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Kashmir Sees Sharp Drop In Water Levels

Srinagar: The ongoing dry spell in Kashmir has led to a sharp decline in water discharge levels from key supply sources, triggering concerns about water availability in several areas of the valley.

Chief Engineer, Jal Shakti Kashmir, Er. Rakesh Kumar Gupta said that the prolonged absence of rainfall has disrupted natural water recharge systems. "The persistent dry weather has affected most natural sources feeding the supply lines. Once rainfall occurs or weather patterns change, these sources will be recharged," he said.

He acknowledged that some localities are witnessing reduced water flow, but said the department has stepped up measures to ensure uninterrupted drinking water access. | More on P6



Four Of Family Killed In **Kishtwar Mishap**

Srinagar: At least four members of a family, including a six month old infant, were killed in a road accident in the Dada Sarthal area of Kishtwar district on Saturday, officials said.

Officials said that a Chevrolet vehicle (registration number DL5CE 5634), travelling towards Drabshalla, skidded off the road and plunged into a gorge. Three persons died on the spot, while another critically injured passenger was rushed to a nearby hospital, where she was de-

clared dead on arrival. The deceased have been identified as Ranjeet Singh, 35, son of Poran Chand; his wife Jyoti Devi, 30; their infant daughter Ashu, aged six months; and Simran Thakur, 21, daughter of Om Prakash. All were residents of the Marmat area of Doda district.

Police have registered a case and initiated an investigation to ascertain the cause of the accident.

Meanwhile, Union Minister Dr. Jitendra Singh expressed grief over the loss of lives. In a message on X, he said he had spoken to Deputy Commissioner Kishtwar, Pankaj Kumar Sharma, and conveyed condolences to the bereaved families.

Newborn Found Dead in SKIMS Washroom

Srinagar: In a shocking incident the body of a newborn male infant was found inside a washroom at the maternity hospital under the Sher-i-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences (SKIMS) here on Saturday.

An official told KNO that attendants found the body in one of the washrooms and immediately alerted the administration, which subsequently informed the police.

"Upon receiving the information, a police team reached the spot and took possession

of the body for medico-legal formalities," the official said, adding that the incident has triggered shock and concern among the staff and patients at the hospital.

He said the body was later shifted for concerns to ascertain the exact cause and timing of death. "We are verifying all aspects of the case, including how the infant ended up in the washroom area and who was responsible," the official added.

An investigation has been taken up to establish the circumstances surrounding the death and identify those involved, the official said.

Authorities have urged residents to stay vigilant during wildlife sightings and immediately inform police or wildlife control teams to prevent any untoward incidents. According to KNO, the animal had spent the past several days on an extraordinary trek through Srinagar—first spotted at NIT Hazratbal, then moving through the University of Kashmir campus, SKIMS Soura, and later the Nigeen Lake belt—setting off a large-scale, multi-agency hunt. Wildlife teams, assisted by police, used drones, tranquilliser squads and specialised rescue vehicles to track its movements and keep residents safe.

Authorities said that even after Saturday's successful capture, heightened surveillance would remain in place for the next 24 hours. A second bear, last seen near the University of Kashmir, is still on the loose, and teams are continuing an intensive search to locate and trap it.



Banks are turning a simple yearly form into an exhausting task, leaving many elderly people anxious and confused.

ach year, when life certificates are due, Kashmir's elderly get ready for a familiar routine.

They walk into their bank.

greet the teller they know, hand over a form, and leave confident their pension is safe. It was a simple, personal process for decades, until the online system arrived, promising convenience but

changing everything.

Many welcomed it because it saved time and avoided long queues. Those comfortable with smartphones use the

app easily and enjoy the convenience.

The trouble starts when banks make this the only option, even for those who

Many Kashmiri pensioners enter bank branches hoping to hand over their offline certificate. The response feels cold: "We don't accept offline certificates anymore. Do it online."

Those words hit harder than bank officials realise.

People in their seventies and eighties feel lost. They look around for help, unsure where to go next.

Something that used to be familiar now feels out of reach.

