are stretched thin. The social fabric is tearing apart, and we are running out of hands to hold it

This is where I believe we must return to the idea of the lumberdar and chowkidar.

Historically, lumberdars were village-level heads who collected revenue, mediated conflicts, and kept the government informed about life in the village. Chowkidars acted as watchmen who reported unnatural deaths, crimes, or sudden disturbances.

These weren't high-profile positions. They were embedded in the everyday rhythms of rural life.

Though their legal status still exists in parts of J&K, their salaries, often just honorariums, and official roles have withered. Their local wisdom, however, remains alive. They know who owns what, who recently returned from jail, whose sons dropped out of school, and which panchayat decision stirred

This knowledge can be transformative if we dare to use it again.

The fight against drugs in Kashmiri villages needs more than police raids and awareness camps. It needs eyes on the ground, people

who notice when a new vehicle starts coming around at night or when a teenager's routine suddenly

Lumberdars and chowkidars can help track suspicious activity, alert families early, and support rehabilitation efforts. With training and a legal mandate, they can become partners in prevention.

Imagine a village cell, headed by the lumberdar, assisted by the chowkidar, filing a monthly report to the block officer. They note signs of drug circulation, changes in school attendance, and new outsiders moving in. It sounds basic, but it's the sort of low-cost, community-led monitoring we're missing.

Apart from drug crisis, they can help in land reforms.

Digitizing land records was a much-needed reform, and J&K has made notable progress with its JAMABANDI and GIS-linked

databases. But many records still contain errors. Oral partitions are missing, names of deceased owners linger, and encroachments go unreported.

Patwaris alone cannot verify everything on the ground. Chowkidars and lumberdars, with their local memory and deep village ties, are best placed to cross-check documents with reality. They can flag inaccuracies, explain disputes, and even help settle longstanding confusion between families.

If we ignore them, digital land

records risk becoming neat lies in a neat system.

To make this work, we need more than goodwill. We need policy.

Start by offering proper salaries: ₹10,000 a month would recognize their time and dignity. Train them in digital tools. Give them identity cards and mandate their involvement in Panchayat planning. Let them learn to send geo-tagged photos, access WhatsApp coordination groups with revenue and police officials, and submit basic monthly reports.

We should not fear giving them power. We should fear what hap-

pens when no one is watching. Some may argue they are too old or uneducated. That's true in some cases. So let them nominate younger assistants. Let them remain as advisors. Let the system evolve, not be discarded.

There's also the risk of misuse: reporting rivals or shielding culprits. But performance reviews, community feedback, and grievance mechanisms can reduce this. Every system has faults. The solution is to

OPD Cover in Health Insurance in India

are part of daily life. That's exactly why OPD cover

is gaining momentum.
An OPD-enabled policy allows you to claim the costs of doctor visits and tests or access cashless services at partnered clinics and labs. It turns insurance into a tool for everyday health needs, not just rare emergencies. It helps families make timely decisions, without waiting for a problem to grow serious enough to warrant hospitalisation.

Take diagnostic tests. Doctors now routinely ask for blood panels, lipid profiles, X-rays, and scans, even during general check-ups. These aren't cheap,

especially in private facilities. In urban centres, a full-body test package can cost more than a week's salary for many workers. OPD cover offsets these expenses and gives people access to necessary care without delay. Medicines are another sig-

ing steadily. A consultation with a specialist can cost between ₹800 and ₹2,000 in most metro cities. Add the price of a test or two, and you're suddenly spending a sizeable part of your income. For most Indians, this is a serious burden.

Lifestyles are changing too. Stress, diet, and pollution have led to a rise in non-communicable diseases. Conditions like high blood pressure, diabetes, and joint pain don't always need hos-pitalisation, but they need lifelong monitoring. OPD coverage supports people in this middle space, where you aren't severely sick, but you need care often.

Medical science has also changed. Earlier, some illnesses required days of hospital stay. Now, many of them are managed on an outpatient basis. Technology has made diagnoses faster and treatment shorter. The insurance model must

match this reality. More people are now aware of what they need from health insurance. The old idea of coverage, paying only when you're in a hospital bed, is losing ground. Policyholders want health plans that match the way they use care: frequent, local, preventive.

Insurers have started to adapt. Several plans now offer OPD benefits, either bundled into the policy or as an optional

add-on. These plans may have slightly higher premiums, but the coverage they offer in dayto-day expense management more than makes up for the cost. They help families seek care when they need it, not when they can afford it.

From an industry perspective, this shift is healthy. When patients receive early attention, diseases are detected earlier. This leads to fewer complications, better outcomes, and lower hospitalisation rates. OPD coverage isn't just good for individuals. It's good for the system.

The next phase in India's

health insurance evolution lies in bridging the gap between emergencies and everyday health. OPD cover is that bridge.

It encourages people to go to the doctor early. It gives parents the confidence to act on a child's fever. It supports the elderly in getting regular check-ups. It helps working professionals manage stress-related symp-toms before they become fullblown conditions.

Insurance is supposed to offer peace of mind. That can't happen if it stays locked behind the hospital gate.

For India's growing, ageing, and health-conscious population, OPD cover is a necessity.

It's time we stop treating it as an add-on and start seeing it for what it really is: an essential part of everyday healthcare.

paperwork. At various points, it ran into resistance from environmental groups, legal petitions, and uneasy residents in nearby villages. Some feared the loss of land, others worried

about the impact on the local ecology. And the fact that the project lies in a seismically active zone added another layer of hesitation.

Plans were drawn, scrapped, and reworked. In its earlier avatar, the project was much smaller. Over time, however, it was scaled up to include nine turbines and an underground

The reservoir alone is expected to store over 500 million cubic meters of water, roughly a fifth of the capacity of Delhi's Bhakra Dam.

Even as engineers refined the technical details, the cost estimates ballooned. From an initial plan that hovered around 8,000 crore, the price tag now stands at over 22,000 crore.

With inflation, delay penalties, and logistical uncertainties, experts suggest that the final figure could cross 30,000 crore if the pace slows

The breakthrough came in June 2025, when the central government classified Sawalkote as a project of "national importance."

The tag is expected to cut through red tape, fast-track clearances, and give NHPC greater

freedom in appointing contractors. The move also fits into a wider strategic

India has been re-evaluating its use of rivers allocated under the Indus Waters Treaty, especially the Chenab. After suspending implementation of the treaty earlier this year, the government has shifted focus toward maximizing the potential of its western rivers.

In this context, Sawalkote is also a statement of intent.

Energy analysts say the project could become a cornerstone in India's push toward cleaner and more reliable sources of electricity. Jammu and Kashmir currently imports a

large share of its power during winters, when local generation drops and demand peaks. A functioning Sawalkote station could ease that gap and also supply surplus electricity to the national grid. Still, the road ahead is steep. Previous proj-

ects in the region have faced backlash when environmental safeguards were overlooked.

In nearby Kishtwar, flash floods have grown more frequent, raising questions about the impact of large reservoirs on local ecosystems. Engineers working on Sawalkote say newer safety and seismic guidelines are being followed, but local trust remains fragile.

"People here have heard of Sawalkote for as long as I can remember," said Ghulam Rasool. a schoolteacher in Ramban district. "Now they want to see whether this time something really happens."

For now, the machines have yet to arrive. The river still flows untouched. But with a formal tender now in place, Sawalkote is finally moving beyond blueprints.

There is no immediate reaction from India on Trump's announcement.

A team from the US is scheduled to visit India next month for the next round of negotiations for the proposed bilateral trade agreement.

India and the US teams concluded the fifth round of talks for the agreement last week in Washington.

India's chief negotiator and special secretary in the Department of Commerce Rajesh Agrawal and Assistant US Trade Representative for South and Central Asia Brendan Lynch held the deliberations.

Studying Implications

The government, an official statement said, will take all necessary steps to secure the country's national interest, as has been the case with other trade agreements, including the latest with the UK.

Trump announced the imposition of a 25 per cent tariff on all goods coming from India, plus an unspecified penalty for buying military equipment and crude oil from Russia.

"The Government has taken note of a statement by the US President on bilateral trade. The Government is studying its implications," the statement said.