A large number of senior citizens do not own smartphones. Many have never opened an app in their lives. Some live alone. Several rely on neighbours or relatives who are busy or live far away. Others struggle with poor health or limited mobility.

The online process demands confi-

dence with technology, and they simply do not have it.

When they try anyway, things go wrong. Fingerprints fail to scan. Facial recognition refuses to work. Internet signals drop in the middle of the submission. Screens show errors they cannot understand.

Each attempt adds more anxiety. A pension that should bring comfort turns into a source of fear.

These struggles feel even heavier in Kashmir's winters. Snow, delays, and long distances make every trip difficult. Imagine a retired teacher from

Imagine a retired teacher from Baramulla waiting for a shared taxi, or a widow from Pulwama depending on a neighbour's phone, or an elderly couple in Kupwara walking to a cybercafé only to return without success.

None of this should happen for something as simple as a life certificate.

This is why the Finance Department's decision to extend the deadline to 15 December 2025 matters to so many families. It brings relief and lowers the immediate pressure. It shows that someone in the system has noticed the difficulty senior citizens are facing. It gives them time to regroup instead of rushing into a process they do not understand.

The extension helps, but the larger

issue remains.

Senior citizens want choice. They want the comfort of walking into their bank and completing the process the

way they always did.

Offline submission worked well for years. People trusted it because it involved human interaction instead of confusing screens.

Technology feels helpful only when it offers more options. When it replaces old methods without considering people who cannot adapt, it creates exclusion.

Senior citizens are not asking for

Senior citizens are not asking for special treatment. They are simply asking for a familiar door to stay open.

With more time available now, banks can rethink their approach. They can welcome both offline and online certificates. They can train staff to assist older customers instead of turning them away.

A small amount of patience and guidance can make a huge difference for someone who depends on their pension for daily survival. Kashmir's elderly have already

faced decades of hardship. Their pension is their security, and proving they are alive should not be stressful.

The solution is simple: keep online options for those who can use them and offline options for those who cannot.

Senior citizens deserve a process that respects their age, effort, and dignity. They should feel supported, not lost in a digital maze.

The valley grew around social closeness, neighbourly affection, teastall friendships, and long conversations on rooftops or by shopfronts.

Daily life carried an easy sense of community. Digital routines have altered this foundation and pushed many into a sense of isolation that is hard to explain but easy to feel.

Kashmir once built friendships on street corners, fields, and long evening walks in neighbourhoods. These spaces still exist, though they now compete with the glow of phones.

Young people scroll for hours, driven by habit or the need to escape a heavy day. Groups of friends sit together in cafes or on campus lawns while each drifts into a different digital bubble.

The psychological toll of this hyper-connection is visible in small everyday ways.

Kashmiri society prizes warmth and hospitality, though digital interaction flattens emotion. Many compare their lives with filtered timelines and feel a sense of inadequacy. Constant availability creates pressure that leads to anxiety, restless nights, and emotional fatigue.

Even people living in large families speak of feeling detached. Digital presence overwhelms the relationships that once anchored them.

The Wheelchair Word Builder of Kashmir

In South Kashmir, a young man uses books to move beyond physical limits and make a global mark.

ooru sits at the base of gentle hills in South Kashmir, a town shaped by orchards, winding lanes and the steady hum of daily life.

At the edge of this place stands a modest house with one room that wakes earlier than the rest.

Before most families begin their morning routines, a lamp is already on inside. The light falls on a young man seated in a wheelchair with a book resting across his lap.

This is Aamir Rasool Khan, a thirty-year-old proofreader and editor who has lived with a paralyzed left leg since he was twelve.

His hands move across books with ease. Reading is the first thing he does each day, and often the last. "People think I live far from everything," he says, "but books keep my world open."

From his window he can see children running after a football in the lane below. Their voices reach him, and he smiles.

He remembers the day his leg stopped responding. The diagnosis came quickly. Nerve damage, the doctors said. His mother cried into her shawl, and his father had no words. The house felt smaller and heavier.

Then a cousin handed him a worn-out copy of Gulliver's Travels. That book changed everything.

"It felt like a hand pulling me toward something bigger," he says. "I understood that movement can begin in the mind."

School felt far, with steep paths that often turned to slush in winter and dust in summer. Aamir still made the trip, pushing his wheelchair over stones and uneven ground.

"Studying became my way forward," he says. "I kept telling myself that learning was something no one could take from me.'

Teachers remember him as the boy who always arrived with a book under his arm. Some classmates stared at first, unsure of what to say. Over time their curiosity softened into respect.

"He inspired us," says Shabir, who shared a desk with him. "He made reading look like a doorway."

Aamir finished school and went on to complete a Master's degree in English Literature. Power cuts slowed him down, long winters tested him, and the village's weak internet connection delayed many assignments.

But he kept going, teaching himself grammar, proofreading, editing and manuscript review.

His first editing request came from a friend who needed help with an academic paper. Aamir corrected it with patience and precision. The professor praised the work, and soon more students knocked on his door. "We saw how carefully he shaped every sentence," says Tariq, a local teacher. "People trusted him because he respected their words."

He created an online profile with hesitation. Once the first few clients arrived, he realized the wider world valued his talent. Assignments began coming from across India and abroad.

"I was afraid people would judge me without knowing me," he says. "They judged my work instead."

His father, who once feared for Aamir's future, now speaks with pride. "We thought his life would stay limited," he says. "He surprised everyone."

Dooru is full of stories about Aamir. A teenage boy who wanted to quit school stayed after a talk with him. A girl struggling with her writing learned patience by watching him go over every sentence carefully. Shopkeepers stop to offer him tea and ask what book he's reading. During festivals, children crowd around him, eager to hear his latest story.

Aamir remembers being stranded once on the road after a landslide blocked the way. He sat there with a book in his hand while waiting for someone to help. "The world may close a path," he says, "but stories never leave you stranded."

He spends his mornings reading, his afternoons editing, and his evenings talking with neighbours in his courtyard.

During local celebrations, he moves through the bazaars with a book tucked under his arm, stopping to greet familiar faces. People call him "the teacher without a classroom."

Omar Seeks Exam Postponement

Earlier in the day, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah urged the JKPSC to consider postponing the CCE in view of "uncertainty" resulting from Lok Bhavan's "delay" in approving age relaxation for the aspirants.

"The chief minister expressed deep concern over the travel chaos caused by the ongoing airline issues, compounded by the uncertainty resulting from Lok Bhavan's delay in approving age relaxation, a provision granted multiple times in the past," the chief minister's office said in a post on X.

Omar urged the JKPSC to consider the "unprecedented stress" on aspirants and postpone the exam to ensure fairness and equal opportunity for all.

The chief minister's advisor, Nasir Aslam Wani, said the examination should be deferred till the issue of age relaxation, which is pending consideration of Lieutenant Governor, is addressed.

"The elected government is in favour of relaxing the upper age limit for recruitment and we have sent the file to the Lok Bhawan in this regard. Till the process is completed, the JKPSC should defer the examination," Wani, told PTI.

He said the Abdullah government earlier this week sent the file of age relaxation to Lieutenant Governor for approval.

"The file has been returned to General Administration Department with some queries. The GAD has forwarded it to the Public Service Commission for its opinion on the matter," Wani said. **Leaders Urge**

are caught in a tussle between the LG and the CM," she said in a post on X. "In this freezing cold, they are out on the streets asking for nothing more than basic fairness-age relaxation and a reasonable exam schedule. Tarigami further highlighted the ongoing flight disruptions that have left several candidates arriving from outside the Union Territory stranded due to mass cancellations.

"The examination must be deferred until the approval process is duly concluded," he said.

The reactions reflect mounting political on the administration to offer clarity and relief to thousands of candidates who say they are caught between administrative delays and unpredictable travel conditions.

Cold Grips Kashmir,

marking a sharp plunge from the previous night. Shopian remained the coldest location in Jammu and Kashmir as the mercury settled at minus 6.4 degrees Celsius. The drop in temperature comes just a day after most parts of the valley experienced relief with readings rising above the freezing point.