It added that India and the US have been engaged in negotiations on concluding a fair, balanced and mutually beneficial bilateral trade agreement over the last few months.

"We remain committed to that objective," the statement said.

"The government attaches the utmost importance to protecting and promoting the welfare of farmers, entrepreneurs, and MSMEs. The Government will take all steps necessary to secure our national interest, as has been the case with other trade agreements, including the latest comprehensive economic and trade agreement with the UK," it added.

The two countries are negotiating a bilateral trade agreement (BTA) from March with an aim to more than double the bilateral trade in goods and services to USD 500 billion by 2030 from the current USD 191 billion. So far five rounds of talks have been completed.

For the sixth round of talks, the US team is visiting India from August 25.

They are aiming to conclude the first phase of the agreement by fall (September-October) this year. The two sides are also looking at an interim trade deal before the BTA.

Responding to criticism over the timing of the operation coinciding with the start of the Parliament session, Shah said, "Had it been possible. I'd have ordered it within a minute of the attack. These aren't planned events. They depend on intelligence, precision, and timing.'

Taking a sharp dig at the Congress, he said, "PoK was lost under your rule. It is the BJP that will bring it back." He also slammed opposition interruptions during his speech. "Who were you trying to save? Lashkar-e-Taiba?" Shah asked, adding that P. Chidambaram's remarks had "exposed the Congress before the nation."

No US Mediation

Jaishankar clarified that no phone calls took place between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Trump between April 22, the day of the Pahalgam terror attack, and June 16. There was no mediation, no pressure. The decision was India's alone," he said.

The Opposition had earlier seized on Trump's comments, alleging that Washington had mediated a ceasefire using trade leverage. Jaishankar dismissed this, reiterating India's policy of zero tolerance towards cross-border

terrorism. Calling the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack "absolutely unacceptable," he said Pakistan had "crossed a red line," and that accountability was non-negotiable. "Blood and water will not flow together," he added, referencing India's decision to suspend the Indus Water Treaty, originally signed by Jawaharlal Nehru, which he said was an act of appearement, not peace.

Jaishankar said India acted decisively through Operation Sindoor, striking terror infrastructure in Pakistan, including Bahawalpur and Muridke. He emphasized that India will continue to respond to terrorism in the same firm manner going forward.

He credited the Modi government's efforts for putting terrorism high on the global agenda, noting that despite not being a UN Security Council member, India succeeded in getting The Resistance Front (TRF)—a proxy of Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taiba—designated as a terror group.

Detailing the government's timeline of response, Jaishankar said the Cabinet Committee on Security met on April 23, a day after the

attack, to authorise immediate action. He also revealed that US Vice President J.D. Vance had informed PM Modi on May 9 of a possible large-scale Pakistani strike. Modi responded that India would deliver an appropriate answer. "And we did," Jaishankar told the House.

He also rebutted opposition criticism of the operation. "Those who mock our actions should watch videos of the funerals of terrorists and damaged Pakistani airfields," he said. Operation Sindoor, he added, has now become the foundation of a new strategic doctrine.

Addressing questions about his recent visit to China, the Minister said it focused on terrorism, de-escalation, and trade. "There was no secret meeting," he added, in a veiled jab at Congress leadership.

He concluded by thanking the multi-party parliamentary delegation that visited foreign capitals post-Operation Sindoor, calling their effort "great national service."

The recovered war-like stores include two assault rifles with ammunition, one pistol with ammunition, hand grenades, two improvised explosive devices, medicines, communication device and other logistic stores, the spokesperson said.

He said the huge recovery of war-like and logistics stores indicates that the terrorists were

well-prepared for prolonged engagement. "This operation highlights a high level of synergy, coordination and commitment on the part of the Indian Army and other security agencies towards maintaining peace and security in the region. Search operation is in progress in the surrounding areas to rule out the presence of any more terrorists in the area,"

The officials said troops on ambush duty, following information about possible attempts by LeT terrorists to sneak into this side, saw the movement of infiltrating terrorists in the Maldivalan area of Degwar sector on the intervening night of July 29 and 30.

The terrorists opened fire on the ambush party and in the ensuing encounter, which lasted several hours, two terrorists were hit. A search operation was launched with the first light of the day and both the terrorists were confirmed dead in the encounter, they said.