However, a renewed cold wave gripped Kashmir on Friday night, bringing back harsh winter conditions. Qazigund, the gateway town to the valley, registered a minimum of minus 4.2 degrees Celsius, while Kupwara in north Kashmir recorded minus 3.5

degrees Celsius and Kokernag in the south witnessed minus 0.2 degrees Celsius.

Tourist destinations also experienced freezing conditions. Pahalgam recorded a low of minus 4.4 degrees Celsius. Gulmarg, the popular ski resort, touched minus 2.6 degrees Celsius. Konibal town in Pulwama district noted a minimum of minus 5.2 de-

According to the meteorological department, the weather is expected to remain generally cloudy but mostly dry on December 6 and 7. A brief spell of light snowfall is likely in higher reaches of north and central Kashmir on December 8.

Residents, who had welcomed a short reprieve from the cold, are now bracing for another intense winter spell as temperatures continue to fall.

A Difficult First

minister referred to the April 22 attack in Baisaran, Pahalgam and the November 10 blast in Delhi, saying those who believed everything was normal after 2019 were taken by surprise.

Omar warned that the recent terror incidents have pushed the country to a point where any future strike "will be considered an act of war", making preventive action even more critical.

He criticised the existing governance model under Union Territory status, saying elected representatives are excluded from key security discussions. "You cannot operate governments in silos. Elected representatives play no part whatsoever in decisions affecting security," he said.

Omar drew a contrast with his earlier tenure as chief minister, when he received immediate updates from senior police and security officials. "I read about the Delhi blast in a newspaper. I did not know who carried out the attack or how the investigation was proceeding," he remarked. "The Union Territory model does not work."

He also cautioned against policies outside J&K that demand Kashmiri Muslims register with police alongside foreign nationals, saying such measures fuel mistrust and prevent youth from feeling secure in other parts of India.

Omar emphasised that the overwhelming majority of Kashmiris oppose violence. "A minuscule minority supports terror. The majority are the ones you saw on the streets after the Baisaran attack, the ones studying and working honestly across the country," he said.

The chief minister urged the need for trust-based engagement, arguing that alienating an entire community would only harm national cohesion and long-term security interests.

"Good, bad, ugly... I have never shied away from taking responsibility for what I have done. And, therefore, if I have pivoted my government or my politics to ensure a good working relationship with the government of India, I own that. And I will own its consequences," Omar said.

It is important to understand that a good working relationship with the Centre does not mean that his party has any alliance with the BJP, he said.

"I do not see eye to eye with the BJP. I will continue to oppose the politics of the BJP. But at the same time, I will seek to work with the government of India as best possible," Omar said.

On his relation with J&K Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha, Omar said it is a work in progress and "we will leave it at that". (PTI)

800 Flights Cancelled

on Saturday directed the airline to complete the ticket refund process for the cancelled flights by Sunday evening, and ensure baggage separated from the travellers are delivered in the next two days.

The airline had cancelled over 1,000 flights on

The airline said its teams are focused on stabilising schedules, reducing delays, and supporting customers through this period. IndiGo, in a statement, also said it is addressing all

customer refund issues on "priority".

The refund process for all cancelled or disrupted flights must be completed by 8 pm on Sunday, the civil aviation ministry said in a statement. "Airlines have also been instructed not to levy any rescheduling charges for passengers whose travel plans were affected by cancellations," it said.

IndiGo has also been instructed to set up a dedicated passenger support and refund facilitation cells. "These cells have been tasked to proactively contact affected passengers and ensure that refunds and alternative travel arrangements are processed without the need for multiple follow-ups. "The system of automatic refunds will remain ac-

tive until operations stabilise completely," the state-Further, the ministry said the airline should ensure that baggage separated from passengers due to flight

cancellations or delays should be traced and delivered to them within the next 48 hours. "The number of cancellations on Saturday dropped below 850 flights, much lower compared to Friday. We are continuing to work towards reducing

this number progressively over the next few days, The airline's teams are focused on stabilising schedules, reducing delays, and supporting customers through this period, it said, adding, "We are also working closely with all airports and partners to en-

minals, on our website, and via direct notifications." In the two-page order on capping the airfares, the ministry said disruptions in flight operations of one of the scheduled airlines has resulted in flight cancellations, leading to capacity constraints and unreason-

sure timely updates are provided to customers at ter-

able surge in the fares on a number of sectors. The fare limits, excluding applicable charges, are not applicable for business class and UDAN flights. the civil aviation ministry said in an order.

However, the order did not provide clarity on whether the caps are applicable for economy class tickets or both economy and premium economy class

Under the limits, for a flight flying up to 500 kilometres, the fares are capped at Rs 7,500 and for 500-1,000 kilometres, the ticket price cap is Rs 12,000. For flights operating 1,000-1,500 kilometres, the fares are limited at Rs 15,000 and for above, 1,500 kilometres, the cap is Rs 18,000.

The cap means that for a Delhi-Mumbai flight, which is covered in a distance of over 1,300 kilometres, the fare for at least the economy class is capped

The limits will be in place till the situation stabilises, the ministry said in a statement. It excludes User Development Fee (UDF),

Passenger Service Fee (PSF), and taxes on air tickets. The ministry, in the statement, said it will continue to closely monitor fare levels through real-time data and active coordination with airlines and online travel platforms, adding that any deviation from the prescribed norms will attract immediate corrective action in the larger public interest, it added.

These fare limits shall be applicable for all forms of bookings, regardless of whether the purchase is made directly through the airline's official website or through various online travel agents' platforms,"

The ministry has also asked airlines to avoid steep or unusual upward fare revisions on sectors affected

An analysis of fares on airlines' websites on Friday showed that a one-way one-stop economy-class SpiceJet Kolkata-Mumbai flight ticket for December 6 costing up to Rs 90,000, and a similar ticket of Air India for Mumbai-Bhubaneswar going up to Rs

Indian Association of Tour Operators (IATO) President Ravi Gosain said unpredictable spikes damage consumer confidence and create chaos for

A temporary fare cap may provide immediate relief, but the durable solution is better contingency planning, rapid capacity deployment, and transparent fare monitoring, he noted.

Federation of Associations in Indian Tourism & Hospitality (FAITH) Board Member Anil Kalsi said the fare cap is essential to protect flyer rights in India and there is a need for a permanent policy in this regard.

On Friday, when IndiGo cancelled over 1,000 flights from across airports. IndiGo CEO Pieter Elbers. after maintaining a stoic silence over the grave crisis for three days, apologised in a video message for the major inconvenience caused to passengers due to the

In the one-way video communication, Elbers also said that the airline was expecting fewer than 1,000 flights on Saturday.

The regulator DGCA provided temporary relief to IndiGo -- partially owned by Rahul Bhatia -- by rolling back the night duty definition to 12 am-5 am from 12 am-6 am earlier, and allowing its pilots to do six night-landings from two earlier, besides other relaxations.

Meanwhile, the pilots' body, Airlines' Pilots Association (ALPA) India, has taken a "strong" objection to the DGCA's "selective and unsafe" relief to IndiGo, saving that the relaxations have not just "destroyed regulatory parity but also placed millions of passengers at "heightened risk"

"ALPA India expresses its deep concern that this step directly contradicts the Court's directions, which mandate the enforcement of fatigue-mitigation standards rooted in aviation science." the association said in a statement late Friday. "We urge the (Civil Aviation) Ministry and the

regulator to uphold the Court's order in both letter and spirit and to prioritise the safety of the pilots and travelling public above all commercial considerations," ALPA India said. It is worth noting that IndiGo was the first car-

At Jammu airport, three IndiGo flights were cancelled, taking the combined cancellations across the Union Territory to 21 for the day. Two flights connecting Jammu with Mumbai and Hyderabad remained

Passengers continued to face uncertainty and distress. "They were not informing us about the correct status of the flight. We kept waiting for nine hours a day at the airport," said Rajni Goyal, a relieved passenger whose flight finally operated. Many travellers also complained of skyrocketing airfares as alternatives became limited.

Airport authorities advised passengers to confirm their flight status before travel and arrive well in advance to avoid inconvenience.

The disruptions follow 41 cancellations reported across Jammu and Kashmir on Thursday, primarily affecting IndiGo services. The issues have been linked to crew shortages and internal rostering adjustments triggered by recent DGCA safety directives, forcing airlines to recalibrate operations nationwide.