The Know Your Mobile Connections feature helped citizens identify and report unauthorized SIMs, resulting in 1.36 crore disconnections. Additionally, the ASTR AI system was used to detect fake mobile numbers, leading to 82 lakh more disconnections.

To curb international spoof calls, the DoT introduced a software solution that blocked 1.35 crore calls on day one, reducing such incidents by 97%. Now, only 3 lakh spoof calls are detected daily. Telecom companies are now required to flag these with "International Call" labels.

The government also deployed the Fraud Risk Indicator (FRI) system to categorize user risk levels based on financial behavior. Shared with banks in real-time, the system has flagged 3.7 lakh users, blocked 3.04 lakh suspicious transactions, and frozen 1.55 lakh bank accounts. The RBI has mandated all banks to integrate FRI into their systems.

In a crackdown on Indian SIMs misused from Southeast Asia, 26 lakh roaming SIMs were disconnected and 1.3 lakh devices blocked.

BSNL Revival and 4G Push

"Many of these handles were operated from outside the country and were found actively involved in sharing false, anti-India narratives, the Minister said in a written reply.

The government took action under Section 69A of the Information Technology Act, 2000, which allows blocking of digital content in cases involving national security, public order, or the sovereignty of India.

According to the Minister, the URLs flagged during this period contained misleading content, provocative material targeting the armed forces and posts with communal overtones, largely traced to Pakistan-based accounts.

To monitor and respond in real time, the government established a centralised control unit, which remained operational round-theclock. This unit, jointly managed by defence personnel, information agencies and the Press Information Bureau (PIB), functioned as a central command for identifying and countering online threats during the operation.

Vaishnaw noted that the PIB's fact-checking team was actively involved in tracking false narratives and issuing timely clarifications. Verified information was shared with the public, and action was taken against posts found to be spreading disinformation.

He also informed the House that the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting issued an advisory to media outlets on April 26. The advisory instructed news platforms to avoid live telecasts of defence activities or troop movements in order to protect operational details and public safety.

"Relevant prison records should reflect their specific needs to ensure suitable accommodations and assistance." the notification adds.

It further states that prison staff should undergo regular training to sensitize them to the needs of prisoners with disabilities and to handle them appropriately.

ACB Probes Ex-Cop For Amassing Disproportionate Wealth

ANANTNAG: the Jammu and Kashmir Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) has initiated a formal probe into allegations of amassing wealth disproportionate to known sources of income by a terminated police official, Selection Grade Constable Firdous Ahmad.

A secret verification by ACB into the conduct of the accused revealed that he had allegedly acquired a range of substantial assets, both movable and immovable, in his own name and those of his close family members, far exceeding his known income as a public servant.

The properties unearthed during verification include a two-storied residential house built by the accused on ancestral land at Hugam in Srigufwara area of Anantnag district, a luxurious mansion on a 1 kanal 10 marla plot in the prime estate of Machbhawan Mattan, and a one-third ownership share in Hotel Grand Lords located at Movora, Tehsil Salar, Pahalgam. In addition, a double-storied house at Tawi Vihar, Sidra in Jammu was also identified as part of the suspected disproportionate wealth.

Subsequently, the ACB registered a case under FIR No. 03/2025 U/S 13(1)(b) read with 13(2) of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 at Police Station ACB Anantnag against the terminated official

Following registration of the FIR, the ACB obtained search warrants from the Hon'ble Special Judge Anti-Corruption Court Anantnag to conduct raids at all the listed properties. During the course of searches, officials also discovered that Firdous Ahmad had been allotted a government police quarter at Police Housing Colony Bemina in Srinagar. This location was also searched under the authorization of SSP ACB Anantnag.

Simultaneous searches at all locations, Hugam, Mattan, Pahalgam, Sidra Jammu, and Bemina Srinagar, were launched by ACB teams, and according to officials, the raids were still ongoing at the time of filing this report.

Further investigation into the matter is in full swing, as the ACB continues to examine financial records, property documents, and other crucial evidence to determine the full extent of the assets and the sources behind their acquisition.