Officials said flight operations are being constantly reviewed and further updates will depend on improvements in airline scheduling and manpower availability. (KNO)

The court noted the numbers are alarming and it was high time that people take traffic laws very seriously.

"We as a society must realize that these lives can be saved if traffic rules are followed," the court observed, stressing that simple measures — such as wearing a seat belt, a helmet or proper headgear, and keeping mobile phones aside while driving — are not mere formalities but essential habits that protect and

"This sense of responsibility should come from within us, not only when a police officer is around to remind us.'

The Court also underscored that underage driving is a major contributor to traffic accidents and congestion, posing serious risks to other motorists and pedestrians

"It is important to realize that Parents/guardians or owners of vehicles are responsible for providing vehicles to their minor children. It is observed many times these minors are driving vehicle, riding bikes in and around, schools or crowded places resulting accidents/loss of lives," the court said, adding, "It is the first and foremost duty of parents not to provide their minor children any vehicle unless they attain majority and have license to drive the vehicle."

The court said that it was also the duty of Principals, Teachers not to allow the minor students to drive the vehicles and impart education regarding these issues. "By allowing minor to drive we are only producing violators and victims and not responsible citizens," the court underlined.

The court directed that copy of the judgment be sent to the Commissioner Secretary School Education J&K with a request to circulate it in all the schools (government or private) and direct them to educate the students as well as their parents or guardians regarding these issues.

"I would also request the Commissioner Secretary School Education to issue directives to all the schools and frame some policy like "No Vehicle policy for Minors" in education institutes. So as to contribute to this noble cause that may save many lives."

Further, the court directed IGP Traffic I&K to conduct a special drives against these minors (Violators).

Worsening Winter Air Quality in Kashmir Raises Health Concerns

SRINAGAR: As winter sets in and temperatures continue to steady deterioration in air quality, raising serious public health 9

Environmental experts and doctors said that prolonged dry weather, increased traffic emissions, biomass burning, and industrial pollutants have pushed pollution levels up, particularly in urban pockets

Residents have reported a visible layer of haze over many parts of the Valley, while air quality monitors have repeatedly recorded PM2.5 and PM10 levels above safe limits in recent days.

The pollution levels remained high with PM10 ranging between 136 and 243 micrograms per cubic metre and PM2.5 between 86 and 167 micrograms per cubic metre, both far above the World Health Organization's safe limits.

Speaking to KNO, Dr Javid Ahmad Bhat, said that the worsening air quality is directly impacting public health. "Outpatient departments in hospitals have begun to see a surge in patients



complaining of cough, breathlessness, chest tightness, burning eyes, and throat irritation,"

"The number of patients with respiratory issues, especially chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and asthma, has notably increased over the past few weeks," he added.

The doctor said that poor air quality aggravates existing conditions and triggers fresh episodes of respiratory distress. Children, elderly, and people with pre-existing lung or heart conditions are especially vulner-

Doctors warned that the impact is not limited to respiratory ailments.

A cardiologist working at GMC Srinagar said that prolonged exposure to polluted air increases the risk of heart attacks, high blood pressure, cardiac arrhythmias, and stroke. "Fine particulate matter enters the bloodstream and can cause inflammation, which puts additional strain on the heart," he said.

Studies have also linked poor air quality to fatigue, headaches, decreased immunity, anxiety,

They advised keeping windows closed on hazy days, wearing N95 or KN95 masks while outdoors to filter harmful particles, drinking plenty of water to help flush toxins from the body, using air purifiers indoors, especially important for patients with asthma, heart disease, or chronic lung issues.

"Avoid burning trash or biomass, as this is one of the major contributors to harmful pollutants; ventilate rooms during afternoon hours when pollution levels are relatively lower," the doctors said. They called for taking extra care of vulnerable groups

J&K Sees Over 230 **Enforcement Drives Against Tainted** Fertilizer Supply: GoI **Observer News Service**

SRINAGAR: In a crackdown on malpractices in fertilizer supply, authorities in Jammu and Kashmir have taken more than 230 enforcement actions against black marketing, hoarding, and the supply of substandard products during the current Kharif season. Union Ministry informed in the Lok Sabha.

As per the data submitted by J&K to the Centre, the Union Territory conducted 3,694 inspections between April 1 and November 28, 2025, to check irregularities in the supply of urea, DAP and other fertilizers.

As per KNO, during this period, authorities issued 142 show-cause notices, cancelled 44 licences, and registered two FIRs for black marketing-related

tions in the UT Under hoarding-related enforcement, the UT served 31 notices, cancelled two licences, and reported no FIRs. "J&K issued 55 showcause notices for substandard quality cases, while eight notices were served in diversion-related checks, though no FIRs were lodged under these categories.'

India Win ODI by 9 Wickets, Clinch Series Against South Africa

VISAKHAPATNAM: Yashasvi Jaiswal reeled off an unbeaten maiden ODI hundred, carrying India to a nine-wicket victory in the third and final one-dayer and a 2-1 series win against South Africa here on Saturday.

here on Saturday.

It was always a case of the margin of victory once Jaiswal (116 not out, 121 balls) and his senior opening partner Rohit Sharma (75, 73 balls) stitched 155 runs in 25.5 overs, and it turned precisely so as India finished with 271 for one in 39.5 overs, chasing 271.

Virat Kohli contributed a classy 65 not out off 45 deliveries.

Quintonne de Kock made a refined 106 off 89 balls, his 23rd tonne in ODIs, but it remained a shiny footnote as Indian batters dictated the

course with authority.
Jaiswal was not comfortable initially in his innings, but the assured presence of Rohit at the other end was a massive blessing for him.

Rohit guided the understudy, who was playing only his fourth ODI, through some early turbulent phases and also did the bulk of the scoring

The 38-year-old reached his fifty in 54 balls, tranquil by his standards, but those patented, magical swivel

pull shots, three of which sailed for sixes, lent the innings a touch of aggression.

It enabled Jaiswal to collect runs unhurriedly and walk to fifty in 75 balls. But once he reached fifty, the left-hander grew in confidence and opened up a lot more, unbuckling some of those drives and cuts that he carefully avoided in the early phase of his innings.

Rohit, who became the fourth Indian batter to reach 20000 international runs during his knock after Sachin Tendulkar, Rahul Dravid and Kohli, looked set for another hundred.

But an ill-timed sweep off left-arm spinner Keshav Maharaj cut short his stay. But that didn't deter Jaiswal, who, accompanied by Kohli, kept India's innings moving.

The 23-year-old reached the coveted three-figure mark in 111 balls with a single off pacer from Corbin Bosch and immediately tore his helmet away to slip into an energetic celebration — a combination of sprint, jump, roar and punch in the air.

Jaiswal and a typically assertive Kohli added 156 runs for the second wicket as India calmly went past the target to whip up some frenzy among a nearly

27000-strong crowd. Earlier, a largely disciplayed its part in keeping South Africa to a manageable total, an effort led by pacer Prasidh Krishna (4/66)

and Kuldeep Yadav (4/41).
After Arshdeep Singh sent back Ryan Rickelton early, De Kock (106, 89 balls, 8x4, 6x4) struck his seventh century against India and put on 113 runs off 124 balls with skipper Temba Bavuma (48, 67 balls) as the visitors moved to a healthy position.

De Kock was severe on Prasidh (4/66), who erred on length continuously in his first spell (2-0-27-0). The left-hander biffed the pacer for 6, 6, 4 in his second over to milk 18 runs.

The 32-year-old quickly pounced on anything that was short, and pacers Prasidh and Harshit Rana offered him plenty of feed on his pet areas.

De Kock moved to fifty in 42 balls and never let the tempo down, reaching his hundred in 79 balls.

India found temporary relief when Ravindra Jadeja induced a false slash from Bavuma (48, 67 balls) to get caught by Kohli at point.

But the tourists got another move on through a 54-run partnership between De Kock and Matthew Breetzke for the third wicket, and at 168 for two in 28 overs they were in a good position to

JKBOA (K) Office Bearers Call on MD & CEO


